SE HAN REGISTRADO CON EL ACARREO DE BANANOS EN EL TRANVIA DE PENSURST

Durante la semana pasada y con motivo del acarreo de bananos en la línea del tranvía de Penshurst, se han registrado innumerables incidentes entre los representantes de la International Trading Corporation, administradores del tranvía y la Cooperativa de Cacao Mixta. Ambas firmas tienen contratos pa-

ra la exportación de fruta y desde luego intereses especiales en el rápido transporte de la fruta. El Gerente de la Cooperativa de Cacao, don Raúl Velázquez, pidió amparo a las autoridades correspondientes manifestando que los administradores del tranvía ponían obstáculos para el trans-

porte de su fruta ya cortada, ocasionando serios perjuicios. Para solucionar las diferencias que pudiera haber, las dos partes en compañía de sus respectivos abogados y el Delegado de la Secretaría de Fomento ingeniero don Rogelio Pardo, se reunieron en la Gobernación de la Provincia y después de larga dis-

cusión llegaron a un acuerdo provisional. Parece que la dificultad se origina de que aún no

existe una tarifa aprobada por la Secretaría de Fomento para el transporte de bananos en es-

MIS 3 MESES EN MANILA

Por una de las tantas casualidades de la vida, me tocó pasar en Manila mis vacaciones. Acabé gustoso un trabajo con la sana intención de finalizar allí el año en curso, pero desde un principio tropecé con un trabajo que a pesar de conocer no me agradó.

Una escuela sin vida, la que a

pesar de mis buenas intenciones, de mi labor honrada y consciente, jamás pude hacerla activa; faltaba allí el elemento infantil, ese bullicio diario, la fogosidad constante y para mí algo más, gran de, mis alumnos de color.

Cuatro años tengo de trabajar en Limón y durante ellos solamente he encontrado a negros. Conozco sus sentimientos, sus costumbres, su magnífico trabajo y a través de estos he podido conocer al negro adulto.

Peró, volvamos al principio de estas líneas; trabajé en Manila tres meses, aburrido en mi trabajo y hasta cierto punto en mi vida diaria; pero de ese apartado lugar de la Zona Atlántica, tan apartado como, importante tenía que sacar una buena lección, al go útil a mi vida.

Dos cosas muy importantes traje y de ellas me alegro cada día más: Primera: la inmensa paciencia de ese sufrido trabajador que se llama maestro, su resignación, aún a costa de grandes sacrificios, su fecunda tarea que debe ser amparado por todos los padres de familia para que sea una realidad.

Segunda: la más grande, la que me dará un mayor éxito en la escuela limonense y una mayor satisfacción a mi espíritu, la de haber conocido al negro en forma ampla.

Pobres aquellos que se sienten superiores al negro, a ese ser que por tener pigmentada de oscuro su piel, lo desprecian. Yo no los culpo, algunos porque se

creen superiores, otros por falta de instrucción, los más por tonfo, y todos por una vanidad racial estúpida.

Hay que convivir con el negro para conocerlo bien, hay que pasar con ellos sus duros días, trabajar entre ellos sus días de trabajo corriente, pero hay que pasar con ellos sus días alegres. En Manila tuve la dicha de conocer al negro tal y como es. Por ser aquí un lugar pequeño, son todos los que allí viven, como una sola familia, sin odios, sin divisiones, sin envidias muy propias de la sociedad blanca, sin rencores. Tanto en la adversidad como en la dicha, siempre están todos unidos. Terminé mi trabajo en aquel lugar y hoy doy gracias a Dios porque además de mis buenas y sanas intenciones que he tenido por la raza de color me ha dado la oportunidad de conocerla a fondo, de poder apreciar a cada uno como se lo merece, de apreciar la raza en general, hoy despreciada por algunos, pero la que en no muy lejano día ocupará su verdadero lugar en este conglomero del Mundo en el que, aunque pareciera mentira a veces es muy estrecho.

Cultivad vuestras capacidades amigos de la raza negra, para que más allá sin mirarnos el color de vuestra piel, sino vuestro saber y vuestra inteligencia, ocupéis un lugar preferente en esta nuestra querida Patria así como en cualquier lugar de la tierra.

