LOS SINDICATOS VUELVEN A DIRIGIRSE AL BANCO DE SEGUROS SOLICITANDO una OFICINA EN ESTA CIUDAD

Limón, 19 de mayo de 1944

Sr. don Andrés Brenes Mata
Gerente del Banco de Seguros

San José.

Muy señor nuestro:

Permitame volver a distraer la atención y quitarle tiempo de su trabajo y entrar a considerar la grave situación de los asegurados de esta Zona.

Empezaré por manifestarle señor Gerente, la imperiosa necesidad de que el Banco tenga por lo menos un empleado para atender todos los asuntos relacionados con los trabajadores asegurados, según informes que se han suministrado, antes existía un empleado para estos fines y con suficiente autorización hasta para hacer los pagos previa consulta a San José en casos de alguna duda, tales consultas la hacía este empleado por la vía telefónica resolviéndose rápidamente el pago a los derechos que tienen, la resolución del Banco para no continuar haciéndose estas operaciones en Limón está perjudicando a los trabajadores que necesitan el inmediato pago de su dinero, los mayormente perjudicados son los trabajadores de la línea que, saliendo del hospital sin un cinco en el bolsillo y todavía enfer-

mos tengan que volver a los ocho días para recibir lo que les corresponda. El nuevo sistema adoptado por el Banco de Seguros de enviar de San José y por escrito la autorización, no se justifica toda vez que el trabajador necesita cuando sale del hospital o está enfermo y no cuando ya está trabajando; consideramos que el Banco debe mantener un empleado atendiendo todos los casos de su incumbencia. Qué razón hay señor Gerente para que los trabajadores tengan que sufrir esta disposición del Banco? No considera usted justo que debe haber un empleado atendiendo todas estas situaciones que hoy le expongo?

En esta ocasión señor Gerente, le estoy demostrando mis afirmaciones anteriores de que tengo razón para pedir del Banco mayor y mejor atención a sus asegurados.

Espero que usted estará de esta vez de acuerdo con mi criterio y ponga toda su buena voluntad y empeño por resolver cuanto antes esta situación por el bien de los asegurados y del mismo Banco de quien es usted su digno gerente.

SE LE FIJO PRECIO AL MAIZ PRODUCIDO EN LA ZONA ATLANTICA

EN UNA IMPORTANTE REUNION ENTRE LOS MIEMBROS DE LA DIRECTIVA DEL BANCO NACIONAL, DE LA JUNTA CENTRAL DE ABASTOS Y DOS PERSONEROS DEL INSTITUTO DE ASUNTOS INTERAMERICANOS, SE HIZO TAL FIJACION, QUE SERA DE 90 COLONES LA FANEGA DEL AMARILLO Y DE 100 COLONES DEL BLANCO

Se verificó una importante reunión entre los miembros de la Directiva del Banco Nacional de Costa Rica, los de la Junta Central de Abastos y dos personeros del Instituto de Asuntos Interamericanos.

Como se sabe, este instituto posee en Guácimo una secadora y en vista de que la producción de maíz está por recogerse, había necesidad de fijarle o señalarle precio a ese producto. A eso debióse la reunión. Después de discutirse varios aspectos del asunto se acordó hacer tal fijación de precio mínimo a pa-

gar al productor, quedando señalados los siguientes valores: la fanega de maíz amarillo deberá ser pagada a razón de ₡ 90.00, y el maíz blanco a ₡ 100.00 la fanega. Para mayor facilidad del agricultor se dispuso que la Secretaría de Agricultura ceda a éstos sacos aparentes a razón de ₡ 2.00 cada uno. Además, también con el afán de favorecer al productor se dispuso que el maíz sea entregado en la estación más próxima al sitio de producción con flete a cobrar, en la secadora. Como se comprenderá este maíz deberá ser entregado a los dueños de dicha secadora en mazorca.



NOTAS EDITORIALES

CAMPAÑA CONTRA EL MERODEO

La Inspección Provincial de Hacienda, a cargo del General Ricardo Monge, ha emprendido desde hace días, una intensa batida contra el merodeo que es mal endémico en la provincia de Limón

Era necesaria esa actitud enérgica. Nuestra pequeña agricultura nunca ha podido surgir, porque la indiferencia de los de arriba y el hurto de los de abajo, hacen nulo todo esfuerzo para trabajar la tierra. En ninguna finca de los alrededores de Limón pueden sus propietarios recoger más de un veinte por ciento de sus escasas cosechas. El resto es para quienes los visitan en la noche, arrancando sin consideración cuanto encuentran vendible.

