A qué llamamos instinto...? A todas las necesidades físicas, que representan estímulos de la actividad psíquica. Se hace necesario explicar o anotar, que el Ello está saturado de instintos: sintéticamente se puede decir que toda la actividad del Ello procede de los instintos.

La fuerza instintiva reclama cierta o total satisfacción en el Ello generan los instintos que pueden aparecer en el Yo, pero en una forma dederivados. Como ejemplos podemos señalar el hambre, el amor; que son instintos del Ello, que necesitan una satisfacción veces muy urgente. Siendo el Ello incapaz por sí sólo de sa-

ciar su deseo, recurre a aquella parte suya que está en contacto o en funciones del mundo exterior; este espacio viene siendo el Yo.

No es correcto que el Ello se conduzca por sí solo a la (necesidad) saciedad de sus deseos hacia el mundo exterior; la experiencia nos enseñará que si esto sucede, los trastornos consecuentes serán de gran repercusión en el apartado anímico.

El encargado de que no se fracase en esta misión es el Yo, que ha de servir como un intermediario entre el mundo externo y el Ello. Vemos como la actividad del Yo se orienta en dos direcciones: una que se dirige hacia el mundo exterior, donde ha de buscar el momento oportuno para aprovechar un medio de satisfacción del Ello exento de todo peligro, y la otra que se dirige hacia el Ello para dominar sus pasiones o sus propios ins-

tintos aplazando su propia satisfacción, incluyendo el caso de abandonar sus fines contra una indemnización.

Cuando el Yo y el Ello se encuentran en estas relaciones, se dice que existe el estado ideal y no debe haber ningún temor por las perturbaciones.

Cabe aquí decir, que la decisión de cuando se debe reprimir la satisfacción del instinto y doblegarse a la realidad lo mismo que cuando se debe atacar el mundo exterior para la saciedad del instinto, es algo que reclama sabiduría; será mejor decir que en eso consiste la sabiduría.

Es ideal, pues, la regulación que ejerce el Yo sobre el Ello sabiéndose que el último tiene una intensidad mayor que el primero.

Aplicando esto al grado comparativo expuesto unos párrafos antes, obtenemos por resultado lo siguiente: cuando el pueblo desea colmar su tranquilidad, ya sea con una compañía local, nacional o extranjera, el gobierno como intermediario, con sus atribuciones de tal, ha de cumplir con su deber buscando el momento oportuno y exento de peligro, de buscar y dar lo que el pueblo por justa razón ha pedido y hecho suyo, como un ideal.

Si el gobierno sabe cumplir con su deber, la normalidad se establece en el momento necesario para solucionar cualquier conflicto justamente.

Es la influencia de la fuerza instintiva.


EL GRAN DESFILE DE LA VICTORIA EN LONDRES

LONDRES, 28. — Las señas de los preparativos para el gran desfile de la victoria del día 8 de junio se hacen más visibles con cada día que pasa en distintas partes de Londres. En los Jardines de Kensington, donde se encuentran acamados los destacamentos de ultramar, se contempla una pequeña ciudad completa en todos sus detalles. Cada día se informa de nuevos contingentes que vienen de países distantes para participar en esta magna reunión de todos los aliados de la segunda guerra mundial. Del continente americano han llegado tropas de Brasil y México, y su oficialidad vive en los hoteles del oeste de Londres. Los periódicos han anunciado que el cuartel general subterráneo del grupo de cazas N° 11, desde el cual se dirigió la famosa "Batalla de la Gran Bretaña"

en otoño de 1940, servirá para controlar el desfile aéreo de más de 300 aviones por medio de una red de estaciones de radar. De ser favorable el tiempo, el escuadrón de cazas de la R. A. F. encabezará el desfile volando a gran altura y dejando huellas de humo. Luego se verá un sólo aparato "Hurricane" que tomó parte en la épica batalla, pero hasta la fecha no se conoce el nombre del piloto quien tendrá el honor de pilotarlo. Diez diferentes tipos de aviones de servicio, incluyendo bombarderos Lancaster, hidroaviones Sunderland, Mosquitos, Beaufighters, Firebrands y Fireflies de la aviación naval pasarán sobre la base del saludo a intervalos de veinte segundos. Las Obras de la Catedral de Washington se Terminarán Pronto



