te de trabajadores extranjeros. Además advierte que la mayoría de estos elementos son nacidos en el país.

Tales trabajadores actúan en la línea férrea al Atlántico y en forma muy especial en el puerto de Limón. Termina por manifestar que la empresa que de ajustarse a dicho Código de Trabajo se crearía un problema de carácter social, que serían muchos los beneficios que quedarían cesando.

También advierte que estos trabajadores tienen suficiente práctica en sus diferentes actividades de llegar nuevos elementos se le presentarían a la Corporación muchos problemas sobre la capacidad de tales trabajadores. Por lo puesto, solicita que se permita utilizar en sus trabajos un 25 por ciento de elementos extranjeros, si que así debe considerarse a tales personas, que se cuando nacidas en el país no tienen la ciudadanía costarricense.

La Secretaría está estudiando una petición y muy posible que dentro de pocos días se pronuncie sobre el particular.

NOTAS EDITORIALES

HACE FALTA UNA ESCUELA

Nosotros no conocemos el censo escolar de Limón, pero estamos seguros que el número de niños que deben asistir a las escuelas es mucho mayor que la capacidad de los edificios escolares que tenemos. Es necesario también un mayor número de maestros. El año pasado estas dos circunstancias impidieron a una enorme cantidad de niños a privarse de asistir a la escuela.

El problema que apuntamos se presenta este año en las mismas o peores condiciones sin que se haya hecho nada por resolverlo favorablemente. Nosotros comprendemos que es difícil encontrarle solución adecuada. La Junta de Educación no está en condiciones de construir un edificio, ni siquiera de ampliar los que ahora tiene. No puede tampoco alquilar locales a propósito. Su capacidad económica es nula. Es necesario que el Gobierno tome a su cargo la construcción de una escuela con capacidad suficiente como se ha hecho en muchos otros lugares del país que no tienen la importancia de Limón.

La falta de maestros es una simple cuestión económica. Aumentarles el sueldo mejorando el sobresueldo de la zona. Lo que ahora ganan con todo y el aumento general que hizo la Secretaría de Educación, no se conseguirán maestros que vengan a trabajar aquí. La vida es cara y es casi imposible como en otros lugares del país conseguir alojamiento en casas particulares. Hay que ir a las pensiones, y las pensiones cobran caro. El maestro necesita por su propio decoro y por la posición que desempeña mantener una vida decente, vestirse y alternar en un medio que sus recursos económicos no le permiten. Para pasar necesidades preferiere quedarse en el interior.

Pero a pesar de que comprendemos las dificultades con que se tropieza para resolver esta situación, insistimos en que no es posible continuar así. Por las calles de Limón vagan durante todo el día infinidad de muchachos en edad escolar sin más freno que sus propios instintos y sin más ambición que adquirir una peseta para asistir al cine.

La escuela de Segunda Enseñanza que el Dr. Calderón Guardia y su Secretario de Educación han creado en esta ciudad es un paso de importancia incalculable para nuestro futuro. Pero es necesario terminar la obra de cultura resolviendo estos problemas para el curso que comenzará dentro de breves días.

INTERESANTES OBSERVACIONES SOBRE EL CULTIVO DEL HULE EN COSTA RICA

En un artículo que hace poco más o menos unos cinco años, y que dada la amable cortesía del señor Director de "La Tribuna" se me dió a la publicidad, decía yo, en relación con el cultivo y riqueza del hule, lo siguiente:

"En el territorio costarricense y en todo el litoral de la costa del Atlántico, desde las cumbres más elevadas de la Cordillera de los Andes hasta la costa, existe una temperatura variada, desde los 12 grados hasta los 28 y 40 grados, con ricas y fértiles tierras para toda clase de cultivos tropicales y subtropicales, protegidos por las lluvias que caen durante todo el año, lo cual viene a ser un factor importante para todas aquellas plantas que requieren abundante o relativa humedad para su mejor desarrollo y prosperidad productora".

Bien, ahora que ya es una realidad tangible el estudio de la zona atlántica costarricense y la propagación de la planta de hule, ya muy mejorada con procedimientos científicos para su cultivo, ejecutados por técnicos y expertos en el campo de experimentación del "Instituto Agrícola Interamericano de Turrialba", vengo, siempre inspirado en mis mejores deseos de éxito para todos los agricultores que dediquen sus capitales y esfuerzos para

triunfar en aquella región llena de riquezas como de secretos para el hombre, a poner un grano más de arena al desenvolvimiento del cultivo del hule en aquellas regiones con estas observaciones:

Como lo dije ya en mi artículo al cual vengo refiriéndome, en el Castellora, que es natural en nuestra zona y que crece libremente en nuestras selvas vírgenes, se podrá encontrar una clase de goma de muy buena calidad y quizás al gusto del industrial, si estudian nuestra naturaleza.

