LONDRES, 7. — Con motivo del primer aniversario de la victoria de los aliados, el Mariscal de Campo Lord Montgomery dirigió al Ejército Británico un mensaje especial que dice: "El día 5 de mayo hace un año que algunos dos millones de hombres del en un tiempo afamado ejército alemán se rindió al grupo británico del ejército que ocupaban el flanco norte del avance aliado en el noroeste de Europa. Los términos de la rendición incondicional fueron firmados en mi Cuartel General táctico en la llanura de Luneburg a las 6.30 minuto de la tarde de mayo 4; las hostilidades cesaron a las 8 de la mañana del día 5. Hemos estado en guerra casi seis años; La carga del conflicto pesaba fuertemente sobre el Imperio Británico, el cual en un tiempo luchaba solo contra el poderío combinado de las potencias del Eje; casi parecía imposible que pudiéramos ganar la guerra. Entonces nuestros grandes aliados se unieron a nosotros; primero Rusia, luego Estados Unidos, y este gran equipo aliado logró la más absoluta derrota de las naciones del Eje. Como fue que pasamos por aquellos días oscuros cuando estuvimos solos y todo parecía sin esperanza? Seguimos adelante porque todo el Imperio replicó a nuestra llamada en la hora del peligro; ningún esfuerzo individual por parte de algún miembro del Imperio pudiera haber igualado este poderoso y unificado Imperio." 

La Mansión de Roosevelt Es Ahora un Santuario Nacional



Truman dedica la mansión de Roosevelt como santuario nacional.

HYDE PARK, NUEVA YORK. — La famosa mansión que perteneció al finado Presidente Franklin D. Roosevelt, situada en la orilla del Río Hudson, donde el inolvidable estadista nació, vivió y está sepultado, es ahora propiedad del pueblo estadounidense.

El gobierno federal ha tomado posesión del predio de Hyde Park, el cual mide 13,35 hectáreas, y que fue regalado por el Sr. Roosevelt a los Estados Unidos. El solar contiene la casa residencial y la sencilla tumba del famoso presidente. La fosa está en medio de un jardín de rosales. Y desde ahora en adelante todo el pueblo tendrá el derecho de ir a ver ese santuario nacional.

Bien sabido de todos es el hecho de que el Presidente Roosevelt siempre sentaba precedentes; y uno de éstos fué el de que, al legar esa mansión a su patria, realizaba un acto que ningún otro presidente de los Estados Unidos había hecho antes. He aquí cómo la distinguida viuda de Roosevelt explicó ese hecho al efectuarse el acto del traspaso de la propiedad:

"Creo que mi esposo, amante de la historia como era, encontraba deleite en tratar de predecir lo que el futuro podría traer; y así se figuraba ver su propia casa como perteneciente al pueblo estadounidense y como uno de los puntos a donde pudiese acudir la gente a fortalecer sus conocimientos de historia, adquiriendo más informes acerca de las figuras que la hicieron."

El 18 de julio de 1939, el Congreso aprobó una ley autorizando la creación del "Franklin D. Roosevelt National Historic Site" ("Solar Histórico Nacional Franklin D. Roosevelt"). El presidente había hecho el traspaso del predio al gobierno bajo una condición: la de que su familia pudiese habitar en él si así lo deseaba; pero la viuda de Roosevelt, su hija y sus cuatro hijos renunciaron a ese privilegio, dejando expedito el camino a la Secretaría de lo Interior de los Estados Unidos para que formalizara el establecimiento del mencionado Solar Histórico.

La casa se edificó en 1826, y desde entonces ha sido reformada varias veces, ensanchándose a medida que la familia Roosevelt aumentaba en número. Ahora está tal como la dejó por última vez el presidente: todavía están cerca de la puerta del vestíbulo su abrigo y su sombrero, y disseminada por toda la casa, una miscelánea de muebles y cosas que fueron objeto del aprecio de generaciones sucesivas de los Roosevelt.

El visitante puede contemplar el lecho en donde F. D. R. vivió al mundo, su colección de pájaros, su biblioteca y su dormitorio, cuyas ventanas dan al serpenteante y caudaloso Hudson. En el viejo jardín de rosas, rodeado de un cerco de abetos, puede verse una lápida de mármol, notable por su sencillez. Escrita sobre ella se lee la siguiente inscripción: "Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 1882-1945. Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, 1884-".

