Algunas conversaciones amistosas que sostuve con los señores miembros de la comisión de agricultura, no cayeron en el vacío. Ya el señor diputado don José J. Peralta con su clara visión de los problemas nacionales, que me complazco en reconocer, informó ayer en "La Tribuna" que a los productores de cacao se les tratará en el Instituto de Defensa del Café y del Cacao en las mismas condiciones de los cafetaleros. Dentro de aquel organismo, ambas industrias, la cacaotera y la cafetalera, estarán en igual pie de condiciones y a ambas se les protegerá por igual. ## ULTIMOS CABLES

MOSCÚ, 26 UP. — Las fuerzas rusas aflojan incansablemente y en gran número por una brecha de 60 kilómetros abierta en las defensas alemanas al norte de Gomel y han cortado al parecer la carretera entre esa plaza y Mogilev. Las fuerzas soviéticas prosiguen con éxito las nuevas operaciones ofensivas en Rusia Blanca con la que amenazan con derrumbar la línea de defensa germana en esa región, que protege las vías de acceso y según las últimas informaciones del frente las tropas rusas prosiguen do sus avances en la zona de Proskov llegaron al Dnieper y cortaron la principal carretera que une a Gomel con Vitsebsk y Orzha.

En la margen opuesta del Dnieper se halla el único ferrocarril transversal de Rusia Blanca. Las tropas rusas que siguen es trechando el cerco de acero en torno a Gomel, cuya caída se considera cuestión de poco tiempo, irrumpieron a través de las defensas alemanas a unos 110 kilómetros al norte de la plaza y también a 60 kilómetros al sudeste de Mogilev con un súbito y violento ataque que los lleva a través de los ríos Pronya y Sozha y les permitió reconquistar 180 poblaciones en avances que llegan a profundidades hasta de 43 kilómetros. Informaciones del frente aun no completas dicen que las fuerzas rusas lograron dominar enteramente las defensas alemanas entre los ríos Sozha y Dnieper y tomaron gran número de prisioneros a raíz de la rendición de varias guarniciones que habían quedado aisladas. Mientras tanto, las fuerzas soviéticas prosiguen satisfactoriamente sus operaciones en los demás sectores activos del frente al oeste de Rechitsa las tropas al mando del general Rokossovsky siguen abriéndose camino después de la ocupación de dos estaciones ferroviarias con lo cual cortaron la línea Zhitomir-Kalinivichi. En la saliente de Kiev los contingentes rusos al mando del general Vatutin siguen rechazando las acometidas de las agotadas fuerzas alemanas y han paralizado casi por completo la poderosa contra ofensiva nazi. Las informaciones que se reciben de ese sector del frente hacen saber que han sido desbaratadas todas las tentativas enemigas de irrumpir y que las fuerzas nacionales, con el poderoso apoyo de artillería y tanques, causan grandes pérdidas a los germanos.



### El Agricultor y La Guerra

WASHINGTON.—El agricultor de los Estados Unidos es un trabajador importante en el arsenal de la democracia, puesto que proporciona asistencia imprescindible a las fuerzas armadas y a los hombres que manejan las herramientas mecánicas en las fábricas de peritrichos, ayudándolos eficazmente a soportar las cargas de la guerra total en que estamos empeñados.

El señor Howard R. Tolley, jefe de la Oficina de Economía Agrícola de los Estados Unidos, en un libro titulado "El Ciudadano Agrícola en Pie de Guerra," presenta una magnífica descripción de las valiosas aportaciones que los agricultores estadounidenses contribuyen al esfuerzo bélico de las Naciones Unidas.

Los agricultores de esta nación tienen que producir miles de toneladas de alimentos para los millones de paisanos que residen en el país y para las fuerzas armadas de los Estados Unidos y sus aliados que pelean contra los agresores nazi-fascistas en los lejanos y apartados campos de batalla en todo el mundo.

#### Necesidad de Muchos Alimentos

Al hacer referencia al hecho de que "el toque de guerra" de los agricultores constituye producir las mayores cosechas jamás obtenidas, el señor Tolley dice lo siguiente:

"De las granjas de los Estados Unidos tiene que salir ahora gran parte de alimentos que se necesitan para substituir los que el Reino Unido recibía anteriormente procedentes de la frágil Dinamarca, de los países Bajos y de las regiones bordeadas por el azul Mediterráneo en donde actualmente no impera la paz. Además, ahora nuestra agricultura está tratando también de proporcionar a Rusia enormes cantidades de víveres a fin de reemplazar parte de los que antes fluían de la fértil Ucrania con tanta abundancia."

