Big Jubilee Celebration

WORK OF THE JAMAICA
HOME AND FOREIGN
MISSIONARY SOCIETY

SERVICE WILL BE HELD AT
MANDEVILLE NEXT MONTH

The Church people in Manchester are beginning to take a keener interest in the commemoration of the fiftieth year of the Jamaica Home and Foreign Missionary Society. The Co-adjutor Bishop announced on Sunday morning that the society was started in 1861 in a drawing-room in Spanish Town, and it is believed the Archdeacon Downer is the only survivor of those present on that occasion. The Bishop went on to show the extraordinary usefulness of the Missionary work then started in the outlying parts of Jamaica, and the scores of schools and Mission Churches built by the Society during these fifty years.

It is proposed in Mandeville to hold a big Jubilee service to the end of April, at which possibly the Archbishop will be the Preacher and all the Manchester clergy and Parochial Council representatives will be invited. Jubilee banners are already being made for the occasion, and three representatives of each Mission District in Manchester will be asked to join the Procession wearing some distinctive badge. In addition to this, Children's Jubilee is being organized at Mandeville with full Procession and Missionary service. The "Old England" congregation, formed by the Missionary Society in 1871 is being asked especially to join in the celebration and has already set to work to make a banner. A band of laymen speakers, each provided with a printed history of the Missionary Society is being set to work in Manchester and should prove of great value to District meetings. A layman is to preside on each occasion. In addition to all this, twenty-four Jubilee collecting books are being issued in Mandeville, in aid of a commemoration gift to the Society. Solid Military Wall on Frontier

On Board President Taft's special train, Charlottesville, Va., March 9.—Mystery that has surrounded the sudden mobilization of one-quarter of the standing army of the United States and a strong naval force on the Mexican border was cleared to-night when the real purpose of the movement became known to the newspaper correspondents on board the train which is carrying President Taft to Georgia.

The United States has determined that the revolution in the republic to the south must end. The American troops have been sent to form a solid military wall along the Rio Grande to stop filibustering and to see that there is no further smuggling of arms and men across the international boundary.

Mexican revolution is operating near the border have been receiving their supplies for a year almost entirely from this country. This the United States intends to put a stop to, and if twenty thousand men are not sufficient to accomplish the task more will be sent.

It is also said that there is reason to believe there is a plan on foot among the revolutionists in Mexico to establish an independent government in Lower California if they succeed in overthrowing President Diaz. The United States has no intention of going across the line to prevent the formation of such a government, but it feels called upon to spread troops so thickly along the southern border of California as to prevent any damage to American property. The peninsula of Lower California occupies a position of great strategic importance to the United States—it commands Magdalena Bay. If disorder should become a rule there the formation of a new republic, it is not beyond the range of possibility that the United States would then undertake to maintain order.

The administration, it is said, desires to be ready for this emergency. These in the main are the reasons, it is asserted, for the great military movement.

As a further reason for the movement of the army it is explained that the War Department, stung by the criticisms heaped upon the army by the members of Congress, was eager for a chance to demonstrate what it could do.

This is amusing and tends to stimulate and improve the king of sports, Limon also boasts of its seasons which come periodically, sometimes plenty "agna," at times none, sometimes vargas are apprehended and carried to the cuartel, etc., but the present season that is now on is called.

Parra, masters Francisco and Guillermo Parra, Miss Elita Parra, Master Jairo Parra, Robert Sandi, Jose Jorgue and 17 deckers and 14 cabin passengers in transit.

The United Fruit Company's steamer "San Jose" arrived from Boston yesterday and brought as passengers Dr. Pizarro and Mr. A. J. Horning and 30 other passengers.

The estimated loss is placed at over one million dollars, the fire is said to have commenced in the negro section of the town, presumably Boca Grande where nearly all the residents are West Indian blacks. Particulars are anxiously looked for.

Japanese Assail Treaty as Worst of all Disasters

Tokyo. — The new American Treaty was bitterly denounced last evening at a dinner given by Dr. Yoshinoike Haegawa and attended by Admiral Himotsuki and numerous parliamentarians, journalists and business men. The object was to form an association for the study of American questions.

The host described the treaty as the culmination of the disasters overtaking the country in the wake of Hall's comet.

"It effectually checks Japanese expansion on the American continent," he said, "and nullifies the effort of the hundred thousand Japanese pioneers, who are left to die out."

In the course of the evening a pamphlet entitled "Necessity, Like Diplomacy, Knows No Fear," was circulated. In it America is described as a "country which, while posing as a lover of humanity and justice, secretly aims at the mastery of the Pacific, and then the world."

Japanese admiration for Perry is ridiculed, the pamphlet adding that "when Japan was sound-bitten by American ambition she took steps to insure her expansion and repay the humiliation."

Admiral Kimotsuki said: "The Japanese must not fall asleep at a time when international competition is keenest."
