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### Plans for Coronation

KING GEORGE AND QUEEN AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE SETTING DETAILS

Her Majesty interested in Home Industries

Buckingham Palace is now the headquarters of the Court, and the King and Queen will not visit Windsor again for any length of time till they go there for the Ascot races shortly before the coronation. There will, however, be gathering of royalties at the castle on May 6, the first anniversary of the death of King Edward, by which time Queen Alexandra will have returned from her trip in the Mediterranean.

Queen Mary, since her return to Buckingham Palace, has been living very quietly, entertaining more intimate friends and those about her Court by herself. Her Majesty has pleasant little gatherings every afternoon for tea the beautiful tapestry room being used for the purpose. This, which is one of the most pleasant apartments in the palace and has charming outlook over the gardens, was a great favourite with Queen Alexandra, who usually spent her afternoons there.

It takes its name from certain very fine old French and Belgian tapestries on its walls, surrounded by heavy gold frames, white there is some magnificent old French furniture in the room. Queen Alexandra kept there her wonderful collection of ivory miniatures, and the place of this collection is now occupied by some of the many valuable curios and works of art that the King and Queen Mary brought back from their Indian and Colonial tours. The tapestry room is in close proximity to her Majesty's private apartments, and she can reach it without having to pass along the maid corridors.

### BUYING IRISH LACE

Queen Mary is now showing her interests in home industries in a practical fashion and particularly her desire to promote the welfare of the Irish people by directing the attention of the women of England to the work done by their sisters in the Emerald Isle. Her Majesty has given a large order for some of the choicest Irish lace, principally rose point, Carrickmacross and Limerick, including a beautiful Court train in Carrickmacross applique and guipure. The Queen has also bought a quantity of lace and work done by the St. Helena government lace school, with which she is highly pleased, and thinks very pretty. The St. Helena lace industry was started as recently as 1907, in accordance with a scheme of the League of Empire.

With the one exception of the imperial mantle or pall, which the King assumes at his coronation, the robes to be worn by the King and Queen are being made in London. Until lately it was understood that the King would wear the imperial mantle made for King Edward VII, but it now seems to have been decided that His Majesty will wear the mantle of the Georges.

The Queen will not wear the mantle or train worn by Queen Alexandra at her coronation, as at one time there was reason to believe it was Her Majesty's in-

attention to do, but one specially made for her in London. This is being made of purple velvet lined with ermine, and will be embroidered by the members of the Ladies' Work Society, of which Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, is president.

### FOR HOME INDUSTRIES

The movement for the promotion of everything British in the way of dress being worn this coronation year, started by Queen Mary, enrolls its recruits more rapidly every day. The latest to join is one of the greatest artists in dress of today, Lady Duff-Gordon, who, under her business incognito of Madam Lucille, has achieved both an American and a European reputation for dresses of her own creation and design, and who is an enthusiastic supporter of the movement. She is now arranging an exhibition of a series of tableaux, for which she has reserved a large space at the Crystal Palace.

All these dresses are being designed by Lady Duff-Gordon herself, and will be made in her London workrooms, in Hanover square.

### PAGEANT OF EMBROIDERY

The large assembly of society women at the pageant of embroidery, led in Sir George Cooper's house in Grosvenor square, was also testimony not only to Queen Mary's movement but to the interest that is taken in fine needlework. The exhibition was in two parts. There was a loan collection of antique embroideries, the most interesting item of which was a screen lent by Lady Sackville out of Knole, which is said to have been worked by Queen Elizabeth and the women of her court. The Dowager Lady Northampton lent an old firescreen. There were also embroideries done by members of the Athene Society of Broderers, in which section a diploma prize for the finest exhibit as to fidelity of design, detail of coloring and artistic execution was divided between Lady Phyllis, Windsor Clive and Mrs. Birch.

In the dining room, which was fitted up with a stage, six tableaux were given as illustrations of a lecture by Mr. Paulson Townsend on the "History of Embroidery." The first of these had a special interest at the present moment for it showed Queen Editha embroidering Edward the Confessor's coronation robe. The part of the Confessor's wife was taken by Lady Tiverton, the daughter-in-law of Lord Halsbury.

### Cannon Get Ore From Mexico

El Paso, Tex.—General Manager Earle of El Paso smelter announces the plant will shut down within five days on account of inability to get ore from Mexico. The smelter is the second largest in the world. Eighteen hundred men will be thrown out of work. Eighty per cent of the ores treated by the plant come from Mexico.

### Uncle Sam's Navy

Washington.—The entire Atlantic torpedo fleet and the first and third submarine divisions will concentrate this week at Solomon's Island, Md., for spring practice. Several of the vessels are gathering and the rendezvous will be complete within ten days. About the middle of the month, spotting practice with the San Marcos will be carried out by the fleet in the Chesapeake Bay.

In May the destroyers of the Atlantic torpedo fleet will be called upon to operate under war conditions in various exercises. The third submarine division, including vessels of the first division temporarily attached to the third; and the Soveran and Castine will go to Cape Cod Bay for combined operations with the Atlantic fleet in July and August.

### Society Women of Madrid Mobbed

Madrid.—Two women belonging to the most exclusive society circles of Madrid appeared in the streets wearing the new Parisian trousers skirts and were mobbed. The crowd grew rapidly, surrounded the exponents of advanced fashion and after insulting cries threatened violence. A force of police came to the protection of the women and cleared the streets. The police have had to deal with several similar cases of disorder recently and are determined to put a stop to the rowdyism.

### Age of the Earth

Chicago.—Four hundred million years was given as the age of the earth today in a lecture by Prof. Thomas C. Chamberlain, head of the department of geology at the University of Chicago. His statement which placed the date of formation of the planet at a time 800,000,000 years previous to that computed by physicists, is based on a new computation involving a study of radio-activity.

"The rate of the dissociation of uranium rock containing radium," said the professor, "shows us conclusively that the earth is at least 400,000,000 year old. This estimate is scientifically more accurate than that of physicists.

### To Inspect Canal

By special invitation of President Taft of the U. S. A., the Russian expert, Prof. V. E. Timokoff of St. Petersburg, will go on an inspection of the Panama Canal with the American Society of Civil Engineers. They were to leave New York on Thursday last in the "Zacapa," all the cabin accommodation have been engaged for them.

### Bibles For Distribution

New York.—One hundred thousand Bibles have been ordered for general distribution by the Gideons as the members of the Christian Travellers' Association of America style themselves. The order is said to be the largest ever placed and it forms part of a national plan to place a Bible in every hotel bedroom in the country.