"Pero, los productos alimenticios no son lo único con que contribuyen los agricultores a la tarea de hacer la guerra en la forma más gigantesca que registra la historia humana. De las fincas de este país también proceden materiales básicos que son esencialmente necesarios para satisfacer las necesidades puramente militares."

"Del maíz y el azúcar se saca el alcohol industrial que tan útil es para la fabricación de explosivos; la soya y el encacahuate substituyen los aceites vegetales de las Indias en una veintena de usos militares; el algodón se necesita para fabricar polvora; el lino produce aceite de linaza para pintar nuestros barcos de guerra, y hasta el humilde estropajo proporciona esponjas para los motores marinos. En esta forma se puede extender la lista casi indefinitely."

#### Multitud de problemas

"El agricultor se enfrenta con numerosos problemas que obstruyen sus actividades en esta época de guerra," dice el señor Tolley. Sus hijos se han marchado a la guerra, y tiene él que cultivar su terreno, sin los abonos y muchas otras cosas que eran tan abundantes en épocas de paz. Mas, a pesar de todos los obstáculos, el agricultor prosigue con su labor.

Al hacer una síntesis de sus encomios, el señor Tolley se expresa en la forma siguiente: "Es nada menos que un tributo justo a la tradicional ingeniosidad y al espíritu batallador de los agricultores norteamericanos el reconocer el hecho de que están contestando al reto más difícil que hasta la fecha se ha lanzado a los cosecheros. Aún más: ese hecho muestra de manera digna que la democracia tiene razón cuando confía en esa ingeniosidad; cuando deposita en el ciudadano promedio una gran responsabilidad. Puesto que, al fin y al cabo, la producción agrícola depende, mucho más que la industrial, de la densidad, la lealtad y la laboriosidad de ciudadanos que trabajan mayormente por cuenta propia."

## THE DESTRUCTION OF BERLIN

With more than one thousand of their largest and most powerful war machines, the Royal Air Force raided the Capital of the German Reich on the nights of Monday and Tuesday of this week in course, with the most terrifying results.

Information released by both the British Air Ministry and foreign correspondents declare the assaults were the worst effected throughout the entire war period, particularly in so far as the use of 4,000 pounds bombs were concerned. Property destruction was said to be indescribable, and included the presidential palace in which von Hindenburg lived, the buildings occupied by the department of War, Foreign Relations and the Administration of War Production, the Embassies of the United States of America, Japan and Italy, all the building in the district of the Zoo and the largest cine theater in the city.

The fires produced by the incendiary bombs so enveloped the city that the flame started

on Monday night were still burning when the second attack took place. The number of persons who lost their lives has been placed at the huge total of 35,000, a large percentage being due, it is said, to the people being erroneously signalled to leave their air-raid shelters after only the first wave of planes had passed over the city.

Hitler was attending a conference in the Chancery building when the alarm was given

on Monday night; he immediately took refuge in one of the air raid shelters; he was unhurt and left the city early the following morning by automobile for an unstated destination.

Other important military and industrial positions and districts in different parts of Germany have also suffered heavily from recent RAF raids as well as positions of importance in the Nazi occupied territories of France and elsewhere.

About four million persons are reported to have fled Berlin for safer localities.

## AN IMPORTANT AND DESERVING APPEAL

With much interest we place before our esteemed readers the text of the circular issued under date, the 22nd, October last, by His Britannic Majesty's Charge d'Affaires at the Legation in San José to Britons in Costa Rica

The year 1943 is fast running out. With the generous support of our friends (now Allies), we contributed to British war charities up to the end of 1941 — £111,570 and, by the close of 1942 — £168,086. It looks, however, as if our united effort in 1943, which now stands at

34,967 colones, may fall short of the standard we ourselves have established; and in a year of such splendid achievements on the war fronts, it is unlikely that we, in Costa Rica, would be satisfied with less than our best.

What to do? A Bazaar is impracticable, for the Roof Garden, which we have previously used, is no longer available. Musical and cinematic entertainment would hardly cover the deficit. But shall we need a Bazaar or other form of entertainment to stimulate our efforts? I know that such is not the case; and I, therefore, suggest that we make a special effort to round off the contribution for 1943. We are approaching "POPPY DAY" — the flower that has come to mean for us REMBRANCE. Shall we make the occasion for personal sacrifices, with the Poppy as our symbol? We hope to have a supply of poppies, one of which will be sent to you, early in November.

