SE ABRE UNA ESCUELA NOCTURNA DE INGLES

PARECE QUE LA EXPORTACION DE BANANOS ESTA ENCONTRANDO SERIAS DIFICULTADES POR LA OPOSICION de la COMPAÑIA BANANERA

Como saben nuestros lectores desde hace varias semanas se está exportando una cantidad de bananos que llega a siete u ocho mil racimos semanales, lo que ha permitido a los dueños de finca y a muchos peones una mejora en su situación económica. La Compañía que se ha formado en Limón estaba comprando el banano a cincuenta céntimos oro el racimo computado, que es más todavía de lo que pagaba la mayoría de las veces la Compañía Bananera.

Pero parece que la Compañía ha enviado a uno de sus altos empleados a advertir a todos los productores de banano que se mantienen en los abanos de la Compañía que no puede entregarle la fruta a la nueva compañía. Ignoramos las razones en que se basa la compañía frutera y ninguna de

las personas con quienes hemos conversado sobre este asunto, nos han podido dar razones.

Don Manuel Iglesias representante de la nueva compañía visitó al señor Gerente de la Unidad en averiguación de los hechos y Mr. Monch le ratificó la orden que había dado para evitar que se siguiera vendiendo esa fruta. Los finqueros por su parte han venido a quejarse a los representantes que les compran la fruta y éstos a su vez se han dirigido al señor presidente de la República en solicitud de que intervenga en esta nueva dificultad que pone la compañía para la venta de la fruta que se está perdiendo en los bananales y que pudiera mejorar las condiciones económicas de la población de esta provincia.

Como dijimos antes, no sabemos qué razones tenga el señor Monch para dar las instrucciones dichas, pero es necesaria la intervención del Gobierno a fin de solucionar esta dificultad.

Cualquier otra información que podamos adquirir la transmitiremos a nuestros lectores por estimar que es de sumo interés para nosotros.

La señora doña Lia M. de Montero, actual directora del Colegio de segunda enseñanza en esta ciudad y profesora titulada de inglés, ha abierto un curso nocturno para enseñar el inglés según sus sistemas acertados y fáciles aplicados en los colegios de San José.

La suma que cobra por mes es casi insignificante, pues es solamente de doce colones pagaderos por quince días adelantados. El que esto escribe ha asistido a las primeras lecciones y puede recomendarlos como productivos y fáciles de entender, ya que los libros de texto que la profesora utiliza, son una gran ayuda para los buenos fines que se propone.

El juego realizado el domingo entre los equipos Cartago y Barcelona, ambos equipos de primeras divisiones, resultó un magnífico partido que dejó muy complacida a la afición limonense. El Barcelona, una vez más se clasificó como un campeón que se enfrenta a otro campeón. Tal vez en calidad hubo mejor quilataje en los cartagineses, pero en cuanto a coraje, los nuestros les igualaron y si el score nos fue adverso, eso lo achacamos a cosas del juego, ya que alguno tenía que ganar. Reconocemos que el Cartaginés juega más y con mejor entendimiento, ya que es un equipo de primeras divisiones en el interior y con eso queda dicho todo; pero debemos ser sinceros y reconocerle al Barcelona que jugó tanto como su adversario aunque otras circunstancias le impidieran adjudicarse el triunfo. El score de dos a tres indica que las acciones corrieron parejas. Pepe se clasificó esta tarde como un magnífico portero y hasta tuvimos oportunidad de oír favorables comentarios de su actuación de parte de los visitantes. Las defensas no estuvieron malos y la delantera no dejó de esforzarse aunque la hemos visto actuar mejor otras veces. Notamos en el primer tiempo falta de entendimiento entre el nueve inter derecho y Tenorio, pero el error se enmendó en el segundo tiempo en que se lograron acoplar mejor y obtener más rendimiento. Los cartagineses estuvieron activos durante los noventa minutos. Nos lleva ventaja esa muchachada en el coraje que debido a su abundante energía mantiene todo el tiempo. El buen clima cartaginés y más que todo el entusiasmo de la juventud, hace que esa gente permanezca activa todo el tiempo. No podemos noso-

tro- pedir eso a nuestros jugadores por varias circunstancias; primero porque este clima agota todas nuestras energías; segundo porque nuestros jugadores con muy pocas excepciones, amanecen en prangana el día que van a jugar y tercero porque el licor es el agua diaria en una gran mayoría y una vida desordenada no puede abundar en energías físicas.

