Crecerá el número de americanos que residen en áreas suburbanas, pero no necesariamente rurales. La población de las ciudades crecerá todavía más, pero no tan rápidamente como antes; puede surgir una tendencia hacia ciudades pequeñas y medianas. Parece probable que continuará el movimiento en grande escala de

la población hacia las áreas occidentales del país. Por vez primera en la historia de los Estados Unidos habrá un superávit de mujeres; hacia 1960 habrá 700,000 damas más que caballeros. Finalmente, los patrones o uormas de la vida americana se unificarán todavía más. En todas las regiones del país los americanos de Estados Unidos muestran tendencias hacia las mismas películas, los mismos programas de radio, las mismas revistas, la misma educación.

PUERTO DE LIMON

La ciudad de Limón está ventajosamente asentada en el Atlántico; es el puerto más importante de la República y la arteria principal de comunicación con la capital y con el exterior. Ningún viajero que haya llegado a las playas de Limón, ha dejado de sentir una deliciosa suspensión delante del magnífico espectáculo del puerto. No es el azul del mar tan brillante como el de Nápoles; no es el azul del cielo peculiar de los trópicos; no es el verdor de las cercanas llanuras donde se cimbrean gallardos cocoteros, ni los diversos colores de los edificios lo que produce tan maravilloso efecto. El secreto está en la iluminación del aire que lo armoniza todo;—la iluminación del aire, independiente, por decirlo así, de la luz misma del sol. Cuando se va uno alejado del puerto, no parece que la nave sigue en la misma línea de la ciudad, sino que se eleva a la región del éter puro. Para coronar la naturaleza tan primoroso paisaje, colocó a la entrada del puerto la isla de Uvita, que parece destacarse del fondo del mar. En ella está colocado el faro, cuyo fanal alcanza hasta la distancia de 14 kilómetros. El aspecto de la ciudad, joven y floreciente, es apacible y alegre; comienza en el extremo noreste; va creciendo, principalmente en una dirección, hacia el oeste, donde casi se ven los edificios codearse, empujarse, arremolinarse y pisarse como seres vivientes.

Las calles son rectas y anchas. Entre sus edificios, que los más son altos y de concreto; hay muchos de bonita apariencia; sobresaliendo algunos como la Aduana, la Gobernación, la Capitanía, la Unidad Sanitaria, los Bancos, el Mercado, la Oficina General y el Comisariato de la Cía Bananera de Costa Rica y otros por su verdadero gusto artístico. Tiene una Iglesia Católica y varios templos protestantes.

En la ciudad hay diversiones como son: dos elegantes teatros, un balneario bien montado donde al final de semana hay bailes con buena música por la famosa orquesta «JOHNNY STEELE». Hay también: juegos de beisbol, futbol y softbol y varios otros ejercicios musculares.

FROM OUR DESK

BY THE EDITOR

In these recent days the newspapers of San Jose have carried several interesting notices in regard to the visits, anticipingly of Tourists to our Republic.

According to these notices we are using this medium to present briefly the following lecture as a merit to our port and which, if seen by the visitors might serve as a stimulus for their visit to Limón. In addition we shall mail free of cost to the first class hotels and pensions in San José, soliciting their goodness to place them on their ready racks to the view of the guests

PORT LIMON

The city of Limón is advantageously situated in the Atlantic Zone; it is the most important port of the Republic and the principal artifice of communication with the capital and the interior towns. No traveller who has arrived to the shores of Limón, has dejected to feel a delicious moment before the magnificent spectacle of the port. It is not the blue of the ocean so brilliant as that of Naples; it is not the blue of the sky peculiar to the tropics; it is not the verdure of the nearby plains where vibrates elegant cocoa trees or the diverse colours of the buildings by which are produced the very marvellous effect. The secret is in the illumination of the air which harmonizes all; the illumination of the intended air; to say so; the same light of the sun.

To crown the magnificent scenes in the city there is obtainable launch services to the beautiful island Uvita which looks as if detached from the depth of the ocean. On this island is placed the light houses and when in use its light reaches a distance of 14 kilometers. Nature shows herself in colourful sceneries of charm.

The city carries an almost unchangeable flourishing and springtime aspect; everything is appealing and enhancing to the comfort of the visitors. The streets are straight and wide and with increasing motorized traffic over them. Accommodations in hoteles and pensions are within easy access. Rates are moderate. Restaurants; coffee shops; cantines and other places which cater the things to satisfy the appetite or quench the thirst are maintained in first class conditions. Deep sea bathing and in swimming pool are always to the pleasure of the visitors. Two large theatres which are continually in the vanguard with the most up-to-date film-producing houses. Outdoor sports, such as baseball, foot ball, soft ball, golf and at times horse racing can be indulged in by those desirous. Among the buildings in the city there are many of pretty designs and appearance; excelling these are such as the Custom Houses, Governor's Offices and Residence, Municipal Offices, Banks Port Captain's Offices and Residence, College, Schools, Fire Brigade Station, United Medical and Sanitary Department, Judicial Building, Post Office, the General Office Building and Commissary of the Costa Rica Banana Company, the well laid out American Colony and many others by their pleasing appearance help to feast the eyes of the travellers.

