Aquí la mayoría de los agricultores son parásitos de tierras del Estado y la Compañía Bananera, apenas pueden sembrar en las horas libres de su labor en otras fincas. Las pequeñas parcelas que siembran no pueden darles el sustento. Si no les ayuda el Banco con dinero no pueden extender sus cultivos. Es necesario también facilitarles herramientas y semillas para formar las fincas con productos que paguen el trabajo.

Todas estas cosas pueden organizarse en el nuevo gobierno. El país tiene puesta toda su esperanza en la labor de la futura Secretaría de Agricultura. En estos momentos de crisis solo una producción intensa puede salvarnos de un desastre de enormes proporciones.



LIC. DON FRANCISCO FONSECA CHAMIER ELECTED VICE - PRESIDENT NATIONAL CONGRESS

The newly constituted national Congress which well function during the 1944-1948 constitutional period, held its inaugural session last Monday, the 1st. of the current month amid the usual impressive ceremonials, and witnessed by an unusually large throng of interested spectators drawn, no doubt, from the thousands of visitors to the Capital for the "May Day" celebrations.

The election of the administrative personnel was effected and resulted in Lic. don Jose Albertazzi Avendaño, who had served the previous Congress as First Secretary, being elevated to the all important position of President with that of the Vice Presidency falling to Lic. Francisco Fonseca Chamier, one of the two Depu-

ties who represent the particular interests of our Province before that legislative Body.

We tender our sincere congratulations to both legislators, but more especially to the latter, for as we previously stated, his election

to the exalted position is regarded by his fellow Limonenses as evidence of the high regard had for his personal attributes and legislative qualifications.

The "Atlantic Voice" wishes them and the entire personnel a period of much success.

JAPANESE CONTINUE ADVANCE IN CHINA

Chunking reports that violent fighting is still in progress 65 miles south of Cheng Hsien in the province of Honan, and that the enemy are continuing their advance southward, along the Peiping — Hankow railway, and have reached the region of Yenchen, while another force are on their northward from Sinyang. A third Japanese force is said to be operating one hundred

kilometers west of the railway.

Ten thousand enemy troops are reported to have surrounded Yuhsien, while others have occupied Kiasin located 130 kilometers southwest of Chengchow, also Mingkang — forty miles north of Hsiyang.

New Delhi states that the Allied authorities are fully satisfied with the present general situation on the fighting fronts in southeast Asia, especially in Burma, where a decided improvement has been effected and a big enemy defeat momentarily expected.

An exceptionally large Japanese force is strenuously endeavouring to maintain their position in north Burma, but their efforts have all been defeated and their position is now said to be very precarious. This region is regarded as of great strategic importance as it will enable the Allies to unite with the Chinese and prepare the way for direct operations against the main territory of Japan.

The Australian Premier estimates the loss Japanese soldiers in the southwest Pacific at over 100,000 as well as between 140-160 war vessels, 200-270 merchant ships and about 6,000 aircraft.

THE CORN DRYING PLANT

From time to time, we have referred to the efforts under way by the National Department of Agriculture for the purpose of improving the conditions of the planters of the Old Line region of our Province, particularly with respect to the Corn Industry.

As it well known this entire section of our Atlantic Zone is admirably adapted to the cultivation of this article of prime necessity in the dietary of our people, but the producers have always suffered serious financial difficulties on account of the frequent rains and their inability to properly safeguard their crops. In order to overcome this difficulty, and in keeping with their progressive activities in Costa Rica the Division of the Institute of Inter-American Affairs, which directs special attention to food production, was reported to have concluded arran-

gements with our Governing authorities for the importation and erection of a Drying Plant of sufficient capacity to handle both the Corn and other products grown in this area.

ALLIED AIRCRAFT PREPARE WAY FOR INVASION OF EUROPE

Pursuing their devastating raids over the enemy's strategic positions and industrial centers in Germany and the occupied territories the British and North Amer-

ican air forces have intensely augmented their activities during the past several days and nights, giving special attention to the Nazi defence system and their

food and military deposits. During the night of last Wednesday large squadrons operating from England and Italy dealt heavy blows on a number of important points scattered over a wide area, in Germany, France and Holland.

