NOTAS EDITORIALES

Otra vez el tranvía de Penshurst

En varias ocasiones hemos tratado de la importancia que tiene para la Zona Atlántica el tranvía de Penshurst y de la necesidad de que esta vía de comunicación se mantenga en perfecta condición de servicio. Ahora volvemos a tratarlo en un aspecto diferente pero de una importancia igualmente importante.

Tenemos noticias de que algunos empresarios están haciendo gestiones ante el Poder Ejecutivo a fin de que les sea alquilado o cedido el referido tranvía y explotarlo por un largo período. Si la noticia es cierta y se lleva a cabo la administración por una compañía particular, volveremos otra vez a sufrir las mismas o peores dificultades de hace algunos años. Cuando ese tranvía perteneció a una empresa particular, todos los finqueros de esa región estaban supeditados no solamente al capricho de sus dueños sino a los intereses financieros de la entonces Peushurst Banana Co. No es que nosotros hagamos ningún cargo a esa empresa porque manejara sus intereses con preferencia a las necesidades de esa región. Es que pensamos que en estos momentos, cuando ese tranvía pertenece al Gobierno, sería perjudicial para los agricultores afincados en esa región, volver otra vez al tutelaje antiguo.

Toda esa zona está poblada de pequeños agricultores que producen cacao, frutas, y un sinnúmero de productos que es necesario traer a los centros donde pueden venderse. Si ese tranvía se entregara a un particular éste se convertiría de inmediato en comprador del cacao y de los otros productos que allí se producen y daría preferencia a lo propio con perjuicio de quienes no han querido venderle a los precios que fije.

Se nos ocurre que en este momento en que se ha formado una cooperativa de cacao bajo los auspicios de la Secretaría de Agricultura, sería muy oportuno que fuera esta entidad quien manejara ese servicio de transporte en beneficio general. Todos los agricultores de esa región son miembros de la cooperativa. Ellos, más que nadie tienen interés en el buen funcionamiento del tranvía y en que los precios de transporte sean bajos. Ellos mismos se encargarían de mantener en buena condición la línea y los puentes así como el material rodante. No habría entonces preferencias ni dificultades con el público.

Nosotros esperamos que el nuevo Secretario de Agricultura o de Fomento estudie las condiciones, tanto de los pequeños agricultores como de la cooperativa y tratará de resolver esta situación evitando que sea un particular quien explote la única vía de salida de toda una región.

El Presidente de la República Acuerda:

Proceder a la compra de la finca denominada Parismina Banana Company, situada en el caserío de Parismina, distrito de Jiménez, cantón de Pococi, provincia de Limón, q' es resto de la finca inscrita número doscientos setenta y siete. Registro de la propiedad. (Pasa a la Pág. 8)

EL CONGRESO DECRETA LA INAMOVILIDAD DE LOS EMPLEADOS MUNICIPALES COMO PRINCIPIO DE LA LEY DEL SERVICIO CIVIL

Dice el Decreto:

Art. 1º—Las Municipalidades y los Concejos de Distrito sólo podrán remover a sus empleados, trabajadores o funcionarios, por si o por medio de los jefes de servicio, por causa justificada y previa formación del expediente.

Art. 2º—La información se rá levantada por el Ejecutivo Municipal a instancia de la Municipalidad o Concejo de Distrito, a cuyo conocimiento pasará una vez concluida, con el informe que sobre ella rendirá aquel funcionario.

Art. 3º—Contra lo que resuelva la Municipalidad el interesado podrá interponer el recurso de apelación para ante la Secretaría de Gobernación, que sentenciará conforme a las leyes vigentes.

Art. 4º—Cuando algún cargo Municipal fuere suprimido y por acuerdo posterior se trate de restablecerlo, de-

berá designarse para servirlo el mismo funcionario o empleado que lo servía en la época de la supresión, siempre que entre uno y otro acuerdo—el de supresión y el de restablecimiento—no hubieren transcurrido dos años.

Art. 5º—No podrá hacerse recargo de funciones en ningún empleado salvo el caso de vacaciones o de permisos que no excedan de tres meses; tampoco se podrá, en el curso de un ejercicio económico, rebajar la dotación de los empleados municipales, salvo que la rebaja obedezca a una medida general que afecte a todos los empleados municipales. Las rectificaciones que hubieren de hacerse al presupuesto ordinario de gastos en los casos a que se refiere este artículo, deberán ser sometidos al conocimiento y aprobación de la Inspección General de Hacienda Cunicipal.

Art. 6º—Esta ley rige desde el día de su publicación, y deroga las que se le opongan.

Comuníquese al Poder Ejecutivo.

LOS INTELECTUALES Y LA RESISTENCIA

Hoy día la resistencia francesa presenta un carácter uniforme. No siempre ha sido así, sin embargo. En Junio de 1940, la mayoría de los franceses parecían sumidos en un estado de estupefacción ante la derrota y privados de todo síntoma de reacción.