Sin comentarios, da lástima ver como en la plaza presenciando un juego jugadores jóvenes expresen con la frescura más grande de la tierra una botella de "lijaja" a vista y paciencia de los presentes.

La traída de estos equipos como el Cartaginés, nos dejan mucha enseñanza y aunque sabemos de antemano que el triunfo no será nuestro, también estamos seguros de que una pérdida con un enemigo superior nos deja la lección para un nuevo encuentro. La colocación de las defensas, el cambio de puesto entre la línea de medios y aquellas, la posición de esas defensas cuando el guardameta está en apuros, la buena colocación de los delanteros, la actividad de un buen Half center y otras buenas jugadas producto del entrenamiento y la disciplina, nos enseñan más que cualquier seis a cero que podríamos anotarle

a un equipo de mala calidad. La jugada sobresaliente de este partido fue un trombudo chut hecho por Janson, que fue magistralmente apañado por Jiménez. Con este apañe solamente basta para comprender la clase de guardameta que tiene Cartaginés.


EL "JUPITER" EL SABADO ENTRANTE PARA GUAPILES

NOTAS EDITORIALES

A PROPOSITO DE UN POSIBLE NOMBRAMIENTO

De fuente que nos merece entero crédito, nos ha legado la noticia de que será designado para el cargo de Segundo Comandante de Plaza y Policía de esta ciudad, el caballero don Horacio Tasies Piñeiro, en sustitución del Coronel Rodríguez quien ha sido trasladado a Sixaola a un alto puesto.

Esta noticia, de ser cierta, tiene que ser muy grata para los limonenses. El señor Tasies es un viejo amigo de Limón. Aquí vive hace más de veinte años. De lealtad absoluta para el Partido Republicano Nacional, de indiscutible capacidad para el cargo y de un completo conocimiento del medio ambiente en que ha de moverse, ninguna designación puede ser más atinada que esta.

Pero, aparte del acierto que el nombramiento supone, por las capacidades y la honorabilidad del señor Tasies, es también un acto de justicia para los limonenses. Ello supone que el gobierno del licenciado Picado desarrollará un plan de administración en que habrá justicia y consecuencia política. Designar para los cargos administrativos en cada ciudad a personas radicadas en ellas.

Limón ha sido siempre el lugar de turismo de los empleados públicos. Aquí llegan de todas las otras provincias los funcionarios del gobierno a pasarse cuatro años de agradable veraneo, sin otra impedimenta que una valija y un pase de regreso. Algunos muy pocos se han quedado. Pero la inmensa mayoría pasaron por muchas altas posiciones sin interés y sin cariño por la provincia, indiferentes a todo problema. Y ese ir y venir de altos empleados es lo que ha hecho de Limón un pueblo de gigantes sin arraigo efectivo.

Muchísimos elementos de esos que pasaron por aquí en el curso de trienat años, se habrían quedado entre nosotros y serían ahora limonenses si los vaivenes políticos no los hubieran trasladado o destituido.

Si el nombramiento del señor Tasies, es el principio de esta nueva política de designar los empleados públicos entre los propios habitantes de cada lugar, habrá hecho el nuevo gobierno una labor meritoria. No es política de campenarismo ni provincialismo interesado, es justicia y deseo de estabilidad en una población que bien lo necesita.

Por lo demás, las becas municipales y del Estado, apenas favorecen a un reducido número de personas y el año pasado concluyeron sus estudios primarios alrededor de sesenta jóvenes y el año anterior un número semejante. También se observa que una de las principales razones por las que muchas familias dejan la ciudad y se arraigan en la provincia, es la falta de una institución como la que se trata de establecer. Sigue diciendo el Regidor Solé, que en casita todas las capitales de provincia existe colegio de segunda enseñanza y en algunas, como Puntarenas, ayudo económicamente por la Municipalidad. Atenas, que no es capital de provincia, lo tiene desde este año y Limón, que tan alejada queda de las ciudades que disfrutan de esa ventaja, lo necesita con mayor urgencia y la Municipalidad está llamada a velar por la enseñanza y contribuir dándole el apoyo moral, intelectual y material que se solicita. Para realizar tan laudable proyecto, la comisión, por su medio, propone y recomienda un plan que consiste en integrar una junta administrativa, que organizará la institución y un aporte en efectivo de la Corporación. La junta solicitará la cooperación del Estado, por medio de la Secretaría respectiva así como otro aporte económico y que la institución sea declarada oficial. Además, la Junta resolverá los demás aspectos de organización. Se pretende que este año empiece con un primer curso y se aumente progresivamente, pero que todo eso de inmediato pa-