La Catedral de Washington

WASHINGTON. — La Catedral de Washington, uno de los numerosos lugares de culto y peregrinación en esta capital, se destacará muy pronto como el principal de los edificios. Hombres y mujeres de los 48 estados de la Unión, animados por la fe y el altruismo, se han concertado para recaudar fondos destinados a dar remate a esta inspiradora obra arquitectónica que se comenzó en 1907. Estima el comité designado al efecto que será preciso allegar \$10.000.000 para terminar la construcción del templo.

La Catedral está situada sobre una colina, llamada "Mount St. Albans," que domina la ciudad. Cuando se termine la torre central del edificio, descolará más de 100 pies sobre la punta del Obelisco de Washington, que es actualmente la más alta estructura de esta capital.

Uno de los grandes anhelos de los que proyectaron la ciudad era disponer de un lugar nacional dedicado al culto religioso dentro del Distrito Federal de Washington. En los albores de la Historia de los Estados Unidos, Jorge Washington solicitó a L'Enfant, el arquitecto francés, quien planeó la capital, que trazara también el plano para la construcción de dicho templo. Pero hasta 1891 no se logró que

un entusiasta ciudadano hiciera un llamamiento a sus amigos y colegas religiosos para discutir la labor de recaudar fondos y dar comienzo a la construcción.

Dos años después, el Congreso de los Estados Unidos concedió a la "Protestant Episcopal Cathedral Foundation" el privilegio de establecer y mantener, dentro del Distrito de Columbia, una catedral e instituciones docentes para difundir religión, cultura y caridad.

Los terrenos en que está encavada la Catedral miden actualmente 22 hectáreas y media y han sido cedidos principalmente por ciudadanos ricos de Washington. Además de la Catedral a medio completar, hay allí seis capillas, el Colegio de Predicadores, tres escuelas, una biblioteca y la residencia del obispo de Washington, así como numerosos jardines y parques que hacen de esta Catedral uno de los principales puntos de atracción de la capital.

Hay asimismo el plan de construir una capilla en memoria de los soldados norteamericanos que cayeron en las guerras pasadas. Cuando la Catedral se encuentre terminada, medirá 600 pies de longitud aproximadamente, y su torre central se elevará cerca de 300 pies sobre su base.

cunus, 7^s erot uprim (Se) g Limón vivió mucho tiempo una vida normal: cuando es establecía la relación natural del gobierno con su pueblo, donde los dos tenían que juntarse y luchar duro por un interés común a su bienestar. Eso fué cuando la provincia de Limón tenía por respaldo el poder económico de la compañía frutera, exportadora del banano; los contratos celebrados por dicha com-

pañía y el gobierno de Costa Rica, establecían relaciones directas del Yo con el mundo externo. Mientras tanto el Yo vivía sin ninguna tendencia; al menos alguna que otra como es natural, pero que no impedía el desarrollo de la vida.

Notamos así, el proceso de vida llevado a cabo por un organismo psíquico normal; se hace visible la existencia acorde de los tres componentes del aparato anímico: el Yo, El Yo y Mundo externo; que quiere decir, según el grado comparativo: el Gobierno, la masa y la compañía explotadora.

Se hace ver tan importante misión del Yo; su trabajo implica el de mediador entre el pueblo y dicha compañía. El gobierno por medio de contratos representa al pueblo ante las compañías, y trata de solucionar los problemas que se susciten, tanto preveniendo de parte de uno como de otro. Lo que quiere decir que sus funciones toman dos direcciones: una que se dirige como representante del pueblo ante las compañías, y la otra que se dirige ante el pueblo, unas veces para dominar

sus propias pasiones o instintos aplacando su propia satisfacción si así fuere necesario; incluyendo el caso de hacerle abandonar sus fines en contra de una indemnización por sus propias manos. Esta segunda orientación es principalísima en sus funciones.

