# LABORES MUNICIPALES

Sesión décima novena ordinaria de la Municipalidad de Limón iniciada a las 19 horas del cuatro de setiembre de mil novecientos cuarenta y cinco con asistencia de los regidores señores Echeverría, quien presidió, Hernández y Picado. Estuvieron presentes los jefes de dependencias municipales señores Alvarado, Arrizabal, Casco, Marín, Montero, Martínez, Mora Aguilar, Mora Morúa, Vindas y Zeledón.

**ARTICULO I: ACTA:** Se leyó, aprobó y firmó acta de la sesión anterior.

**ARTICULO II: NOTAS DEL SR. GOBERNADOR:** Se acordó archivar nota N° 1193 que acompaña la que recibió del señor Secretario de Fomento manifestando que sus dependencias no tienen ninguna apianadora, disponeable para prestarla a la Municipalidad de Limón, como se había solicitado, b) Compañía Corporación tiene el mayor interés en que los trabajos de construcción del nuevo matadero se inicien cuanto antes. SE ACORDÓ POR UNANIMIDAD Y DEFINITIVAMENTE: Rogar al señor Gobernador informe en qué fecha se dirigiría a la Secretaría de Salubridad solicitando la aprobación de esa dependencia en cuanto al lugar en que se resolvieron ubicar dicho edificio.

**ARTICULO III: NOTAS DE JEFES DE DEPENDENCIAS CLAS:** a) Se acordó archivar copia de nota del señor Fontanera comunicando haber conectado una caja de agua para servicio de la propiedad del señor John Da Costa Balley, en lote cuatro de la manzana 65.

**ARTICULO IV: NOTAS DE PARTICULARES:** a) Se acordó archivar tarjeta de don Fulgencio Campos Segura agradeciendo el acuerdo que dispuso darle el pesante por la muerte de su señora madre.

b) Se acordó definitivamente, pasar original al señor Gobernador, la gestión que hace el Licenciado don Napoleón Valle como apoderado de don Humberto Terolini, ya que lo que se inde- fuió resuelto por la Corporación y es al señor gobernador a quien corresponde comunicarla a la Secretaría respectiva.

**ARTICULO V: PLANILLAS:** Fueron aprobadas las siguientes: Semana del 23 al 31 de agosto: saneamiento población € 517.55. Sanamiento distrito segun do € 13.00. Peones mercado € 129.15. Peones parques € 153.75. Reparación calles € 237.60. Reparación edificios € 394.70. Reparación tanques cañería .

€ 92.25. Peones higiene € 184.50. Peones tanques € 36.90. Peones cloacas € 73.80.

**ARTICULO XI:** El regidor Echeverría manifestó su enérgica protesta por cuanto no se ha cobrado todavía en la forma dispuesta por la Corporación, el impuesto sobre aceras en mal estado, y crece que ha habido negligencia y falta de cooperación de los empleados que han tenido a su cargo esa actividad. Los señores regidores presentes acorronaron lo manifestado por el señor Echeverría.

El señor Contreras manifestó que el informe presentado sobre las aceras, en mal estado resultó incompleto, lo que informó a la Corporación, habiéndose dispuesto entonces comisionar otros empleados para rendir otro más detallado, el que todavía no ha recibido. El señor maestro de obras explicó que el rindió en su oportunidad el informe que se le pidió, con todos los datos, que pudo conseguir y el señor Contreras dijo que en la semana próxima presentaría el informe que se le recomendó, trabajó que le ha tomado bastante tiempo.

**ARTICULO VII:** Manifestó el regidor Hernández que un grupo de agricultores de La Estrella, productores de arroz le han dicho que tienen cosechada una cantidad regular de ese producto, pero no encuentran dónde beneficiarlo, ni lo pueden mandar con ese objeto a San José por el alto costo de los ferries de farrocarril, que les obligaría a venderlo en la capital pues de volverlo a traer su costo aumentaría aún más. Que esos agricultores están dispuestos, si consiguieran algún auxilio del Estado, a cultivar mayor cantidad de ese grano. Se acordó: comunicar lo anterior, por el órgano correspondiente, a la Secretaría de Agricultura, con ruego de que estudie el asunto y preste el auxilio a su alcance a esos empeños trabajadores que pueden producir artículos tan escasos ahora en todo el país. Acuerdo definitivo.