ra que inicie sus labores el primero de Abril entrante. De sea el Regidor Solé dejar constancia, en nombre de la comisión, de que no se trata de liquidar la escuela de comercio que actualmente existe.

En su calidad de Regidor Municipal, el señor Solé hizo la siguiente moción: La Corporación haciéndose eco de lo que la mayoría de los limonenses desea, ACUERDA: 1) Establecer un Colegio de Segunda Enseñanza en Limón. 2) Para cooperar en el desarrollo de ese centro y mientras las condiciones fiscales no permitan un desembolso mayor, votar quinientos colones mensuales para auxiliarlo. 3) Solicitar a la Secretaría de Educación Pública le de su apoyo moral y material, declarándolo institución oficial. 4) Debiendo regirse el colegio, como los similares del país, por una Junta Administrativa y a fin de que en su integración intervenga el Estado, por medio de la Secretaría Respectiva, la Junta de Educación de esta ciudad y la Corporación Municipal, se sugiere sea integrada así: Un miembro propietario y un suplente, nombrados por la Secretaría de Educación Pública. Dicho miembro propietario tendrá la representación de la Secretaría en el seno de la Junta. Dos miembros propietarios y un suplente nombrados por la Junta de Educación de Limón. Dos miembros propietarios y un suplente nombrados por la Corporación Municipal. Uno de ellos será necesariamente un regidor. El cargo será honorífico y durará dos años. 5) A fin de que pueda realizarse este proyecto a la mayor brevedad, se excita a la Secretaría de Edu-

cación y Junta de Educación para que procedan inmediatamente a nombrar los miembros que integrarán la Junta. La moción del Regidor Solé fué aprobada por unanimidad y definitivamente. Con relación a este asunto, el señor presidente municipal envió a nota que se dispuso insertar íntegramente en el acta, la que fué leída antes de votarse la moción anterior y dice: "Limón, marzo 16 de 1943. Señor don Alfonso Solé, Vice presidente municipal. Ciudad. Muy estimado amigo: No udiendo asistir a la sesión de esta noche y siendo mi deseo el de cooperar en esta ciudad, quiero de usted y mis compañeros conozcan mi criterio al respecto. No ignoro, como creo que tampoco lo desconoce la mayoría de la población, que el problema que hoy confronta nuestra juventud, es demasiado serio: sólo los hijos de los ricos pueden realizar estudios secundarios. Y es mi deseo, como el de todos ustedes, que ricos y pobres tengan las mismas oportunidades de estudiar y formar así los hombres y las mujeres del mañana, sobre los cuales descansará el porvenir de la patria. Como ciudadano aplaudo el proyecto que ustedes discutieron esta noche y como representante de la comunidad ante esa corporación mi voto— de poder asistir— será favorable. Pero ya que con todo sentimiento no me es posible esa asistencia, siquiera conozcan ustedes mi manera de pensar. Cualquier disposición encaminada al logro de ese colegio y cualquier erogación que haya que hacer, contaré con todo mi apoyo. Le ruego informarlo así. Su afectísimo, amigo (f) Fulgencia

El Regidor Solé entregó a la Secretaría, para su lectura la siguiente nota: PARTICULAR: Mayo 8 de 1943. Señor Licenciado don Luis Demetrio Tinoco, Secretario de Educación Pública. San José. Muy estimado señor Secretario. Comisionado por mis compañeros de municipalidad don Fulgencio y don Alfonso Solé con nuestra reciente conversación, tengo el honor de remitirle adjunto los acuerdos tomados por esta Corporación en relación con el tan ansiado y necesario colegio de segunda enseñanza en la provincia de Limón. No dudo de que usted, que tantas pruebas ha dado en favor de nuestra enseñanza en general, nos brindará todo el apoyo necesario para que este colegio pueda iniciar sus labores en el próximo curso lectivo. Aprovecho la oportunidad para reiterar a usted en nombre de mis compañeros y en el mío propio, nuestro más sincero agradecimiento por la forma tan gentil con que nos oyó y atendió. Salud;ndolo

