Praises the Work on Canal

Bishop Bury Considers the Moral Side of Things

Splendid National Work of Every Kind Being Done at Panama, Says the New Coadjutor Bishop of London—Central American Revolutions Fewer Now.

Bishop Herbert Bury, who has just been made Bishop Coadjutor to the Bishop of London, is in New York for a short visit before he takes up the duties of his new office, a jurisdiction that embraces all of northern and central Europe. And in spite of the fact that he is going from the tropics to Moscow and St. Petersburg the Bishop is enthusiastic about his new assignment. Up to a few weeks ago he was Bishop of Central America, and had just finished his work in consecrating the new churches in Jamaica that have been rebuilt since the earthquake four years ago.

Bishop Cheshire of North Carolina represented this country at the consecrating of the churches. Bishop Bury's especial work was taking care of the small army of laborers, most of them colored that are employed by the United Fruit Company on that concern's banana plantations in Central America. Then to he spent much of his time in travelling about his diocese visiting and encouraging the clergymen scattered in-out of the way, forsaken parishes. His diocese went to the boundaries of the Panama Canal Zone, and about this work the Bishop cannot express himself too enthusiastically.

"I don't know of any work," he said, "that is so high in its aim and so efficient in its execution as the work that Americans are doing at the Canal. It is the first big work that I can recall that has been undertaken by a nation where not only the material side of things was taken into account but also the moral conditions were considered by the Government in charge. You have there the pick of efficiency in the line of engineering, and in Col. Gorgas you have the highest type of a sanitary engineer, a man who has gone into a tropical country and made of it a place as healthy as any on the face of the earth, a place where the climate braces you up instead of depressing you as it does in the neglected spots all around Panama.

"Then the splendid moral conditions! The Y. M. C. A. there has done great work. It is spending \$250,000 a year in keeping up the morals of the 30,000 people employed about the zone. It is a work that Americans may well be proud of.

The Bishop thinks that the United States should take a more active part in South and Central American affairs.

"All right thinking people where I have come from agree," he said, "that it is their earnest wish that your country should make its influence felt in these little countries. The United States if it chooses can stop a revolution any time. Simply intimate diplomatically but firmly that there shall be no more revolutions and the things will stop."

Revolutions, the Bishop says, are not nearly as frequent as they used to be, because the means of communication have improved so that when bodies of soldiers are

involved to start a revolution their every move can be watched by those in power. He attributes Diaz's long control of Mexico to the use of telegraph and telephone as much as anything else.

The Bishop thinks that in the future it is very possible that there may be some such thing as a confederation of the South American and Central American States. If such a thing takes place Costa Rica will undoubtedly be a leader in it. Bishop Bury thinks that Costa Rica is undoubtedly the best governed of all the little fellows. He has a great admiration for President Jimenez, who, he says, is almost a model tropical President.

"There is not a bit of the money grabbing sordid spirit so common with rulers down there about Jimenez," said the Bishop. "He is a type of the public spirited man and governs wisely and well. In fact I think it is safe to say that the tendency of all the South American countries is upward."

Bishop Bury has great belief in the future of the negro this man who has worked among them so long, and he says that he has always found that one of his main characteristics is that of persistence.

"When a negro community wants a church and services they give us no peace until they get it. The race has a great future before it, I firmly believe. In the West Indies the negro fills every place in life, from that of a laborer to a doctor, lawyer or minister and is both self-respecting and respecting."

The Bishop said that he was sorry to leave his old fields of activity, but that he was looking forward with interest to the new.

"I've lived in bags, yow know, for thirty-five years. When I was a mere boy in Oxford I took a trip to South America and studied the people there, and from that time since I've been travelling, so that the travel incident to my new charge is not frightening me any. Then the work is practically the same. I shall go about northern Europe trying to encourage the clergy that are stuck away in isolated parts of the world, such as Moscow or Warsaw, and see that their work progresses all right I at last have a home of my own in London which I shall make my headquarters."

Mme. Bernhardt and the Panamá Canal

Mme. Sara Bernhardt, guest of honor at the annual ladies' day reception at the National Press Club, today lauded the construction of the Panamá Canal as a great achievement, that "would be a monument to the energy and grit of the American people." She said that inasmuch as she had gone to Panama with Count de Lesseps to celebrate the turning of the first sod of the canal, she desired to take part in the celebration in 1915 of the completion of the great waterway and would return to America at the time. Mme. Bernhardt was presented to the club by M. Jusserand, the French ambassador, who characterized her as "one of the imperishable glories of her country."

Work's accident

Another servant fetching coal out of a cellar collapsed from fright caused by the silent appearance of a washerwoman and broke her arm.

Attempted Suicide

An Unhappy Marriage the outcome

Backed by guano

Between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock the people residing at Cienagueta were thrown in a state of excitement, and so keen was it that it did not take many minutes to spread the news over Limon that a man had attempted to commit suicide.

On the receipt of the news our representative lose no time to hasten to the scene of disaster. While on his way he met several crowds discussing the tragedy, every troop giving its own version of the affair. When about three chains from the saw mill going up to Banana River way our reporter came across three pools of blood. In answer to a query he was told that it was the blood of one Juan Charles who had just attempted to cut his throat on the railway track line.

This information was food for our man and he inquest of news set out for the man's place of abode. The tramp did not take more than 5 minutes when he came upon the house where Juan Charles, Colombian and expoliceman live.

From information received on the spot it transpired that the expoliceman Juan Charles married the daughter of one Mrs. An-

gelina Lawrence, who hails from St. Lucia, this marriage was solemnized about four months ago; but like many marriages that was not well thought of proved a failure. Mrs. Charles, the late bride is a very meagre girl and only about 14 years of age, and is of a light complexion. Her husband Juan Charles is more of the *bete noir* type. It is alleged since their marriage there was never any peace in the house, they often row and fight; the chief cause of these altercations being the outcome of jealousy and woman's right. Juan who is extremely fond of the ladies is always paying undue attention to them.

On this day in question Juan was spoken to about his incontinency, and being charged with liquor his ire was roused and he "went" for his wife, he started to beat her, he afterwards told her to lie on the bed and when she attempted to do this she discovered that a revolver was there. She refused to obey him and yelled for her mother. The mother hastened to the assistance of the girl and prevented what might have proved fatal. The man went and called two policemen telling them his wife and mother-in-law assaulted him. One policeman took the girl in charge and started for the quartel, the other taking Juan. They did not get far from the house when Juan ran to the girl who was in front and gave her several kicks. He then took a stick and attempted to attack every one that came within reach of him. When he was tired doing this he sat on the track line and