NOTAS EDITORIALES SURGE UN GRAVISIMO PROBLEMA

Estas notas editoriales van dirigidas al señor Presidente de la República y tienen el propósito de llevar a su conocimiento un gravísimo problema que se presenta en la provincia de Limón.

Señor Presidente: En la última sesión de la Junta Rural de Crédito que se inauguró en Limón hace pocas semanas, fueron rechazadas veintitrés solicitudes de crédito de las veinticinco que se presentaron a estudio de la Junta. No pudo la Junta facilitar los créditos pedidos porque los terrenos de los solicitantes no están debidamente inscritos.

Hay una ley dictada en 1942 por el Congreso — a solicitud del Diputado Fonseca Chamier, permite obtener el título de propiedad a los ocupantes de terrenos en la milla marítima sin más requisito que la posesión de diez años y que la medida del terreno sea hecha, gratuitamente, por un ingeniero de la Secretaría de Fomento. Hay actualmente en el Juzgado Civil de la Provincia más de doscientas solicitudes que no han podido ser tramitadas por falta de este último requisito. Y hay — podemos asegurarlo — más de quinientas que no han sido presentadas en espera de conseguir el ingeniero que las mida.

Esa ley no tuvo otro propósito que solventar la situación incierta de los pequeños ocupantes de tierras del Estado en la Milla Marítima. Trato de darles facilidades para ensanchar sus cultivos por medio de créditos agrícolas, estimular la producción y dar vida y prosperidad a la provincia. Quiso también despertar el cariño y el interés a la tierra que es propia, para que el rancho inabastable se convierta en hogar permanente. Trato de resolver también el importante problema de esta zona que ha sido siempre el del pueblo gitano, por medio del arraigo a la tierra.

Precisamente como complemento a esa ley trascendental se creó la Junta Rural de Crédito que costó cinco años de gestación. Pero esa Junta en las condiciones actuales razón de seguir funcionando si no se procede a la medida de los terrenos.

Esa Junta, ante la grave situación que se presenta, acordó efectuar una reunión el lunes ocho de abril, e invitar al señor Secretario de Fomento, al Jefe del Departamento de Juntas del Banco Nacional, a los señores diputados por la Provincia de Limón y al señor Gobernador de la Provincia. Quieren los miembros de la Junta, antes de abandonar sus labores — que tan fecunda pudieron haber sido — explicar la imposibilidad en que se encuentran para actuar si las condiciones actuales se mantienen.

El problema, señor Presidente no obstante su gravedad puede resolverse satisfactoriamente si se destaca un grupo de ingenieros que en representación de Fomento procedan a medir los terrenos. Ponemos ante Ud. los hechos escuetos en la seguridad de que su intervención directa pondrá fin a la crisis, y que tantos esfuerzos realizados no han de perderse lastimosamente. Sólo Ud. animado como está de un sincero deseo de bienestar nacional puede ayudarnos en un asunto de tanta importancia como éste.

EL 6 DE MARZO DESAPARECIO LA DINASTIA IMPERIAL JAPONESA FUNDADA SIETE SIGLOS ANTES DE CRISTO

El miércoles seis de marzo ha sido una fecha memorable en los anales del Japón. Ya serán personas y no cosas. Y uno de los más grandes crímenes colectivos de la humanidad pasará a ser únicamente un horrible recuerdo.

2 MILLONES de libras de maíz someterá — A TRATAMIENTO LA SECADORA DE GUACIMO —

Sesión QUINTA ORDINARIA de la Municipalidad de Limón, iniciada a las diecinueve horas del día 26 de marzo de mil novecientos cuarenta y seis con asistencia de los regidores señores Hernández, quien presidió, Picado y Esquivel. Estuvieron presentes los jefes de dependencia municipal señores Alvarado, Barrantes Casco Costero, Martínez, Montero, Mora Aguilar y Zeledón.

Artículo I.—NOTA. Se leyó, aprobó y firmó el acta de la sesión anterior.