La falta de caminos hace por otra parte casi imposible una vigilancia adecuada. La ley de merodeo resulta buena en la teoría. Llevar la a la práctica sin un personal suficiente es la dificultad con que tropiezan las autoridades

No obstante estas tropiezos, el esfuerzo llevado a cabo por el General Monge y su personal del Resguardo, es muy digno de aplauso. Si se persiste con energía y se extiende a los otros resguardos, puede ser un poderoso auxiliar de nuestro resurgimiento agrícola en lo que se refiere a los pequeños productores.

Hasta el momento, desde el diecisiete de Mayo al veintidós del mismo mes, han sido detenidos nueve sospechosos. La proporción no puede ser más desconsoladora. Ella puede dar una idea de como se halla extendido este delito entre nosotros.

Si las autoridades judiciales a quienes corresponde el juzgamiento de los culpables, les aplican la ley con toda energía, se completará la meritoria labor que está llevando a cabo el señor Inspector Provincial de Hacienda, y que nosotros aplaudimos muy sinceramente.

LOS INTELLECTUALES Y LA RESISTENCIA

Todo lo dicho valga para los intelectuales franceses que han preferido resistir al invasor dentro del territorio nacional. Los hay que han emigrado al extranjero por razones varias.

No estando en nuestro propósito prejuzgar ligeramente al respecto invocamos la palabra autorizada de Jean Perrin, distinguida personalidad francesa, fallecida en los Estados Unidos el 17 de abril de 1942.

¿Quién era Jean Perrin? Baste decir, únicamente, que era de aquellos que no creía en los sabios enclaustrados en su torre de marfil. No concebía el pensamiento científico como un valor extraño a la cultura popular. Consideraba el esfuerzo del investigador como ligado al de los trabajadores de todo orden e influyendo e influenciándose al mismo tiempo con las múltiples formas de la vida. Estimaba que en las horas graves de la sociedad, el profesor como el obrero, el campesino como el ciudadano, sin consideraciones de rangos sociales, tenía el derecho de emitir su opinión. En tiempos normales—según él—uno de los deberes más urgentes del hombre de ciencia era de difundir el resultado de sus estudios y de formularlo con perfecta claridad a objeto de hacerlo accesible a los profanos.

Producida la crisis europea, Perú se contó entre los que salieron de su país. Pero él se caracterizaba por una in-

tegridad intelectual demasiado seria, para no esforzarse en comprender las ventajas y las inconveniencias de una elección dubitativa, entre "quedarse o partir". Tres semanas antes de su muerte, declaró lo que sigue:

"El éxodo no es moralmente posible, más que después de un examen de conciencia y que contemple todos los ser vicios que se pueden rendir, ya sea quedándose o partiendo. Es por esto, tal vez con desconcierto de muchos, que intelectuales franceses eminentes—habiendo podido partir en el momento del armisticio—optaron por permanecer en el país, con la creencia de que así salvaban a Francia. Cito, a este respecto, a mi estimado amigo Langevin, quien, entonces, rehusó abandonar la dirección de la gran

escuela de enseñanza superior, semillero de sabios e investigadores, y en la cual pudo hasta hacer poco salvaguardar la tradición. Como ya se sabe, desgraciadamente, los alemanes terminaron por prenderle y le mantieron todavía en residencia forzada. En resumen, aunque se piensa que tal vez Langevin hubiera hecho mejor de partir, yo reconozco que él obró de tal suerte por motivos altamente respetables".

En todo caso, por nuestra parte, opinamos que el balance moral de la intelectualidad francesa le es favorable. Los impuros se pueden contar en su seno con los dedos de la mano. Sus congéneres de los demás países no pueden menos de sentirse que legítimamente confortados sobre esta materia.

It is understood that this procedure has been promulgated with a view of detecting praedial thieves. This phase of the order is all right, but

was not extended prior to its enforcement. Every farmer is now obligated, we gather to have on his person the prescribed form of identification, when coming from their farms with produce. We hope this new effort will have the much desired effect, though we are inclined to think there is the possibility of the dishonest cultivator seizing it as a license to further rob his fellowmen of the fruit of their hard labour.

