The Man with the Smile.

SOME NOTABLE CHARACTERISTICS OF PRESIDENT TAFT.

The President of the United States, who is called by his familiar name throughout the country, is assured of popularity. Very few Presidents have been so honored. There have been "Andy" Jackson, "Abraham" Lincoln, "Teddy" Roosevelt, and now comes "Bill" Taft.

"Big Bill," some call him, and he is big in brain as well as body. That he is going to be one of the most popular Chief Executives America has had nobody doubts. He was born to be popular. From the time he graduated from Yale University, in 1878, when he was twenty-one years old, and was elected class orator, until the present day, he has been called "the man with the winning smile."

A man who is a member of a multi-millionaire family, and who, after his university days starts right in to work, reporting for a newspaper, as did Mr. Taft, has in him the kind of stuff that Americans like. Such a man does not have to play to the galleries to become popular, and Mr. Taft never has done anything intentionally to attract attention to himself.

He is one of the few American public men who can tear an opponent's arguments into tatters and yet leave no resentment behind. Everything he does is accompanied by his winning smile, and if the blows he delivers hurt, the smile acts as a salve.

His smile, though, does not make him a mollusc. He has as strong a character as President Roosevelt, but his method of work is the antithesis of the man's who has succeeded in the White House.

NO RESENTMENT.

Mr. Taft never thinks a victory is complete if any resentment remains. He wants to convince by persuasion, and he has a marvelous faculty for putting his thoughts into pure English. Logical as a proposition in Euclid. Though he is as firm as a rock when his principles are concerned, he is ready always to recognize that the other side has principles, too. The totally different characters of President Roosevelt and President Taft probably caused the two men to be so drawn to each other that in Washington they are called Damon and Pythias.

When Mr. Roosevelt became President, Mr. Taft was in Manila, as head of the Philippine Commission. He had been sent there by President McKinley a year before. Mr. McKinley found Mr. Taft wasting his great executive abilities teaching law in the University of Cincinnati. The future President had reached the post of Dean of the University after having been an assistant prosecuting county attorney, a collector of internal revenue, and assistant county solicitor, a Judge of the Superior Court, and a Federal Solicitor-General, all in his State of Ohio, and all within twenty-one years.

Mr. Taft wanted to continue as a lawyer and judge, the height of his ambition being to teach the Federal Supreme Court. Mrs.

Taft has related how he talked the matter over with her when President McKinley offered him the Manila post. He was reluctant to go, but Mrs. Taft persuaded him to accept the position because the salary attached to it was larger than the one he then was drawing, and it would allow them to educate their children properly. Mr. Taft had no idea of financial assistance of his millionaire family.

SKILFUL DIPLOMAT.

In the first year of his Presidential term Mr. Roosevelt found that the man way out in Manila was looking up as the strongest official of his Administration. "Big Bill," was handling the extremely delicate situation in the Philippines with consummate skill, and his smile in Manila, was doing more to make the Filipinos contented under American rule than all the soldiers in the Archipelago could do. President Roosevelt heard of the smile, and believed it could be used advantageously on the Pope at Rome, where there was a deadlock over the sale of certain ecclesiastical lands in the Philippines, which the natives wanted to become national property. Mr. Taft smiled in Rome, and the land question was settled.

Then he returned to Manila, but Mr. Roosevelt found he must positively hate the man with the smile nearer him. So, in 1904, Mr. Taft was recalled to Washington, to become Secretary for War. At Washington Mr. Taft was almost as much President as was Mr. Roosevelt himself.

His diplomatic accomplishments are record-breaking for an American. In 1906 trouble broke out in Cuba, and it looked as if there were to be a repetition of Haytian anarchy in the island. In hot haste, Mr. Roosevelt ordered "Bill" to Havana. "Bill" went, met the antagonistic forces, and told them they were bad boys who were running their chances of living under an independent Government. Then he smiled and suggested that it might be a good scheme if America should take charge of things for a while, and a few thousand troops to the island to maintain order, and generally straighten the tangle. The Cubans were hypnotized by the Taft smile, and they agreed to allow the Americans to come in for a few years, with all the grace of a Spanish don. The troops were sent, an American was appointed temporary Governor, and the Cubans remembering "Bill's" smile, throw down their arms and took lessons in the science of practical government.