El primer paso de la resistencia activa fué la protesta de la inteligencia francesa. Dicha protesta se manifestó en forma concreta por medio de la publicación de diarios clandestinos.

Desde un punto de vista exclusivamente intelectual, la tarea a emprender no se perfila del todo difícil. La "propaganda" alemana era de tan baja ley, la de Vichy, tan deshonesta, que sólo evocando los hechos escuetos, razonando lógicamente, se podía hacer luz en la obscuridad política imperante. No era difícil; solo era cuestión de coraje.

A partir de octubre, de 1940, los franceses dispersados por la debacle y el éxo-

Otras revistas clandestinas aparecen regularmente en Francia, dirigidas por escritores, profesores, ingenieros y periodistas que han renunciado al periodismo legal.

El Comité Nacional de ESCRITORES, fundado en París, en 1942, cuenta con numerosos miembros cuyos nombres literarios están al servicio de la batalla patria. El Comité Nacional de JURISTAS publica "Le Palais Libre", destinado a los magistrados y a los abogados parisinos. El Comité Nacional de DOCTORES hace aparecer "Le Médecin Français", prestigiado con firmas conocidas de la Academia de Medicina. La Academia Francesa y la Academia de Ciencias han organizado sus respectivos comités, resueltamente hostiles a los alemanes y a Vi-

chy. Los técnicos y los clérigos no se excluyen, por cierto, del momento que permanecen fieles a una Francia libre y democrática a través de la acción de sus periódicos clandestinos.

Son estos comités, sus corresponsales secretos, sus corresponsales secretos, sus amigos devotos, que han impreso y difundido en todo el país, bajo el título de "Martyrs", el relato de la muerte heroica de los rehenes de Chateaubriant. Es oportuno observar, además,

que estos diferentes organismos no se contentan solamente con recopilar, verificar y publicar informaciones que están de actualidad. Hay que reconocerles con justicia su contribución histórica al esclarecimiento de la verdad sobre la vida y pasión que atraviesa la intelectualidad francesa en tal época, medida que sin duda tornará más deslumbrante su resurrección de mañana. BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

The Chindits

It takes more than courage and daring to win battles. Imagination must be linked with sound planning and split-second execution. The Chindits are winning in the Burma jungle because they are masters of all these. Glider-borne troops, British, Americans and Indians, dropped from the sky are slicing through the lines that tie the enemy to his bases. Reinforced now, they have carried their outposts almost to the Chinese border. If their plans succeed, one wing of the Japanese Army invading India will be trapped in the wilderness and another, defending north Burma, may be defeated at Myitkina.

The plan reads like a moving picture scenario. It was to plant self-sustaining fighting forces deep behind the enemy fronts. The only way to do this was by air. But in this virgin forest land there were neither supply dumps nor landing fields—only two dubious and uncharter clearings, which were promptly christened "Broadway" and "Piccadilly". Week after week the commandos packed and unpacked their gliders, training men and mules for the grim work ahead.

Chindits landed in the dead of night after a wild flight over two hundred miles of tumbled mountains. Almost all the gliders were smashed or damaged, but it was five days before the enemy found the protective ring of fighters thrown out into the jungle. Well within that breathing spell the engineers with bulldozers, oxen and mules had blocked out a serviceable landing field, establishing communications and assuring supplies. It took hard fighting to hold it; many wounded went out in transport planes, but held it was. Now a whole belt of these combat rings, all supplied by air, stretches halfway across Burma from east of the Chindwin River, where the Chindits got their name, to within fifty miles of Yunnan. Most main roads of Japanese retreats are already reported cut, and only jungle trails remain. The Chindits are moving into these.

Spring

Spring is here, perhaps the most fateful spring in the history of Europe. The barriers of winter are breaking down, and all the might of Freedom is assembling for the supreme assault on tyranny.

Britain's Friendship for China

Prime Minister Churchill reiterated firmly England's resolve to crush the Japanese and eliminate their militarists when he received the Chinese Goodwill Mission to Great Britain.

Dr. Wang Shih-chieh, head of the mission, said: "China finds no lack of ardent friends in any circle in Britain".

He mentioned several leading daily newspapers in London and in other cities in both England and Scotland that had given consistent support to China's cause since September, 1931. Among the universities, special committees have been set up to propagate friendship for China. In the field of industry and commerce, the Federation of British Industries is taking a very keen interest in giving technical training to Chinese students and the British Cooperative Society has displayed unrivaled generosity in making contributions to the war relief in China. As for the general public, Dr. Wang paid special tribute to the work of the United Aid to China Fund and the China Campaign Committee. "The indefatigable leadership motivating these two organizations," he said, "has enabled them to extend their influence into every nook and corner of Britain!"