Artículo II.—NOTAS DEL SEÑOR GOBERNADOR a) En el oficio N° 442 pida se dicte un presupuesto extraordinario reforzado de la partida 65 (reparación de edificios), la que está sobregirada. Como no pueden fumarse los fondos de la partida que indica, se acordó definitivamente: Traspasar el pago hecho por el Banco de Costa Rica como fin-puesto sobre la venta de licor, por mil ochocientos diez colones, setenta centimos (C1-810.70) a la partida de "entada-

extraordinarias" 74 y reforzar en esa misma suma la partida de gastos C-1 "reparación edificios", quedando así dictado el presupuesto extraordinario respectivo.

b) En oficio N° 441 se refiere a la reparación de la casa que ocupa la Agencia de Policía de 28 millas y manifiesta que según presupuesto del maestro de obras, es necesario invertir más de cinco mil colones en ese trabajo. Immediately following the loss of her precious life, the news went in wings and her body was taken from the morgue of the local hospital and conveyed into the hall of the Court, Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of Foresters. On the following afternoon her internment brought a picture of solemnity and impressiveness.

The Reverend G. Wrigley of the Anglican Diocese arrived on the heel of time and conducted the religious service in the St. Mark's Church; the sacred edifice that had been her place of worship and services as a teacher of the Sunday School and a valuable member in the Mother's

John and the Women's Life Problem Club.

The cortege moved from the Church led by units of the Boy and Girl Scouts of St. Mark's under the command of District Scoutmaster, Mr. Adrian Mason then followed the fraternal members of the Scotch Lily Lodge, the Loyal Unity Lodge and the Independent United Order of Antia Mechanics; the British Order of Ancient Free Gardeners; some members of the Foresters Lodge the Auxiliaries of the Church and Sunday School children; Mr. Wm. Daysley, the caterer in front of the vehicle used as hearse, then the concourse of mourners and sympathizers. The grave was reached; at the conclusion of the believers service by Mr. Wm. Daysley, the funeral rites associated with the Ancient Free Gardeners were performed by Messrs. Ruben Saenz and Adam Rotray. The members of the Scotch Lily and Loyal Unity, in full representation of her life's work, commended the spirit to God the Giver.

It depends on the attitude of London in conjunction with the complaint said to be lodged against Mr. Bustamante through the medium of Mr. N. N. Recalling a little of what we know of the surrendered ruling by the Constitution which has been given way by Bustamante's MOUNT was taken to Jamaica by Sir John Peter Grant on August 5, 1886 at a time when the Legislative Council consisted of the Governor, six official and three un-official members. A privy Council was also appointed.

In 1883 a petition was sent by Jamaicans for a change in the then existing Constitution. A moderate step in advance was granted; affording an election of nine members to the Council; this

did not give satisfaction and in 1893 the elected members were increased to 14; that is, one was elected from each parish of the Colony and the nominated members increased to 10.

In pursuance of what is considered as "Well being of Jamaica" the new Constitution has been established under the designation, "House of Representatives". The Jamaica Labour Party had gathered the greatest number of votes and Don Bustamante took the bacon.

As our general speculations were popular as to whether the preferred Party had the necessary intelligent personnel for the all important responsibility of Governing the Island and its inhabitants.

— MY THREE MONTHS IN MANILA —

By one of the many casualties of life, I passed my vacation in Manila. I had accepted cheerfully employment with the same intention to terminate the year in course, but from the commencement I was confronted with a work that was not congenial to me.

A school without life that weighed on my good intentions with my conscientious and honest labour, and at no time could make active; there was needed the element of infants; this daily sullen; the constant excessive vacancy and for me the greatest thing is my scholars of colour.

Four years I had to work in Limón and during those years I had to teach only negroes. I know their sentiments; their customs; their magnificent work and through these facts I have known the adults of their race. But let us return to the beginning of these lines — worked in Manila two months; — wearied in my work; reaching up to a certain point in my daily life; but at this separated place of the Atlantic Zone, far apart, but as important that I had to secure a good lesson, something to be useful to my life.

Two important things have been brought forward and of these I am each day happier.

First: The immense patience of this suffering worker who is called teacher; his resignation of labour at the cost of a great sacrifice; his eloquent labour which should be aided by all parents of families for that to be a reality.

Second: The grandest is that which has given me a major advantage in the Limón School and a great satisfaction to my spirit; — by having known the negro in ample form.