¿TEME HITLER EL ASAUTO A DINAMARCA?

La visita del mariscal Erwin Rommel, el mes pasado, ha hecho creer que los alemanes temen una invasión a través de la pequeña nación escandinava. La toma del puerto de Esbjerg sería una gran amenaza para el sistema defensivo alemán, y colocaría a las tropas aliadas a cuarenta millas de las fronteras del Reich

La visita inesperada del mariscal Erwin Rommel a Dinamarca, en la segunda semana de diciembre, es una de las más reveladoras indicaciones recientes que sugieren que los nazis esperan una pronta invasión aliada en Dinamarca, precisamente por una de las vías más cortas a Berlín.

Se declaró oficialmente en Copenhague que el mariscal había inspeccionado las defensas alemanas en Jutlandia por orden de Adolfo Hitler. Fue acompañado por un estado mayor compuesto de expertos en fortificaciones. Más específicamente, un despacho de Suecia dijo que Rommel había girado una visita a Esbjerg, el único puerto de importancia en la costa oeste de Jutlandia. Antes de la guerra, Esbjerg, era el principal puerto de exportación para los productos agrícolas que salían de Dinamarca hacia Inglaterra, y también la principal entrada para los productos que venían de este último país.

Hoy, Esbjerg, es un pilar, perfectamente fortificado, de la "muralla del Atlántico" de Hitler. Este puerto pesquero, un día activo, ahora está muerto, y toda la vida de sus 35 mil habitantes ha sido transformada para ayudar a los fines de guerra. Los hoteles, las escuelas y muchos edificios privados se han requisado, para la guar-

nición alemana, que ha aumentado en grandes proporciones recientemente. Muchos civiles que no se necesitaban en las industrias de guerra de la ciudad, han sido evacuados por los alemanes.

EL PUERTO DE ESBJERG

La captura de Esbjerg por los aliados constituiría una amenaza capital para el sistema defensivo alemán y pondría a nuestros ejércitos a 40 millas de las fronteras del Reich. El viaje de inspección de Rommel a esa área indicó que los alemanes están completamente al tanto de esta amenaza potencial y sus implicaciones.

Si nembargo, no puede haber duda de que un intento de desembarco en Esbjerg sería una empresa harto arriesgada y costosa. La entrada al puerto está protegida por la gran isla fortificada de Fanoe y la península de Skallingen. Entre ellas, un estrecho canal dragado conduce desde el agitado Mar del Norte hasta el



von Haneken y su estado mayor, están todavía en Silkeborg. El doctor Werner Best, ministro alemán en Dinamarca — en verdad, ahora es el gobernador nazi de ese país — se ha trasladado también de Copenhague a utlandia, y varios departamentos del gobierno danés han sido obligados, por los alemanes, a enviar parte de su empleomanía a Silkeborg.

Antes de abandonar la capital se informa que el doctor Best le hizo saber, al director del ministerio de relaciones exteriores danés, Niels Syningensen, que él esperaba que los ingleses intentarían invadir a Jutlandia dentro de

unas cuantas semanas.

Al mismo tiempo que los nazis demuestran bastante temor a una invasión aliada por Dinamarca, un periódico sueco observa justamente que los alemanes recientemente, han dado a la publicidad, en vez de ocultarlos, sus preparativos defensivos en Jutlandia. La razón de esta publicidad es muy simple. Aunque pueden ser bastante temibles, las fortificaciones alemanas de la costa occidental danesa, en el presente, no son tan formidables como las que se alzan frente a los ejércitos aliados de invasión en otros sectores del frente del Atlántico. Se requiere mucho tiempo para construir defensas costeras verdaderamente fuertes y las que hay en la costa de Jutlandia se comenzaron en una fecha comparativamente reciente. Por eso los nazis atraen la atención hacia el hecho de que este punto débil en la "muralla del Atlántico" ha sido fortalecido y hecho inepugnable ahora.

Es perfectamente posible que el viaje del mariscal Rommel a Esbjerg y Copenhague tuviera el mismo propósito. Es probable que Hitler mandara a su mariscal favorito a Dinamarca no porque su presencia se necesitase allí, sino porque, para fines de publicidad, no hay otro militar igual a Rommel en el ejército alemán.