On the future of Anglo-Chinese friendship, Dr. Wang said: "We must try to know each other in schools in colleges and through amplification and revision of textbooks and literature in both countries, and also through more extensive and more direct cooperation of private individuals, especially scientific, industrial and business leaders, China and Britain and other leading allies may well try to focus their attention on cooperation over major problems such as future world peace organization and plans for international economic cooperation. There exists no real conflict of national interest between China and Britain. If full cooperation between China and her allies is achieved in major international issues, all minor problems can be solved readily."

To the fighting man, spring is the herald of attack. To the farmer, it is the signal for renewed activity, the time for sowing a harvest on which countless lives depend. To the worker, it brings an opportunity to strive even harder for victory.

Millions have waited for this spring as for a shaft of light piercing the clouds of oppression that darken their troubled countries. Hope, the season's eternal companion, is high in our hearts to day. Let us justify it by every means in our power. For hope smiles on effort.

Two Ethiopians Head Back

After a stiff and brisk engagement on the Volturino Front, a party of Allied troops were searching the ruins of a small town when they heard voices hailing them in the dark. After a game of hide and seek during which they became convinced that the voices were seeking contact and not beating a clandestine retreat they finally located two dark figures climbing out of ruined cellar. When the figures finally emerged they took off their red Italian headgear and threw them on the ground. They were two Ethiopians. They explained that they had been forced into the Italian Army after the fall of Addis-Ababa several years ago and that they had been obliged to fight in Libya, Tunisia, Sicily and finally in Italy where they had also been used as military police. They alone of their whole outfit remained and, seeing an opportunity, they had remained behind while the Italians retreated and then started advancing on their own in the

hope of contacting the Allied troops. They knew that any enemies of the German could only be the friends of Ethiopians and they wanted to get anywhere that would be in Allied control whence they could travel on to their own country and enlist in the services of their Emperor.

No Alarm

The best Chinese and foreign opinion agrees that while the ultimate Japanese aims are not yet clear, no major threat to free China is indicated or even likely in consideration of Japan's overall position. There is no doubt that present proportions of the fighting still are relatively small and that the Chinese have some of their best troops in the territories which the Japanese would have to bathe through if they had any fantastic plans as attacking Chungking. Relatively large numbers of troops would be required to seize considerable areas of Free China to the east of the railroad, which then would become a large pocket offering ideal conditions for the organization of Chinese guerrilla warfare. The Chinese often have been able in similar campaigns to benefit from initial retreat by collecting their forces and staging a comeback when the Japanese lines were considerably extended and weakened.

Even victory over the aggressor is only a means to an end. We all hope that the world will be so organized that the possibility of attack on the security of peace-loving nations will never occur again.—Dr. Wellington Koo.

Soil Erosion Mastered by Education

An experiment in the prevention of soil erosion has been carried out over a period of years in Kenya Colony, the district of the Suk people. Owing to the agricultural Suk having cut down the trees and the pastoral Suk having overstocked the plain, erosion had become a serious threat and desert conditions were apparent by 1931. In that year a British District Education Officer started a scheme of giving the native schoolboys small holdings and instructing them in cultivation. Their success was so marked that at the annual Local Native Council one of the chiefs agreed to start an agricultural demonstration plot and in the following years many other chiefs asked for such plots. The boys from the original school were trained as instructors and sent out to these areas. By 1939 the experience of the chiefs of the Local Native Council had fully convinced them of the need to prevent soil erosion and issued orders to their peoples to stop forest destruction on the hills and to control grazing on the pasture land. In 1941 the local streams carried away the soil when they were in spate during the rains, and completely dried up during the dry season; now the streams are clear and provide a fairly even flow throughout the year. With the improvement in the soil and steady water supply there is already a distinct improvement in local diet.

Rags to Germany

Every time our bombers fighters roar over Germany tons of rags have been thrown on their way.

Many thousands of prints are used in the production of the wings and fuselage of aircraft; some 20,000 are supply the details of the engines. All these designs are printed on specially tough paper made from cotton rags on the airfield, when the craft stands ready for take-off, it carries with it charts, special paper for which made from cotton rags. Sacking and hessian have been used to make the needles, which is used as an anti-explosive packing for ammunition. Felt, which is produced from mixed woolen, cotton and linen rags, helps to line the aircraft conserving warmth for the crew.

Higher Education in West Indies

A committee of members of the Commission on Higher Education in the Colonies which co-opted representatives from the West Indies has been appointed to review existing facilities for higher education in the British Colonies in the Caribbean and to make recommendations regarding future university development for these colonies. The committee will spend some months in the West Indies considering the problem on the spot, and will receive delegations from any of the Colonies they are not able to visit and hear their views.

Bullocks' Battle School

Bullocks are now receiving battal training in India to condition them for the noises and shocks which they will be subjected to as members of the new Indian pack-bullock companies.

Their schoolmaster is Lieutenant A. J. Mills, who put them through a tough course. Red flags are waved near them, thunderbolts explode around them, gas-rattles and sirens are encountered on their forced marches through the jungle. They are also given battle dress. Their white coats are dyed with camouflage.
