HOW PRISONERS "WORKED" TO TAKE OFF DUPPIES FROM A GIRL.

In the Resident Magistrate's Court at May Pen on Monday, before His Honor Mr. W. P. Clark, R. M., William Simpson, Richard Jordon, and Pigeon Minott were charged with practising obeah.

Here is the story: At 10 a.m. on the 8th ult., Mechilda Montagnac, a South American girl, who lives at Wesley, in Clarendon was seized with fits, and for several hours lost her reason. A Government dispenser-it was stated in the open Court-after looking at the girl declared that duppies were on her, and suggested that the services of an obeahman should be obtained Pigeon Minott, who said that the dispenser told her that duppies were on Mechilda, removed the girl to the bome of one Richard Jordon, and the local obeahman, William Simpson, was sent for. He immediately said that three duppies were on Mechilda, and for a substantial fee, he would catch and bottle up the evil spirits. Jordon, on behalf of the unconscious Montagnac, agreed to pay the obeahman £1 7s, and that same night the "working" took place. Jordon was ordered to procure the

She also discovered that the fowls used by Simpson to aid in his humbug belonging to her.

The worker of the "black art," Jordon and the woman Minott, were all convicted. The obeah. man, Simpson, was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment, and to undergo three years' pol ce supervision. Jordon, the accomplice to six month's imprisonment, and Minott to three months' imprison-

MANY LETTERS FOUND.

The police found in Simpson's possession over a score of letters written by clients of the obeahmen all over the island-from Kingston to Westmoreland, Some wanted "duppies" placed on their emenies, others that their foes should either be sent to prison, or suffer injury through supernatural agency. Most of the dupes belonged to the very lowest orders, and they all commenced their epistles as follows:-'Dear Mr. Simpson," and invariably contained the information that the writer had just obtained a few days' work, and with the few pence saved up was prepared ... to pay for his services.

PANAMA NOT A HEALTH RESORT. Still, while not a health resort, Panema, for the tropics, may be made an endurable place to live in. It is not as beautiful or well kept as Havana. The buildings are not as large, well made, or as comfortable, but with improved sanitary conditions it is very probable that the hotels of Panama will at least equal those of Cuba, while at present the food served in Panama is more palatable to an American toan that served in Havana. There is little that is attractive in the city. The streets are narrow, badly paved, though clean, thanks to the Americans, and there is no water-supply or s werage system, although both are b ing introduced. It seems odd to ge to bed in the best hotel by candle light. Soon, however, there will be an electric light plant, and another ice-plant, for as it is now the city is left days at a time without ice at zny price. There are no street-railroads, although there was one some years ago, which was discontinued from lack of use; there are no theatres, and absolutely no form of amusement since the discentinuance of bull-fight-

THE VIGILANT POLICE.

The hotels are closed every nigh at about eleven o'clock, and after for the most part by Jamaican darkies. After dark, too, the police are particularly vigilant. One evening lately an American was going home with a package of laundry. He was stopped by a policeman, who pointed to the bundle, but as neither understood the other, he was bustled to the sergeant, and after explanation was allowed to proceed. He was scarcely out on the street again when he was arrested by another policeman and the same performance was re, exted. This happened several times, until the sergeant, finally becoming tired of seeing the man with the laundry so often, issued a written permit, which enabled him to carry it home without further interference.

A CITY WITHOUT "GRAFT"

But these city police are well weaning, and they know absolutely nothing about graft. As one of the American Canal Zone police put it, and he had had experience in the States, "They don't even know enough to get their peanuts for nothing." In fact, there is very little room for graft. Prostitution is licensed by the government, and there res y librares is no form of gambling except the Panama Lottery, which does a flourishing business, and has the sole concession by the government.
