El conflicto europeo

La revolución en Venezuela

Según temíamos hace días, el conflicto europeo vuelve a presentar un cariz alarmante. La escuadra inglesa del Mediterráneo ha dirigido a Tétuan, hay tres buques alemanes en Agadir y varios otros ingleses y franceses en distintos puertos de Marruecos. La presencia de tanto buque de guerra en aquellas aguas puede provocar un conflicto irreparable en cualquier momento.

Agadir resulta ser el Santa Cruz que pertenece hoy a España por el Tratado del Muri, y ya le perteneció otra vez en siglos anteriores, como de España fueron también la Costa del Sur y del Noreste, Safi, Arzila, Gmder, Larache, Ergula, Yfui, Gelber, en Tánzit, conquistado por Roger de Lauria; Orujo, Bojja, Argel, Tánzit, Tlemecen, Bizieta, Melcheda, Mazagüa, Casablanca, Rabat, Tetuán, casi todo la costa berbera que nortes antepasados regaron con su sangre.

Un coronel alemán ha calculado en más de seis mil millones el gasto que la guerra representaría para Alemania y en cuarenta y dos mil millones el costo total para todos los países que en ella tomarían parte.

Alemania tiene en reserva tres mil millones y parece ser la nación mejor preparada para hacer frente a la gran eventualidad.

Los expertos militares han abandonado ya la teoría de que las guerras modernas no pueden durar más que un espacio muy limitado de tiempo; así el Coronel expresado, calcule los gastos para un año de duración.

Esa cifra son tranquilizadoras y explican bien el por qué la guerra no ha estallado ya.

Noticias particulares recibidas de Venezuela, aseguran que aquel país está en plena revolución; el General Tellería por un lado y el General Castro, hermano de Cipriano, por el otro, han sublevado el país, de manera que el Presidente Gómez se halla entre dos fuegos y su posición es casi insostenible; Cipriano Castro, según opinión de la mayoría de los venezolanos, estaba en la Goigarta, pero es de suponer que contaba ya con fuerzas suficientes, se halla al frente de la revolución.

Veremos qué actitud toman los americanos con su irreconciliable adversario.

WORLD'S GREAT WATERFALLS.

THEIR RELATION TO INDUSTRY AND CONSERVATION.

I.

The waterfalls of the earth have become the subject of a conflict which is yearly increasing in violence. The lovers of nature wish to preserve the waterfalls in their original condition as far as possible for all time, while the engineers and industrial promoters seek to exploit them as sources of cheap power for electrical purposes. The accomplishment of this object on a large scale necessarily involves the total destruction or serious injury to the waterfalls, regarded as pictureque additions to the landscape.

It is only within recent years that waterfalls have been considered from the commercial point of view, but since it has been recognized that the energy of flowing water in very many cases furnishes a cheap and almost inexhaustible substitute for coal, which is yearly becoming more costly and more largely consumed, the great waterfalls, which as impediments to internal navigation have hitherto been worse than worthless from the viewpoint of social economy, have suddenly become objects of very great value.

The falling water drives the turbines of electrical power stations, producing electric light and power, which in many cases are transmitted over hundreds and thousands of miles. The war over the waterfalls which is now being waged by the friends of nature and the promoters of industry is likely soon to increase greatly in bitterness, for many celebrated falls have already been destroyed or have at least suffered aesthetic injury from the establishment of power stations.

The famous falls of the Rhine at Schaffhausen are at present the subject of heated controversy. Several power stations already stand on their banks and sap their life blood. The Swiss Government, however, takes care to preserve a sufficiently large volume of water to maintain the character of the falls as a notable spectacle and an attraction for tourists, writes Dr. Richard Hering in *Ueber Land und Meer*. A still more bitter strife has been engendered in America by the question of the preservation or destruction of the Falls of Niagara. These famous falls have already narrowly escaped entire absorption in the pipes of power stations, and every energetic action on the part of lawmakers both in the United States and Canada has been required to keep intact from industrial invasion and preserve in its original beauty at least a remnant of this great wonder of the world.

Another North American waterfall, which as the highest fall in the whole world especially deserves preservation as a natural monument, is apparently assured against destruction for all time. This is the Yosemite Fall in California, which makes a descent of 2,600 feet in three successive stages. As the whole Yosemite Valley, which was not discovered

until 1851, was made a national park in 1864 the falls of the Yosemite are under Governmental protection and their pristine beauty can never be marred by the establishment of any power station.

There is a popular but erroneous impression that the falls of Niagara are the greatest in the world, and even those more enlightened persons who know that the Victoria Falls of the Zambezi River in Africa are twice as broad and more than twice as high as those of Niagara almost invariably assign to Niagara the second rank among the great waterfalls of the earth. Even this is an error, for South America possesses a waterfall which exceeds Niagara both in width and in height and is actually the second largest waterfall in the world.

