Invasion by Air.

Major B. Baden-Powell, who used to make ascents with manflying kites and was a balloonist when the sport seemed perilous—the balloon is now considered safer than a swivel chair in a parlor car—is trying to convince Englishmen that invasion by aeroplanes is a real menace. Lord Roberts, in his speech upon the national defense in the House of Lords, had no such vision. He calculated that an enemy might disembark a strong expeditionary force upon the eastern coast, and he urged conscription upon his countrymen. Major Baden-Powell, in a letter to the London Times, says that invasion by the air had evidently not occurred to Lord Roberts. The major predicts that within two years foreign nations will be counting their aeroplanes by the hundreds. Now comes the question, he says: "Can our great navy do anything to prevent a fleet of say 500 aeroplanes carrying ten armed men, from landing at any place, not necessarily on our shores, but at any place in land. Not only could 5,000 men be landed near some out of the way town, whence sufficient supplies could be taken for the support of the force, but the aeroplanes could then return to their country for reinforcements." Granting that hundreds of aeroplanes of such a capacity might escape the navy by flying at a great height, Major Baden-Powell forgets that the daring aviators would have to combat in alighting not only with the foot, horse and artillery of the territorial army, but with a swarm of native aviators. It may be assumed that if nations commence in building warships they will compete in constructing airships. As for returning to the continent for reinforcements, the invading aviators would be lucky to save their aeroplanes. With wireless receivers buzzing and telephones ringing all over England, how could 5,000 men in aeroplanes expect to land without a fight or defend their machines from the home land and air forces? We feel sure that the Englishman will sleep securely in his home for all the Major can do to scare him with the threat of subjugation or even surprise by aerial foemen. We have never taken the military aeroplane as seriously as Major Baden-Powell does. For reconnaissance or for carrying dispatches and within restricted limits, it is to be reckoned with. To the army in the field it has already become indispensable, but as a means of transporting combatants in force it is not to be thought of by practical soldiers. For that purpose no faith is pinned even to the colossal dirigible balloon.

Mothers and Babies

Not every young mother knows how to wash her baby so that the least harm and the greatest benefit will result, says an exchange. Yet it is quite simple points mastering the important points here set forth, the daily bathing becomes a pleasure to the child, and certainly is not a task to the mother. The successful washing of a baby is largely a matter of practice, but there are a few hints

which must be acted on if baby is to get real good from his bath and come to no harm.

In the first place, everything must be in readiness before the child is undressed. The room must be warm and windows closed to keep out draughts. It is well, too, to lock doors to prevent intruders bringing a gust of wind in with them.

The mother should wear an apron, should roll her sleeves up above the elbows, so that they may not get wet and flap against the child's skin, and she should take particular care to see that she has neither needles nor pins striking in her dress.

The bath should be shallow, the water soft and moderately warm. Rain water is best, by adding a little milk or toilet cream. The soap should be of a mild variety of any well-known make, and highly and brightly colored soaps should be avoided. A small piece of flannel for the rinsing, a small soft sponge for the wiping are required. In addition to these a solution of boracic acid (a teaspoonful of acid to half a pint of water) and some swabs of cotton (to be burnt after use) are required for the proper use in cleansing of the mouth, ears, nose and eyes, which should be done when baby is dressed.

When the face and head have been washed and dried the limbs should be rubbed over with the soaped flannel, and then the baby is ready to go into the bath. The left hand should be held under the child's thighs, and his back and head supported by the left arm, while the right hand is used for sponging, which must be quickly done.

When taken from the bath baby should be quickly dried and powder dusted over and a gentle rubbing with a smooth hand indulged in. Dressing must be accomplished quickly, and then baby is ready for his meal, and after this double exercise, will be quite ready for a sleep, which should be in a well-ventilated room, or even out of doors if the weather is bright and warm.

Home and Foreign News.

Yesterday being the anniversary of the birthday of the King of Spain the English flag was hoisted at the premises of the British Vice-Consul. The Costa Rican flag was also raised at the Governor's office.

A meeting of the Coronation Committee of St. Catherine, held at Spanish Town, Jamaica, Thursday May 4, a subscription list was opened, and in a short time the gentleman raised £21; the Ladies contributed £5 and D. P. Mendes, Esq., a similar amount.

The correspondent in Limon of a San José paper "El Diario" states that the Electric Light Company refuse to supply the necessary current to run the fire motor which the Limon mu-

nicipality proposed starting. We can authoritatively state that the report is incorrect, as up to the present time the municipal fathers have not approached the Electric Light and Power Company on the subject, neither directly nor otherwise.

Information has reached us that a coolie man residing at Camp One Road has on Monday the 15th inst., scampered away with another man's wife, the woman being of the same nationality. 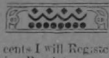
