La religión, el mejor vínculo en las Américas

FILADELFIA.—En un discurso pronunciado recientemente en esta ciudad, el Doctor Héctor David Castro, Embajador de la República de El Salvador en los Estados Unidos, afirmó que "la religión es el vínculo que une entre sí a las naciones del Hemisferio Occidental."

El conocido estadista salvadoreño, cuyo discurso fué pronunciado en el Colegio de la Inmaculada, añadió:

"Las naciones del Hemisferio Occidental tienen en común tres

lazos fundamentales que las unen en sus tradiciones, en su cultura y sus anhelos. El primero, que las abraza a todas sin excepción, es su fe religiosa."

"En la Constitución de la República Argentina, de Bolivia, Colombia, Costa Rica, la República Dominicana, Nicaragua, Panamá y Paraguay, se hace resaltar enfáticamente el carácter católico nacional."

"El segundo lazo común es la sangre, que no es tan general como el que acabo de mencionar, pero que constituye un poderosísimo punto de enlace entre estas naciones."

"El tercer lazo es la comunidad de lenguaje. Dieciocho de las repúblicas latinoamericanas, y además Puerto Rico, hablan el español como su lengua vernácula. El idioma del Brasil es el portugués; el de Haití el francés, basado en el latín, igual que el español y el portugués."

El Reverendísimo Señor Obispo James E. Walsh, superior general de la Congregación de los Padres de Maryknoll, quienes establecen actualmente varias misiones en la América del Sur, dirigió la palabra en el mismo acto, e hizo resaltar que "cualesquier plan inteligente para la cooperación entre las naciones, solamente aquellas cosas que nos unen, sino también los factores que tienden a dividirnos."

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IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America.

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem best, provided always that whenever the People shall form a new Government, they shall not alter or abolish the old one, until the new one shall have taken its place.

That the history of the present United States of America, is a history of the progress of the ideas of these truths, and of the efforts of the American people to organize and establish Governments in accordance with these truths.



EXPENDIO OFICIAL DE VIVERES

A propósito de nuestras notas editoriales del número anterior, en que hicimos mención de la necesidad de controlar los precios de los artículos de consumo indispensable, se nos ha hecho una sugerencia, que estimamos muy atinada.

El autor de la idea — que quiere guardar el incógnito — nos dice: Si el Gobierno instalara en determinados lugares establecimientos para la venta de artículos de primera necesidad, o si vendiera, por medio de casas honorables esos artículos a precios reducidos, se acabaría con la especulación.

Vale la pena hacer algunos comentarios en derredor de esta iniciativa, que puede en realidad solucionar gran parte del problema sin un costo elevado.

Si el Gobierno acapara una cantidad suficiente de artículos de consumo indispensable y los expende por medio de casas conocidas, a precios que permitan una ganancia moderada al comercio general, se daría un golpe de muerte a la especulación. Sería suficiente que cada uno de los locales donde se expenden esos artículos mantuviera una lista de precios en lugar visible, para que allí acudiera la mayor parte de la población. Esto obligaría al resto del comercio a mantener los mismos precios sin ocasionar ningún perjuicio ni límite en las ventas.

Sería necesario desde luego limitar la cantidad que ha de venderse a cada persona de acuerdo con sus necesidades para evitar el acaparamiento por medio de terceros, como ocurre en esta ciudad continuamente.

Hace algún tiempo el Comisariato de la United Fruit estuvo vendiendo algunos artículos a precios relativamente baratos, y el comercio chino acaparó por medio de terceros casi toda la existencia. Esos mismos artículos se están vendiendo actualmente a precios altísimos. Un ejemplo. El paquete de té, de cuatro onzas, fue vendido en el Comisariato a dos colones setenta y cinco céntimos. Ahora se revende en las pulperías de los chinos a ocho colones, cuando hay posibilidad de conseguirlo. Como este caso hay muchos.

Pero esta especulación puede controlarse con la limitación de ventas. Si es necesario podría implantarse la fórmula de tarjetas de racionamiento como se está haciendo en Inglaterra y los Estados Unidos. No es necesario, para la implantación de estas medidas que estemos en una guerra activa como los países citados. Aquí, como allá carecemos de infinidad de cosas indispensables. Aquí más que allá, no producimos siquiera la mitad de lo que consumimos. El resultado, no importan las razones, siempre es el mismo. Un altísimo costo de la vida y una bajísima capacidad adquisitiva.