muy cordialmente, me suscribo su atento servidor y amigo, (f) Alfonso Solé L." Manifestó el regidor Solé que ha solicitado la lectura de esas piezas para recordar que la Municipalidad y los Regidores han cooperado en las gestiones tendiente y al establecimiento de un colegio de segunda enseñanza en la ciudad y lamenta que sea un empleado municipal el que olvide o ignore esas gestiones. Manifestó el señor Arrázola que al hacer la publicación que apareció en su periódica La Voz Atlántica, no citó al municipio por desconocer esas gestiones así como la nota del regidor Solé al señor Secretario de Educación, pero que por su olvido pide excusas y con gusto publicará todo en sección preferente en su semanario. A iniciativa del regidor Espinach se acordó: Publicar en la sección de La Voz Atlántica que para la Corporación, los documentos leídos.

A las 20 horas y 50 minutos terminó la sesión.

When they alighted, after the night mare drive, they counted eleven bullet holes in the car. Nobody quite knows, of course, how she managed it, but the ordeal she endured must have been terrific. For the part she played in the Bir Hakeim

action she was awarded the "Croix de Guerre" and also given the Colonial Medal.

Nurse Travers was recently asked to be an honorary corporal of the French Legion—a compliment not often bestowed on women. When the war broke out, she was staying in France so joined a French Ambulance unit. She has been to Finland, Dakar, Eritrea and Syria with the Fighting French and is still in North Africa.

NOTAS DE LA REPUBLICA DE NICARAGUA

A las nueve de la mañana del 22 de febrero de 1944, salieron de Managua con rumbo al Departamento de Boaco el Sr. Presidente de la República y su señora esposa doña Salvadorita O. de Somoza. COSTA RICA'S PRESIDENT ELECT GOES ON VISIT TO CANAL ZONE AND WASHINGTON

During the earlier forenoon hours of last Thursday, Costa Rica's President Elect, Lic. don Teodoro Picado, left by special air transportation for the Canal Zone, where he will be the guest of General Brett, the Officer in Command of the Canal Defences. It is expected that don

Teodoro will leave the Zone today for the United States of America, where he will be entertained at the White House in Washington as the guest of President Roosevelt. He will be accompanied by his brother don Rene Picado, and expects to be again in Costa Rica on the 27th instant.



ONCE AGAIN THE CRY

Our attention has again been called to the serious difficulties being experienced by the people who, fortunately or unfortunately, reside in the very industrious district served by the Limon - Zent branch line of the Northern Rail way Company.

We have been assured that the recent changes effected in the stopping points of the passenger and freight combination, which daily traverse this section of the Company's service, is seriously prejudicing the general interests of these people, the large majority of whom are struggling farmers. The cancelling of many of the former stops now compels shippers to transport their goods over inconvenient distances under all weather conditions and subjected to a number of mishaps. It also forces them to traverse the intervening mile or more, on foot, under a piping sun or heavy showers of rain to effect personal entrainment to attend matters of vital importance or to secure medical attention for a sick relative.

May we again direct the attention of the Company's Management to these hardships which face a very appreciable and hard working number of our people and the travelling public, with the sincere hope the matter will be accorded such further consideration as will bring about the greatest good for the greatest number.

SOVIETS NEAR FINAL VICTORY IN CRIMEA

The Germans are reported fighting desperately on both extremes of the vast southern front in Russia. The Soviets have broken the first line of fortifications which

guard Sebastopol and forced the Germans and Rumanians to retire further inland.

Large formations of the Soviet air service maintain continuous activities over the strategic position and along the routes giving access to the Black Sea. They are also effectively operating on the Rumanian littoral with the object of destroying the ships intended for Nazi evacuation. The forces under General Tolbukhin who hold the heights entirely dominate, we are told, the city, while those under General Yermenko are approaching from the southeast and have reached a point a little more than six kilometers of the stronghold. The enemy is resisting fiercely though it is felt without the slightest chance of success.

