50 mil racimos mensuales de banano se comprometen a vender a México productores de la ZONA ATLANTICA

Finqueros de Cuba Creek han venido a visitarnos para darnos la mala noticia de que a lo largo de la línea de Zent, especialmente en Cuba Creek las hormigas llamadas Wee Wee han invadido todas las plantaciones haciendo destrozos incalculables en los sembrados. Todos los cultivadores de esa zona están justamente alarmados y han solicitado de la Secretaría de Agricultura la asistencia de técnicos para terminar con la plaga. La noticia que publicaremos sobre el particular des

pertó gran interés, y numerosos productores bananeros de esta zona se apresuraron a entrevistarse con el agente de la mencionada compañía. Hemos recogido nuevos e importantes detalles, en torno de las gestiones para colocar banano costarricense en México.

Según los productores lo han manifestado al agente de la "Comercial Panamericana", están en condiciones de vender mensualmente, y por ahora, 50 mil racimos de fruta.

Ciento treinta colonos formarán la primera colonia agrícola, que de acuerdo con el plan trazado por la secretaría de agricultura y que ejecuta el departamento respectivo a cargo del señor San Román, se instalará en el país adaptándose sistemas que han resultado en otros países de América.

Esa primera colonia agrícola será establecida en una extensión de 1.300 hectárea. y en terrenos adquiridos por el Estado y que están ubicados entre Pococí y Roxana, en las regiones de esta zona.

A cada colono se le entregará 10 hectáreas de tierras y se le darán facilidades para la explotación de las tierras, ejerciendo la secretaría de agricultura un completo control para el éxito en el desarrollo de las colonias agrícolas.

ULTIMOS CABLES

LONDRES, 15. UP. — Poderosas formaciones aliadas de bombarderos pesados, medianos y ligeros y cazas bombarderos atacaron ayer objetivos militares en el norte de Francia obteniendo buenos resultados. Fueron derribados 17 aviones enemigos y se perdieron tres bombarderos pesados, tres medianos, tres cazas bombarderos y siete cazas.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — El ministerio del interior búlgaro ha ordenado que se hallen comodidades en las provincias para 300.000 refugiados. Agrega la radio alemana que dió este despacho, que más tarde otras ciudades búlgaras serán evacuadas.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — Acaba de anunciarse que más de dos mil doscientas cuarenta toneladas de explosivos fueron lanzadas arrojados sobre Brunswick, centro de producción de aviones, al tiempo que fueron asaltados Berlín y Magdeburgo.

CUARTELES AVANZADOS ALIADOS. NUEVA GUINEA, 15. UP. — Parece ser inminente una batalla conclusiva por la península de Huor en Nueva Guinea. Tropas australianas están combatiendo a los japoneses atrapados en Sió. Bas principal en la península, y fuerzas americanas han establecido una cabeza de playa en Saidor, al norte de Sió.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — Una información de la radio de Berlín dice que sus fuerzas contraatacaron y ganaron terreno al noroeste de Kirovograd.

EL CAIRO, 15. UP. — Las mujeres y los niños de los guerrilleros que luchan en Yugoslavia y entre otros países ocupados son evacuados a Egipto, para librarse de la muerte y la tortura a manos de los nazis. Los primeros llegados a esta hacen relatos aterradores sobre las atrocidades cometidas por los alemanes en sus países. Formando parte de uno de estos grupos se encuentra una joven llamada Olga, que escasamente tendrá 20 años y que tiene ganada ya mereci

da fama por haber dado muerte a más de 150 alemanes.

ESTOCOLMO, 15. UP. — El corresponsal del Afton Bladet en Berlín anuncia que anoche operaron sobre Alemania 500 aviones aliados, 100 de los cuales atacaron Berlín. La incursión se concentró en los suburbios meridionales de la capital. Los demás aparatos atacaron Magdeburgo y objetivos del oeste de Alemania.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — En círculo autorizado se informó al gobierno polaco extraterritorial que Gran Bretaña está dispuesta a actuar como intermediaria en el litigio de límites ruso-polacos y en los demás problemas entre Polonia y la Unión de los Soviets. Las autoridades admitieron que sus esfuerzos para lograr inmediatamente una solución satisfactoria de la cuestión fronteriza han sido anulados por el rechazo polaco indirecto de la propuesta rusa sobre la línea Cur-