Air units of the Mediterranean division are also, effectively operating over Bucharest, the Dalmatian coast, and a number of strategic positions in Italy. The attack on Bucharest is said to have been made by four motored units, which caused a tremendous amount of damage to the railway system in the city area.

Allied military circles are of the opinion that the recent aerial attacks have destroyed a very high percentage of Germany's aviation industry, as also the vital railway system and must seriously affect the defence planned by Hitler against the coming invasion.

5,000 lives were supposed lost as the result of the aerial attack on Treviso, where a military parade is said to have been taking place in honour of von Ribbentrop and General Graziani.

Intense activities are reported from Italy where the aerial units launched an unusually sharp offensive against the principal enemy bases and communicating lines in the north of the country, particularly along the western coast.

St. MARK'S SCOUTS AUGMENT SPLENDID ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The magnificent display of the Boy and Girl Scouts of St. Mark's witnessed last Tuesday afternoon, on their return from San Jose, where they had augmented their splendid accomplishments in Scouting, was self evident of the brilliant representation in the Capital. BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

Mass Education for 40,000,000 African People

The principle that education should be adapted to the aptitudes, occupations and traditions of primitive colonial peoples and should aim at producing leaders of the people belonging to their own race, was laid down in a Colonial Office paper on education policy in 1935. The Advisory Committee on Education in the Colonies, set up by the Colonial Office, has now issued a Report which proposes more comprehensive action than has ever hitherto been undertaken. It proposes that mass education of the... 40,000,000 people of British Tropical Africa should be undertaken, the first stage being the elimination of illiteracy within a given time — the period of two to three decades is suggested. This mass education shall embrace both adults and children, and women as well as men. The ending of illiteracy is not in itself the aim but only the spearhead of the campaign, which will be centered around the particular problems as well as the local traditions of the various peoples. Essential to the scheme is the "active and understanding participation of the community itself". The cooperation of all groups working in African administration and welfare and particularly all educated Africans and returning soldiers is urged as well as the use of all the various educational techniques which have lately been evolved, such as broadcasting, the cinema, mobile libraries and so on. The aim of this proposal for speedy and widespread development of education is to secure the goal already stated by the Government as (1) the improvement of the health and living conditions of the people; (2) the improvement of their well-being in the economic sphere; (3) the development of political institutions and political power until the day arrives when the people can become effectively self-governed.

Barbados Agricultural Development

Under the Colonial Development and Welfare Act the British Treasury has made a number of grants to the Barbados. The most important is £ 172,000 for the extension of the Agricultural Department. This grant will materially help in advancing the standard of peasant agriculture in the Colony. It is of great importance that this should be done for here are over 18,000 peasant

Japan's Transportation Difficulties

Japan is faced with acute transportation difficulties which threaten to cripple her war effort, according to reports of the Tokio radio, which reveal official anxiety over Japan's ability to supply her outpost garrisons and to feed her people at home.

The crisis comes under two readings: a shortage of shipping, owing principally to sinkings of Japanese merchant ships by Allied submarines and Japan's inability to keep pace with her losses, and an overburdened railway system hard pressed to comply with new requirements such as evacuating Japan's main cities and feeding her scattered population.

Japan's critical shortage of shipping has been admitted repeatedly by Japanese officials. Indeed, Premier Tojo told the Diet that the losses in shipping could not be minimised and that he was endeavouring to reduce them by strengthening both sea and air protection and by stepping up ship building. Home Minister Ando revealed how tightly Japan is feeling the pinch when he disclosed that rice no longer could be imported from Indo-China, Thailand and Burma and that Japan would have to be self sufficient at home. It may be assumed that Japan's loss in shipping tonnage now amounts to approximately 3,300,000 tons. Against this must be set Japan's replacement capacity, estimated at between 500,000 and 800,000 tons a year or about 300,000 tons in the interval, so her total losses may be about 3,000,000 tons. The transportation crisis inside Japan appears to be equally acute and has prompted a series of regulations rationing travel even for military men and government personnel and banning all non-essential travel. Railways are to be used to transport troops and war supplies, to evacuate city populations to rural areas and to carry food and urgently needed commodities.

