BANANA THE PRIDE OF THE TROPICS.

An exchange of a recent date publishes the following:—

If you did not eat three dozen bananas last year, you did not have your share. Over 40,000,000 bunches, or more than 3,000,000,000 bananas, were imported into the United States in 1910. The immensity of this shipment can be more readily grasped by the statement that it would cover an area 20 feet wide reaching from New York to San Francisco, or placed end to end, would extend thirteen times around the earth at the Equator. The "slip" in the pedo would launch the ships of the world. The wholesale value of the 1910 importation at point of export, was over 12,500,000 dollars, while in all probability the consuming public of the United States expended over 35,000,000 dollars for this delectable fruit.

During the past ten years the number of bananas consumed in the United States has more than doubled, and the increased tropical acreage under cultivation assures even more startling figures for the next decade. Many European countries are importing large quantities of bananas; last year Great Britain consumed over 8,000,000 dollars worth, Germany, over 1,000,000 and France, 500,000.

With the world's decreasing food supply, and the wheat crop at a standstill, the banana comes forward as an important factor in the saving day. One acre with little labour will annually produce 17,000 pounds of bananas or more than one-third times food substance as an acre of corn, two and one third times as much as oats, almost three times as much per acre as wheat and potatoes, and four times rye. The chemical composition of bananas and potatos is almost identical.

Forty years ago they were very few people in this country who could boast of having seen a bunch of bananas. The fruit was practically unknown. Now in even the most remote country store this "pride of the Tropics" is a familiar sight.

Despite the fact that millions of bunches annually are consumed, they belong almost wholly to one member of the family, the common yellow Gano. Scientists have recognized and classified as many as 42 different species ranging from ornamental groups that do not develop fruit to the giant bananas, the Platano of the Spaniard.

The red bananas is not common in the American markets. "There is a reason." In the United States it is used only to "dress" fancy baskets of fruits, but in the tropical countries, it is quite a favourite. The individual banana is large, but the stalk does not carry so many "hands" as the yellow varieties, so as it does not bring as large a price to the grower and wholesaler, its extensive cultivation is not encouraged.

Human culture is one of the oldest of industries. It has been known since the origin of the human race. Long before the dawn of history in the Old World, perhaps long before the Old World rose from the waters, man lived on the fruit of the Musos. The banana was generally considered

a native of south in Asia, and to have been carried into America by Europeans, until Humboldt threw doubt upon its purely Asiatic origin, quoting early authors who asserted that the banana was cultivated in America long before the Conquest. It is claimed that at the time of the Incas in Peru, bananas formed one of the staple food for the natives of the warm and temperate regions of the Mountain. In spite of the uncertainty as to just which country may claim the fruit as indigenous all tropical lands assert their right to it.

The first importation of bananas to the United States occurred in 1844, when the schooner "Raynard," on a voyage from Cuba brought into New York, as a commercial venture, a consignment of 40 bunches, but the real beginning of the trade dates back to 1856, when Mr. Charles Frank undertook the importation of fruit from Colon to New York. Previous to that venture small cargoes consisting mainly of the red banana had been received at irregular intervals from Cuba. 1870 captain Baker, an owner of a Cape Cod schooner, took a charter to carry gold miners and machinery 300 miles up the Orinoco River in Venezuela. After discharging his cargo, Captain Baker ran into Jamaica to secure some coconuts as ballast to New York, carrying a few bunches of bananas on the deck as an experiment. The result promised a great future for the industry in that island, which has been fulfilled the exports last year exceeding 4,000,000 dollars.

The s.s. "Limon" is expected to arrive here this morning from Boston with passengers and mail. She will after taking a cargo of bananas leave on Sunday for the same port from whence she came.

Testing Of Guns.

CROCKERY DESTROYED.

London.—The battleship "Orion" 13.5 inch guns have been tried with remarkable effect. So tremendous was the concussion that windows were shaken in Southsea, ten miles away. The structure of the ship well withstood the test and showed no damage. All those engaged in the operation wore wool padded ear wraps.

Hardened glass skylights and port-holes were fractured and the coverings of the canned goods in ship's store burst and much crockery was smashed. The decks were not buckled by the blast, due to the manner in which they were specially strengthened, the bottom of the ship's boat fell out.

Prussian Divorces Are On The Increase.

Brio, Saturday.—The statistics of the city of Berlin for 1909, just published, show that out of a total of 39,474 births, less than 10,000, or more than twenty five per cent were illegitimate. In the same period there were 19,120 divorces in the capital, Brio also had 785 suicides and 45 murders in 1909.

The statistics of divorce in the kingdom of Prussia in the year 1910 shows that there were 19,200 divorces to every 100,000 marriages in Prussia, these having been an increase of 10 per cent over 1909. In the cities generally divorces rose from 181 to 192 to 210 in 1910, and in the largest cities from 258 to 323 per 100,000.

In the country districts the figures only rose from 44 to 49. The figures show the

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remarkable fact that divorce is seven times more frequent in big cities than in the country. In 1910 the divorce in Prussia amounted to 9,277 there having been a gain of more than one third in five years.

Chinese Cruiser Not Wanted In Mexico.

Mexico City.—Because the claims of indemnity growing out of the massacre of Chinese at Tarragon during the revolution have not yet been adjusted, the Mexican Government has suggested to China that the call of the cruiser Hui Chai at Mexican ports be deferred. The government expects that the Chinese chargé d'affaires will let a visit at this time give rise to embarrassing incidents, since the public might misinterpret the meaning of the call. China has acceded to the request.