En este momento en que la Comisión del Congreso tiene en estudio una ley que regule los precios, y pide sugerencias al país, nosotros enviamos esta idea con la esperanza de que como otras muchas que seguramente han recibido, se tome en cuenta como una fórmula inmediata de solucionar la crisis por que atraviesa

LA HISTORIA SENSACIONAL DEL CAUCHO

Uno de los problemas de solución más difícil que han venido confrontando los Estados Unidos a consecuencia de la guerra con el Japón, ha sido el problema del caucho. La primera industria norteamericana — la industria automovilística — se vió privada de repente de un producto sin el cual no podía subsistir, una materia prima que recibía en su totalidad del Lejano Oriente. Los daños materiales que pudieran causarles los aviones o los acorazados del Mikado no preocupaban a los norteamericanos, pero el hecho de que pudieran verse obligados a tener que renunciar al automóvil, poco menos que indispensable en nuestro tiempo, si los

llenaba de inquietud. Por su parte, el gobierno estadounidense necesita la goma, cada vez en proporción mayor, para los requerimientos de su colosal programa de defensa. 

JAPAN SUFFER HEAVILY IN ANOTHER

In what may be regarded as a desperate effort to check the victorious advance of the North Americans in the South Pacific, the Japanese fleet confronted units of the United States of America last Monday in the Gulf

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT

of Kula to the north of the Island of New Georgia and ten miles off the important enemy base of Munda. The result of the fight was another outstanding victory for the North Americans whose only loss was one cruiser sunk, apart from the destroyer "Strong" torpedoed prior to the main encounter, while eleven Jap. cruisers and destroyers were sunk or badly damaged.

This new blow brings, we are told, Japan's naval losses, since the start of hostilities in the Pacific to a total of 344 or possibly 345 units.

In reprisal, apparently, for their defeat, Japanese air units attacked Port Darwin Australia, during the day last Wednesday and inflicted, the reports say, a certain amount of damage. Seven of their machines were destroyed and a similar number lost by the defending force. Intensive raids have been effected against a number of enemy bases in the northern zone of the Salomon Islands. Much damage resulted.

North American naval units have been bombarding the Japanese positions of the Island of Kiska located between the Islands of Attu and Amchitka, recently captured by the North Americans in the Aleutian Group.

ENORMOUS NAZI LOSSES IN NEW OFFENSIVE IN RUSSIA

During the first three days of their offensive, launched last Monday in the southwest sector of the Russian battle fronts, the Germans are reported to have lost no less than 35,000 men, more than 1,500 tanks and nearly 800 air planes. The fighting is described as of an exceedingly sanguinary character over a front of 200 miles running from Orel to Belgorod. All the efforts of the enemy to break through the Soviet defense lines have been frustrated so far.

In an effort to regain some of their serious recent losses, the Nazi High Command is said to be using 450,000 men, fourteen divisions of tanks and one of motorized infantry in these engagements.

In the sector of Belgorod south of Kursk the conflict between the motorized elements has been described as the greatest known in history.

SOUTHERN ITALY BOMBED DAILY

Allied Headquarters in North Africa report that Southern Italy and the Islands of Sicily and Sardinia continue to be the objects of intense bombardments daily. The latter two experienced violent attacks during five consecutive days in the week in course. Damage of a far-reaching character was effected enemy aerodromes and other interests.

During the night of the fourth instant British troops effected a landing on the Island of Crete and destroyed a number of enemy airplanes lying at their bases. After completing their mission the men reembarked without suffering any casualties.

With the reported concentration of a million tons of war units and an unusual quantity of material in north Africa and the devastating activities of the aerial and naval forces in the Mediterranean the fears of the enemy with respect to the approaching European invasion have again been aroused.

BRITAIN'S NAVAL POWER OUTSTRIP THE ENEMY

According to a recent London report, another attempt by German submarine Commanders to destroy a British Convoy was outstripped with the enemy losing from two to five of their underwater craft and others seriously damaged.

The convoy, made up of a large number of ships loaded with troops, technicians, pilots, nurses, artillery, munition and other supplies from the United States of America and Canada, was

vigorously attacked by the Germans during the last two days of the voyage, but reached British ports without suffering any loss. The success is said to have been due, mainly to the formidable protection given by the aerial units and the mighty escort of the British naval vessels under the able guidance of Commander M. J. Evans of His Majesty ship "Peppel", a veteran who had earned great distinction in the conveying of supplies to Russia during the height of the Axis fight for the supremacy of the seas.

ANGLO-AMERICAN FORCES DESTROY 18,000 AXIS AIR PLANES

Under date the 2nd, instant Britain's Ministry of Aviation released the information that since the start of the war, the British and North American air forces and batteries had destroyed 18,031 German, Italian and Japanese air planes, not taking account of those destroyed in Russia, which amount to many thousands, as also, those accounted for by the French aviators and the Allied naval units. The losses suffered by

the British, and North Americans totalled, the announcement said, 9,906 machines, exclusive of those lost in Burma.