Poor are those who feel superior; to the negro; to these belong the pigment of the iridines of colour; — he is disappointed I excuse some of them who think they are superior; other by failure of instructions and the neglect of these by a stupid racial vanity. You have to fraternize with the Negro to know him well; you have to pass with 'em the hard days; — you have to pass among them the days of their current work and you have to pass also with them the happy days. In Manila I had the same chance to know the Negro as he is. That is a small part

of those living there are as one family; without hatred—without distinction; without division without a union without that is much owned by the white society; without grudge. The same in adversity as in happiness; they are always united.

I terminated my work at that place and today I give thanks to God and in addition is my good and sane intentions that I have for the race of colour. I am given the opportunity to know the extent of the Negro; able to appreciate each race according to merit; to appreciate the race in general; a race today disappreciated by some; but the day is not very distant when the Negro will occupy his true place in this world of conglomerate in which, although apparently at times is very narrow.

Let us cultivate friendly espacities to the Negro Rases for tomorrow, without beholding the colour of our skin; without knowing it may be that through the intelligence occupy a preferential place in this our beloved Country, as well as in any other part of the Earth.

BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

JAMAICAN BANANAS RETURNING TO BRITISH MARKET

Shipments of bananas from Jamaica to the United Kingdom, suspended during the war, are to be resumed in December. That was not only welcome news to the people of Britain, who have greatly missed this fine fruit, but tidings of vital importance to the one-and-a-quarter million people of Britain's biggest West Indian Colony, whose standards of living depend largely upon their export trade in agricultural products. With an adverse trade balance which in 1943 had grown to over £3,000,000, out of a total of £11,500,000, Jamaica is naturally concerned about an industry which, in value, represented nearly 60 per cent of her exports in 1938.

Jamaica plans in the next 12 months to sell to Britain, Canada and the United States 8,000,000 stems—about 500,000,000 bananas—and to work the hard road back to full production in an attempt to recapture the market for the 27,000,000 stems which she sold in 1937. It is the reform timely to review some of the problems, domestic and external, which face Jamaica in this drive for profitable markets, and for expanded production. This drive is urgently needed to make possible the higher standards of living now accepted as the absolute minimum if Jamaicans are to be rid of some measure of the "hunger, disease ignorance and crime" about which the West India Royal Commission reported.

The war hit the Jamaican banana grower hardest when he could least bear it. On top of soil-borne Panama Disease, which had put 100,000 acres of first-class banana land out of production, came shortly before

the war wind-borne Leaf-Spot disease, which reduces output and increases cultivation costs by making necessary a system of expensive spraying. The effect of these twin evils on the small farmer, who in Jamaica produced more than half the bananas, can be realised when it is noted that the big and expert United Fruit Company were compelled by the conditions to cease almost entirely the cultivation of bananas on their own plantations.

GROWER'S NEW HOPE

The difficulties of getting banana lands back to full production are numerous, but not insuperable. Although Panama Disease is now chronic, there are hopes of a penicillin-type cure, and the reality of a new variety of banana immune to that disease as well as highly resistant to Leaf-Spot. This new banana, named after J. B. Sutherland, the Jamaican agricultural expert who produced it, is now being tested for marketing qualities.

When the war caused the critical bottle-neck in shipping the British Government had to stop the despatch of bananas from Jamaica to the United Kingdom. But, as a means of maintaining the industry for "the duration," they undertook to buy all export fruit at 3s. 6d. per stem of nine hands or more—a price which has been gradually increased, but not to the extent to which other export prices have risen.

Maintenance of the Jamaica banana industry by this method cost the British Government £800,000 in 1942, when they paid for 10,000,000 stems. But if prices for bananas had kept pace

with those of other export commodities, the 1942 figure should have been 78 per cent higher than 1938. Even at 1938 prices, when her bananas fetched 235s. per 100 stems, Jamaica would have got (£o.b.) £1,225,000 for the 10,000,000 stems in question. If prices had gone up the 78 per cent, which other export crops averaged, the £o.b. price would have been 436s. for 100 stems; and the yield from 10,000,000 stems would have been £2,180,000. So that Jamaica's loss, in spite of the generous subsidy, was £1,380,000 for 1942 alone. That is how it looks on paper, and this computed loss can be seen in all-too-tragic reality in the dwindling and unkept cultivations. The effects of war, combined with diseases, hurricanes and droughts, have cut Jamaica banana production so badly that the target for next year is a mere 8,000,000 stems, in a country which just eight years ago exported 27,000,000.

