## CORONATION FESTIVITIES.

### Witnessed by Over Two Thousand Persons.

#### ATHLETIC SPORTS, ETC.

(Continued.)

After the State Service the men marched to their quarters opposite the Plaza del Toro and refreshed themselves. The next place of attraction was the base ball ground, where athletic sports were to be held. By three o'clock the ground was filled by an appreciative-crowd eager to see the contestants in the events of the afternoon.

The sports were announced to begin at 1:30 but owing to the heavy rain that fell during the day the time was altered and it was not until about three o'clock when the first race was competed for. Mr. C. Breedy acted as starter and Mr. O. P. Nunes as Judge.

At 8:30 p.m. a large crowd gathered at the Plaza del Toro to witness the fireworks and enjoy the band concert which was splendid and lasted a couple of hours! All around were loud in their praise as to the manner and skill displayed by those who were responsible for the pyrotechnic work.

This being the last event of the day all left for their homes feeling satisfied with what was prepared to make them happy.

#### SUCCESSFUL END.

Under unfavourable conditions what looked to be a failure turned out to be a glorious success, and we believe will long be remembered by those who were privileged to witness it.

It was at a late time Mr. Peter Noel came forward with his military display project and with the advice of Mr. Fred. Wynter approached our worthy Vice-Consul on the matter who gave him every encouragement possible. Mr. Noel is a man of undaunted courage and knows no failure, with grim determination set to work and organized what was the grandest affair ever accomplished by

the English speaking people of Port Limon.

When the proposition to hold a military display on 22nd inst. met the approbation of a few, a subscription list was opened but despite determined efforts to swell the funds the response was slow.

This did not at all daunt the organizer, who had faith in himself and those that promised to rally around him. With this determination he solicited the co-operation of men to join him and organize an infantry corps and cavalry regiment. Even the response to this was poor, but Noel went to be beaten in his ideas with a few men at his command started to learn them a soldier's discipline and in a short space of time the men were fairly in the art of the regimental drill. The ranks were filled slowly and when three weeks elapsed after the organization only about a dozen and a half men were enlisted, but with perseverance and courage the commander had the ranks swelled to a goodly number.

Messrs. Nation, Sanderson and Hunter were entering in their zeal to bring about the programme that was arranged for the day, and well did they do it. The committee on the whole that was entrusted with the gigantic occasion worked well and deserve the lasting praise of all.

The behaviour of the people was all that could be desired, we never noticed a case of blasphemy; indeed everyone we came across had a pleasant face. The absence of house decoration was very noticeable, the only places that had any pretension of display were the Rev. Pitts, Mr. Stiebel's, and the Mechanic Lodge. The United Fruit Company Commissary show case was artistically dressed and great praise is due to the man who did it. On the whole, the day's proceedings came off without a hitch.

## Yellow Fever on Steamer.

Fort de France.—The French transatlantic line steamship "Perou" which arrived here from Colon and Laguayra, had fifteen cases of yellow fever on board during her voyage from the Isthmus of Panama. Two victims died. Six patients are convalescing and seven others are still under treatment. The vessel has been quarantined.

## Pope Issues Dispensation.

London.—The Pope has issued a dispensation for Roman Catholics of the British Empire that they will not be compelled to abstain from eating meat on Friday, June 23rd, when the King after his coronation, on the day before will make his Royal progress through London.

## The Future of Canada.

Commenting upon the ultimate relations between the United States and Canada, the "Toronto Globe" (a Government organ) says:—"The United States and Canada, are never together in life and purpose than they have been at any time since the days of the severance. But in matters of sovereignty and government, they never were so far apart as now. It never was as certain as it is that two flags will continue to float on the North American continent. The Canadian people have set themselves with purposeful decisiveness to work out their national destiny within the British Empire. And it is the dawn of a few days for what is best in civilization when the two English-speaking nations on this continent accept the fact of two flags and to develop side by side with one common purpose is for the peace and progress on all the world."

## Russia's Policy Towards Jews.

It was learned to-day that the United States Government has been advised that the Russian Government has prepared for submission to the Duma a bill removing the present restrictions with regard to the visiting of passports of all foreign Jews visiting that country. The information given to this Government is not official, but comes from an entirely reliable source.

This contemplated step by the Russian Government marks a new policy of the Czar's administration to take a more liberal view on the question of religious and racial restrictions. It will probably require a long time for the Russian Government to entirely carry out its policy.

The prejudice against the Jews is so deep rooted in Russia that the Duma would probably refuse to take such action at the present time. The Government, indeed, has never presented its bill to the Duma for consideration but appears to be abiding its time. Meanwhile it is reported that all steps which can be taken by the Government toward removing these restrictions against Jewish travellers will be put into effect.

As the situation is represented to this Government, the Russian Duma is now engaged in a big programme of internal reform legislation which requires all of its time. Such are of course of prime importance to Russia, and the international questions have been obliged to abide their time until the Duma has at least partially accomplished its present tasks.

However, partial assurances have been given that in time a bill entirely removing restrictions against foreign Jews seeking entrance into Russia will be presented and will be backed firmly by the Government.

It is said that the Russian Government in this regard is acting without consideration of the protests made by the United States against the treatment of American Jews. The news is conveyed to this Government unofficially as the statement of a change in policy by the Russian Government.

The information, however, tends to relieve a strained situation between the two countries. The activities of American Jewish societies to force the President to terminate the treaty of commerce and amity between the United States and Russia have been constantly growing more persistent.

B. Frank of St. Louis, who represents a number of fraternal organizations, called on President Taft to urge the passage of the Stulzer bill, which is now pending before the House, abrogating the Russo-American amity treaty.

It is probable, however, that now the Administration will take the efforts of the Russian Government in good faith and will not press the matter so long as the Russian Government continues its efforts to relieve the anti-Jewish restrictions by legislation.

Panama, June 14, 1911.

Sir:—Mr. Harry O. Chalkley, Acting British Consul at Bluefield, has telegraphed to me as follows:

"Consider desirable British Vice-Consul at Limon and Bcas del Toro should advise British West Indians not to come to Nicaragua for the present to work on the banana plantations owing to unsatisfactory conditions and wages."

I have to request you to make known in your District, Mr. Chalkley's warning in whichever way you deem best to reach intending immigrants for that Republic.

## Break in Miraflores Dam.

Says the "Colon Starlet" of the 20th ult.

An eye witness to the breaking away of the Dam at Miraflores reports to us that on Wednesday last at about noon the dam into which was being pumped mud and water gave way. The picture described by our informant was that the mud ran out like batter to the height of fully four feet, and entered the lock covering steam shovels, cranes, hydraulic pumps and other machinery. Fortunately, the first indication of the break was seen in time to allow the workmen in the lock and around to escape. The work has been going on since September last, and will now have to be done all over again.

The value of the damage done cannot be ascertained, but it is believed that it will go into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

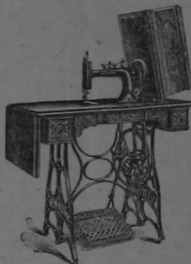

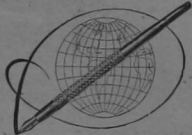