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LET US MARSHAL OUR FORCES

We should be ever mindful of the dignity of labour and of its moral potentialities. With the grim necessities of life slipping from under our feet, it is time we be up and doing. Of what use is it that we realize the great forces of Nature running to waste, when we do not marshal our forces to harness and utilize them?

On every hand we hear wailings regarding the ever increasing cost of our essential commodities. This is, in part, due to a lack of production.

Let us ask ourselves this question — Had our brethren beyond the seas spent their time in idleness and unprofitable pastimes, if they had not been aroused by the law of demand and necessity, could they be able to so efficiently take care of their own needs and supply so large a percentage of ours? What a terrible state of affairs would we all be experiencing if they had so acted.

If we truly desire to lend our aid toward the winning of the world war and the protection of our own lives and civilization, it is urgent that we marshal our forces and be up and doing. No longer should we merely indulge in growls and idle waitings. Let us display an earnest to help ourselves and others will assist.

BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

RAMMED A U-BOAT

For critical seconds in a North Atlantic midnight the bows of a rammed German U-boat towered above a British corvette which had chased her for more than five hours.

Then slowly with a crunch of iron and a shower of sparks flying off the plates, she slid back to the sea from the bows of her attacker and one of the most remarkable anti-submarine fights in which a small ship has been engaged was ended.

Four times in 19 minutes this little British 600-tonner had crashed deliberately into her enemy. Her name is that of a hardy flower, the Dianthus—how hardly has already been told in part by the First Lord in a recent speech.

She is only 193 feet in length and certainly smaller than the ocean-going raider she was attacking.

THE LOOK-OUT'S CALL

Last night in the wardroom her curly-headed 22-year-old anti-submarine officer, Lieut. Peter Hickman, R.N.V.R., who comes from Bognor Regis, where he worked as an architect and surveyor, told the story of the action from start to finish.

"It began just before dusk, when the lookout screeched out from the mast-head that he had spotted a submarine on the horizon.

"We turned off and lost her for a while in the thick rain squalls that were sweeping over the sea. Then to our amazement we saw not one, but two submarines going hell for buckles away from us, with their conning towers showing in flurries of spray about eight miles off.

"We closed in and opened up with our four-inch at full range. Then we lost them again, but we spotted one again on the surface just before midnight.

"The four-inch gun let her have another bifful and she went under. By this time we were right on the mark, and blew her up to the top with depth charges. Everyone in our ship began to go dancing mad.

"Our captain Commander Clement Edward Bridgeman, R.N.R., is an imperturbable old Blue Funnel man from Broadclyst, Devon, and even he began to get excited. He gave the order to ram and we hit the submarine at full speed.

"There was a terrific crunch, our bows went up and we could see her being rolled right over.

"And in the light of every kind of flare we could put up and the flashes of every kind of gun from pom-poms to rifles, we could see the Hun rolled right over on her side while her crew pitched out of the conning tower as fast as they could.

THE MIDDLE SEA

The Mediterranean Sea is no longer just a battlefield. It has become once more a great highway. The blasting of the last island barriers out of the Sicilian Narrows ends one phase of the war as definitely as it inaugurates another. Final clearance of the passage from Gibraltar to Suez puts the Allies in control of a vast naval belt that, with the single interruption of the enemy-held East Indian archipelago, girdles the circumference of the earth. The effect on global strategy is bound to prove profound.

From the beginning of the war Britain has fought desperately to keep the Middle Sea open, sacrificing even the armor of her island home to maintain the fluctuating battle. With our help the long battle has been won. From Spain to Turkey the whole Axis flank lies open to attack. The attack is already developing with such power as the air has never carried before. This summer's fighting will map its course. Italy now seems the chosen victim, but wherever the blow falls it will be aimed at Germany.

The remoter effects of the opening of the ancient waterway are not so obvious. But at the very moment we seem to be getting the better of the submarine we receive the equivalent of several million tons of shipping. The slow convoy passage around Africa is automatically canceled out. The Near East, South Russia and India can be supplied directly from our main bases in a third of the time it took before. This should mean a release of shipping in every theatre of the war, Atlantic and Pacific included.

Japan must be watching developments in the Mediterranean with anxious eyes. Once we establish our footholds on Southern Europe, the bulk of the Mediterranean fleet will be freed for action elsewhere. Madagascar stands ready as a halfway base for a strong naval concentration in the Indian Ocean. Then the Japanese fleet, already harried by our growing strength in the Pacific, would find itself caught between two fires, unable to extinguish either. Dominance of the Middle Sea is a long step toward victory in the East as well as the West.