Vamos aclarando así, lo que en otros concejos parecía haberse dejado un poco obscura; las funciones del Yo que vienen siendo en ese caso el gobierno.

Si, estimados lecres, la sociedad adquiere ante nuestros ojos las formas inefables de una quimera, de un gigante que todo lo puede, que todo lo hace y deshace todo al mismo tiempo. La Sociedad sigue la definición diciendo que eran las eczemas del mundo, por ellas supuran.... Son tejidos vivos que crecen y se unen entre sí, unas veces por su bien, otras para su mismo mal. Pero no solamente tiene puntos criticables, se encuentran en ellas aspectos que son dignos de alabar; nos han prestado inagotables servicios que han hecho más llevadera la vida actual; medios acomodaticios, medios de adquirir cultura en demasia, lo que nos pone en un plano superior a nuestros precursores de las variadas épocas.

Pero no se escapa a nuestra observación, el fenómeno aquél tan curioso del comportamiento de las masas que forman la sociedad. Aquella metempsicosis que sufre a causa nuestra que somos individuos de la sociedad costarricense. No escapan a nuestros conceptos las enfermedades que sufren las diferentes masas que forman la colectividad patria. Esto se debe a que en el seno de estos gigantes hay, abstractamente guardado un espíritu no.

Desde hace muchos años se está tratando de conseguir la canalización de las Lagunas de Tortuguero. Cuantos hombres de buena voluntad han pasado por aquí desempeñando posiciones políticas o públicas, se han dado cuenta de los inmensos beneficios que tendría esta vía fluvial para la zona atlántica.

Extensas zonas de tierras casi vírgenes podría convertirse en verdaderos emporios de riqueza. El trabajo no es obra de titanes. De treinta millas de camino fluvial hay apenas catorce kilómetros que es necesario abrir con dragas. El resto son lagunas más o menos extensas en que la navegación no ofrece dificultad ninguna. Hay en esta región innumerables caños navegables que desembocan en la enorme extensión de la laguna. Caños que son caminos de penetración por lo que puede sacarse cuanto produce esa tierra prometida.

Pero hay sobre todo, escondida allí como tesoro de leyenda, la riqueza inagotable de los árboles. Sólo la explotación de esas maderas convertiría la provincia de Limón en la más rica de toda la República.

Un libro, escrito hace ya muchos años por el caballero don Federico Gölcher, contiene cuantas referencias pueden desecharse sobre estas tierras y sobre las facilidades de la canalización de esas lagunas. Ojeándolo se sorprende el lector de la facilidad con que esa obra se puede ejecutar. No es un libro de visionario sino una obra de empresa. El señor Gölcher reunió en él todos los estudios y todos los informes que la experiencia de muchísimos años logró acumular con paciencia y cariño por esta obra de inmenso beneficio nacional.

Champion Jockey

British Sporting journalist — on the "News Chronicle" (London)

In the year 1904 at the little townlet of Oakengates in Shropshire, England, was born a sturdy youth named Gordon Richards, destined to break every record hitherto set up by a jockey on the English Turf. Now, at 42 years of age, he is pre-eminent in the racing world.

Richards' whole career is a romance. He began his working life as a clerk in an office; but that was not good enough. Gordon was ambitious, and when one day he read that Martin Hartigan, a well-known racehorse trainer, was in need of likely stable boys, Gordon answered the advertisement and was engaged. That was the start of a job which has brought him increasing fame each succeeding season.

It was in 1921 that he rode his first winner, a horse named Gay Lord. In 1924 he had 61 winning mounts, and in 1925 he became champion jockey for the first time. Since then Gordon Richards has headed the list of successful "flat racing" jockeys every year with but two exceptions — in 1926 (he had chest trouble and did not ride after the opening week) and in 1930, when the late Freddie Fox beat him into second place in the race for the jockeys' championship.