The grim struggle, which has raised us from the desperate straits of Dunkerque to the present triumphant march forward against an arrogant foe, has not been achieved without the tragic aftermaths of sightless, maimed victims, orphans and desolated homes. This does not need stretching. It is a matter of pride with us that in modern wars, we do not neglect those who fight for us.

I invite you, then, to make November the eleventh, a day of special sacrifice.

## THE ISOLATION OF OUR ZONE

Once again has our Atlantic Zone experienced the great misfortune of having been isolated from the remainder of the country.

Consequent on the torrential rains which had been falling for some time, wash-outs and an extensive landslide occurred along the road-bed of the Railway Company's main line, and despite the efforts of the Management and the herculean labour of the workmen, train service with the Capital and other inland points was held-up for a week.

This must have seriously affected the economic interests of our people, particularly those engaged in commercial and industrial activities. The general progress of the Province must also have been prejudiced.

Our Republic is destined to play a not unimportant part in the unfoldment of the comprehensive post-war programme, now under formation, for aiding in the rehabilitation of the United Nations. The United Fruit Company have also made it known that they are prepared to invest a vast sum in the cultivation of food plants in this country. As it is quite possible that our Atlantic Zone will be selected for the carrying out of a large percentage of the proposals, we consider it is essential that an effort be made to provide us with the means of regular communication facilities with the Capital and other interior points. We, therefore, beg to suggest that our highly regarded Minister of Fomento give consideration to the long pending project of the construction of a roadway to connect Siquirres with Turrialba, which we are assured would keep us in touch with the interior of the Republic in the event of landslides or wash-outs occurring along the Railway's system.

## Nazis Still Give Way Before Soviet Push

The Russian armies, under command of General Vatutin, are reported to be bringing to a close a signal victory with the battle southwest of Kiev, where the enemy forces have been compelled to initiate a new and disastrous retreat.

Other Soviet forces, operating in White Russia, are said to be continuing their advance toward Poland. Russian advances are also continuing in the bend of the Dnieper River, where they have recaptured numerous localities and inflicted considerable loss on the enemy in the sector south of Kremenchug and Dnieperetrovsk. Despite his terrible losses, Marshal von Manstein has been launching his exhausted troops in additional attacks, which have only resulted in the Russians securing further gains. Gomel was vacated by the Germans after they had destroyed all their military installations.

## ALLIENDS CONTINUE ADVANCES IN ITALY

Having forced the passage of the River Sangro and established themselves firmly on its northern bank, over an extension of eight kilometers where they have rejected all the counter attacks of the enemy, the Eighth Army, under the command of General Montgomery, is said to have accomplished the most important victory of the past month's operations in the Adriatic sector, in view of the Nazi's tenacious opposition and the unfavourable weather conditions.

## NAZI BRUTALITY

More than one hundred persons were recently executed in one day in Berlin in an effort of the Nazi authorities to com-

bat the increasing opposition of the people.

It has been authentically stated that one hundred prisoners were taken from concentration camps and either shot or hanged in Turin, Italy, by the Nazi authorities, in reprisal for attacks on German soldiers.

An official announcement declares that German troops executed fifty-three Italian civilians in the city of Bellona because of the killing of one German soldier and the wounding of another, when they attempted to attack an Italian girl.

# BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

## CHURCHILL'S VOICE GOES ROUND THE WORLD

When Mr. Churchill comes on the air he is also heard "live" on a worldwide coverage, local conditions being good. He is re-broadcast "live" by the three big American companies, and later re-broadcast in full, at appropriate times for listeners in American, Pacific and Eastern transmissions.

The European Service "plugs" the Prime Minister in translation, to give salient passages a few minutes after he spoke them. The Portuguese section gives a full translation while the substance of what he said is "plugged" in bulletins for the next twenty-four hours.

The Germans get four very full summaries, and the French two.

Two separate bulletins in other languages contain full reports of the speech, while the Latin-American Service, in both Spanish and Portuguese of that continent, give the important parts in the next news bulletins, and follow these with translated verbatim extracts in the newscasts periods. All other foreign-language broadcasts give similar condensed translations. Mr. Churchill has to be summarised so that transmitters can be switched over punctually for the programme. Important as this is it is especially so in the European Service, which caters for the expectant listeners in enemy and occupied countries, hidden in cellars and attics with muted radio sets.

