IMPORTANTES OBSERVACIONES HACE EL REGIDOR MUNICIPAL SR. PICADO, A PROPOSITO DEL EMPRESTITO DE UN MILLON QUINIENTOS MIL COLONES OTORGADO A LA PROVINCIA DE LIMON.

La ley Fallar Chamier dota a la provincia de Limón de la cuantiosa suma de un millón quinientos, cinco y cinco mil colones, que sabiendo, invertir, son muchas las obras de gran progreso e importancia que se pueden llevar a cabo y, que beneficiarían, no solamente a la provincia, sino al país en general. El principio fundamental de esta gran ley era: la carretera a Talamanca, la cañería de la ciudad de Limón, y caminos de penetración agrícola; ésto si dicha ley hubiera sido aprobada por la Cámara tal y como fue presentada en proyecto, lo que daba a esta provincia, la cuantiosa suma de cuatro millones de colones, pero; como

fue reducida a un millón quinientos y cinco mil, la obra fundamental y la de más importancia (la carretera a Talamanca), considerando, que quedó de cartada; por las siguientes razones: Dicha obra, de hacerla; tiene que ser, una carretera por lo menos macadamizada; para que así, sería, mucho más; pero; lo que tendría un costo menor de dos millones y medio de colones, esto macadamizada. Pensar en invertir el millón quinientos setenta y cinco mil colones, que se tener en dicha obra, sería quedar, sin carretera porque no la termináramos, y sin dinero, para llevar a cabo tantas otras obras de gran importancia, en la ciudad y

en la provincia, y de muchísimo menos valor; tales como la completa solución del grave problema de la cañería de Limón; otra obra de gran importancia que se podría impulsar con este dinero, ya que no se puede pensar en la carretera a Talamanca y que la considero casi de igual importancia, no solamente para esta provincia sino, para el país en general, es, LA RECONSTRUCCION DE LA CARRILERA NACIONAL 'JESUS JIMENEZ', el trecho Siquirres-Pereña, o sea lo que corresponde a la provincia de Limón; el resto ha sido Turrialba, estoy completamente seguro, que la progresista Municipalidad de ese lugar, lo haría de su cuenta. Podría persona alguna señalarme otra obra de más importancia que ésta para la provincia de Limón? Estoy completamente seguro que no. Que se disponga por lo meo, una cuarta parte de esta renta para la reconstrucción de esta carretera, que su importancia va millones de colones para la vida económica, comercial y agrícola de esta provincia, y si la mitad de la renta se gastara, mejor inver-

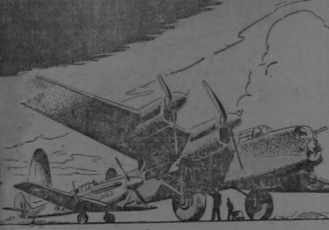

NOTAS EDITORIALES

OTRA VEZ CON LA NORTHERN

Agricultores de La Estrella han venido hasta nosotros a denunciar el hecho de que la Northern Railway Co. ha levantado un trozo de doscientos metros de vía férrea en las cercanías de la finca Pandora, cortando todo tráfico con una vasta zona agrícola.

Si la noticia es cierta como no podemos dudar, la empresa del ferrocarril comete una grave injusticia y viola una ley del Congreso que prohíbe levantar los tranvías y las líneas de ferrocarril en la provincia atlántica por considerarse de utilidad pública.

Pero al margen de esa ley, que ya harán cumplir las autoridades respectivas, hay otra ley de carácter moral que también se ha violado: la ruina de muchos, pequeños agricultores. Todos aquellos que levantaron sus fincas en esa región de La Estrella lo hicieron confiados en que el producto de sus esfuerzos y de sus dineros tendría salida a los mercados del país por la línea férrea que estaba allí tendida como garantía de una comunicación estable. Si hubieran sabido que la economía o el interés privado de una empresa podría causarles su completa ruina, seguramente habrían buscado otros lugares donde vivir y trabajar.

No es posible que ahora, cuando no pueden arrancar lo que sembraron durante muchos años, se les trate en una forma que es incesario calificar.