Se sabía en Francia que el partido comunista era el mejor disciplinado, el más rico y más confiado, para no decir el más en greido. No cabe duda que los comunitas esperaban el endoso de la constitución, la cual, al establecer virtualmente una forma de gobierno de una sola cámara hubiera sido favorable para sus ambiciones. A pesar de algunas inconveniencias, tales como la elección de una nueva asamblea constituyente en junio próximo y de comenzar otra vez la tarea de formular una constitución, el resultado no puede considerarse otra cosa que saludable. Como de costumbre, no hay una sola o simple explicación para esta sorpresa política. No cabe duda de que una de las causas contribuyentes fué aquel nuevo factor en la política francesa, a saber, el voto de las mujeres. Otro parece haber sido el hecho de que los socialistas locales no siguieron a las direcciones de sus líderes partidarias

de votar a favor de la constitución junto con los comunistas. Es cierto que en muchos distritos que fueron fuertemente izquierdistas durante las elecciones votaron en contra de ella, y aunque el resultado no debía nada a la apatía — des de luego que el ochenta y cinco por ciento del electorado registró sus votos. Las consecuencias, sin embargo, resultan más interesantes que las causas. En verdad no sabremos hasta donde los sentimientos políticos hayan cambiado hasta que se verifiquen las nuevas elecciones el mes entrante. Es entonces que vendrá, si es que viene, el más violento choque entre la izquierda y la derecha tantas veces pronosticado y que debe temerse. Generalmente hablando la posibilidad de que surjan serias dificultades más bien ha disminuido que aumentado debido a la votación del domingo pasado, la cual indica que existe una antipatía popular en contra de los procedimientos extremistas".

a GUILAS IMPERIALES DE DOS CABEZAS

Segun varios eruditos, introdujose el uso de esta insignia y se ejerció privativamente cuando estaban dos emperadores sobre el trono, gobernando de común acuerdo el imperio, como simbolo oportuno para significar esa unión.

El uso del águila con una sola cabeza como insignia del imperio es muy antiguo. The Age of Chivalry

Among Britain's new devices by which science saves lives at sea is a two-way lifeboat radio. Exhaustively tested before it was produced, it consists of a water-tight binacle in which are the transmitter and receiver, a hand-driven generator power unit, a telephone set, telegraph key and 300 feet of antennae wire on a reel. The transmitter can be used for either code or voice transmission. On low frequencies 50 to 200 miles can be covered, and on short wave, signals can be radiated over 1,000 miles. This transmitter can work also automatically, and when the master switch is set in the "automatic" position

and the hand generator cranked, S.O.S. signals are sent out with long dash signals to give radio direction-finding bearings. To bring the receiver into operation a master switch is used and when contact has been made with ships or shore stations, the lifeboat is able to give information of its moved 70-year-old member of Cherbourg. Equipment also includes a collapsed rubber balloon in a metal case with a cylinder of helium for inflation and in case the wind is not suitable for flying the balloon, a collapsible box kite. THE BARCELONA - TURRIALBA FOOTBALL MATCH

Northern Railway Company to The Citizens of Limon

In view of certain charges that have recently been widely circulated against this Company since the Military Control on the Railway was raised it seems desirable to make the following statement:

1. By section C) of Article 369 of the Labour law, strikes are declared illegal in transport companies.
2. The same law states that employers paying wages not less than the minimum fixed by law cannot be forced to raise these, if they are working at a loss.
3. This Company is working at a loss and does pay wages higher than the minimum fixed by law. It has not bought any railway in Salvador or anywhere else out of profits.
4. In spite of this a strike was organised on the railway last December and it was recognised by all (even the organisers) to be illegal.
5. The penalty for an illegal strike or being absent from duty for two consecutive days without leave is the cancellation of the contract of the culprit.
6. Accordingly, when the strike broke out all contracts were automatically cancelled and while Military Law lasted the Company had no employees of its own.
7. When the Military Law was raised the Company re-employed everybody except a very few obviously disloyal ringleaders, re-validating their contracts though not required to do so by law.
8. The Company has dismissed nobody as a result of the strike, it has merely refused to re-employ certain notorious trouble makers.
9. Therefore there have been no reprisals and there will not be, but discipline will be maintained in the interest of public safety and those who do not obey the rules or who persist in making trouble will be dealt with in accordance with the law as established by the Labour Law.

SILVER BROOCHERS FOR GAMBIA CHIEFS

A message from Bathurst, capital of THE GAMBIA, says that the award of Silver Brooch Badges to Gambian chief, discontinued in 1940, is to be resumed.

The awards, limited to 30 holders will be made to Chiefs and others living in the Protectorate, who have occupied a responsible public position for 25 years. There are now 21 holders of the Brooch and nine more presentations will be made in the near future. Each recipient of the Silver Brooch will also be given a Certificate signed by the Governor in recognition of the awards.

PRISON EXPERIMENT IN JAMAICA

One of the world's most unusual prisons is coming into being in JAMAICA, British West Indies. The Richmond Farm Prison, as it is called, is being financed under the Colonial Development and Welfare Act. The Colony's Director of Prisons, Mr. W. Shillingford, says that the farm, which occupies 435 acres, will have no walls and no wardens. Provision is being made for up to 200 specially selected non-habitual criminals (most of them first offenders) to be trained as small settlers. The training will include soil conservation, animal husbandry, pig, poultry, rabbit and bee keeping, and the building of huts and sheds and the making of utility furniture.