In 1933 Richards rode no fewer than 259 winners, and thus broke the long-standing record of another famous jockey, Fred Archer, who had held the record of 246 in a season. In 1943 he passed Archer's aggregate of total wins, and in November, 1945, Richards rode his 3,000th winner — emphatic proof, indeed of his genius in the saddle. The champion has a few more year's riding ahead of him to add to his long list of successes before he retires to set up as a trainer — which I understand he intends to do.

In the autumn of 1933 Gordon rode twelve consecutive winners, a feat unequalled in the history of horse-racing. He rode the last winner of the day at Nottingham, and followed up by taking all six races at another meeting, Chepstow, on the following day. On the concluding day of the Chepstow meeting he was on the winners of the first five races.

"Working Partnership" With His Mount

As to the secret of Gordon's outstanding jockeyship, I would say first and foremost that he rides so many winners because he rides so few bad races. Gifted with a perfect sense of balance and a happy temperament, a love of his craft and considerable patience, he befriends with assets which are denied to most young horsemen. Yet there is still one more very important factor which contributes to his racing triumphs — he has the ability to achieve what is perhaps best described as a working partnership with his mounts. And never is this more valuable than when he has to deal with highly strung or "difficult" animals.

This year Gordon has high hopes of at last winning the one big Turf prize which has so far eluded him — the famous Epsom Derby. His mount is likely to be Edward Tudor, brother-horse to Owen Tudor, the Derby winner of 1941.

To look at, this famous little man is not a particularly impressive figure. He is just under five feet in height and weighs about eight stone, and has screwed and twinkling eyes.

It is extraordinary the strength he packs into his small frame and never is that power so much in evidence as when he is apparently "lifting" a reluctant animal past the post.

Richards has many interests outside racing. He farms a considerable area around his home and he has built up a famous loft of racing pigeons in which he takes a keen and justifiable pride. He is a director of the Swindon Town football club, a sport at which, in his younger days, he was very good. Usually he spends his winter holidays in Switzerland and on those occasions has developed much skill at curling, a game like bowls played on the ice.

But perhaps his biggest interest of all is his family. He has three children: two boys and a girl. He has hopes that the youngest boy may follow "in father's footsteps", but at 14 the lad is growing rapidly, so we shall have to wait and see.


There, in brief, is a profile of a grand little sportsman whose honesty of purpose and outstanding ability in his chosen profession have made the most popular English jockey riding today.

No mind, no intellect is powerful or great enough To attract wealth while the mental attitude is turned from it; Facing in a contrary direction. There are no triumphs lived (without their trials). Very few persons ever become aroused to the full extent of life.

THE PERMANENCE OF THE CHURCH FROM OUR DESK BY THE EDITOR:

There are people who seem to imagine that the days of the Church and her attendance are past; that the Church and Christianity has served their purposes; that they have exhausted their mandate; that it was alright to convert our ancestors during their days of slavery, but the greater majority of men today, believing themselves to be free men from the service of God since they enjoy freedom in materialism; that Christianity was all very well to give men a solace and hope in the state of poverty, but now they are prosperous and they have no further use for the Church.

You go to the Churches practically in every location in this city and you will find that all the congregations in the majority are women - hardly any men there at all. The women true to their old and noble traditions of the past, still linger around the Cross when men have left it. But the men have gone; and it is largely attributable to the fact that they have gained considerable wealth; become prosperous and their hearts have waxed gross with such temporary success.

We must not be deceived; no nation or people have ever done that without paying the price. There is a growing tendency to treat Christianity as it were but a stage in the march of humanity towards a higher mode of living; — only as a stage along which humanity must pass, but which it must, in spite of the beauty and grandeur of its scenery, leave behind it if it means to reach a more exalted destiny. This should not be the attitude of men, especially when it is quite visible that humanity is marching through the dreary and parched, arid plains which are stretched between one hemisphere to the other; men hearts failing them in every place; that which awaits at the end of the journey, cannot be prophesied.

The uncertainty of life represents a long tramp through a desert, ere it is reached, foot-sore and weary, the fertile oasis is the grace of God through His Only Begotten Son.