Labores Municipales

Sesión décima octava ordinaria de la Municipalidad de Limón iniciada a las diecinueve horas del veintidós de agosto de mil novecientos cuarenta y cinco con asistencia de los regidores señores Echeverría, quien presidió, Hernández y Picado. Estuvieron presentes los jefes de dependencias municipales señores Alvarado, Arrazola, Barrantes, Casco, Martínez, María, Molero, Mora Aguilera, Mora Morúa y Zoledán.

ARTICULO I:

Acto: Se leyó, aprueba y firmó acto de la sesión anterior.

ARTICULO II:

Notas Oficiales: el Sr. Secretario de la Junta de Pensiones Municipales de Limón transcribe acto de la sesión primera ordinaria celebrada por dicha Junta, en la que, por artículo primero se dispuso devolver a los empleados municipales, su aporte al fondo de pensiones, ya que, de acuerdo con la reforma reciente al artículo 1 de la ley respectiva, dicha plan queda vigente únicamente para los municipalidades que tengan ingresos anuales superiores a medio millón de colones, en cuyo caso no está la Municipalidad de Limón y consulta dicha Junta qué debe hacerse con los empleados que por diversos motivos se retiraron de sus puestos habiendo contribuido al fondo de pensiones, pero que no fueron distribuidos por los consejos que la ley en referencia indica; además, se licita la aprobación de un presupuesto extraordinario por mil quinientos diecisiete colones veinte céntimos, que se tomarán del fondo de pensiones del presupuesto vigente de ingresos del año en curso, 64, para reforzar la partida 7—4 "fondo de pensiones". SE ACORDO: por unanimidad y definitivamente, aprobar lo resuelto por dicha Junta, devolver a los empleados los sumos, con que contribuyeron, inclusive a los que se retiraron de sus puestos y aprobar el presupuesto extraordinario indicado.

b) Se acordó archivar nota de don Rafael Echeverría agrediendo el acuerdo en que se dispuso manifestarle la condonación de la Corporación por la muerte de su hermana política, doña Elvira Odio de Castro.

c) Se acordó archivar nota del señor Presidente de la República transcribiendo la que recibió del señor Gerente de la Northern Railway Company explicando los motivos que han determinado la no terminación del túnel de 48 Millas, y el interés de la empresa en el granbo-cuánto antes.

ARTICULO III:

Notas de jefes de dependencias: a) Se acordó archivar copia de notas dirigidas por el señor Fontanaró al señor Gobernador comunicando la conexión de pajas de agua para servicio de las propiedades de Judith v. de Nazari, Seguro Social y Cyril Grant, y del señor parqueero informando del mal estado de los cerros del mercado.

ARTICULO IV:

Nota, de particulares: a) Don José Sarkis solicita que se le continúen arrendando dos trozos del mercado de carnes. Se acordó: que como la Corporación resolvió dejar a cargo del señor Gobernador y del señor Administrador lo relativo al arrendamiento de esos locales, se dirigió a ellos el señor Sarkis.

b) Cuarenta comerciantes establecidos, en la ciudad se licitan a la Corporación se dispuso celebrar fiestas civiles los días 12, 13 y 14 de oc-

tubre; considerando los señores regidores conveniente acoger esa sugerencia, pues así se estimulará el turismo, con las ventajas consiguientes. Se acordó por unanimidad y definitivamente: declarar días de fiestas cívicas en el cantón el doce, el trece y el catorce de octubre próximo; nombrar una comisión para organizar esos festejos; integrada por el señor Gobernador don Abel Robles, el señor Vicepresidente Municipal, don V. Echeverría, los regidores, don Joaquín Hernández y don Federico Picado, don Enrique Arrazola y los licenciados Fernando del Barco y Daniel Zoledán, quienes serán auxiliados, por los siguientes comités; integrados por las persona que se indica: De Deportes: Mario Góchez, Oscar Bolaños, y Fermín Amador. DE GANADERIA: Abel Robles, Roberto Montero y Joaquín Jiménez. DE BARRERAS, TABLADOS Y CHINAMOS: Rafael de la Peña, Joaquín Hernández y Víctor Casco. DE JUEGOS: Federico Picado, Rangel C. Mendoza y Luis Jiménez Acuña. DE ESPECTACULOS PUBLICOS: Rogelio Fardo, Fernando del Barco y Ramón Acuña León DE PROPAGANDA: Enrique Arrazola, Antonio Canales y Daniel Zoledán y Mario Pardo. DE FINANZAS: Víctor E. Echeverría y Mariano Zuñiga. Además, se dispuso comisión por el señor Gobernador para la juramentación de las personas que integran la comisión y para que ordene la publicación en La Gaceta del avisos respectivos.