**ARTICULO VIII:** El regidor Píscalo hizo moción que fue aprobada por unanimidad y definitivamente, para dirigir atenta nota a la Junta de Educación excitando a sus miembros para reunirse regularmente, pues tiene noticias de que no lo hacen desde algún tiempo, siendo

**Truman actúa para proteger el continente contra los extranjeros enemigos**

**WASHINGTON:** — El Presidente Franklin D. Roosevelt dictó medidas para trasladar a establecimientos de origen a los extranjeros peligrosos, ciudadanos de las naciones enemigas. Ellos fueron enviados a los Estados Unidos por los más repelentes americanos para que sus actividades fueran controladas y luego fueran repatriados.

En una proclama reciente, el Primer Mandatario expidió regulaciones que afectan a seis extranjeros enemigos, señalando que se adoptarán esas medidas "para proteger la seguridad del Hemisferio Occidental".

El Presidente citó las resoluciones adoptadas en 1940 en la Convención Rio de Janeiro, en las sesiones en Montevideo del Comité Consultor de Emergencia para la Defensa Política y la Confederal. Aunque este año, que acordó que los Estados Unidos asumieran responsabilidad sobre ciertos extranjeros de la Ciudad de México, el Presidente Truman hizo notar que en la Ciudad de México "no se han tomado medidas para evitar que cualquier persona cuya deportación sea deseable entre en las zonas de seguridad del continente, continuara residendo en este hemisferio, o tal residencia sea de utilidad para la seguridad y el bienestar futuro de las naciones americanas."

En consecuencia, el Gobierno de los Estados Unidos ha indicado que las autoridades de las fuerzas armadas y las autoridades de la Marina, así como las autoridades de la Seguridad Pública, el Bienestar Social, las autoridades de la Justicia y otras dependientes del Ejecutivo, se encarguen a "evitar que se cumpla la orden de deportación de tales individuos de las naciones americanas." 

## POTSDAM CONFERENCE RULES ON GERMAN PROPERTIES

The Atlantic Voice learns that the functioning members of the Department of State in Washington, the Capital of the great North American Republic have announced that the agents of Great Britain and the United States of America have already direct control of all German Buildings — Industries and Funds which are in Spain and that in addition the Government of the United States has terminately rejected the petition of Franco in which he seek, permission to reopen five German Schools in Barcelona and Madrid.

The agents of the two Allied countries are said to have signed the "Titles" over all the properties and values of

the German Government in accordance with the Declaration at Potsdam.

It is mentioned that there remains now the question of those called the private German properties in Spain to be taken possession of and which only awaits the approval of the Allied Control.

Commission of Berlin. The plan of mentioned does not only comprehend Spain; but a we greater, nozni properties and values in Portugal, Switzerland, Sweden, the Argentine and other Latin American Republics are under process of liquidation to elimate the possibility of future nozni influence in the American Continent.

Spain is said to have consi-

dered that the German schools were private property and which, in consequence should not fall under the control and disposition of the Allies; but the United States of America, as we learn has not accepted this thesis.

Twenty three German schools according to the report which have been in Spain and the Canaries for the education of more than 30,000 German residents in territories of Spain; seventeen is already under Allies control; the remaining five for which Franco's petition has been effected are stated to be the principal zones and with accommodations for more students than the other seventeen combined.

## THE BATTLE OF BRITAIN

Each earned lively support. The dance numbers by the Riverside orchestra was the major feature of the meeting. The youngsters tripped their measure in the mood of the hour.

For the splendid outlay of things and the enjoyment on a whole the Management merits due congratulations. All were well done.