Para ello bastaría con hacer un examen de la sustancia viscosa que produce la planta en cada zona y la calidad de la tierra donde crece, pues desde la costa hasta la Meseta Central cambia en su fuerza productora y calidad, y de seguro, encontrarán una notoria variedad en el producto, tal ocurre con la piña, la naranja, la caña, etc., todo lo cual está indicando que la posición geográfica de estas tierras tiene condiciones especialmente extraordinarias para la vida de la planta, y que, si se le dedica la atención que nos ha merecido el banano y el café, podremos convertirnos, con solo sembrarlo intercalado en las cercas y usado como calles de sombra en las fincas de cacao y café, en grandes productores de un artículo

que tiene gran porvenir y que puede ser colocado libremente en todos los mercados del mundo.

Al hacer aquí reproducción de mis observaciones anteriores, quiero llamar la atención de lo que debe tomarse en cuenta, muy especialmente, para el éxito que, naturalmente, todos deseamos para la explotación de una planta tan valiosa como la del hule en nuestras tierras desocupadas y vírgenes; y, ello es, en lo que se relaciona con la escogencia de las zonas y tierras para grandes cultivos. En la costa Atlántica por ejemplo, es aconsejable, de acuerdo con la naturaleza de la planta y las industrias en las cuales va a ser aplicada la goma escoger la tierra donde, conociendo el fácil desarrollo y vida de la planta, se obtenga una cantidad del producto con más o menos porcentaje de agua que le proporcione a los manufacturadores, una economía positiva en la vulcanización para sus adecuadas aplicaciones. Esto se logra, naturalmente, después de conocer por el examen de cada zona, la clase de tierra que se requiere para que la planta capte su alimento y nutra su organismo, de sustancias que han de rendir un producto a satisfac-

MOSCU, 25, U. — Prosiguiendo con vigoroso impulso la nueva ofensiva en Rusia Blanca las tropas soviéticas amenazan ya el baluarte de Bobruisk del que se han colocado a 45 kilómetros al mismo tiempo que en el frente NO desarrollan con éxito su vasta maniobra de cerco contra Pskov. Un rápido descenso de la temperatura en las llanuras de Rusia Blanca al endurecer el terreno ha facilitado las operaciones o ensivas del general Rokossovsky cuyas tropas atacando bajo fuertes tormentas se desplazaron hasta pocos kilómetros de la carretera Rogachev

Bobruisk después de eliminar una cabecera de puente alemana en la margen oriental de Dnieper y atravesar el curso del río. En sus últimos avances de esta ofensiva que al parecer fue lanzada para que coincidiera con la aparente desorganización del frente alemán del noroeste las tropas rusas han llegado a unos 70 kilómetros al este de Rogachev, colocándose a 45 de Bobruisk donde los restos de los ejércitos napoleónicos fueron dispersados hace más de un siglo. Fuerzas rusas se concentran al sudeste y sur de Bobruisk apresándose al parecer para iniciar

ataques coordinados contra esa plaza, baluarte de protección de Minsk, capital de la Rusia Blanca. Las fuerzas soviéticas reconquistaron más de 100 poblaciones en avance hasta de 233 kilómetros en la fase inicial de la ofensiva con la que el prueba la prolongada inactividad existente en el frente que se extiende al norte de Zlobin. Al mismo tiempo las tropas soviéticas del frente noreste se apoderaron de 150 localidades además de Dno en su ofensiva por tres direcciones contra Pskov que ya las ha llevado a sólo 30 kilómetros de esta poderosa base llave de acceso a Letonia y Estonia. Las informaciones de este frente dicen que las tropas rusas persiguen encarnizadamente a los restos de las fuerzas nazis que lograron desligarse y que ahora retroceden desorganizadamente en dirección a Pskov y hacia Ostrov, situada al sudeste. Sin embargo estos elementos parecen estar perdiendo la carrera entablada con las fuerzas de Govorov que avanzan hacia el sur desde Luga y contra los elementos de Popov que los persiguen de cerca. No hay nuevas informaciones de los frentes de Ucrania donde el comando soviético está al parecer reagrupando sus fuerzas para la nueva fase de la ofensiva en esta región. Es probable que la calma allí existente tenga corta duración. Tampoco hay novedades acerca del desarrollo de la lucha en la región de Narva donde al parecer los rusos están demorando las nuevas operaciones hasta tanto se logre la reconquista de Pskov para permitir al comando soviético lanzar una ofensiva doble contra las regiones meridional y septentrional de Estonia.