ARTICULO V:

We gather that the prosecution can furnish thousands of prisoners from all the Allied Countries in proof of Kramer's crimes.

Both official and private schools were represented in the march accompanied by the Boy and Girl Scouts of St. Mark's and the First Limon Cadet Troop. The children of the Cienegueta School were escorted by the Scouts from their point to plaza Yglesias.

At the Vargas Park the playing of the Band and the soul stirring singing of the National Anthem intiated that feature of the observation; followed with the allegiance to the flag, by Don Walter Cambrero, an illustrious discourse by Don Gonzalo Cordero, the Inspector of Schools and several choruses by the scholars and the band concluded the 1945 Independence Day celebration; one that will linger in memory.

SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING METHODIST CHURCH, SAN JOSE

Prelude by Miss Mildred Johnston.

President Truman's proclamation was read by Mr. Clinton Wood.

Followed by the singing of the hymn: O, God our help in ages past:

A solo was rendered by Miss Margaret Nealey.

Scripture lesson was read by Corporal Robert Anderson.

And the sermon was by the Rev. Ralph Kesselring, Pastor of the Church.

The sermon subject was: "A World Divided Against Itself Cannot Stand". It was based on the text found in Mark 8:25 "If a kingdom be divided against itself, it cannot stand. If a house be divided against itself, that house cannot stand."

After an expression of Thanksgiving for the return of peace to the world, the minister referred to the writings of Abraham Lincoln whose words, he said, have proved to be in harmony with the word of God as applicable to all nations and all ages. In particular, Lincoln's own use of the above text was pointed to as Lincoln applied it to his own nation and its need of unity.

In these days of robot and atomic bombs, these words of Jesus are applied to the need for world unity. Lincoln's problem of unity was closely linked with a vicious and unjust economic system the system of slavery. Our world unity also is threatened by inequalities of wealth and opportunity. Lincoln said "This nation cannot exist half slave and half free". Stanley Jones says: "This world cannot exist half stuffed and half starved". The major problem of this age is to achieve a unity based on justice.

A second thing in this fight for unity must be wide democracy. The world still sees too many "minority" groups at large, some of them quite near. The establishment of the European colonial system in the Far East will be a denial of what we have been fighting for. The world cannot exist half democratic and half undemocratic.

A third note in Lincoln's messages was a note of reconciliation. Some people are worried that war criminals will not be punished sufficiently. It is the minister's belief that there are

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more than enough people to see that this is done and that perhaps even many innocents will suffer. The Christian doesn't need to worry about this in any case for it will be adequately taken care of. On the contrary the Christian will need to worry lest he do not attempt to put the decent people in power and lest we make no attempt to rise above the passions engendered by war. Lincoln's policy of reconciliation, had it been carried out, would have united the nation fifty years sooner than the stupid policy carried out after his death. Today the same truth needs to be driven home. The way of love shown to us by Jesus Christ, is the only way to build a world of peace. Until we have made our enemies our friend we have no real victory. Bernard Shaw said after the last war that the only one to come out of it with an increased reputation for common sense was Jesus Christ. In these days of destructive power, these words are more true than ever. Men have tried to solve their problems by militarism, and greed and what they call realism. But common sense tells us that if we do not want civilization to perish from this earth we shall have to turn to His way of Love. Unless we dedicate ourselves to this, the 25 million who have died the past eight years will have died in vain.

BANK OF BLOOD

THE ATLANTIC VOICE is exceedingly pleased to publish the below extract of the very praiseworthy suggestion of Mr. Alfredo Canas, our esteemed fellow citizen and President of the Limón Auxiliary, Red Cross Committee; an effort to have the medical facilities of this zone co-operate in some tangible manner with the San Juan de Dios Hospital's proposal for the "Bank of Blood".

Mr. Canas states that our city, regretfully has not the necessary facilities to maintain in perfect form a "Bank of Blood"; a service to be utilized and which at the moment given may save many lives. He says it was his desire to continue to co-operate with all that tends for the betterment of the health of our people and which respect he thought in the matter was submitted for the consideration of Dr. Oscar Pacheco, Superintendent of the Costa Rica Banana Company's hospital; Dr. Bablermero Fernandez, Director of the United Medical and Sanitary Department; Dr. Sergio Vindas, Official Doctor and Chief of Sanitation and Dr. Rafael Ruano, Chief of the Medical Section of the Social Security.