Fierce fighting is also reported in progress in Poland, where the Nazis have been counter-attacking southeast of the city of Stanislanov in an effort to save the vitally important base of Lwow, and place a check on the Russian advance westward.

Thirteen large German destroyed off this base during Thursday sunk in the Bay of Sebastopol; this gives a total of 50 enemy naval units destroyed off this base during the past two weeks.

TERRIFIC AIR RAIDS OVER GERMANY AND NA OCCUPIED TERRITORYSINGAPUR THREATENED

The reports reachings us daily, tell of incessant and terrific attacks by the aerial divisions of the Allied forces military and industrial areas under Nazi control.

Since Tuesday of the pre- have been discharged by not less than 9 000 planes of the British and North American forces over aviation factories, aerodromes, important communicating systems of the Reich and with elsewhere with dire effect.

The raid over Paris on the same night of Tuesday last is said to have caused the deaths of 640 persons and injuries to 1,700. In the noted city of Rouen 120 persons were killed, hundreds injured and thousands of houses destroyed. Many of the city's famous buildings of gothic construction were also destroyed including the famed cothedral. The historic market square

where Joan of Arc was burned was also among the ruined places.

The enemy aerodrome at Maleme in Crete also suffered heavily from an attack by bombers piloted by South Americans during the daylight last Wednesday.

A record force of more than 1,000 British bombers raised numerous important objectives from the coast of France to the heart of Germany last Thursday night. The enemy's lines of communications in south Italy were also hard hit.

JAPANESE INITIATE FURTHER OFFENSIVE IN CENTRAL CHINA

The Japanese have started their expected offensive in Central China with an attack against the Chinese forces in the sector of Chungmow, in the province of Honan. The object of the movement is said to be for the purpose of securing control of the railways systems.

Chinese reports declare that after receiving large reinforcements the enemy troops crossed the inundated region by three distinct routes and engaged their men in fierce fighting in the region of Paisha. The counter-attacks of the Chinese in Chonmow is stated to have caused the enemy considerable losses.

The Japanese advance has reached a point about 20 kilometers southeast of Chenchow, where violent fighting is in progress.

SINGAPUR THREATENED

The information has been released by the British Admiralty that during the early morning hours of last Wednesday, Allied naval air units bombarded the Japanese base of Sabang located north of Sumatra and in the vicinity of the strategic stronghold of Singapur now held by the Japanese.

The attack was such a surprise for the Japs. that the base was converted into a heap of destroyed planes and ruined fortifications. It is es-

BRITAIN'S AID TO U.S.A. UNDER REVERSE LEND - LEASE

Britain is reported to have spent more than \$ 526,170,000 on goods and services given the United States of America, under reverse lend-lease, during a period of eighteen months ending last December. This amount provided, we are told, a third of the supplies required by the American forces in the United Kingdom, thereby saving more than 1,360,000 ship tons.

In addition to this large-scale aid, which covered \$ 548,000,000 on constructions for the American troops, nearly \$ 700,000,000 on goods and services

transferred both within and out of Britain, as also \$ 1,000,000 on shipping services. reverse lent lease was possible for many comforts for individual American soldiers while in camp or when on the move.

The cost of airfields and depots for the RAF represented about \$ 473,000,000, of which only \$ 40,000,000 will be the account of the United States. A quantity of construction material for the fields, hospitals, barracks, workshops, hotel offices built for the Americans represent 2,180,000 tons.

The Dean was appointed Rector of the parish of St. George, Georgetown, by the late Bishop Parry and arrived in the Colony in December 1930. He has been a member of the Diocesan Council and the Governing Body for schools since 1931 and is, at present, the Vice President of the Young Men Christian Association as also a member of the Organization's Board of Governors.

CHANGE IN NATIONAL CHANCE LOTTERY DRAWINGS

We have been afforded the information that a change will shortly take place in connection with the drawings of the "Popular" Lottery or "Chances".

As is well known, the "Popular" scheme was established some time ago, in an effort to eliminate the illegal game then so widely indulged in throughout the country, in conjunction with the National Lottery of the neighbouring Republic of Panama, and which was having financial interests of our Azeilo Chapui Lottery. Drawings for the "Chances" take place each Sunday, regardless of that of the regular Lottery. So popular has this "Popular" System become

that it is said to be making serious inroads in the sales of the regular System. After, therefore, fully considering the matter, the Junta de Protección Social of San Jose, who have charge of both operations, have decided that the drawings in connection with the "Popular" will only take place on the Sundays on which there are none for the Azeilo Chapui Scheme.