THE THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

It makes a tremendous difference what things, what kind of things, our minds dwell upon. The ideas we allow to pass through our minds make or unmake us. If we think beautifully, we become beautiful in mind and soul, thought, word and deed. If we think honestly of all, under all circumstances, we will become entirely honest. Our thoughts become us and we become our thoughts. If we but control our thoughts we will live better lives.

TRY AGAIN

The lessons taught us in our youthful years would be as energy and time wasted, if we did not obtain inspiration from at least one of them. The marvellous narrative of King Bruce and his Spider should always serve to inspire us with the desire of pegging away at a project which might have baffled us in our initial effort.

We are thinking of the very valuable effort effected by the Costa Rica Burial Scheme Association in the securing of a motor driven hearse and the establishing of a service for bearing our dead to their last resting place in the One Mile Cemetery. Most unfortunately the Society succumbed to the weight of the economic crisis which long existed in our community and the vehicle got destroyed. As, however, the ground was so well broken by that far-seeing group, we think another effort should be made by either some collective Group or a single individual. In view of the present-day disturbances, a motordriven vehicle may not be procurable, but what of a horse-drawn one?

Many were the expressions of dissatisfaction hurled at our Municipal Fathers for the absence of a roadway to the cemetery and numerous solicitations were, we believe, presented for its construction. The road now exists but, apart from a few instances, it is not being utilized for the principal purpose for which it was constructed. Let us not always depend on others to provide our every need. Let us act on our own initiative. We urge that a real co-operative movement be brought about in this as has been in other matters of civic importance. We have with us a number of organizations, any one of which can financially and efficiently undertake the project.

The use of either a motor-driven or horse-drawn hearse is a long established and highly appreciated custom in all progressive communities. We are confident one of either kind can be obtained in the Capital of the Republic. We earnestly press that it be secured and our people taught that a little walking exercise, now and then, is a medium to physical fitness, particularly under a cool and invigorating temperature, even though the main cause may be so sad a one.

The Germans are said to be facing a serious

as the majority of those, who would be affected were born in Costa Rica and are employed in the Atlantic Zone, especially in this city.

It is expected the enemy troops will abandon Dno, in order to occupy a stronger position immediately east of Pskov in a last effort to save Estonia and Letonia. The Germans are reported to have assassinated 17,000 of the civilian population of the Dno region during the period of their occupation.

The strategic position of Dno has since been captured as also many other points of military importance.

(4) Consideration to be given the subject of the demobilization of the Finnish Army, the problem of war compensation and others.

The Germans have renewed their aerial assaults on London. Four raids have taken place within the past week or so.

The attack effected during the night of the 23rd instant is said to have taken the lives of dozens of persons and to have caused numerous fires in different parts of the city.

It is stated that the Nazis have gathered an unusually large air force in France for the purpose of intensifying

the attacks over England.

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JAPANESE SUFFER FURTHER LOSS OF 28,000 MEN

Admiral Chester Nimitz has reported that the North American forces had completed the conquest and occupation of the Island of Eniwetok in the northwest of the Marshall group. The last phase of the occupation took place last Tuesday night with the seizure of the Islet of Parry.

This further victory by the North Americans, has elevated the enemy losses in manpower in this sector to 28,000 it is announced.

The Islands of Saipan and Tinian located about 1,300 miles off Tokyo have been attacked by Allied air units with heavy losses to the enemy.

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A SPLENDID CO-OPERATION

It is with much interest and commendation we report the Rev. W. J. Evans, and the splendid co-operation and the members of the No. 2 very effective services executed by many of the personnel of the No. 1 Brigade of the Limon Auxiliary Redon Election Day.

GERMANS LOSE ALL INITIATIVE IN ITALY

Intense Allied artillery fire is said to have repelled every effort of the Germans to renew their attacks against the bridge head of Anzio; they have also been prevented from reorganizing their forces to the south of Rome to initiate a third counter offensive.