The President of the Red Cross Committee suggests that Limón, too, should celebrate a week of "Bank of Blood" and by so doing solicit all willing persons and both laborer bodies could examine, free of charge the blood of those effecting the offer, then, classify the extraction. In groups; each laboratory would record the name and classification of each person examined. Immediately afterwards the Auxiliary Red Cross Committee would proceed to the elaboration of the various lists by groups sanguineated and in turn furnish a detailed report of the classification to each "Medico"; a copy of which to be given to the person in charge of the Ambulance.

Don Alfredo further suggested that in case a transfusion be found necessary the attending "medico" should call the ambulance's service station and give the instruction in conjunction with the sanguined group required; such an order would be immediately complied to; in all the places; finally the proposal is approved by the physicians would provide a "Bank of Blood" for Limón.

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BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

LEND-LEASE FACT AND FICTION

(Continued from last issue)
FICTION

A persistent fiction concerns lend-lease shipments of butter. The story appeared in various parts of the country that American tourists in Canada have been able to purchase all the butter they want at low prices and have allegedly found that the butter contains a lend-lease label.

FACT

Canada has received no butter under lend-lease. All butter scheduled for export under lend-lease has been sent to the U.S.S.R. for use by the Russian army. The proportion of our total supply lend-leased amounted to 0.7 per cent in 1942, 4.1 per cent in 1943, 4.2 per cent in 1944, and 2.1 per cent in the first quarter of 1945.

FICTION

The British buy aviation gasoline from us at 0.25 a gallon and resell it to us at 0.55 a gallon.

FACT

We do not sell aviation gasoline to the British, nor do we buy it from the British. The United States and the United Kingdom both purchase aviation gasoline and deliver it to a common pool in the British Isles from which the R. A. F. and the U. S. A. A. F. both draw. It has been agreed that the only charge to be entered on the reverse lend-lease account for the aviation gasoline drawn from this common pool by the U. S. A. A. F. shall be an amount equal to the actual costs to the British of storing, transporting, and handling these products in the British Isles. The costs incurred in the United Kingdom for all types of petroleum products average a little more than 0.2 a gallon.

FICTION

A rumour which is particularly vicious because its aim is to create distrust of our ally, Great Britain, is the one that the British have removed labels from lend-lease goods and substituted their own, thus getting the

credit in the country in which the goods are used. One version was to the effect that the British had used Italian work battalions to remove American trade-marks from goods of American origin and apply British trade-marks before the goods were distributed in Italy.

FACT

On-the-ground investigation by the War Department and the Foreign Economic Administration in various parts of the world shows no justification for such rumours. High Army officers, closely associated with distribution of supplies in Italy, have stated that they never saw any evidence of such changing of trade-marks by the British. There can be no question about the United States origin of many of the items furnished under lend-lease, such as jeeps. Others, such as foodstuffs, are shipped in packages bearing the maker's name and location printed clearly on the container, usually with the American flag. Standard lend-lease labels are attached to all goods which are shipped in packages, boxes or barrels.

FICTION

Our lend-lease exports to Great Britain have enabled that country to maintain its export trade at a comparatively high level during the war while our exports have declined.

FACT

During the war period British export trade has declined drastically, while our own has not fallen substantially below the pre-war level. In 1944, exports from Great Britain were only 55 per cent, as large in value as in 1938. In contrast, commercial exports from the United States were 95 per cent, as large in 1944 as in 1938. Moreover, in certain areas such as the Middle East and Latin America our commercial exports have increased above pre-war levels while those of Britain have fallen considerably below pre-war levels. In addition, we have through lend-lease made American products widely known abroad, which should help to stimulate our post-war foreign trade.

BRITISH MOTOR INDUSTRY IN WARTIME

The whole British aircraft industry was concentrated during the long conflict on the needs of war. Now the changeover has come so swiftly that detailed plans for conversion from war to peace have to be brought forward more quickly than anyone had dared to hope only a few weeks ago.