zn así como por el pedido polaco de que Gran Bretaña y Estados Unidos intervengan como mediadores.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — El corresponsal de una agencia noticiosa alemana en Sofía, según una transmisión de la radio de Berlín, anunció que el gobierno búlgaro ordenó la evacuación de esa capital, disponiendo que los habitantes del interior faciliten alojamiento y alimento para los evacuados. Se estableció la pena de muerte para los culpables de saqueo. Añade que las sirenas de alarma fueron destruidas durante el último bombardeo, por lo que se utiliza las campanas de las iglesias como señal de alarma. Se procedió a la clausura de las universidades y escuelas en las grandes ciudades para facilitar los trabajos de evacuación de los habitantes y zonas fuera de peligro.

Esta noticia es muy halagadora ya que pone de manifiesto la buena voluntad que anima al Gobierno en lo que se refiere a esta provincia. La reparación de estos caminos nos hará un gran beneficio por que se ocupan muchos peones que ahora están sin trabajo y por otra parte tendremos con esa reparación la facilidad de tránsito para muchos pequeños finqueros de esos lugares que ahora tienen que servir de la vía férrea con el continuo peligro de los trenes. 
Cuartel general de la aviación norteamericana en el Pacífico central, 15. UP. — El Mayor general Willis Hele, comandante de la séptima fuerza aérea norteamericana, anunció que sus aviones han neutralizado parcialmente a dos bases aéreas japonesas en las islas Marshall y causando serias averías en otras tres. Añadió que en las primeras fueron destruidas las principales instalaciones de los aeródromos.

LONDRES, 15. UP. — Los yugoeslavos del mariscal Tito acometieron violentamente hasta situarse en las cercanías de Fiume. Guerrilleros y alemanes libran una sangrienta batalla que se extiende por la costa eslovena.

MOSCU, 15. UP. — Los rusos lanzaron una terrible ofensiva en el sector de Leningrado. No hay más detalles sobre esta nueva operación. Sólo se sabe que el invasor es atacado por poderosos efectivos de infantería, tanques y aviones.

ARGEL, 15. UP. — Las tropas francesas del quinto ejército se han adjudicado su primer gran triunfo en Italia al conquistar la importante población de Acquafredda a nueve kilómetros y medio al noreste de Cassino, y tres estratégicos cerros desde los cuales se dominan las estribaciones que llevan a la poderosa fortaleza alemana. Los franceses, al mando del general Alphonse Juin han avanzado ocho kilómetros desde el comienzo de su ofensiva, y las conquistas de ayer les han permitido quebrar por el noreste y el norte al anillo de defensas con que los alemanes habían rodeado a Cassino. La plaza también está amenazada por el sur debido al avance de las tropas norteamericanas que avanzan desde Cervaro, la localidad conquistada hace tres días. Aumenta de hora en hora el riesgo para la guarnición alemana de Cassino aislada por tres lados.



UNA SUGESTION INTERESANTE

El señor Veterinario Oficial y Administrador del Matadero, se ha dirigido a la Corporación Municipal de esta ciudad, en un interesante informe sobre las labores que ha efectuado su Departamento durante el año pasado. De ese informe tomamos una sugerencia que estimamos muy oportuna en estos momentos de crisis económica.

Sugiere el señor Marín Torres que se den los pasos necesarios para abaratar la carne de tortuga a fin de poderla vender a un precio de treinta y cinco céntimos la libra. Los cálculos que contiene el informe sobre precios del animal y gastos de destace y venta, dejan una halagadora utilidad en el negocio. Anota el señor Marín que la Municipalidad, o la Junta de Abastos, podría adquirir todos los animales que se pesquen llevándolos a los corrales que aún existen en Cieneguita y mantener allí cantidad suficiente para el consumo diario. Por lo que nosotros sabemos en este momento no se paga patente ninguna de pesca de tortuga tiene mucha aceptación por todas las gentes pobres. Si se diera toda clase de facilidades a los pescadores, garantizándoles también la compra del producto, éste se obtendría en abundancia.