Mr. Shillingford says: "Instead of walls, we hope to build character and instead of wardens there are 'leaders' who work with the prisoners rather as foremen. There are, and will be, many difficulties to be overcome but all concerned are working well as a team and optimism is justified as to the eventual success of this experiment, which has as its primary object the removal of at least a proportion of decent young men (who, for one reason or another, have committed an offence) from the contamination which is inevitable in large overcrowded prisons, and the training of them to become useful members of an agricultural community."

Government wishes to dispose, are to be purchased in bulk by the Indian Government. It is estimated that the total amount will be 600,000 tons, ranging from needles and fountain pens to aeroplanes and heavy machinery for road-making. The sale price is not yet fixed, but the American book value is stated to be over £100,000,000.

Representatives of the two Governments will be meeting in the next few months to reach agreement as to price and method of payment, which cannot be separated from claims under Lend - Lease and the reciprocal aid given to the Americans by India.

The arrangements will give the Indian Government complete control of the outflow of American surplus goods into the Indian market.

AFRICAN CHIEFS ARE SCHOOL RIVALS

A message from Accra, in the GOLD COAST, says that a 51-years-old Chief, Ankobalene Odei Mensah, is a pupil at a local night school and has risen to Standard I; now another Chief in the district, Gyaschene Kwasi Afiyia, who is 41, has also joined the school and a friendly rivalry between the two Chiefs has started. Their presence is having an excellent effect on the other pupils and in the atten-

dance at the classes. This is thought to be the only night school in the Gold Coast which has two Chiefs among the pupils.

"RAIN" GENERATOR

A fully automatic irrigation system which operates when the ground requires moisture, has been invented and used for the past ten months by an Australian engineer. The apparatus, which applies stored water, provides the correct amount of moisture content for any crop. The machine has no electricity or motors, or involved gadgets, yet it gauges when the earth requires water for best results and turns it on. Installation costs are well within the range of the average small farmer.

THANKS FROM NEW ZEALAND

The New Zealand Government is donating £3,000 to the Queen Victoria Cottage Hospital, East Grinstead, Sussex, in recognition of the work done for New Zealand airmen who suffered burns requiring plastic surgery.

BANTU PROFESSOR

The University of Cape Town has appointed its first

Native lecturer. He is a Mr. A. C. Jordan who will be lecturer in the Bantu language. Mr. Jordan is 39 years of age, a B.A., an M.A., and the author of several books in the Bantu language.

AMERICANS IN AUSTRALIA

Benefits under the Re-establishment and Employment Act will be extended to American servicemen settling in Australia. These include employment facilities through the Commonwealth employment service, including the payment of transitional re-employment allowance, training in occupations where openings exist and re-establishment loans for undertakings offering good prospects.

The Commonwealth will discuss with the United States the possibility of amending the current Commonwealth States housing agreement to see what housing concessions can be granted to former U.S. servicemen. Conditions of eligibility will be the same as those for Australian veterans. The Department of Immigration will advise and assist immigrants among the American forces. Additionally, it will in form them of their legal obligations and duties settlers.

Crusade Against Bread Waste

Newspapers, cinemas, the wireless, and other agencies for publicity and advertising have joined the current campaign for bread saving in Britain. 1,250 newspapers are carrying paid advertisements making straight appeals to the public to avoid waste and giving domestic hints on economical dishes. (See the Ministry of Food's advertisement on page 43). For several months cinemas have been featuring food flashes, appeals, and advice to housewives, while BBC is carrying special talks on food.

The campaign is being taken directly to fortysix women's associations such as the Women's Cooperative Guild and the TUC Women's Advisory Committee. Printed matter and other displays are meeting the public from all sides: beginning April 15th, 10,000 sites will bear large posters, while over a quarter of a million smaller posters will be available for women's organisations, food advice centres, buses, and trolleys. 5,000,000 stickers are being printed for pasting on garbage cans. Twenty mobile exhibitions will tour one hundred and forty towns from May to August, and our hundred displays will show methods of avoiding bread waste. Leaflets will discuss each of the following three subjects: how to avoid bread waste, how use stale bread, and the causes of the present wheat shortage. During May and June the Post Office franking device will carry the slogan, "Don't Waste Bread; Others Nedd It".

The baking and catering trades have recently, held conferences on the general question of food economy, and are co-operating wholeheartedly in the campaign. In spite of the financial complications involved, the baking trade has recommended that the standard two-pound loaf be reduced to one and three-quarters pounds, a change now under consideration. They also suggested a scheme for mutual aid between bakers by which those owning ruskling and crumbing machinery would handle surplus loaves of those not possessing such equipment.

In addition to raising the wheat extraction rate from 80 to 85/100, it was decided that from March 24th, no bread was to be served in restaurants as part of a meal (other than breakfast) unless the bread was an integral part of a dish, or was requested by a customer.