The Prime Minister's broadcasts are given at certain pre-arranged places, to which wires are ready laid, and the microphones—two of them—are brought along at the last moment. At least two land-lines are used, as a safeguard against bombing or accident, and usually three recordings are made in separate places—one on film and two on discs. Posters will be able to hear what Mr. Churchill said in the war against Nazism.

"The first two years after the war are bound to be a time of great stringency on the food front. British agriculture will have to remain fully mobilised after hostilities have ceased for a period likely to be counted in years". — Minister of Agriculture.

## NORSE GIRLS TRAIN IN SCOTS CASTLE

More than a thousand Norwegian women representing every section of Norway's national life have escaped to Britain since the Germans overran their country in 1940. They have come overland via neutral states, or across the North Sea in small fishing boats or even on British warships after commando raids. All have only one aim—to carry on the fight for the eventual liberation of their country. Some of them with some particular training or craft at their fingertips fitted easily enough into war jobs. But many of them were without any professional training and it was for these women that the Norwegian Government launched a scheme whereby they could get instruction not only in some particular form of work which would fit them for service, but also, in the English language and in the customs of the country into which they had come to work.

From this embryo the Kvinnekorp, the Norwegian Women's Auxiliary Corps, began to take shape, and soon, the great Scottish castle which they had taken over was hardly big enough to house all the activities on which they were engaged. Women have been trained as nurses for Norwegian hospitals and convalescent homes. Courses have been given in ambulance and truck driving, office, kitchen mess and canteen staffs have been trained. These particular courses have been supplemented by drill, camouflage, map-reading and eventually full army training to fit them for the Norske Kvinnekorp, the Women's Auxiliary Corps which forms part of the Royal Norwegian Army, for the Marinens Kvinnekorp, which serves with the Royal Norwegian Navy and for the newly formed Norske Kvinnekorp Flygeväapnet, which serves with the Royal Norwegian Air Force.

## EUROPE MARCHES

A Danish journalist writing in the Swedish paper Lektyr, gives a description of the way in which the fifth column in Denmark communicate with the Allies and sabotage the war effort of the German occupying power: "The Royal Air Force", he writes, "is to a great extent kept informed by secret radio transmissions of Danish deliveries of goods to Germany, of movements of German troops in Denmark, and German fortifications along the coast and inlets. The following is a typical example of efficient secret service work in Denmark.

"At the beginning of 1943 a German steamer with a cargo of about 1,000 head of cattle destined for a port on the German Baltic coast slipped out of the harbour at dusk. Two hours later the sirens sounded their plain warning just over the house where we lived in Copenhagen, and detonations were heard in the far distance. Spitfires with the help of flares had located the steamer, which was bombed while still in the Sound. We heard later that it sank immediately with all hands.

## NEGRO TROOPS POPULAR IN ENGLAND

Ramming Hitler's "racial supremacy" down his throat on today's front line of action, Negro troops have completed a year of shuttling bombs to United Nations Fortresses and working double shifts to level British farmland into bases for more bombers. Quartermaster units rushing supplies, gasoline and bombs to air fields on split-second schedules literally boost the aircraft into the sky and send them off to pulverise war industries in Germany and occupied territories. At the same time, engineer aviation troops are laying the groundwork for future raids. Thousands of tons of concrete stretch into mile-long runways on what a few months ago was British wood and farmland. "Coloured troops are a part, and a vital part of our team" said Major General Ira C. Eaker, now stationed in Britain, in a recent statement on the "outstanding service" of the coloured Quartermaster Corps. "Were it not for the long hours of work and efficiency of these units" he went on "our bombs would not reach our airfields on time and consequently would not be delivered in Germany".

The soldiers work in double shifts from 5 o'clock in the morning to 11 o'clock at night. When Flying Fortresses pass overhead on their way to pound Germany, men working on runways and hangars stop work momentarily. They watch the great craft move through the clouds, then return to their tasks with renewed vigour. All are eager to bring closer the day when similar craft will take off on their airfield. In actions as well as looks these troops have brought credit to their uniform.

When a quartermaster unit was moved recently from one English community, many residents wrote letters to the commanding officer expressing regrets that the soldiers would no longer be with them. "Everyone says the same" one resident wrote "they're sorry the boys have gone. We miss them very much. They kept the area clean and they were always cheerful and smiling. We miss them singing in the evening". Others wrote "They were a quiet, civil, well-behaved body of men, especially loved by the children to whom they were more than generous. We were indeed sorry when they went".

