Millennial Dawnists Bible Students Association Convention.

Large Christian Gathering.
 Millennial Dawn Doctrine a Wonder to all.
 Don Pepe's Theatre the scene of the most helpful Lectures ever offered in Port Limon, Costa Rica.

A convention of "Believers in the Reason for all", under the auspices of the International Bible Students Association, Port Limon C. R. was held on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday at Don Pepe's Theatre. Prior to the convening of these meetings large placards were pasted over the town, announcing the meetings. In addition to these there were several artistically-printed programs distributed all over the town which served as inserts.
 The large and spacious hall, where this convention was held, and unique meeting was held was the scene of light and beauty and the attraction of passers by throughout the program. Immediately over the front door was a banner marked with white letters on red ground "Bible Students Association." The walls of the Theatre were tastefully decorated with Motto cards and Scripture texts in large letters "GIFTS FREELY." No collection plates, pews, cotton and bouquet were well in evidence that presented a charming picture to the audience, and the floor itself is a full emblem of the glorious doctrine of restraint.
 A feature of this gathering that struck us most was the preparing of this hall, which we believe must have cost a large sum, and which on their programme was pointed in large letters "GIFTS FREELY." No collection plates, pews, cotton and bouquet were well in evidence that presented a charming picture to the audience, and the floor itself is a full emblem of the glorious doctrine of restraint.

On Friday 28th, ultimo, the first of the series of meetings and according to the programme was a Praise Service which included an address of welcome followed by general testimony. The meeting was opened by the singing of hymns and prayer, at the conclusion of which Mr. V. E. Sims led a neat and well chosen speech which was to the convention and introduced Mr. Ellis. Mr. Sims in expressing thanks for his honor conferred on him in setting him a chairman again, said "Let us be content not do justice to his occasion, but let us be sure that it is called upon in his name as he was there to answer his call. Rightly did he do so, and also we commend him as a herald of the International Bible Students Association Convention and in behalf of the local church. A general testimony by the brethren followed and at the close of prayer was offered and that ended the first meeting.
 The next meeting was on Saturday 29th at 9 a. m. Praise Service, followed by Lecture entitled "The Glorious Kingdom of God." The subject was treated by Mr. F. R. Hucho the pastor of Pleasant T. Utah in Costa Rica. He treated the question as well as home with his subject in an accessible and impressive way. This meeting closed a few minutes past seven o'clock.
 The next meeting was convened at 10 a. m. and was a Bible Study, Topic: "The Kingdom of Nature." The text book used for the occasion was "Soberly in the Scripture" Vol. I, page 173 Mr. J. L. A. Conde presided over this meeting. This study was very profitable and many questions were asked and in every instance the answers were edifying. This study occupied two hours.

Four o'clock brought on the next session, which was a Symposium on the Fruits of the Spirit of Love. Gal. 5: 22. The topics were: "Love and Joy," "Peace and Kindness," "Gentleness and Gildness," "Faith and meekness" and "Temperance." Five of the brethren handled these different fruits of the Spirit and at the close of the meeting they were all highly praised for the manner they acquitted themselves.

The last meeting for the day was conducted by Mr. J. L. A. Conde. His topic was Baptism into Christ's Death. Rom. 6: 3-6. At 7 p. m. The chairman commenced the meeting by the singing of hymn 42, followed by prayer and another hymn when the lecturing came forward in a masterly manner due to his subject. His soul seemed to have glided while he spoke. Never in the annals of Costa Rica was the term baptism so well defined. At the end of his exhortation he called upon those who had considered themselves to the Lord to occupy the front seats. He asked them a few questions and after answers in the affirmative he gave each a hearty shake hand, accepting them in the beloved.
 The following morning Oct. 30th, at 9 o'clock the first meeting of the day was commenced. This service was in the form of a lecture, at the meeting as on previous occasions operated by hymn and prayer. The lecturer was Mr. Edward Somers and the topic was "Take heed to yourselves." The lecture throughout was listened to with marked attention and we believe the listeners and those whose hearts were in a prepared condition received a blessing. We believe this speaker if given more opportunity would have shown the characteristics of an orator. The meeting was brought to a close at seven o'clock.

The brethren and friends assembled again at 12 o'clock for another lecture at the home of Mr. Edwin Maxwell. Lik: the previous session this meeting was a lecture, entitled "The Grace of God." Mr. J. L. A. Conde spoke. The speaker did not at all disappoint his audience, he was from the start to finish he of his hearers as if were spot found and at the end of his fall hour discourse was accepted worthy of his position.
 At 3 p. m. the brethren and brethren and friends assembled to listen to another lecture by Mr. J. L. A. Conde, entitled "Weaning the Little Child." Phil. 1: 14. The meeting was opened with hymn and hymn. The lecturer then came forward and in his plain manner handled his topic much to the satisfaction of all that were there to hear him. The meeting was closed at 4 o'clock.