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

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UNPRECEDENT AIR RAIDS OVER GERMANY AND NAZI OCCUPIED EUROPE

On Wednesday last, the sixth day of their consecutive monstrous aerial offensive against Germany and the occupied territories, the outstanding number of 6,500 Allied airplanes, raided many of the enemy's more important military centers and effected damages of a most serious character.

No less than 6,000 tons of explosives were rained over airbases, factories, railways and other military objectives. The important Nazi Capitals of Berlin, Paris and Vienna experienced disastrous attacks. The aviation factories in Niberdorf, and Graz in Austria, as also those of Zagreb in Yugoslavia suffered heavily.

The day's operations include several violent aerial encounters and resulted in the loss to Germany of 34 machines. The Allied loss was a total of 45, which the competent authorities regard as very small, in view of the successes achieved and the unprecedented number of planes which were in operation.

On Thursday last, violent attacks were launched against important enemy installations in south France. Strategic military positions in Italy were also the objectives of intensive raids by 3,300 of the planes of the Mediterranean force. 55 Nazi planes were destroyed against 31 for the Allies.

IMPORTANT ALLIED VICTORIES IN ITALY

The troops of the Fifth and Eighth Armies are reported to have gained important victories during the course of the past few days.

Effectively aided by tanks, the Canadians of the Eighth, who operate in the valley of Liri, broke the Hitler Line and crossed the river Melfa.

Moving by way of the mountains, the North American troops of the Fifth attacked and captured the important position of Terracina on Wednesday last. The capture of this place is regarded as of extraordinary import, not only because of the exceedingly large number of prisoners taken but because it enables the Americans to continue their advance along the Apia way and brings them in close proximity to the other troops who have initiated the offensive on the Anzio front, and places the remainder of the German forces in danger of being

destroyed in the Pontine swamps.

Other Allied successes refer to the cutting of the railway line between Rome and Naples. A later advice states that the Allied forces of the Anzio region

Canada's Navy Multiplied Twenty - Two Times

The information has been officially released that the Canadian Navy is now twenty two times larger than it was at the out-break of the war. Its man-power is also said to be almost on a par with that of the Royal Navy.

Among its important units is the "Prince Robert", an anti-aircraft auxiliary cruiser. She is equipped with powerful anti-aircraft firepower and provided with special protection against aerial attack. It was the "Price Robert" which, in September 1940, surprised and captured the German freighter "Weser" off the west coast of Mexico.

THE THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

The shirking of duty or running away from the things we feel we ought to do has a peculiarly demoralising effect on our high purpose of right.

FACING THE ISSUE

We desire, today, to express an impartial opinion in connection with the vigilance of the representatives of the "Junta de Abastos" or the "Auxiliary Price Control Committee"

We firmly believe connective and conscientious thought is essential when treating with the different phases of communal activities, particularly, as in this instance, with those which may possibly develop into what is generally known as "profiteering", to the serious prejudice of our economic interests. All should endeavour to prevent this evil from becoming a standard of living in these dark and terrible days. Though we should, at the same time, carefully avoid losing our sense of proportion when faced by two opposites.

Every system, whether political, religious, social, economic or otherwise reflects the good and the bad, the merits and the demerits of the civilization it serves. Each is however, capable of being fully controlled. To secure a just analysis of the causes which have brought about the abnormal increases in the value of our daily requirements, we must, undoubtedly, take under close consideration all the elements and persons concerned. First, the supplier or producer, being faced with heavier production costs and greatly increased living expenses, is, obviously, compelled to place a higher value on his product. Then, the trader, if he intends to remain in business, must buy at the increased quotation and in turn, charge the consumer a higher price. We see nothing incorrect in these activities - the evil lies in the manner or proportion in which the increases are made. The scrupulous may seize the opportunity to less advanced prices. Its against these that the vigilance of the competent authority must be directed, and accorded the wholehearted cooperation of the general citizenry.

The most effective means of stemming this situation is, we think, by the inauguration of a well regulated aid to stimulate production particularly with respect to the first line needs of our dietary. Unless something of the kind is given immediate attention, there is reason to believe that very soon, in this city, there will be much to offer the consumer.