The Church is designated as the sacred place of worship in the same light as the Tabernacle was given to the Children of Israel in the Wilderness. We might claim that it was the long ramble through the wilderness that had brought pressure on the Israelites to worship God in the Tabernacle; but to the contrary. We may not be persued by Paroah's hosts, but we have our perils as well as our joys and it is a fatal mistake for anyone of this age to think that modernism aims at inaugurating a new model of Christianity; such is a fallacy; nothing of the kind; no new idea can shell off the true worship of God; services to Him through divine worship in the House designed in His name.

We firmly believe that when men who from the altitude of their self - sufficiency shun the churches; they are leaving behind the most effective agency to guide them through the dangerous paths of life, for strengthening their hearts to hear the inevitable sorrows of life; there is no other idea

Merits Of British Broadcasting

Orderly and regular radio transmission started in Britain in 1922 under the direction of the British Broadcasting Company, whose managing director was a tall and angular young Scot named John Reith. In 1926 the Government of the day transformed the company into a non-profit earning public service Corporation, under a Charter giving it for ten years sole authority to erect and operate radio transmitters. In 1936 an eminent Committee enquired into the effects and as a result the Charter was renewed for a further period of ten years. As from 1947 it may be taken as certain that the Charter will again be renewed. This has little or nothing to do with the fact that Britain today has a Socialist Government; no matter what the party complexion, the decision would be the same.

What The Public Wants

To those accustomed to continual criticism of British broadcasting in the British press, this may seem strange. Broadly, however, it may be said that the contrasted broadcasting systems of Britain gives the public what it wants. We are quite aware that monopoly involves a certain risk of dullness and respectability. Not for us the exciting procession of dramatising commentators, contending for favour by the capacity to shock or delight their fans. But if we sacrifice this, we get something, and something which we greatly value, in return. We have confidence in the detachment, impartiality and objectivity of what we hear. Our listeners prefer, by and large, reliability to excitement. They like to feel that broadcasting is wholly clear of commercial pressure, direct or

indirect. They want to trust it and are prepared to pay the necessary price.

Citizen's Education and Entertainment

The argument from popular approbation (tempered by the grumbles and gibes which are the British citizens' birthright) would influence any administration. For a Labour Government it is reinforced by a general preference for having public services run in the interest of the consumer of those services. Broadcasting has from the start been, in this sense a "nationalised" industry. Indeed it stands, with London's transport and London's port and electricity generation, as an example of the 20th century notion of how nationalisation should be operated.

Control is vested by Government in an autonomous corporation whose policy is directed by a board of persons appointed for a period, not as specialists, still less as interested parties, but on grounds of their general and collective competence to watch over and promote the wishes of consumers, to see that through impartiality, fair play, a right distribution of programme time and an adequate reflection

of the life of the community in its multifarious aspects, broadcasting serves both the education and the entertainment of the citizen.

It is, from this point of view, an instrument for correcting that time lag in the transmission of knowledge, whether factual or cultural, which is one of the great problems of democracy. No-one who surveys the wholly unregulated influence of the film on the mind of nations can help feeling that there is a good deal to be said for a steady and coherent effort to put the best available in all fields before those who listen. The B.B.C. is dedicated to that task.

The "Punch" Cartoon

Of course it is criticised at home as well as abroad. It is a national institution and, as such, inevitably arouses the healthy national inclination to find fault. Did not "Punch" once print a cartoon in which a typical clubman, turning over the pages of the current issue, grunts to a friend: "Punch" is not as good as it used to be". "No", comes the reply, "it never was".

So there are always people complaining angrily about this or that item—musical, critical, political—because it does not correspond to their own views, serenely unaware of

the fact that it is one of the merits of broadcasting to report the views one does NOT hold as well as those one does, and them as far as possible uncoloured by the bias which lurks unsuspected in one's favourite newspaper.

Much of the criticism heard of the B.B.C. derives from the fact that it is as non-partisan

and objective as an institution run by human beings can be. This which gave to its news service such incomparable value for Europe during World War II, remains its major achievement. We in Britain see that achievement as connected with the fact that it is run as a public service.