The considerable losses suffered by the enemy in their two earlier important operations — estimated at 7,000 — has produced, we are told, a serious disorganization in their ranks and which is being aggravated by the constant blows of the Anglo-American artillery and infantry.

Heavy cannon fire of the Fifth Army dispersed a large number of German tanks

and infantry which had gathered in the Aprilia sector for the purpose of launching a new offensive by the Anzio roadway.

Notwithstanding unfavorable weather conditions during the past few days, Allied air units are said to have effectively attacked several enemy positions south of Rome as also their shipping in the Adriatic, off the coast of Dalmatia.

On their front, the Eighth Army is said to be conducting successful engagements with the enemy in the vicinity of Leri. They also repelled German attacks in the localities of Torricella and Guardiagrele with heavy losses to them.

JAPAN FEELING WEIGHT OF ALLIED BLOWS

Long had the Japanese desired a war with Great Britain and the United States of America, but they seem to have entirely overlooked the possibility of a merger of the great Powers with their almost inexhaustible resources. Feeling also assured, apparently, that Britain stood at one in the fight with the European Totalitarians, the Japanese, from early 1940, began their "Big Talk" and committed acts of aggression or British diplomats and civilians. They also repeatedly bombed North American Mission Stations in the North Shantung Province and committed other unfriendly acts against the peoples of the European Democracies as also against those of this hemisphere.

The attack on Pearl Harbour was not an over-night thought — it had been timely arranged. Following that treacherous act, the combined forces of the British Commonwealth of Nations, the United States of America and their associates

demonstrated their determination of hitting back a hundred fold — and mightily are they doing so.

According to recent reports, the Allied offensive in the South Pacific is increasing by leaps and bounds, with results entirely contrary to the plans of the military Lords of the Empire of the Rising Sun. The bombardment of the Island of Truk, Japan's principal base in that region was outstandingly disastrous for the enemy whose immediate loss was nineteen naval units and 201 airplanes apart from the terrible damage inflicted on their land installations. Among other engagements is mentioned the sinking of twelve merchant and three war vessels attached to an enemy convoy in the Bismark Archepelago, when thousands of their troops perished and much valuable war material was lost. Additional landings of Allied forces on many of the Japanese Islands of strategic importance is paving the way for the final attack on the Empire's mainland. Kavieng, on the Island of Ne Ireland, as also the Islands of Paramushiro and Shumshu were the special objectives last week end. Forty-four enemy ships were sunk in the course of one week in the Bismark Archepelago.

Japan's outer defenses in the Marshall, Caroline and Mariana Islands are now being subjected to aerial attacks.

BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

NAZI AIRFIELD

A British undercover man in Nazi-occupied Tobruk had reported to headquarters that the enemy had established an airfield outpost somewhere east of the town. He didn't know exactly where it was located, but he knew that every Saturday at dusk a fleet of supply trucks left Tobruk and headed for the outpost. So a party of our men, consisting of a captain, a sergeant and ten privates, volunteered to locate it and blow it to smithereens. They had about 500 miles to negotiate by truck, from our headquarters at Kabrit, Egypt, to the desert objective. The immediate goal was a curve some thirty miles east of Tobruk, along the coast road, which was Rommel's main line of communication. It was known that at some point along the coast road, to the east of the town, the truck convoy customarily turned off into the desert. It was the raiding party's job to get into that convoy in the dark, somehow — and this particular curve seemed the best place — and travel with it to the airfield outpost.

The dimmed driving lights of a truck swept into view around the curve, followed by another and another. Leaning forward to peer through the dark, the driver was studying the intervals between the units of the convoy as they flashed past the mouth of the wadi at an easy thirty-mile gait. He reported his findings with satisfaction. "Keeping a bit better than a hundred yards between 'em, sir". The truck shot out from the ravine as if the word had cut some invisible leash. A lurch or two, a few stiff jolts, and it took the highway smoothly, pointing east, some forty yards behind the jerry ahead and comfortably in advance of the one yet to round the curve. The captain held his breath. What was the driver of No 12 thinking? What had he thought when he straightened out from the curve and discovered himself so close to the truck ahead? Would he think No 11 had fallen off the pace? Would he think he had been driving too fast himself? These Nazis were such methodical devils — would he speed up to investigate? No 12 was dropping back! His speed checked perceptibly till he was the required hundred meters or the rear. The captain's pent-up breath escaped in a long sigh of relief.