Negro Jonah Still Smiles

Harold Harper has led one of the most remarkable lives, but then he is a remarkable man. Everything seems to have happened to him and yet he manages to keep smiling and is determined to fight the Nazis to his last breath. He had studied languages at Berlin University in 1914 and had joined Messrs. Thomas Cook as an interpreter — for he speaks Arabic, Greek, Gaelic, Icelandic, French, German, Russian, Japanese, Hindustani, and Basuto. He was on his way to Ireland when the first war broke out and the Germans torpedoed his ship. More ghastly though was the next blow which came to Harper in the Skagerrak straits off Denmark when he was serving as a seaman aboard an ammunition ship. A second German torpedo came along and the whole ship went up, killing 1200.

In April 1942, Harper was in Malta and again subjected to constant bombing. Here he saw little children machine-gunned in a bathing pool by a Nazi plane and, despite all the agony that he himself has suffered, he says that this incident outwings all others in heaping coal upon his constant fire of hatred for the Germans. On the way back from Malta he was torpedoed again. Altogether, he has had six ships blown from under him. Now he has joined the merchant marine as a cook. Here is a Negro who knows the full horrors of war and whose personal history can only be an inspiration to all of his race to fight on until Hitler and all his works are utterly destroyed.

Progress

It is not generally realised that practically every camera in the Hollywood studios is equipped with British lenses. That is no new development; it merely illustrates the success achieved by Britain's optical glass-makers in the years between the wars.

Recent research in Britain has proved of real war benefit. For example the time-schedule for the annealing of glass has been substantially shortened. A further development has meant much saving of time, material, and labour. Not so long ago, the highest quality glass for the most powerful and accurate instruments could only be obtained by sawing the glass from large blocks that had emerged from the "pts." Now, by new methods of annealing, it is possible to secure glass of the highest quality by moulding.

Anti-Nazi Activity

Demonstrations and strikes have taken place in Southern Jutland, Denmark, during the past few days.

Popular anti-nazi sentiment reached the boiling point when a bridge in Soenderborg was shelled by a German warship, killing a Danish worker. The bridge had not been raised to allow the ship to pass.

Big crowds demonstrated in the streets of Soenderborg, forcing the shops to close. Thousands participated in the slain worker's funeral procession. Clashes with the German troops ensued. So serious was the street fighting that Germans resorted to barbed wire entanglements. Several arrests were made.

A Bull and a Goat

Recently, a survey ship was making a chart of an inlet in the tropics. According to custom a party was given on board for the native chiefs. The gun was fired in their honour. They were delighted — so delighted, in fact, that they presented the Commanding Officer with a live bull and a goat.

One officer was sent native canoe to serve a small over on the African coast, a precaution he took a revolver, although as he said himself, he had never fired at anything more than a few fish. On this occasion he fired into the water and saw something wriggle. One of the native boys dived down to see what it was. He came up with a 21 ft. long python. By a million-to-one chance the officer had shot in clean through the head. He took the skin home and it made a fine handbag and shoes for his wife, for the war to compit.

Another incident took place before the war. To complete a survey in the Persian Gulf it was necessary to send an officer, a petty officer and some men to a certain hill top. As the natives were not friendly, it was decided to put a party ashore at night. Next day the natives discovered what had been done, and set out to capture the party. Covered by the muzzle-loaders of the natives they were brought back to a village near the shore. On board the survey vessel, the Commanding Officer ordered the gun to be uncovered and brought to the ready. A full-armed platoon was then landed to rescue the "prisoners" which it did successfully after a short palaver.