BRITISH WEST INDIANS ON WAR SERVICE

Designated an "Ace Air Gunner" twenty-three year old Sergeant Lincoln Orville Lynch, a native of Kingston, Jamaica, is mentioned as having distinguished himself within the first nine months of takinn up work with the Royal Air Force in England. On his first operational flight he is said to have materially assisted in the destruction of an enemy fighter.

After concluding his education, Lynch volunteered for air crew duties with the Royal Air Force, and left his Island home for Canada to train to be a rear-gunner. Shortly after reaching England, Lynch went through an O. T. U., when he won his trophy—an air gunner's wing, mounted on a pedestal for his all-round efficiency.

While in a raid over Ludwigschafen Lynch and the other gunner in the "Halifax" saw a Junker 88, just as it had begun its run over the target. The fighter was about 350 yards away to starboard, and when it began to edge in, the two gunners opened fire. Two of Lynch's guns jammed, but he saw tracer from the other two hitting the fighter's port engine. Then the fighter's starboard engine was hit. Flames shot out from both engines and the aircraft fell, crashing in the fires of the target. Refer-

ring to the incident, Lynch said he shall never forget the thrill of it.

WAR SHORTS

When the important city of Odessa was captured by the Russians the Germans are reported to have lost 10,000 trucks, 6,000 automobiles, 6,000 railway waggons and 95 food, ammunition and fuel deposits. Their loss at Sebastopol is stated as vastly greater, in addition to 25,000 of their man-powes.

The North Americans are officially said to be employng, with great success a special type of aircraft, called "helicopter", in the transporting and landing of their troops behind the Japanese forces in Burma.

A Washington advice reveals that orders have been issued to augment to a large extent the programme with respect to the manufacture of heavy artillery for the North American Army.

TRANSLATED COPY OF LETTER OF SYNDICATE OF WORKERS TO MANAGER OF THE BANCO NACIONAL DE SEGUROS, SAN JOSE

Señor don Andres Brenes Mata, Manager of Bank of Security, San Jose.

Dear Sir:

Permit me to again distract your attention and time from our work to give consideration to the grave situation of the insured workers of this one.

I shall begin by emphasizing, Mr. Manager, the imperative necessity of the stand by us lest we fall—support us with your united strength. Eat, and drink, day and night at LA MAGNOLIA Dixon's little place West of the city Market.

Bank having, at least, an employee to attend to all matters relating to the insured workers. According to the information we previously furnished, there should be an employee at this end with sufficient authority to make payments after consultation with San Jose. In cases of my doubt this employee, by means of the telephone could rapidly determine the pay to which such workers are entitled.

The resolution of the Bank

to discontinue carrying on these operations in Limon is prejudicial to the workers who need the immediate receipt of their moneys. The greater number of these prejudiced workers are those of the line towns, who, leave the hospital without five cents in their pockets and though still in ill health, have to return in eight days to receive that which corresponds. The new system adopted by the Bank of Security to send to San Jose for written authorization does not justify, at all times, what the workers need when discharged from the hospital, or when sick. We consider that the Bank should maintain an employee to attend to all the cases of its incumbency. What reason is there Mr. Manager, for the workers to suffer this disposition of the Bank? Will you not consider it justifiable that an employee should be assigned to attend to all these situations to which we are today exposed?

On this occasion, Mr. Manager, I repeat my previous affirmation that I have reason to ask the Bank for more and better attention for those who are insured.

Awaiting that you will, at this time, give attention to my criticisms and your good will decide how long this situation should remain for the workers associated with the Banco de Seguros of which you are the worthy Manager. Attentively yours.

THE HONDURAS-COSTA RICA BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

NEW REPELLANT AGAINST BODY LICE

WASHINGTON. A new chemical, scientifically known as dichloro diphenyl trichloro ethane, but more familiarly called DDT, has recently been adopted by the United States Army as an effective repellent against the plague of body lice.

During the last war, the question of body lice constituted one of the major problems confronting the Army Medical Corps and no truly effective insecticide was ever found.

The new compound, which is prepared from chloral hydrate, monochlorobenzene and

sulphuric acid, was first synthesized in 1874 by a German scientist, but it was not until 1939 that a Swiss Chemical firm, Geigy, Inc., made complete tests and reports on the quality of the deterrent; the analysis was satisfactory and indicated high potential killing powers against flies, moths and particularly lice.

Made in the form of powder, it is sufficiently strong so that one application to a piece of clothing will insure protection for as long as two months, even though the garment is laundered weekly.