Twenty minutes more and the convoy swung sharply off the coast road to the south. The going was rougher, yet not too bad. It was obvious to the captain that the Germans had done a spot of roadwork. When they came to a steep wadi, the way down was cleared of rocks and the way up on the other side was surfaced with coral matting to afford traction. They slid through the night. Casually they made a wide detour around the one building that showed signs of human life. A hum of voices came from it, and a parchment strip of light from an otherwise closely shuttered window. It was a cookhouse. They

POLYGLOT WARFARE

While land warfare in the Eastern theatres is conditioned by such factors as the monsoon, the radio war against Japan goes on unceasingly. Day by day, and for eighteen hours out of every day the powerful transmitters of All-India Radio at Delhi send out news and comment to the Far Eastern territories presently under Japanese domination. Burmese, Malay and Siamese are the principal languages used in these broadcasts, but not the only ones. There are broadcasts in Hindustani addressed to emigrants from India; in French, for the French colonialists and others in Indo-China; and, of course, in English, the lingua franca of the Far East. For the benefit of Chinese British subjects, Chinese broadcasts are made in four forms — the official Mandarin and the dialects of Amoy, Canton and Shanghai. The Chinese formed the largest single element in the urban population of Singapore, and owned about half of the 20,000 radio sets registered there before the war.

Perhaps the most important of the languages used in All-India Radio's broadcasts to enemy-occupied territory is Japanese. It is known that most of the good radio sets in the occupied countries are in the hands of the Japanese officials and military officers, and, in preparing broadcasts to them, the Delhi script-writers conform in every detail to the style of the official Japanese broadcast from Tokyo. It is impossible to estimate how many people in the occupied countries listen to Delhi's programmes, but there are signs that they are not without effect. A Quising broadcaster from Bangkok recently complained that the Siamese ignore their own radio and listen only to Delhi. The Japanese have tried to call in all radio sets and adjust them to prevent short-wave listening.

reached the airfield without incident and halted for a brief survey.

Left to himself, the captain swung to the right for his tour of the field. Presently he found what he was looking for — a wall of rubble and logs and rocks. Tucked behind it were nine planes — bombers and fighters. With typical attention to symmetry and neatness, the Germans had lined them up in threes, their wing tips almost touching. The captain placed one bomb in the center plane of each trio and went on his way rejoicing. He found two more revetments, but to his disappointment there were only three planes in the first and just one in the second. Still, that brought his total up to thirteen. He tucked one of his two remaining bombs into the vitals of a small tractor which was probably used for odd jobs around the field. The other he placed under a tool shed. Then he turned and went back over the path by which he had come, moving in the

BULAWAYO A CITY

Men who 50 years ago rode into Bulawayo while Lobengula's kraal was burning and while the Matabele king was fleeing beyond the River Shangani were honoured guests at the fiftieth anniversary celebrations held at Bulawayo, newly elevated to the status of a city. In the presence of the Governor, and Lady Mary Baring, they attended a service and witnessed a parade and march past the Governor of contingents of all the units of men and women serving to day. Afterwards Lady Mary unveiled a plaque in memory of the members of the 1893 columns. Later, in one of the Bulawayo parks, wreaths were laid on the Lundy memorial, when the Prime Minister of Southern Rhodesia addressed the pioneers expressing thanks for what they had done, and read a message from the King expressing the hope that the people of the country would soon return to a life of peaceful progress which, by their endeavours in the present conflict, they had truly earned. The former Premier of Southern Rhodesia, a relative of David Livingstone, was made the first freeman of the city of Bulawayo. The freedom of the city was given to 36 pioneers at a ceremony in the city hall. On Sunday the pioneers visited Cecil Rhodes's grave at the Matopos.

There is reason to believe that the secret of Lobengula's grave has at last been revealed. When he fled over Shangani from his capital of Bulawayo, he was thought to be in possession of gold and diamonds which were said to have been buried with him. It was not that, however, that sealed the lips of the Matabele concerning the whereabouts of his grave, but tribal tradition that graves of Kings are holy places. The secret of the grave is now revealed by the Rain Goddess to officials of the Native Department. It would appear that fear of her powers over rainfall overcame the fear of the natives at entering "Ama Linda," the place of spirits; and the grave, which is in Lubimbi Valley, had been entered. The story told by Ginyilische, a 70-year-old Matabele, is to the effect that Lobengula moved off before the battle of Shangani in the Pashu country. When he heard the result of the battle he and his chief Magwegwe drank from a bottle, both dying. It is stated that two chairs given to Lobengula by Queen Victoria were buried with him. The place has been declared a national monument.

same swift and stealthy fashion. Lights were springing on everywhere. The post was a bedlam of shouting. Then, as the captain sprinted for the exit, from a point in the desert just beyond the southern boundary of the camp came an ear-splitting racket. Thestaccato explosions rose and fell convincingly, settled to a steady roar, then died away.