Naturalmente el plan es susceptible de modificaciones y podría ser estudiado por la Junta de Abastos o la Municipalidad de Limón. Nosotros estimamos que así como el señor Marín lo presenta es perfectamente factible y no requiere una inversión fuerte. Actualmente los precios de la carne son mucho más altos que las posibilidades económicas de un gran sector de la población. Aquí la carne de tortuga tiene mucha aceptación por todas las gentes pobres, si ese precio puede estabilizarse como lo indica el señor Marín Torres, se haría un gran beneficio al público. Todo se reduce a organización y empeño de quienes tienen autoridad para desarrollar el plan que tan inteligentemente expone el señor Marín Torres en su informe. Nosotros lo acuerpamos con todo entusiasmo y esperamos que no se eche en olvido como tantas otras iniciativas que hubieran mejorado nuestra difícil situación de estos momentos.


Bombas de Socorro

MADRID, 15. UP. — Informaciones alemanas procedentes de Génova dicen que se conocen detalles sobre el paradero de los miembros del gran consejo fascista condenados en contumacia por el tribunal que hace pocos días sentenció a muerte al conde Ciano y a otros jefes del fascismo. Dino Alfieri, ex embajador de Italia en Berlín, se encuentra en Suiza. Alfieri permanece en el norte de Italia hasta después de la capitulación y huyó cuando las radioemisoras fascistas comenzaron a atacarlo. Dino Grandi, principal responsable de la caída de Mussolini, se halla en Portugal. Poco después de detenido Mussolini, Grandi fue enviado a Lisboa por el gobierno de Badoglio. Giuseppe Bottai encuéntrese escondido en Italia. Demarsico y Acerbo, naturales de los Abruzs, parece que se encuentran en esas montañas. También se ignora el paradero exacto de Bastianini y de Rossonio, creyéndose que también se hallan ocultos en territorio italiano.

MOSCU, 15. UP. — Las tres columnas del ejército de Rokossovsky se han internado ya profundamente en los pantanos del Pripiet avanzando dos de ellas hacia el oeste por el ferrocarril y la carretera a Pinks y la otra en dirección al sudeste, y amenazando copa a varios miles de alemanes a quienes han flanqueado por el sur las tropas del general Vatutin. En el extremo meridional del primer frente ucraniano, al este y sudeste de Vinnitsa, las tropas blindadas germanas continúan siendo destruidas al impedir que las unidades soviéticas lleguen al ferrocarril Odeza-Lemberg y corten la retirada de los ejércitos del Reich semicercados en el codó del Dnieper. THREE OF GERMANY'S LARGEST PLANE FACTORIES DESTROYED

In competent circles, the opinion exists that the North American air units, which attacked important industrial centers in Germany on Wednesday last, have dealt the Nazis a terrible blow in connection with their preparations against the expected Allied invasion.

Three of Germany's most important plane factories were virtually destroyed. Those of Ochtersleben, Halberstadt and Brunswick. Various other installations were also badly damaged.

In the aerial battle, which took place during the raid, it is officially admitted that attacking force lost sixty-four machines and that 595 men failed to return to their home bases. The Nazis' loss is placed at more than one hundred units.

None of the factories will, it is estimated, be able to restart operations until after the expiration of several months probably not before the anticipated Allied invasion takes place. For this reason, it is said, the destruction of the establishments has deprived the nation of hundreds of machines on which they were relying to repel the aerial attacks

VIOLENT FIGHTING IN ITALIAN WAR ZONES

Overcoming the violent resistance of the Germans in the vicinity of Cassino, forces of the "Fifth" penetrated the defence line of the stronghold and reached the heights of Monte Trochio, the last natural barrier south of the position, and from which they are supposed to be distant about three kilometers. Their operations are along both sides of the road which leads to Rome.

Attacking between the mountains to the north and northeast of Cassino, the French troops dislodged the Germans from three important heights. Repelling two enemy counterattacks, they also occupied other heights in the Casale

and Acquafondata mountains.

The British and New Zealanders have improved their positions to the north of Ortona and their patrols, penetrating deeply in the German lines, took numerous prisoners.