BULLETINS FROM BRITAIN

Fate

The strength of the Reich, encircled, besieged, blockaded and surrounded, is one of the most important factors in the equation of victory. Some statistics are available; other figures are largely intangibles which can never be precisely measured; such an estimate must take account not only of military strength but of political, psychological and economic factors.

The war strength of Germany is most fully expressed in her Wehrmacht, and it is the Wehrmacht that must be defeated when the day comes. It has a tactical flexibility, units can be readily shifted—without any serious impairment of combat efficiency—from one division, one regiment, one battalion to another. Such shifts are constantly occurring; German divisions are really task forces—built up of special units for the particular job. The German soldier today—all things considered—is still a very tough soldier; it is still a very strong army, second only to the Russian Army in sheer numerical size, probably second to none in fighting efficiency. Armies of the satellite powers—Finland, Croatia, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, Slovakia, etc.—add perhaps 75 to 100 divisions to the Wehrmacht, and despite their inferior quality these troops must be reckoned with.

The numerical air strength of Germany's enemies has increased so greatly that the Luftwaffe, relative to its enemies, is probably only one-fifth to one-tenth as strong as it was four years ago. Above all, the Luftwaffe, like the German Army, is now a defensive force. Some of the latest versions of the Messerschmitts and Focke-Wulfs compare well with our operational fighters, although the Nazis have no heavy bombers in any way comparable. Germans are undoubtedly building up in western Europe as part of their strategic reserve to meet our invasion, a hard-hitting, fast-moving army of maneuver, which will counter-attack any beachhead.

Invasion GHQ

Inside there are makeshift tables and rickety chairs. But the lighting is good and on the walls are big maps with concentric circles marking the extent of Allied air power and little flags which designate the German divisions. Once, twice or three times a week the invasion chiefs meet there for an hour or so, then dash off in cars to other jobs. The citizens watch them go in silence.

Japan's "Friendly Enemies"

If Hitler asks Japan for assistance, his request isn't likely to produce much. Not only are the Japanese heavily engaged with Anglo-American forces, but they've never pretended any special love for Germans.

Some recent comments by Germans who have been in Japan are enlightening. The former German Ambassador to Tokyo, General Ott, said, "If I had remained there, if we had lost the war, I would have been the first to be interned in a concentration camp."

The coolness of the Japanese towards the Germans has increased steadily with the Wehrmacht's reverses. That coolness has now reached an undisguised contempt. The latest blow was a peremptory order to Germans in Yokohama to leave their homes and offices in the fashionable Foreign Settlement. The order was issued for "security reasons". German newspapermen in Japan are subject to rigid censorship. They complain bitterly that Yokohama, for eighty-five years the centre of German trade in Japan, has now been closed to them. Most of the German traders have been cut off from home since the beginning of the Russo-German war. There is much financial distress among them. It appears that Germans without means are herded into communal camps. From here to proper internment would seem to be but one step. In other words the "herrenvolk" are having a hard time as guests of the nation which the Kaiser described as the "yellow peril".

Blackout

The blackout comes when the light fades. And blackout it is, as deep and formidable as the very name of Hitler. A nocturne punctuated only by the beauty of the searchlights. It is then that England becomes a fortress in truth against the envy of less happier lands. The blackness is absolute. A man is indeed daft if he is not handy to an underground by blackout time, for he will never find his way home unless he is a native. Even they do not venture far at blackout time. The luckiest soul in London is one able to flag a cab after blackout begins. For the blackout is a shroud dropped upon a city of 10,000,000—the largest city in the world—as completely as the lid of a coffin or the cap of a well.

That is invasion headquarters. It is not especially glamorous or even comfortable now.

R. A. F. Mountain Rescue Service

Here's a phase of the Royal Air Force about which you hear very little. Yet it's a godsend to the flying men who return with shaky planes from missions over Germany or dashes over the Channel. When flak, machine-gun bullets or rocket-gun fire has all but crippled a plane, and the pilot's trying to bring her back with a dead or injured navigator and a waist gunner who needs immediate attention, the pilot sometimes loses direction and lands "somewhere north of Dover."