LUCK DOES NOT TRUST TO LUCK:

The below is an extract translated from a publication in Spanish in the War Cry of Havana, Cuba.

Mr. Smith states: 'I have not offered articles of commerce with premiums; numbers of lottery nor insurance policies. I have always rejected these offers although I have much luck'.

'I have not committed errors in which; at no time received any trickery in lotteries or raffles; no horse has attracted me in races; nor have I lost any money playing cards; Some one may say to me: "Then you do not know the joys to gain by luck". As far as is considered the happiness of earning premium by luck; in any form I do not want such joy. I do not know for example; the happiness that can be resultant from such exit or that of a deceiver; nor have I been given the satisfaction to win in a pain from the sword or from a pistol which came from a specie of loosing card while one plays

his life.

"I am very contented to remain from the pleasure of gain in gamble; for me there would be no pleasure; after thinking those (some more needful than I am; some desperate, perhaps) who lost their last ten cents and have to face afterwards a dislodger.

"Could a Christian be content with the money of others? that would be the same as to rob a hungry child and to boast of your exploit. Card game is a specie of consented or legal robbery and with robbery in the end. It buys nothing; it sells nothing nor gains nothing. None wants to be cheated, but the gamblers take the risk of a small loss as that of a robbery of much money in bet. Frankly, I have no interest in no similar business. Let us return to the matters that have luck; luck in studies; luck in business; in the marriages, etc. Many times we receive good without depending on them, without trust in them.

Bulletins From Britain

SPORTS IN GREAT BRITAIN

Sport in Britain in 1946 is having a wonderful revival. It will be firmly established on a pre-war footing by the month of June when a tremendous influx of visitors is assured for major attractions like:

The great races at Epsom for the Derby (June 5) and the Oaks (June 7).

Return of the four-day Royal Ascot meeting (June 18 to 21).

Lawn Tennis Championships at Wimbledon (June 24 to July 6) and the Wightman Cup lawn tennis match between British and American women, also at Wimbledon (June 14-15).

First Test Match at Lord's cricket ground between England and India (June 22-24-25).

Greyhound Racing Derby at the White City, London (June 29); and Fight for the British Heavyweight Championship between Bruce Woodcock (Doncaster) and Freddie Mills (Royal Air Force), in London (June 4).

THRILLING DERBY PROSPECT

Flat - Racing, under Jockey Club Rules, began on April 1, and meetings have been fixed for nearly every week - day until the season ends in November. The first two of the five Classic races, the 2,000 and the 1,000 Guineas, took place at Newmarket on May 1 and 3 respectively.

Classic prospects have never been brighter. The five best colts are all sons of Lord Derby's wonderful sire, Hyperion, the world's leading stallion, for whom his owner has declined tempting offers, exceeding £ 100,000, from syndicates of American breeders.

These five Hyperion contenders are: Lord Derby's Gulf Stream, Lord Astor's Aldis Lamp, the Aga Khan's Khaled, Mrs. Macdonald-Buchanan's Edward Tudor, and Mr. T. Lilley's Radiotherapy.

Both Lord Derby, now over 80 years of age, and the Aga Khan have already won the Derby three times, but the coveted prize has always eluded Lord Astor, who has been striving for it more than 30 years. In one unlucky seven year's spell, colts carrying Lord Astor's colours were second in the race on five occasions. Incidentally, the Derby, is one of the few races our champion jockey, Gordon Richards, has never won.

A strong challenge to Britain's Derby candidates will come from France. M. M. Boussac, the leading French owner, having entered his

World Needs Economic and Social not Military Security

Major Powers Must Call Truce to their Political Quarrels and Concentrate on task of Developing and Fairly Distributing Throughout the World its Infinite Resources

"Atlantic Voice" publishes timely editorial of "Daily Herald", London.

London, May 30. — Making an urgent appeal for worldwide cooperation, the "Daily Herald" today published the following editorial on international affairs: There is speculation in many lands about a third world war. This is no idle talk. Every honest man must admit that a clash is inevitable unless wisdom and tolerance prevail in the turbulent council of the Great Powers. So far the portents are entirely psychological. There is a deep suspicion in Russia of the British and American motives.