The 300 fighter planes of the Royal Air Force which swept low over London on Saturday, marking the fifth anniversary of the crisis day in the Battle of Britain, were commemorating one of the great, decisive victories of world history. It was a victory to which this country, to which the whole civilized world, owes more than many now care to remember amid the petty reactions of peace. And it was British victory, won primarily by the skill and stamina of the famous "few" who fought it, but won also by the technical resources and strategic acumen which developed in time the radar-warning system and the Spitfire eightgun fighter — two superb instruments on which even the German technicians had not counted and which were far in advance of anything of their kind which had then been developed elsewhere. It was a hard fought victory, and it was clear-cut in its consequences. Sept. 15, 1940; the day when the R. A. F., with fewer planes in action than those which paraded over London on Saturday, shot 185 German bombers and fighters out of the sky from a total attacking force of about 500 planes, showed the Germans that their plans could not be made to stand.

There will never, it is already quite safe to say, be another battle like it. It was only five years ago; already the struggle which seemed so wearily and terribly novel at the time has receded into military ancient history. The planes, the instruments, the tactical methods, and the strategical concepts employed are all absolute to day; the numbers seem almost ridiculously small, the damage done of the most minor importance. It was not only history which was changed in September, 1940; but war, now brought to wholly new levels of mechanical terror, presenting wholly new and vastly more complex problems to any society which is so foolhardy as to maintain war as an instrument of policy. So far have we come since 1940. May we never have to go farther in that direction.

# BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

## THE BATTLE IN THE PROGRESS CHANNEL IN JAMAICA

The naval war in the English Channel was fought out by the "little ships" of the Royal Navy and German Navy for five continuous years. It is now disclosed by the Admiralty that 500 enemy ships were sunk by the British Navy's coastal forces for the loss of 170 of their own vessels.

Naval actions in the Channel in these "little ships" were fast and furious. They were high speed actions fought often at 30 knots (nearly 50 m.p.h.) and at night. It was a war of stealth and sudden action. Officers and men had to be highly trained and able to make instant decisions.

The E boat was the German equivalent of the British M.T.B. (motor torpedo boat) or American P.T. boat. They carried two torpedoes and a light armament, and their prey was the coastal shipping moving up and down the Channel. The E boat held the initiative in the early stages around 1940 but very soon was on the defensive and seldom looked for an engagement with the British [M.T.B.s]. Forty-eight E boats were sunk during the five years and many others were severely damaged.

M.T.B.s formed the protection for the large convoys converging on the Normandy beaches on D-Day. Many times E boats endeavoured to break through this cordon to attack Allied shipping but seldom succeeded.

Beginning with only two flotillas they increased a hundredfold and finally employed 25,000 officers and men. They bottled up the E boats in their own harbours and in cooperation with the R.A.F. Coastal Command virtually brought German coal shipping to a standstill.

## EXCHANGE CONTROL

During the past week stories have been circulating to the effect that after September 30th, there will be a free market in sterling and that a 25 per cent devaluation is expected. These stories are founded upon a misunderstanding. What is happening is that on September 30th, the guarantee of the exchange rate of \$4.02 1/2 is coming to an end.

Exchange control could not possibly be lifted at the

Progress in Jamaica's Colonial Development and Welfare scheme, despite shortage of equipment and trained personnel, has been impressive, according to reports just published. Notable achievements have been attained in the fields of agriculture and health.

A Rural Health Demonstration in the parish of St. Catherine has shown interesting and encouraging results. Among an estimated population of 59,000, four units carrying on an intensive campaign against yaws, a tropical skin disease, have reduced incidence from 51.5 to 7.6 per 1,000 during 1944. Two of the units have now moved to neighboring parishes.

Other achievements in St. Catherine include a decrease in malaria fever incidence in the north where a demonstration control unit has been set up; the inauguration of a maternity and child welfare service; the examination of 40% of the school population by Public Health Nurses; the establishment of a clinic for the treatment of syphilis and another for the outdoor treatment of neural leprosy; the construction and distribution of concrete latrines; a 40% improvement in dairy sanitation. It is in St. Catherine, too,

present time, and there will be no free market in sterling. The guaranteed exchange rate dates back to the difficult times of July 1940, when the system of special and registered accounts was instituted. Holders of registered sterling were given a guarantee that they would be able to transfer their balances at any time at the rate of \$4.02 1/2. This step was taken at a time when Britain was under the threat of invasion and was done to lessen the difficulties of commercial and financial intercourse. It encouraged those dealing with Britain to leave their balances in sterling. It was a very unusual expedient for a special purpose, and the time has come to return to more normal methods.