ELEMENTS IN JAPAN

An illuminating gleam was thrown on Japan by Sir Robert Craic in an address to the Royal Empire Society. Sir Robert, who was British Ambassador in Tokyo from 1937 to 1941, described the bewilderment and consternation among the people, already weary of the Chinese war, on realizing that their country was at war also with Britain and the United States. He thought that, as disillusionment spread and the army's prestige waned, a form of passive resistance to military domination might develop. To the army were due the evils Japan had brought upon the world. It was the army as a whole, particularly the influential younger officers, that formed the centre and kernel of the whole conception of totalitarian aggression and lust for foreign conquest. From that core all the other extremist elements drew their strength. But through out the country, hidden in the shadows, were potentially influential statesmen, politicians, and leaders in the business and professional worlds, who had opposed, and still abhorred, army control of their nation's destinies. When the present tyrannical military régime began to lose its grip, those men were likely to re-emerge and might play an important part in the overthrow of the military domination.

NEVER-ENDING THUNDER

There is enough action on the Channel front at present. But across there, along that smudge of coastline the towns whose names are printed on every English heart — Boulogne, where the Guards died one by one in the ruins; Calais, held by a rifle brigade until only forty men were left alive and un wounded; and Dunkerque.

Some day soon the little ships of the Channel are going to convoy the "Pongos", as they call soldiers, across to the Continent and retake those towns.

Moreover, this front line is also a sally port for Estrope. Over it fly by night and day bomber commands of the RAF and the Eighth Air Force and clouds of fighters to sweep the skies. The Channel, which in 1940 was the most important battleground in the world, is now an air highway. Every type of Allied plane from Fontresses to Spitfires can be seen crossing the Channel while by ones and twos fighters of the Raf Coastal Command patrol overhead on the lookout for German bombers that may try to sneak into England.

There is great naval activity in the Channel, but it is not the kind that makes Flaring head lines. There are hundreds of British and German ships. There are motor torpedo boats which night after night take station off the enemy coast waiting for a chance to loose a torpedo at a German tanker. There are motor launches which have been known to lurk behind a convoy then dash through to get so close to the merchantmen they can

KENYA'S DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Projects for development, with assistance from the United Kingdom involving an expenditure of some £ 2,000,000, have been worked out by the Government of Kenya, and these are already being examined in the Colonial Office. All except £ 500,000 of the sum involved, which would be a loan, would be in the form of grants under the Colonial Development and Welfare Act. The expenditure would be spread over several years. The principal scheme is one for soil conservation, which would take £ 940,185. The next most important scheme is for the housing of Africans other than Government employees, which would cost £ 500,000. Altogether plans for African housing would cost £ 658,000. Another large sum involved is for water supplies, and other schemes include plans for agricultural and educational projects, reforestation, and the reclamation of tsetse fly areas. In addition, the colony is now preparing a five-year construction programme, which would also cost about another £ 2,000,000 the main funds for which would probably be raised by loans by the Kenya Government. This programme would be chiefly concerned with increased school and hospital accommodation.

attack them with depth charges. Anything goes in this informal war. There is the slam of a gun then long seconds until a star shell bursts, revealing four E-boats. They increase to full speed, turn and make smoke. The flotilla of British ships knifes in, among them the MGB rams, the German boat amidsthip, cutting into the side like butter. There is a hollow grinding noise as the crew of the British boat is hurled to the deck by the impact. In the darkness no one can see what is happening, but the men on the deck of the British craft can hear the Germans shouting and screaming as flames break out in their engine room. They try to rescue some in the water but are interrupted as another E-boat bears down, all guns firing. There is a destroyer somewhere in the neighborhood, for over their heads flies a 4-inch shell.

Merchantmen are rusty, broad beamed tramps, most of them, but there is a certain kinship with the tiny memo-war which shepherd them up and down the Channel like dogs working sheep toward home. The merchant skippers, even break their customary imperturbability enough to give a faint flick of the hand to the little ship.