The city of Limón heartily welcomes the visitors.

Six Major Events Shake World Stability

(Continued from December 3th)

The plan, in its present stage, would endow the Prime Minister of India with full powers to organize his mediation in whatever way he feels best to insure success. His instructions from the General Assembly would merely call for an effort to convince not only the governments of Washington and Moscow, but also the allies of both, that if the whole UN concert is to succeed, it must achieve constructive cooperation between East and West.

According to the confidential plan, the UN should accord to the Prime Minister the broadest personal authority. He should be authorized to choose among the statements of the world the assistants he would like to have. The UN would also place at his disposal a special secretariat to help him carry through his task.

In the view of those now exploring this plan, Mr. Nehru would begin by making a survey of all the outstanding differences between the East and West as well as areas of agreement. He would analyze the various proposals made by each side to achieve a *modus vivendi*.

He would try to work out a minimum program of accord, which he would then discuss with the opposing governments.

It is felt that public opinion all over the world would strongly support any such initiative. It is also felt that no man today is better placed and more qualified than Mr. Nehru to undertake such a gigantic job. First of all, Mr. Nehru's country, which has just won its independence, is in the forefront of those vitally interested in maintaining international peace. As one of the out-standing internationalists of our time, he is particularly equipped, both on the basis of his intellectual achievements and his fundamental beliefs, to attempt a mediation mission unique in history.

Furthermore, advocates of the idea suggest that Prime Minister Nehru, fresh from the acclaim of his American visit, would also be similarly received in Russia. They further affirm that in view of his high standing all over the world, the Kremlin could not refuse to negotiate with him. The major difficulty foreseen at this stage is that

The Ring of Hate Around Germany, Poles, French, Belgians, Czechs Never Forget

Europe is the name of a civilization which, for 2,000 years, has been trying to absorb the wild energy and furious ability of the German people.

The German people are at once the most hated and most needed community on their continent.

And it is the conflict between dread and need in the minds, the memories and the subconscious of Germany's neighbors which for five years has paralyzed all effort to make peace in Europe.

In the past generation Germany has invaded and sacked every one of her neighbors (with the exception of Switzerland) at least once and usually twice. Germany is thus fringed not by peoples who have learned of her national character from textbooks and the word of returning travelers, but by peoples who have sheltered German orphans after one war to see them return as spies and scouts in the next; by people who have heard German spoken in their homes and market places not in friendship and visit but in curse and command; by peoples, finally, who know Germany not from personal experience alone but from the wars of their fathers and grandfathers.

Hate underlies the emotions of Germany's neighbors as bedrock underlies top-soil; for on every quarter of their compass the Germans have sealed the memory of their acts to geography with physical monuments. Three cities come to mind: Budapest, Warsaw and Lyons, all of which I saw in a six months space, as different in texture as the languages spoken by their citizens and the cultures that nursed them. But they frame

themselves as one in memory because a river runs through each of the towns and into each river dip the bridges the Germans destroyed. All these bridges were wrecked not in highnoon of combat but in the ebb tide of defeat when Germans could gain nothing more than the discomfiture of peoples they had already sacked. The broken stumps and girders which dangle in the Danube, the Vistula and the Rhone all bear the same trademark, and it will be a full decade before the dwellers of these towns can cross their rivers as they did before the German visitation. Whether it is in Hungarian, in Polish or in French, the words they mutter lining up for crowded ferries have the same sound.

Destruction in monotonously similar on all frontiers of the new, clipped Germany; but the neighbors of Germany all keep fresh the memory of war with new monuments which differ in quality as sharply as the personalities of the bordering states.

Prime Minister Nehru might hesitate to undertake this task lest failure impair his global prestige. He would want to get some advance assurances that his mission would have a reasonable chance for success.

It would also be necessary for the UN to draft a resolution that would enable Mr. Nehru to act as a UN emissary rather than as the Prime Minister of India. Another reason assigned

for any display of hesitancy on Mr. Nehru's part is that his presence in India is urgently required, especially in these critical times, when many economic, industrial, educational and political problems demand solution.

However, the Indian people and government might accede to his acceptance of this mission because of the pivotal importance it would give to India in world affairs, and the enormous prestige it would carry with it.

Donald, the treasurer, that he has in his possession the key to the Cash section of the iron safe and that same would not be delivered until the audit was completed and the members be made acquainted with the funds. To all this Mrs. Pitters agreed in the presence of all; gave her word that she would notify the Committee as soon as the Division's auditors were appointed. However, with alarming attitude three or four persons were appointed to check the accounts and not a word was given to the Committee of complaint.

More surprising was her letter to Mr. Mc. Donald, the treasurer to turn over the key to the iron safe immediately; this, quite naturally, the treasurer who has been placed in that position of

trust, constitutionally, could not allow himself to be trapped by this daughter of Timnah; this Commissioner of Jamaica. Not obtaining the key from Mr. Mc. Donald, the treasurer, Dixon, we are told employed a machinist to chisel open the safe and the funds were taken out. To this unparallel violation was associated the said Mrs. Florence Pitters and others on the night of Saturday the 26th of November 1949.