It has also been stated in view of the speculative prices now charged, in different localities, for the "Chance" tickets, a much larger number of tickets will be issued for each serie. It is expected the change will take effect on the 14th. of the coming month of May.

H. R. H. PRINCESS ELIZABETH - HEIRESS TO BRITAIN'S CROWN



Yesterday, 21 April, Princess Elizabeth of Great Britain reached her eighteenth birthday and, in conformity with recent legislation, officially attained her majority. Not only the people of the United Kingdom, but also those Britons living in the Dominions and Colonies which form the British Commonwealth of Nations and all other Britons abroad have felt the deepest interest in this young woman who one day will be their Queen. This is a red-letter-day for the Princess, since henceforth when occasion arises she can act as official deputy for her father, King George VI, should he go abroad. This means that at an age when other young people are attending their university courses, Princess Elizabeth may be called upon to fulfill the arduous and difficult tasks which are her heritage, and for which she is being properly trained. Her royal parents have always lived a happy, family life and her education has therefore been ideal. The King and Queen have cared for the upbringing of the two princesses—since Princess Margaret Rose, her younger sister, has always been an inseparable companion, particularly since October 1940 when Princess Elizabeth spoke for the first time before the microphone, and the soft voice of the younger princess also was heard at the end of the broadcast as they both said goodbye to the juvenile audience. Princess Elizabeth's childhood was happy and on the same lines as that of any normal, healthy young person. She was taught at home by Miss Harion Crawford of Edinburgh University. Naturally the princess had to devote more attention to her studies than do many other students, but prior to the war she still had plenty of time for games and recreation. She is an excellent horsewoman and frequently accompanies her father in his rides in the neighborhood of Windsor Castle. Her princesses enjoy bicycling but it is always

Elizabeth, as the elder sister, who arranges their games and outings. Her public appearances so far have been few but sufficient to give her the bearing and confidence necessary in the future. At 11 years of age, Princess Elizabeth joined the Girl Guides and like any other member gained by merit her badges and promotion. Since war broke out, she has of course had the opportunity of speaking personally with her heroic compatriots from the Army, the Navy and the Air Force and has learnt the hard realities of the world conflict. She possesses a natural dignity derived from the simplicity and sweetness of her heart, and her character shows a warm human sympathy combined with firm understanding of her duties.

When some 200,000 British girls of 16 years of age registered under the British Youth Plan, Princess Elizabeth was among the first to give in her name.

For her sixteenth birthday, her parents arranged a party in her honour, and shortly afterwards, in her own right as Colonel-in-Chief of the famous Grenadier Guards, she invited the members of the Regiment to a private ball. With her large, intelligent greyish blue eyes, her curly chestnut hair and her slender, graceful figure, the princess is extraordinarily attractive, whilst her gentle smile captivates everyone who has the honour of meeting her. Today Princess Elizabeth is earnestly studying all branches of endeavour including music. She is already fulfilling public duties and is preparing herself in every way to assume the burdens of the future if Destiny should call her to the Throne of Great Britain.

FATEFUL DAY

Fifty-five years ago last Thursday there was born in the Bohemian township of Brounov (corrupted by the Germans into Braunau) a freak who has since achieved two of the most notorious distinctions accorded to any human being in one lifetime.

First, he made himself Humanity's Enemy No 1, and secondly, though involuntarily, he has succeeded in welding thirty-four civilised nations into a steel-clad confraternity determined to smash once and for all the single nation whose petulant arrogance, overbearing behavior and insolence throughout the ages have unleashed incessant warfare for the sole purpose of lording it over the entire world and enslaving all other nations. This creature, one of the most sinister megalomaniacs who ever saw the light, to whom one can hardly apply the name of human—being, is known as "Adolph Hitler" the mistimed "Fuehrer" of the so-called "Third Reich". He it was who, in an access of incredible vanity, said a few years ago, when the presages of this second world war were already gathering: "I want to fight at 50 years of age, while still young, and not as a greybeard of 70". He it was who set in motion the most powerful war-machine yet devised, knowing full well that other nations neither wanted war nor were prepared for it. And he it is who now is in the course of reaping the whirlwind which he himself sowed. He wanted to fight while he was young, and forced the democracies of the world to show therefore that they were younger and more virile than he and all his professional armies trained during the long years of uneasy peace. Now, at the age of 55, he can sit in Berchtesgaden and contemplate the imminent fall of his country, whose pride and insolence have drawn against themselves the inexorable judgment of the united races of mankind—"Delenda est Germania" (Germany must be shattered).