Powerful formations of North American bombing planes raided four enemy air bases last Thursday in the southern outskirts of Rome. Wave after wave of the planes discharged heavy high explosive bombs causing great destruction; several cuartels were also destroyed.

Other units of the aerial forces attacked and seriously damaged enemy ships in Yugoslavian port of Sibeni on the Adriatic.

MORE RUSSIAN SUCCESSES

The Russian offensive continues unbeaten. Pursuing their activities in the southern sector of white Russia, the troops captured Mozyr and Kalinkovich, the fortifications which

which they anticipate will precede the invasion.

protected the corridor of Pinsk in the higher region of the Pripiet marshes. This success has divided the enemy forces, who panic-stricken are said to be fleeing in disorder. After having occupied Tutovichi, eighteen kilometers west of Samy the First Ukrainian army continue their operations on the Kiev-Odessa railroad while another column, under the orders of General Vatutin move northward from Dombrizta and are about 60 kilometers to the south of Pinsk, whose conquest will, it is stated, condemn thousands of Germans to either death or capture.

Effecting other movements across the old Polish frontier the Ukrainian troops have occupied Korets and Kiliukiev of much military importance.

Sun in Eclipse on 25th. Instant

We note the very interesting announcement that the sun will be in eclipse on the 25th. of the present month and may be partially observed here, in Costa Rica, between the hours of 6.30 a. m. and 12 noon. Astronomers are of the opinion that this eclipse will be one of the grandest of recent times.

We advise all who might be interested in observing the solar phenomenon to get their smoked glasses ready with which they will be able to make the observation with greater facility.

WEEKLY CASH ADVANCES SEEM INDISPENSIBLE IN INTEREST OF OUR ECONOMIC SITUATION

For quite a long period of years the employees of the local Companies were facilitated with weekly cash advances on account of their earnings. This enabled them to arrange their financial transactions on a similar basis, in which the merchants, the farmers, the teachers of the private system, and almost every other member of the community participated. The system might also have been given some consideration at the time the Popular National Lottery was established for weekly drawings at the low cost of twenty-five cents per number, to enhance the sale and encourage general support.

The prevailing demand for ready cash has given rise to an outcry by those who are now deprived of the weekly advances; and the substitution of fortnightly and monthly payments seem to be the cause of much hardships which seriously affect our economic life.

There are certain circumstances which cannot easily be separated from the general weekly circulation of cash and our attention has been invited to the important setbacks which threaten to engulf all classes. It has been stated that no one can do a greater service to his fellow creatures than by so adjusting matters as to afford them relief and some degree of comfort. The renewal of the weekly payments to all workers is popularly desired. We hope it will be granted.

Presidents Calderon Guardia an Somoza Confer.

According to the San Jose press, President Calderón Guardia left the Capital the day before yesterday, by air transportation, accompanied by his aid-de-camp, Colonel Rigoberto Pacheco, and Major Hernán Ortiz for the town of La Cruz on the border of Nicaragua. From this point he is said to have gone on to Piñas Blancas, in the neighbouring Republic, where he held an in-

terview with General Anastasio Somoza, the President of the country, sometime yesterday.

No information has yet been released regarding the reason which necessitated the conference, though it is somewhat generally presumed it was with respect to the economic interests of both Republics.

It is said that no torture is equal to the inhibition of sleep long continued; a pain to which the state of that man bears a very exact analogy, who dares never give rest to his vigilance and circumspection but considered himself surrounded by secret

his children or his friend with the secret that throbs in his breast and the auxiliaries which break into his face. To avoid, at this expense, those evils to which easiness and friendship might have exposed him, is surely to buy safety at too costly a rate, and, in the language of the Roman satirist, to save life by losing all for which a wise man would live.

Suspicion is also regarded as just as great an enemy to virtue as it is to happiness. He who is already corrupt, is known to be naturally suspicious will quickly be corrupt.

JAPAN PRESSED TO ATTACK RUSSIA

By way of Cairo, Egypt, comes the information that Hitler is exercising every possible effort to persuade Japan to launch an attack against Vladivostok and other Russian points along the frontier of Manchukuo.