Members of this special mountain crew are first of all rugged. Many of them were already familiar with the local terrain in which they work. Day or night they must be ready on the cliffs or in mountain ravines, to haul some crippled or unconscious flyer up slopes to highways and safety. When word is flashed that a plane is down in their district, the crews don ropes, special head torches, first-aid packs and "walkie-talkie" radio equipment. Then they start off in an ambulance and a jeep to the key point on their location charts. In foul weather at night it is not so simple to locate a crashed plane unless there is a fire. Once it is found, ropes and stretchers are put into use, and injured flying fighters are taken from the plane to be hauled away to hospitals or rest camps.

The Colossal Task

The number and extent of Britain's airfields is secret. But the total area of paved runways, perimeter tracks, hard standings, etc., amounts to nearly 160,000,000 square yards—or 33,000 acres. This is the equivalent of a road, thirty feet wide, stretching for 9,000 miles. The construction of runways, perimeter tracks, and hard standings, for the standard bomber station, required thousands of tons of ballast and cement. The airfields programme to date has meant the carriage and use of approximately 30,000,000 tons of ballast and cement—7,500,000 truck loads. This has involved the opening of hundreds of new ballast pits and material has sometimes had to be hauled fifty miles to sites—thus adding to Britain's already considerable transport problem. Equally immense are figures of other materials required in the construction of Britain's airfields. 1,000,000 tons of steel and cast iron have been authorized. Electric plants and equipment in-

British Fishermen

Fishermen on the southern coast of England are jaconic folk, with the salt of the sea in their beards when they have them, and, in their word, when they use them. They don't say much about it but the order which turned the south coast into a restricted invasion spring-board zone has even further curtailed their limited operations. So many a fisherman sits on a granite slab outside a fish-shack door or in the middle of a trawler deck, quietly working a bit of new hemp into his net. Occasionally he may pause a moment to look up at a flight of four-engined bombers zooming across the Channel toward Ostend or toward Boulogne. Sometimes the planes overhead are not British or American. Then when he does drag his nets near Lizard Point or Beachy Head, he may haul in a plank or two from the hull of a fishing smack ripped apart by machine-gun fire. Or he may leave his fishing to make for the hazy coast of France in a minesweeper to clear the channels of hidden danger. It is a task in which the British are not alone. Newfoundland seamen are operating mine sweepers along Britain's "E boat alley."

Despite these incidents, a prosperous, if limited, war-time fishing trade flourishes. For, in warring Britain, fish is a vital food.

India's First Wild, Rubben Plantation

The Government of India first wild rubber plantation will come into production in April this year. The plant, *cryptostegia grandiflora*, may turn out to be of great assistance in solving the problem of the United Nation's shortage in rubber. 5,000 acres of land not far from Dehli were sown with the seed last summer but neither the conditions under which the plant would thrive nor the quality of the rubber it would produce were then known. It has now been found that the plants have thriven and the rubber is of good average quality. A few hundreds of tons will, it is estimated, be produced this year, though a satisfactory method of extracting the rubber has not yet been evolved.

It includes 6,936 transformers, 9,800 switchboards, and 336,000 miles of cables. Among other items are standard and general accommodation huts and 18,000,000 cubic feet of wood of all kinds.

Germany Strained

Month after month the All-German air armadas have been hurled upon German war industries in ever-growing volleys. All available information indicates, however, that although German production has been gravely impaired, German ground forces can still be supplied with all war mater necessary for the current year. Everything has already been combed out. But the demands are steady for additional hundreds of thousands of people to close the gaps torn by the war on all fronts. That no fresh reserves are available is evident from a recent radio appeal by Fritz Sauckel, the Labor Minister. At this point Germany no longer has any reserves. In addition, the food situation on the home front, which was formerly good, has deteriorated. The Nazis have lost the fertile Russian provinces and they had to draft increasing numbers of farmers for the Army.

The Nazis are aware of conditions. They know that everything is going downhill and that the decline in industry can no longer be stopped but at best slowed down. They know that the German economy is living more and more off its substantial reserves. The present propaganda slogan is that everything must be concentrated upon the Allied invasion.

Great Britain Builds

Winning the war is the dominant thought in Great Britain today. Every man and woman in the country realizes the magnitude of the task they have undertaken. They have undertaken ahead of them, and that until it is achieved their hopes for the future cannot be given practical expression, but the overtones of war cannot deafen them to these understones of future peace. The planning of post-war Britain, in itself necessary, serves as a stimulus to increase effort in the making of war.