Mr. Taft is imbued with the essence of the Roosevelt doctrine, but instead of wielding the "big stick" he swings the "big smile." His admirers predict he will accomplish more with the smile than Mr. Roosevelt was able to do with the stick.

MAN BEATEN AND THEN
CARRIED TO CUARTEL.

Mr. L. Brock, a clerk at the Northern Railroad Company was roughly handled by a man named Francis, who it is alleged is a constable and report has it is a member of the black art college. From information gathered it appeared that on Sunday night last Mr. Brock was sitting at a lounge table in his room reading and suddenly without a moment's

notice Francis ran into his room with a stick and assaulted him. He then cornered Brock and the two men wrestled to the piazza, from which place Brock fell on the side walk, Francis immediately covering him with his body.

When Mr. Brock got the first blow he fell to the ground and yelled out for aid, which caused many persons to reach the scene just in time to see two policemen taking Mr. Brock and the notable Francis to the cartel. The assault and wrestling it is alleged was the outcome of a peculiarly suspicious matter that we believe when properly sifted some one will be made to pay the piper, and this is almost certain to be to a large extent.

It was said that the man Francis took a bottle of kerosene oil to the Government and told them that Mr. Brock had given it to him, with the promise that he would give him \$400 if he would take it and set fire to Mr. Jack Williams' house, which is situated at the corner of Fourth Street and Avenue 5.

We are informed that this man Francis was sent to apprehend Mr. Brock. At 9:30 on Sunday night the man went to a house opposite the young gentleman's, and after keeping a close watch for some time entered the house and took the young man unaware.

The young man is still in the cartel where he awaits the decision of the higher authorities. Application was made for bail but was refused.

COL. ROOSEVELT SAID TO PLAN VOYAGE TO GREENLAND.

New York.—The World says: Capt. Bartlett, of the Peary Polar expedition, asserted that Col. Theodore Roosevelt plans to go to Greenland next summer. It is possible, according to this, that the Colonel may be at the North Pole when the Republican presidential convention of 1912 nominates a successor to Mr. Taft.

Capt. Bartlett insists he has Col. Roosevelt mailed to the mist on the Greenland trip. "Next year," it is said the Colonel replied to Bartlett, when the latter invited the Colonel to join Harry Whitney's expedition this summer to the polar bear regions.

Battleships go to Baltic Sea.

Washington.—Bound on a foreign cruise of international courtesy, the second division of the Atlantic fleet sailed from Hampton roads for the Baltic Sea. Rear Admiral Charles J. Badger commands the division, the itinerary for which includes stops in Copenhagen, Stockholm, Reval and Kiel.

TROOPS SENT OUT.
The City of Port-au-Prince in Darkness.

Port-au-Prince.—A revolution has started near Port-au-Prince, and spreading. The municipality has been closed and a transportation left here for Fort Liberia with the Secretary of War and General Mompalao, fifteen hundred soldiers and their equipment. This city was in darkness. Recently groups of insurgents and Haytian refugees who have crossed into Santa Domingo have made several attacks upon frontier posts in the north.

Sydney.—The latest advices from New Hebrides state that 200 natives in Vanuatu Island and a number of tribes in a night attack routed the natives of Espiritu Santo Island, who had revolted against the whites. The rebels fled into the bush abandoning their rifles. Two tribesmen were killed and the rebels had two killed and many wounded.

Political.

Many prominent members of the Liberal party at Panama thought it to address a letter to President Avila, asking him if it was true he would be a candidate for the next presidential election. Canada's Navy.

Ottawa.—Three English ship building firms put in bids for the construction of the four cruisers and six destroyers for the Canadian navy. The bids were Harland and Wolff of Belfast, Vickers Sons and Maxim and Winson, Richardson, Ltd. The results will not be made known for some time.

Representatives of the firms are in Ottawa, waiting. The terms of the contract provide that the ships must be built in Canada. Their construction, therefore, means the establishment of ship building yards and dry-docks, the cities of Quebec, Montreal and Halifax being rivals for the advantage of having the big new works.

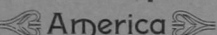