Even so, a number of designs for new British transport aircraft are now beginning to appear from the factories which produced the Lancaster, the Beaufighter, the Mosquito, the Halifax and other famous warplanes. All these new British civil types should be capable of holding their own with the best which is available anywhere else in the world.

There is, for instance, the Avro Tudor I Transatlantic Transport designed to carry twelve passengers in sleeper comfort from London to New York in less than twenty hours. The first Tudor is now flying, its bigger brother, the Tudor II, will lift sixty passengers over shorter ranges.

Much bigger still is the Bristol Type 167, the Brabazon I. This "Queen Mary" of the skies will have a wing span of 230 feet, a loaded weight of 125 tons, and will be capable of carrying 50 passengers with sleeping accommodation across the Atlantic or 224 passengers for shorter stages. The 20,000 horsepower Bristol giant will not be in the air before 1947. But when it makes its first transatlantic flight it will open up a new era in world air transport.

For shorter ranges, British aircraft companies are preparing smaller aircraft. There is, for instance, the 24 passenger Vickers Viking, a descendant of the famous wartime Wellington. There is the 14 passenger Miles Marathon and the 10 passenger De Havilland Dove. The Handley Page Halifax bomber is to be succeeded by the Handley Page Hermes Transport carrying 34 passengers in peaceful skies while, at sea, the short Sunderland Patrol Bomber of the RAF Coastal Command is transformed into the short Sandringham Transport Flying Boat.

Of these promised and promising aircraft, so far only the Tudor I and the Viking have

EIGHT TONS OF GOOD MONEY

British civil affairs authorities in Malaya have anticipated the temporary inflation caused by Japanese currency having suddenly become valueless and are able to do a certain amount to counteract it. They have already landed eight tons of our own Malaya money, backed to the hilt, and they are getting it into circulation although that can only be done slowly. The services will spend a great deal of it, both as individuals and by placing contracts. Certain businesses, too, will be able to secure issues of the good currency. Price control is to be enforced, and the proclamation will be out in a day or two. It will not be a long list; at first only certain essential foods will be controlled as the basis of stability to the monetary system.

ENFORCING PRICE CONTROL

To make price control effective you can do three things. You can have an army of inspectors and prosecutors. You can flood the market with goods so that

prices automatically fall to a reasonable level. Or you can persuade the public to see the necessity of keeping prices down. We have not an army of prosecutors and inspectors. We cannot flood the market with goods because we haven't got them. We have no order.

Other price controls will not be far behind although inevitably some time must pass before they can be seen in regular airline service.

When these aircraft are in service, they should do well. They should maintain British prestige on the air ways of the world. But even so, at best, they are only stop gaps, almost all of them conversions or developments from, wartime types. The true British commercial air liners, which will make possible higher cruising speeds and lower economic fares than ever before, are yet to be announced.

The pattern of British post-war airline operation is still obscure. The change in government in the U. K. has been too recent for a final plan to emerge. The importance of efficient, well operated airline operating companies on the air routes of the world is patent. The best aircraft in the world cannot do their job unless they are operated, maintained and serviced with skill and efficiency.

MERCY SHIPS OF THE ATLANTIC

The corvette — the Royal Navy's little ship which played such a great part in the guarding of convoys through out the world has turned from its war time role of U boats killer to that of mercy ship. Many of these little ships which battled Atlantic gales, Arctic cold and Tropical heat are now patrolling the trans Atlantic air routes, ready to go to the assistance of any aircraft which might come to grief in the vast ocean.

The corvettes are fitted with complete rescue apparatus and carry medical personnel. They remain on their assigned station for 14 day patrols, maintaining constant radio communication with shore bases, and contacting each aircraft which passes overhead. One corvette returning from a recent patrol reported she had made contact with more than 660 aircraft; many, because of their height or visibility, could not even be seen.

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HARDSHIP UNAVOIDABLE — BUT THERE WILL BE NO FAMINE

Therefore we have to rely on the public to avoid the perils of a second inflation that might prove disastrous. It is up to the public to report breaches of price control. Official committees will be set up of all races and parties to report the price situation in their districts, and volunteers for these committees are being asked for. But, whatever is done to relieve the situation there must still be hardship; it is *fin juyvolditie*. These committees will be asked to report any extreme poverty in their area and to investigate it.

There is no danger of starvation. There is a good deal of rice already in Malaya, and more is to come from Burma.