BRITAIN'S PARATROOPS

Paratroops of the British forces are being trained by the Royal Air Force at a School of Army Co-operation Command working every daylight hour.

Many men fit enough for some of the finest regiments now in Britain are unacceptable as paratroops. A very high degree of fitness is demanded. Perfect eyesight, hearing and above all quickwittedness are essential. Every parachutist must be prepared to make his own decisions, to be his own officer, to be entirely self-sufficient in an emergency.

Paratroops are recruited from all types, professional and temperaments. So are the R.A.F. instructors. At one school, many of the instructors were teachers in civil life. Others were circus performers, equestrian acrobats, ballet dancers, variety artists, professional footballers, or wrestlers. Such men are used to the limelight and fit well into a job where there is a mixture of excitement, danger and continual activity.

GROUND EXERCISES

The trainees are all volunteers and are shown how to jump and get the feel of a parachute. For the first two days they go through a series of ground training exercises in a hangar which has been converted into a vast gymnasium. They slide down chutes to practice a forward landing, swing on a giant stride, from which they drop at a given signal, to get accustomed to landing on one side without injury or sit suspended in a harness trapeze learning how to change direction. They practice dropping from a troop-carrier by means of a machine called the "High Aperture".

The first jump most probably comes just as dawn is breaking; at daybreak or sunset the conditions are more often suitable for parachuting.

The first and second jumps are taken from a tethered balloon in a park adjoining the aerodrome. From the balloon hangs a small cage—waist height—in the centre of which is the hole through which the troops will drop. The cage is just big enough to hold four men and the instructor. The

THE NAZI OFFENSIVE IN RUSSIA

As this paper goes to press, the German hordes on the Russians front have at last loosened their long-expected summer offensive. The dispatches received up to the last minute indicate that the fighting is fierce, but our Russian allies are holding their ground in all the strategic strongpoints between Kursk and Orel, against which Hitler is throwing an army of more than half a million men on this relatively short front sector. — It appears the Russian High Commands as, is it did in the two previous nazi offensives, relying on its huge recuperative power and vast reserves to hold the important positions of its great defence-in-depth system, and only to the north of Kursk the nazis seem to have made slight progress. In the meantime, Russian official communiqués reveal that Hitler has already lost more than two thousand tanks, a thousand aeroplanes, and a hundred thousand men in casualties, of which about thirty-five thousand should be reckoned as dead.

The fact which stands out as a departure from usual nazi procedure is that so far the German communiqués have been rather reticent regarding this last desperate attempt to crush the Russians, free their armies from the powerful hug of the Soviet bear and turn its eyes toward the west and south where the United Nations presumably are getting ready for their counterstroke by way of the invasion of the "Fortress Europa".

balloon ascends to a height of 600 feet in three minutes. During the ascent the instructor gives last minute advice.

Immediately the parachute opens an officer on the ground shouts instructions through a microphone such as "No 1, keep your feet together," and "No 2, try and turn round." Each jump is recorded on a special chart.

Each day the pupil's charts are inspected and any faults are dealt with by the officer in charge.

NAZIS BOMB AND GUN CRIPPLED CHILDREN

Forty crippled children, aged between two and 12, were playing in their convent home. Suddenly there was the drone of aircraft. The children shielded their eyes against the sun and gazed skywards.

Three planes roared from a cloud, and as the children, sensing danger, started to run the machine guns in the three raiders began blazing. Then one of the Germans zoomed low over the convent and sent a bomb crashing into the grounds.

One child was killed; five others were badly hurt.

Two raiders, following their leader, gunned the streets as nuns rushed from the ruins of their wrecked convent home, shepherding and carrying the crippled to the convent's vaults. One nun returned five times as bombs were falling and carried the wounded, and the babies, to safety.

A man who saw the bombing and gunning said to me:

"The nuns were marvellous. Some of the younger children were frightened, but immediately the sisters appeared they became calm and did as they were told.

"But for the prompt action of the sisters many more of the crippled children might have lost their lives, as the gunning went on for some time after they had been got to safety."

One crippled nine-year-old, with her legs in iron splints, helped to carry two wounded playmates to cover when the first bomb fell. She said:

"I was terribly frightened when the machine gunning started, but when the bomb fell remembered what I had been taught—to brave—and tried to do what I could."

The raiders also bombed three densely-populated districts of the town, killing two babies—five weeks-old three months, a they slept in their prams.

Two other people were killed in the raid.