The Nazi Dictator is said to have had several conferences, recently, with the Japanese Ambassador, Ushima,

during which he pleaded that Japan initiate the attack immediately, as sooner or later the Allies will unite in the Pacific area, so the Japanese should act now.

The move on the part of Hitler is, of course, regarded as an effort to stave off the total elimination of his armies on the western war fronts.


BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

POSTWAR BETTERMENT FOR THE WEST INDIES

Some time before the outbreak of the war, a Royal Commission was set up by the British Government to study ways and means of improving economic conditions in the Caribbean possessions. Development and Welfare schemes amounting to a total commitment of some £7½ million were already operating in addition to forward purchasing of the Jamaican banana crop, the payment of bonuses to West Indian labour, and other measures tending to alleviate the increase in living cost. Naturally upon the cessation of air-bases in these Islands to the United States, that country also had to increase its interest in local conditions and study the problems arising from considerable transfers of labour and material to constructional rather than land work. A special U. S. Committee was therefore established which in logical course merged with the Royal Commission already functioning, and thus the Anglo-American Caribbean Commission came into being, when it was found advisable to organise all the Caribbean countries to work as a single unit at least for the duration of the war. This Commission, whose 94-page report just published shows how much has already been effected by labour transference, block forward crop purchases by U.K. and U.S., and the introduction of certain industrial plants, will continue its studies and act as adviser to the local authorities and the main governments in order to speed forward in emergency such measures as may be necessary to maintain the improved standards already attained, and to carry these principles forward into the future. The AACC is pursuing an essentially long-term policy, intended to provide permanent betterment in the islands and to take advantage on their behalf of all the facilities which once more come into operation when peace returns. A few of these possibilities which may be cited here are simplification of inter-island travel and transport between British and North American possessions, increased public works, combined public health treasures and medical aid, expansion of tourist traffic and special broadcasts and instructional programmes from both London and Washington.

A DEMOCRATIC TRIUMPH

The maintenance of the freedom of the press in total war has been one of the triumphs of the British democratic system, brought about by mutual trust between the government and the newspapers. While giving up none of its peace time liberties the responsibilities of the war the British press has shouldered and welded itself into a powerful weapon.

These lines are dedicated to a man I met in Glasgow, an American. He was an Army officer, not old, In the late twenties. If the truth were told A great deal younger than he thought he was I mention this ironically because After we'd had a drink or two he said Something so naive, so foolish, that I fled. This was December, nineteen forty-two. He said: "We're here to win the war for you!"

Now listen—I'm a Britisher. I love America and know it well, I know its fine tradition; much of its land From California to Maine. I know the grand sweep of the Colorado Mountains; the sweet smell of lilac in Connecticut; I close my eyes And see the glittering pageant of New York blazing against the evening sky; I walk In memory along Park Avenue, over the rise Before Grand Central Station; then Broadway Seared by the hard, uncompromising glare Of noon, the crowded sidewalks of Times Square So disenchanted by the light of day With all the sky-signs dark, before the night Brings back the magic. Or I can wait High on a hill above the Golden Gate To sea a ship pass through. I could recite All the States of the Union, or at least I think I could. I've seen the autumn flame Along the upper Hudson. I could reclaim So many memories. I know the East, The West, the Middle West, the North the wide, Flat plains of Iowa; the South in spring, The painted streets of Charleston echoing Past elegance. I know with pride The friendship of Americans, that clear, kind, Motiveless hospitality; the warm, Always surprising, always beguiling charm Of being made to feel at home. I find, And have found, all the times that I've returned, This heartening friendliness. Now comes the war. Not such a simple issue as before.

More than our patriotism is concerned In this grim chaos. Everything we believe, Everything we inherit, all our past Yesterdays, todays, tomorrows, cast Into the holocaust. Do not deceive Yourself. This is no opportunity For showing off; no moment to behave Arrogantly. Remember, all are brave Who fight for truth. Our hope is unity. Do not destroy this hope with shallow words. The future of the world is in our hands If we remain together. All the lands That long for freedom; all the starving herds Of tortured Europe look to us to raise Them from their slavery. Don't undermine The values of our conflict with a line, An irritating, silly, boastful phrase!