## THE COMMON AIM

From now onwards our capacity to exploit favourable situations and secure the fullest possible aid from our Allies inside Nazi Europe will become increasingly important. They constitute vital factors in the consideration of what operations the Anglo-American armies could and should undertake during the coming months.

British and American leaders are as anxious as the Russians to bring the European struggle to an end at the earliest possible moment. They have a better idea than our Russian Allies of the problems and delays involved in amphibian operations. Our opera-

## RECOGNITION OF THE FRENCH COMMITTEE

The British Government has transacted day to day business with the new Committee ever since its inception; thus recognition gives formal definition and formal effect to a situation that has already to some extent existed in practice. The Prime Minister's statement of June 8 to Parliament will be recalled. Then he said: "The formation of this Committee with its collective responsibility supersedes the situation created by correspondence between DeGaulle and myself in 1940. Our dealings, financial and otherwise, will henceforward be with the Committee as a whole". British communications are being made in the name of His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom alone. The Dominion Governments will be making similar communications of their own, but they, too, may well vary the wording in order to meet their special requirements.

There are technical reasons why any American communication to the French Committee of

National Liberation should be cast in different form. These arise from the fact that the British Government recognised the former French National Committee and concluded formal agreements with it, while the U. S. Government did not. The British formula has to take account of this fact.

## AIRPOWER BRIDGES ATLANTIC

Four years ago when the war broke out the Atlantic crossing was still sensational news. For all practical purposes the only means of communication between Great Britain and the North American continent was still by ship across three thousand miles of ocean.

It was small wonder that Hitler counted on U-boat warfare to break most vital life line in the world. But he did not foresee that the British Commonwealth would survive the worst U-boat attacks, to string across the wide Atlantic another lifeline—air power. A recent Admiralty and Air Ministry communiqué told how a valuable convoy had crossed the Atlantic without interference from powerful forces of U-boats: "Close air cover was provided during the initial stage of the passage by Hudson, Ventura, Liberator and Catalina aircraft of the Royal Canadian Air Force Eastern Air Command, and during the final stage by Liberator, Sunderland and Halifax aircraft of the Royal Air Force Coastal Command. The mid-Atlantic air gap between the extreme escorting ranges of these shore based aircraft was bridged by Swordfish and Martlet aircraft from the escort carrier H. M. S. ARCHER".

tions in the days ahead are to go forward with all possible expedition and the hour of Germany's surrender is not to be needlessly postponed.

## REPAIRING RAVAGES OF JAPANESE INVASION OF THE SOLOMONS

As the Japanese are driven from the Solomon Islands Protectorate, British Colonial officials are putting into practice development plans drawn up before the war and now adapted to the new situation created by the Japanese invasion. Each area is re-occupied, the native communities are being reorganized themselves. Plans are being worked out for establishment of native councils and for the extension of educational facilities. An Agricultural officer is touring the most severely devastated areas to see if replanting efforts are being made to develop new crops which can grow in the Protectorate for which markets are likely to be available after the war. The grave result of the Japanese invasion was the interruption of the medical work in the monsoon. A campaign which promised to bring the most prevalent disease—yaws—under final control was interrupted; there have been some fresh outbreaks. Government and Missions personnel are touring the affected areas and giving injections; United States authorities are doing great help in supplying many drugs as possible.

## TRACKING OF AIRCRAFT

The Royal Observer Corps has been called "the eyes and ears of the R. A. F."—and this is literally true than a mere catch phrase. There seems to be a widespread idea that radiolocation has deprived the corps of its usefulness but this is sheer nonsense. Before the advent of modern apparatus the R. A. F. depended entirely upon Royal Observer Corps information by eye and ear. Since radiolocation arrived in the approach of hostile aircraft, the human senses of R. O. C. observers form two complementary parts of a vital whole working in the closest harmony. A senior R. A. F. officer on the staff of the busiest fighter group during the Battle of Britain enthusiastically declared "that the epic was 'won on R. O. C. information alone' and that this is probably stretching the mark as might be imagined".

Throughout the length and breadth of the kingdom there are 1,500 carefully sited observation posts, each manned every minute of the 24 hours by two highly trained observers, whose efficiency is kept at a constant high level by periodical tests. Their recognition—both by eye and ear—has come to be amazingly accurate; for they have had plenty of practice since the early days of the war, when Me 109 on the table in the centre occasionally became a crow as a result of subsequent investigation.