This little known waterfall is that of the Iguassu River tributary of the Paraná, and like Niagara it is situated at the boundary of two States, each of which owns half of it. The total water power of the Iguassu Fall, which is 213 feet high and nearly two miles wide, is estimated at about 14,000,000 horsepower. This is approximately equal to the aggregate water power of all Scandinavia, which is rich in waterfalls, or ten times the total water power of Germany. The temptation to exploit this great, inexhaustible, never freezing stream as a source of power for industrial purposes may be easily imagined.

At present such exploitation is quite impossible, as the Iguassu Fall is too far from the beaten tracks of commerce to make it profitable to establish any electrical power station, but it will probably not be long before these falls will be threatened with the fate of Niagara. This undesirable possibility has been foreseen by the interested States, Brazil and Argentina, which have already begun negotiations designed to protect the falls.

The largest of the earth's waterfalls, the Victoria Falls of the Zambezi River in Rhodesia, which are 386 feet high and more than a mile wide and which were discovered by Livingstone in 1855, have also become the subject of a compromise between the conflicting demands of the lovers of nature and the promoters of industry. The water power of these falls is estimated to be fully 35,000,000 horsepower, two and one-half times that of the Iguassu and five times that of the Niagara. By way of comparison it should be noted that the aggregate water power of the whole of Europe cannot greatly exceed 35,000,000 horsepower.

Certainly those who can avoid their children going a begging at an early age should put an end to this obnoxious practice.

We will after a while write further on this subject.

Japanese Cabinet.

Tokio.—It is reported that Count Kataura has resigned his position as Premier on July 27th and recommended Marquis Sanomi as his successor. The change will probably be announced on August 25th. This report is not confirmed, nor is it officially denied.

Undoubtedly, a change in the Cabinet is imminent, and it has been in consideration for three months past. As yet the distribution of portfolios has not yet been decided upon, but probably when Count Kataura still remains Foreign Secretary to Baron Motome, now Ambassador to Russia, Baron Ichiba, the Ambassador to the United States, or Count Kato, the Ambassador to Great Britain, will be called upon to accept that office.

There is no reason to believe that the change will affect the general policy of the Government, but Count Kataura is likely to continue as the senior head of affairs, Marquis Sanomi was Premier of the Cabinet organized March 25th, 1910.

Germany's Demands are still Excessive.

Paris.—A semi-official note issued states that the optimistic opinions emanating from London relative to the progress of the Franco-German negotiations are not borne out by the facts as the German demands continue excessive.

Germany Greatly Agitated.

Berlin.—Germany is greatly agitated over the aggressive attitude taken by Great Britain in the negotiations over the occupation of Morocco. That the British lay the blame on Kaiser Wilhelm for the difficulties that have arisen is considered a definite answer to the German empire. Premier Asquith's speech in Parliament, in which he gave the legislation of the government of the situation, is looked on as a veiled attack on Kaiser Wilhelm's Moroccan policy.

Welcoming the King.

Japan's New

Dirigible.

DESCRIPTION OF THE ENGINE OF
W R THAT NIPPON IS
BUILDING.

London.—The "Standard" gives the details of the largest dirigible yet planned, which Japan is now building. It will be rigid and will have a length of 600 feet. It will be equipped with six 1,200 horse power motors and is expected to make thirty miles an hour against a forty mile wind and even to be able to live more than an hour against a gale of 100 miles per hour.

Oversize huge metal skeleton the outer covering of the fabric will be placed. It will contain sufficient gas to lift forty two tons, and if a cargo could carry at least twenty tons of benzine for its engines. The loss of gas is compensated for by the lessened weight caused by the consumption of oil fuel and in that way the balloon should be able to remain in the air a week. It will be under the full control of a crew of ten, but will be able to carry thirty passengers.

There is ample room for ammunition and bomb cylinders. It is hoped that the dirigible will be ready for launching next summer. Japan recently completed a semi-rigid dirigible that was not satisfactory.

Culebra Cut.

THE MOST EXPENSIVE PART OF
THE PANAMA CANAL.

Washington.—Owing to the slides of earth and rock, the famous Culebra Cut has proven to be the most annoying and expensive part of the engineering work on the Canal. The engineers really expected that a good deal of the matter would slip down into the canal prism, the course of excavation, because of the great depth of the cut and the character of the soil, and it is admitted that they had no idea of the enormous extent of the slides to be encountered.

Last year were even very recently the slides were more numerous and larger than usual, and the Canal Commission has consequently been compelled to revise its figures and to increase the cost of the excavation work. This work will be done at an additional estimate for Culebra Cut, owing to the great improvement in the method of work. The cost of excavating, which in 1907 was estimated at 98 cents per cubic yard, has now been reduced to 56.92 cents and even further reduction may be expected.

The statistics of the enormous quantity of coal constructed by the miners and teams tearing away the earth and rock in the bed of the Panama Canal may be gained from the statement that the Canal Commission has just placed a contract for 550,000 of semi-bituminous coal, this being one year's supply. The successful bidder was the Pocahontas Fuel Company of Virginia, at \$2.51 per ton gross tonnage on the steamer. A British steamship line, the Earl of Derby, will carry the coal to the Isthmus from Newport News at \$1.29 1/2 per ton.