Remember—I'm a Britisher. I know my country's faults. Its rather slow Superior assumptions; its aloof Conviction of its destiny. The proof Of its true quality also I know, This lies much deeper. When we stood alone, Besieged for one long, agonizing year, The only bulwark in our hemisphere Defying tyranny. In this was shown The temper of our people. Don't forget That lonely year. It isn't lease or lend Or armaments, or speeches that defend The principles of living. There's no debt Between your land and mine except that year. All our past errors, all our ommissive sins Must be wiped out. This war no nation wins. Remember that when you are over here Also remember that the future peace For which we're fighting cannot be maintained By wasting time contesting who has gained Which victory. When all the battles cease Then, if we've learned by mutual endurance, By dangers shared, by fighting side by side, To understand each other, then we'll forge a pride, Not in ourselves, but in our joint assurance To the whole world, when all the carnage ends, That men can still be free and still be friends.

FJI'S WARRIORS

When war broke out there were in most parts of the Colonial Empire small volunteer units of the Army recruited from Europeans and native people. These units were immediately strengthened, in some cases mobilised, and the volunteers were given two months' intensive training. Conditions in the Colonies were much the same as they were in this country. Colonial volunteers had to sacrifice their leisure hours to training and at the same time ensure that work on vital war production did not suffer.

The defence organisation of large areas of the Colonial Empire is often undertaken jointly by units of the fighting forces and volunteer defence forces. In East Africa, for instance, the world famous King's African Rifles, recruited from the East African dependencies, are reinforced by part-time volunteers of the East African Defence Force. In many places the native inhabitants have had to accustom themselves not only to novel conditions of training but also to new equipment and clothing. The advent of modern battle-dress, for example, has obliged the Fijians to abandon their traditional fuzzy coiffure, kilts and bare feet. But, in tin hats and Army boots, they look more warlike than ever, and their enthusiasm and efficiency has made a deep impression on the New Zealand troops who serve with them in Fiji.

IN EVERY THEATRE

We cannot claim to be victorious in this total war until we have won a total victory in every war, and the Prime Minister has told us that the defeat of Japan may take some little time after Hitler has suffered a dictator's fate.

It is for that that we must spare no effort. To tolerate slackness or complacency at this stage of the war just because the fall of Germany becomes daily more certain, would be to betray the cause for which we fight. We cannot relax our efforts until each and every one of the tyrants and warmongers (of whom Japan was the first) has been destroyed. It is to that end that we must work and fight and pray.

A THIRD WAR??

Unconditional surrender of the enemy is the least we will accept. We can only dictate such a peace if our victory is entire—if the enemy, whether he be white or yellow, is beaten to his knees wherever he may be found. The partial victory which half-heartedness might bring would be useless. It would only mean that the enemy was given a breathing space to regroup his forces and to prepare for yet a third world war. From that we must protect our children and ourselves.

Let us act therefore with resolution and with courage, determined that whatever the fifth or even the sixth year may bring we shall not falter or give way, but that every day will set the intensification of the struggle against tyranny and aggression.

WORK

A doctor, his shoulder crushed by falling masonry, refused to leave his post until he had attended to the wounded around him. A woman factory worker clocked in for the morning shift, although the home she had lived in for twenty-five years had been shattered by a bomb the night before.

This is service that cannot be measured by the ordinary terms of employment. There is no extra pay for heroism. To such people uncomplaining endurance is all in the day's work. Neither hardship nor glory can fall equally in war. Some face the brunt of the battle, others long hours of work that may, at times, seem monotonous enough to blunt even the edge of patriotism. There is fortitude at home as well as in the field. It is unselfish service, the determination to hold on, that turns an ordinary job into a crusade for freedom.

BACK TO LIFE

War has brought back to life the British flax industry. From a total acreage of 400 in 1939, it has grown to 52,000 and new factories have been equipped and opened throughout the country to handle the abundant harvests and prepare flax for the manufacture of war weapons.

Pictures and models of Wellington Bombers and Swordfish Torpedo Bombers draw attention to the use of flax-woven fabric in their construction. ARP hose is woven from flax and nothing else of its light weight could stand up to the terrific water pressure. Thousands of miles of hose have been used by the National Fire Service to save our towns and cities from destruction.
