



Jamaica Defence Regulations

In the House of Commons recent ly, in answer to a question, it was explained that the present Defence Regulations in Jamaica, which have been amended so as to conform exactly with the provisions of the United Kingdom Regulation 18b. will allow any person detained be tween March 16, 1941, and the date on which the amendment came into force, to have his case considered in accordance with the new pro-cedure. It is the duty of the chair man of the advisory committee to inform the objector of the grounds on which the order has been made against him, and to furnish him with such particulars as are in the chairman's epinion sufficient to enable him to present his case.

The Secretary of State is not of epinion; that all Defence Regula tions in Jamaica, or in any other Colony, should be amended to the form adopted in the United King dom, and in particular, he considers that the amendment of the regula Kingdom Regulation 39b is a mat ter to be left to the discretion of the Governor, who has not recom mended any change.




Violent Battle Waging By River Don

Veterans In The Fight For World Liberty

(By O. M. Green, Far Eastern Editor of Reuter, on the War In China)

The arrival of Chinese troops in Burma, the appointment of General Chiang Kai Shek as Command er in Chief for future operations in Thailand and Indo-China as well as in China, the recent great Chinese victory of Changsha, na turally turn one's thoughts to the part that Chiea can play, the part indeed that she has already played in the war in the Far East. For this is certain, whatever reserves of men, oil, and raw materials Japan may have accumulated they would be much greater but for the past four and a half years of ex hausting war in China which has cost Japan at least a million casual ties and has leaded her down with debts and privations.

We have not perhaps been altogether fair to what the Chi nese have been doing. China seemed so far away, the diffi culty of her geographic place names is so great, and the war has been going on so long that altogether we rather took it for granted as one of the normal phenomena of the general world disturbance but not having any particular meaning for

Yet the Chinese have never ceased to contend that they were fighting our battles as much as their own. When Madame Chiang Kai Shek com plained in her remarkable book "China shall rise again" of the help that we and America con. tinued to give to the Japanese, she was as much surprised by our shortsightedness as by our want of practical sympathy with China. Today we see this is true.

No country has suffered so frightfully as China. Hundreds of defenseless cities and villages have been razed to the ground. Six y million people, the greatest excidus in history, have been driven from Eastern China to seek asylum in the West — hundreds of thousands e' them die on the way, The