Aroused by the prospect of a good export market, the banana farmers have begun to awaken from their wartime nightmare. The hurricane of August, 1944, destroyed 80 per cent of the standing trees, but, as the hope of markets grew stronger, the growers put their hearts into the business. The small ship messengers to the United States (then already started), and the likelihood of the war's end, encouraged them to think in terms of expansion. The announcement by Sir Ben Smith, Minister of Food, that ships would be provided to bring Jamaica bananas once again to the United Kingdom set a spur to their energies.

THE SHIPPING PROBLEM

The external difficulties relate primarily to shipping. Of the fleet of 28 bananacarriers which used to ply from Jamaica, only ten are now afloat. Messrs. Elders and Fyffes Ltd., have left to them only seven of their 21. The survivors are the Corales, Tilapa, Tetela, Arizumi, Cavina, Tortuga and Bayana. The Jamaica Banana Producers' Steamship Company (probably the first truly Colonial enterprise to have its own ships) lost the Jamaica Pioneer, Jamaica Progress, Jamaica Planter and Empire Merchant (ex-German Pomona). Their Jamaica Producer alone survives. It recently brought its last cargo of meat to Britain, and will very likely be the first ship into London with bananas

The fast fruiters Erin and Eros, of the Standard Fruit and Steamship Company, have happily survived the war, but they are still busy engaged in the Pacific. The service will be started with three ships, the Jamaica Producer, Tetela and Tilapa; and two small German refrigerated ships the Angelberg and the Salzberg have been added to the list. The first three each have a capacity of about 120,000 stems; the German boats only 80,000 each.

HOUSING IN THE BRITISH COLONIES

London, March.—(I.P.E.) "The colonial secretary has decided to establish in Britain a bureau which will make available to all colonial Governments new information on housing policy," writes the "London Times." Editorially, "The bureau will be associated with the building research station of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research. This decision, which is another symptom of the new and more constructive policy implicit in the Colonial Development and Welfare Act, follows the recommendation of a Study group on housing research set up in this country on the suggestion of the Caribbean Research Council. The group also recommended the establishment of colonial centres of housing research on a regional basis and the appointment in the colonies of committees to review the present state of knowledge and requirements. On both these matters Mr. Hall has invited the views of

BRITISH BUILT MOTOCARS

Motor production in Britain will be simplified with greater standardisation of bodies and a corresponding increase in production of the fast popular type of cars is foreshadowed. Vauxhall Motors have announced that they intend to eliminate the 12 hp saloon as a separate body model. The 12 hp car will be built with the same body style and size as the 10 hp, this means for the two models the body building shops need only concentrate

on one body, it is also expected to step up deliveries. A new car from one of the oldest firms in the motor industry in Britain who have always had a great reputation for cars on sporting lines is announced. Lea-Francis has produced their first post war car, which, although it is a so-called deal of the sporting design is retained. It is available with either a 12 hp or 14 hp engine.

ARTIC RELICS

The outstanding quality of British-made canned goods

Some interesting facts about canned foods, which had remained wholesome after 92 years, are contained in the 1945 report of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, supplied by courtesy of the Tin Research Institute.

The report relates to the two voyages of the R. C. M. Police schooner "St. Roch," during which the tins were found among the ruins of two old caches deposited on Dealy and Bechy Islands in 1852-53 by Captain Kellet of HMS "Resolute."

Many of the tins were still intact, although they must have undergone repeated freezings and thawings. Those containing stewed ox cheek were still fit to eat, and labels bearing the name of Henry Gamble, Leadenhall Street, and 2, Royal Exchange, were still decipherable.

THE BATTLE FOR BREAD

"The battle for bread" continues in Britain, up to now most restaurants have voluntarily given their clients bread only when it is asked for. Now it will become a punishable offence to serve bread in any restaurant or establishment such as canteens, except at the specific request

of the customer. The Ministry of Food has issued an order to this effect which comes into force from March 25th. The maximum penalty on conviction for an offence against the order is one year imprisonment or a fine of 500 pounds sterling.