The fact that the guarantee—which began in a time of severe crisis—is now about to come to an end does not at all imply that change in the exchange rate is contemplated.

## BRITAIN V. JAPAN

Official British sources reveal that three hundred thousand British troops were employed in the war against Japan. When the enemy surrendered a large scale operation was about to be launched against Malaya, and the troops in Burma would have advanced in Siam. Five divisions, one British, one British-Indian, one Australian, one Canadian and one New Zealand were to be employed as a British Commonwealth force under General MacArthur for the invasion of Japan which would have meant redeployment to the Far East of a quarter of a million men from the European theatre.

This force was not limited by the number of men available, but by the fact that the large British passenger fleet was transporting United States troops across the North Atlantic.

The R.A.F. in collaboration with the American Air Force, played an essential part in the operations which resulted in the defeat of the Japanese in Burma.

On the one hand they gained complete air sus-

pened that students of the West Indian Public Health Training Centre carry out their field work.

Ten Agricultural Centres, financed partly by the Jamaican Government and partly from Colonial Development and Welfare funds, have carried on a number of important projects. Some 4,000 trainees were at work at the Centres, divided into three categories of prospective settler, skilled agricultural laborer, craftsman and foreman.

Another land settlement scheme provides for experiments in land tenure—one settlement to be run on a communal farming basis and another on an individual long leasehold basis. New inspection posts have been created; a research officer, for instance, has been sent to the western part of the island to investigate the banana leaf wilt, a coconut disease. Eight scholarships for the Imperial College of Tropical Agriculture, Trinidad, have been awarded.

Under the afforestation scheme over 2,000 acres have been planted, and nurseries have been established to provide stock for another 2,000 acres this year.

## INCREASED

## AUSTERITY

Recent announcements in the House of Commons have foreshadowed more drastic control of food, fuel, and clothing in Great Britain.

Fuel shortages have occasioned a number of warning speeches recently by Mr. Shinwell, Minister of Fuel, in Parliament and at public meetings. Announcing that the supply of coal was al-

most 25% lower than a year ago, he asked for a heavy cut in consumption, particularly in street lighting. All local authorities are asked to see that street lights are not turned on sooner than is absolutely necessary and that they are extinguished before midnight.

The reduction of lights in side streets is also recommended.

"People must ask themselves which they preferred — lights out at midnight or lights out in winter."

The gasoline position is also difficult:

Mr. Shinwell said that rationing would continue until arrangements for the import of future supplies had been reviewed.

(Until June 1st, 1945 there had been no gasoline for private owners, and since that date the ration had been sufficient for about 12 months a month).

By making sharp cuts in supplies of sugar for commercial purposes, Britain has arranged to ship 50,000 tons to France during the next few weeks. Ten thousand tons of margarine will also be sent. The domestic ration will be unaffected.

Sir Stafford Cripps, President of the Board of Trade, has announced that the new clothing ration of 24 coupons, which will begin on September 1st, will have to last for a period of eight months instead of six months as was formerly the case.

The new "Supplies and Services Bill," introduced by Mr. J. Chuter Ede, Home Secretary, will extend economic controls throughout the transition from war to peace for a period of five years with provision for a yearly renewal. A new feature of the Bill is a clause conferring power to make defense regulations for the control of prices of goods and charges for services of any description. The effect of this clause is to widen the power of the price control regulations formerly limited to "essential" supplies and services. The rest of the Bill is a reproduction of the former bill of the same title introduced in the last Parliament by Mr. Herbert Morrison.

Mr. Ede, in a public address, warned of more impending shortages and declared: "... we can only win the peace if the whole of the people of this country are willing to show the same spirit that enabled us to undergo the rigors of war".