The fourth and last meeting for the day was commenced at 6:45. This also was a lecture entitled "The spirit and power of the Holy Spirit." 1 Cor. 12: 3-13. Mr. J. L. A. Conde again handled his high fluted discourse. The cultured lecturer gave the entire history of the Christian religion and proved the fact that different religions if nominal Christianity developed and their benevolent effect upon mankind. He then dealt with the various forms of Christianity as the daughters and sons of the Mother Church of Rome. Rev. 17: 1-5. 8:14, 21. He showed that upon his text meant doctrine and that it was proper that we should believe in and we it to many say doctrine we hear before we put it. He then proceeded to play the Hymn of God after he had showed up the colors of all the various denominations he proved that the Bible was that Hap and was in accordance with the same, which spans from Genesis to Revelation. This lecture did not fail to impress the audience and it was in an ideal manner that he treated to hear him. The meeting ended 10 p.m.

On Monday 31st and at 3 p. m. was the commencement of the last day of the convention season. This meeting was held in the Convention Students Hall. It was on the program a Praise Service followed by several hymns and prayers were indulged in when Mr. J. L. A. Conde again made a plea of the Holy Spirit and the work which was "Communion with the Lord." Luke 22: 13-35.

The religious picture held at this hall was at 1:30 p. m. and called a Question Service. This meeting was convened for the purpose of asking questions and answers on religious matters. Many questions were asked and answered. Many answers made plain the fact that we should not let our hearts be deceived. Mr. Conde to the charge of the meeting.
 The last meeting of the convention was commenced at 7 p. m. The topic for the evening was the Path to glory, honor, and immortality, illustrated from a chart of the pathway which should be followed. The hall was filled and extra accommodation was provided. As on the previous occasion the lecture was very profitable and must be his charge and like a true soldier handled his weapon, the truth with Christian boldness.
 We believe the impression this convention has made upon the public will be of the greatest value and that the behavior was all that could be desired.

Crippen the Condemned.

Crippen has been found guilty of the murder of his wife. Beyond the shadow of a doubt we believed he had been guilty. One cannot help feeling a chilling numbness when the sentence of death is passed on a fellow-creature; yet we are brought face to face with a murder which has been committed in the most atrocious manner. Reading the circumstances under which the deed was perpetrated we find that all the plans for the murder had been well laid, and deliberately carried out, that we feel certain that not a voice in the whole of Christendom to-day will be raised in pity for the condemned man. Human nature has indeed sunk to great depths of degradation, when men like Crippen, in order to get rid of their wives would use their professional skill so to dissect the body, that there would be little chance of the identification of the remains. One's whole nature revolts against the man who after having poisoned his wife with such wicked coldness and devilish intention sets about to carve a human body into what may be nothing else than unrecognisable bits of human flesh, which he afterwards buries in the cellar.

How the blood of his murdered wife must have cried out for vengeance from that cellar! Was he never haunted by the dead memory and face of his wife! Did his memory not lash him like the stings of the Scorpion! Is his conscience scared

or dead? We are told that in order to bring the criminal to justice, the British Government expended much money. In this case we have theobical lesson set before us, that be sure your sins will find you out; that punishment is sure, certain, and it is bound to overtake wrongdoing, and that we can never escape being hauled before the bar of justice for the wrongs which we have committed. The many and various agencies which Crippen employed to help him conceal the deed, have all now turned against him, and were the means of weaving the acts aroused him out of which it was impossible to extricate himself. The eye of retribution had followed him even over the bounding main, and when he thought that he was safe from all detection, the secret had leaked out. There is such a thing as retribution, that even at the expense of time and energy we try to cover our sins and wrongs, there comes a time some day when all is laid bare and naked before the scrutiny of the public that we become so mortified to know that after all there is nothing that can remain covered under the sun that we begin to call up to the mountains to fall us and so bid us from the 'public view forever. But into what heart-rending position has the girl Le-Neve found herself dragged by her connection with Crippen. She seems to have been brought to by the magnetic influence of Crippen, and because the victim of the scheming villain. In her estimation no doubt Crippen appeared to be the paragon of goodness and perfection, though the world viewed him quite differently.

Set free by the Court of Justice from death that would have been one of a murderer, we ask has she yet been disillusioned, has she yet seen the crime in all its hideousness. Probably, in spite of it all she still sticks to him and reveres his memory, with the sublime loyalty of woman, who prefers to stick to the side of the one they love though the world scorns and holds them in the greatest reprobation. Poor girl she stands pilloried, crown with shame she has suffered, but we cannot help our hearts going out to her as she passes through such terrible bodily and mental agonies. It is men of the stamp and type of Crippen that the world stands aghast at. His heart seems to have been bereft of all kindness and sympathy. Would it be amiss if we compared him to Nero! Society cannot do better than rise in its judgement against such a being and calculating murderers; and denounce them in the most scathing terms.