There is deep suspicion in Britain and America of the Russian motives. But a few years only at the present rate will suffice to bring those suspicions to the explosion point, and an explosion, will make a wilderness of this earth. What is so terrible and so serious is that this 'next war' is not decreed by the common people of any country. Nor do we believe that any country's leaders are deliberately plotting aggression. The fact is that the nations ardently desire to lash space together. Mothers do not breed sons with the object of mourning their death in early manhood. Women do not marry with an eye to widowhood. Men do not toil to make homes because they want to see those homes bombed and blasted. The instinct of all people in all countries is the instinct for peace, and after two world wars it might have been assumed that the yearning for peace would take full charge of the thoughts and deeds of men — that they would be anxious above all to accommodate one another, to make lavish allowances for one another's prejudices and fears, to study each other's points of view rather than lapse again into jealousy and doubt. But jealousy and doubt and suspi-

cion are once again thwarting and distorting the better instincts of mankind. Mr. Molotov has just made a statement which shows the Soviet Government to be intensely suspicious of the Western Democracies. He sees America and Britain as two nations determined to 'dominate' Soviet Russia, and to manipulate the United Nations Organisation to their own imperialistic purposes.

"Living here in Britain we know how utterly unfounded are these fears of Molotov. We know we could answer with spirit and effect the charges he brings against us. But it is scarcely likely at this stage that the most devastating reply from Britain or America would cause Molotov to retract his allegations. Indeed such a reply might serve only to widen the gulf already immense between the Soviet Government and the Western Democracies. So let us forego our debating points and let us instead seek ground for the cooperation positive and constructive which must be secured if the drift towards war is to be arrested. The search need not be prolonged. Straight in front of our eyes there is a field of activity in which the three powers might cooperate—and must cooperate if the world is to be saved from misery."

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African Doctors in training - Work of Nigeria's School of Medicine



One of the most difficult problems which faces the four British Colonies in West Africa is the battle against disease. Apart from the treatment of diseases there are the attendant tasks of removing the causes—climatic conditions, malnutrition and ignorance of hygiene all help to make the work more difficult. As it is not possible to staff the hospitals and dispensaries with European personnel, Africans are being trained in increasing numbers to assist and eventually to take over the medical welfare of the territory. In 1930 a School of Medicine was created in Nigeria, a colony

which has an area four times that of the United Kingdom and a population of 23 millions. The training takes five years and the medical student must previously have passed an 18 months course in chemistry, physics and biology at the Higher School in Yaba. Much of the students practical training is gained in the Outpatients and Casualty Departments of the Hospital, where he performs minor operations himself. More detailed knowledge is obtained in the various clinics such as the Fracture Clinic, Venereal Disease Clinic, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic. He must also have a knowl-

edge of the public utility services and understand the problems of housing, sanitation, mosquito control and epidemic diseases. The School is in its development stage and has still far to go, but qualified men are turned out annually who are doing valuable work in the Government hospitals throughout the country. Some of the graduates, having completed their term of Government service are now in private practice.

New Director of BBC Coming to Costa Rica

On Monday, June 3rd, the new Director and Representative of the British Broadcasting Corporation in Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean Islands, Mr. John B. Leech will arrive in San Jose for a stay of several days.

Mr. Leech makes his headquarters in Mexico City, from where he set out at the end of May to visit all the countries under his jurisdiction, which he took over in the month of February of this year from Mr. Thomas P. Gale, who returned to London on a new assignment with the BBC.

The new Director was educated at "Leys School" and later at Christ's College, Cambridge. Mr. Leech's acquaintance with Latin America dates back to 1931, when he was stationed in Chile as an official of a British concern established in that country. When war broke out in 1939, Mr. Leech returned to England and entered the Royal Navy. He participated in many engagements in the Mediterranean, the North Atlantic and also took part in the Allied landings on the coast of Normandy on June 6th 1944.