At the moment it passes over, you will know that the plane was travelling at about the speed of sound. The noise and the plane will have reached you at the same moment. If you should see a plane pass over you, and then should continue to hear its roar coming from the direction from which the plane came, after it has gone in the opposite direction, you will know that it is flying faster than sound the sound will be lagging behind, and still be reaching you after the plane has gone. Do not expect these experiences, in the immediate future.

BRITISH FORESIGHT

The cruiser "HMS Jamaica", which fired one of the torpedoes which finished off the "Scharnhorst", actually represented the "Scharnhorst" in one of the many mock battles that were carried out by the Home Fleet of the Royal Navy, to prepare itself for the great day when it would meet the "Scharnhorst" in real combat. The exercise in which the "Jamaica" played the part of the "Scharnhorst" followed in a remarkable degree the course of battle during the actual engagement. In this exercise, the "Jamaica" adopted the same tactics that the "Scharnhorst" adopted later when she met the Home Fleet. Likewise, the cruisers and destroyers and the battleship "Duke of York" followed the same tactics they followed during the battle.

At one time or another nearly all the ships that took part in the final action also took part in the anti-"Scharnhorst" exercises. In these mock battles by the Home Fleet, every possible action and tactic the "Scharnhorst" might employ was rehearsed. The possibility of her attacking a convoy, engaging units of the Home Fleet, or trying to reach the Baltic were all tried out; also the possibility that she would put to sea with other ships was foreseen; the exercise had to act as if half a dozen German destroyers were all ready in Alten Fjord to protect her.

NEW AIR ROUTES

Though little has been heard of the great air route and aerodrome development undertaken by Britain, much work has been done in developing new routes, extending airfields and creating new strategic bases. Perhaps the greatest development has been in Africa, where the Government has spent between \$ 6,000,000 and \$ 8,000,000 since 1940 largely in creating a reinforcement route from Takoradi, in the west, to the Middle East. In all, forty airfields, flying-boat bases and landing grounds have been provided in the four West African Colonies. The four airfields in British West Africa which are being used extensively by the United States Forces were all developed by the Colonial Governments, with assistance from the British Government. In 1941 the British and Indian Governments decided to establish an alternative route between India and the Middle East. Much airfield extension work has been completed in Egypt, the Sudan and in Gibraltar as well as in Iceland. Of the capital expenditure of \$ 2,460,000,000 involved in the provision of new airfields, camps and depots in Britain to

INTERNATIONAL INFORMATION COUNCIL

In a paper read to the British Society for International Bibliography, "A Plan for Mobilizing Bibliographical References to the Contents of the World's Non-Fiction Literature" it was proposed that in order that valuable information on subjects which might appear in unexpected types of literature should not be lost by incomprehensive classification and recording, an International Information Council should be set up. This council should include representatives of national information committees, and these again should be made up of national information bureaux, each dealing in a specialized subject, who should carry out the work of recording the contents of national literature. These national organizations should be intended to serve government departments as well as the public, and should be subsidized by government funds. The bibliographical reference should be subject-classified in a standard international code and on receiving the material the national committee should classify it and the various bureaux should send copies of the references to their opposite numbers in other countries by air. It is suggested as a start that an Anglo-Soviet-American organization should initiate the work.

MAPS

Every battle begins on a map. Maps are thus the very first weapons of war. They are an essential part of the equipment not only of the G. H. Q., but of virtually every officer in the field. England has, for years, been a producer of first-class maps and has been able to apply a great amount of expert experience to keeping the British Army supplied—and not only the British Army but the American Forces. Under Mutual Aid Lend-Lease, Britain supplies all of the maps used by the U. S. Army and the U. S. A. A. F. in Britain or based on Britain, and most of the maps used by the U. S. forces in the Mediterranean theatre.
