ALLIED NAVIGATION MENACED BY JAPANESE

English naval observers are said to be of the opinion that only a decidedly strong action by the allied fleet in the West Pacific will be able to save the situation in the Indian Ocean. They feel that if an action were effected in the vicinity of the territorial waters of Japan, it would compel the Nipons to considerably reduce their units in the Indian Ocean, where they menace the movement of the merchant ships of the allied powers with fatal results.

It is anticipated that the Japs are preparing to launch their attack against India from the Andaman Islands and certain ports of Burma.

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WIRELESS NEWS

VICHY. — All the North Americans resident in "unoccupied" France have received instructions to leave the country as quickly as possible.

MOSCOW. — A radio broadcast announces that the guerrilla warriors in Yugoslavia recently annihilated a punitive German expeditionary force of five thousand men and had surrounded the towns of Vrdnik and Serajevo.

MASSAU. — Bahama Islands — Thirty survivors of a ship, torpedoed by an enemy submarine, arrived here on the 11th instant. Two of the crew were killed by the explosion of the torpedo and ten are missing. Neither the name nor the nationality of the ship have been released.

LONDON. — The government of Yugoslavia is stated to have received the information that the German force in occupation have threatened to execute 16,000 natives, if the patriotic warriors do not cease their activities within a given time.

WASHINGTON. — The Board in charge of war production deny that the proposal to export one million radio sets to Latin America had been rejected. A representative of the Board said the matter was under consideration of the corresponding Committee.

LONDON. — A fire of gigantic proportions has occurred in Fontainebleau, near Paris; more than 200 buildings have been destroyed.

AUSTRALIA IS PREPARED

The Dominion of Australia is stated to be possessed of more war equipment and general material than any of the territories yet invaded by the Japanese; and military experts are of the opinion that, man for man, the Australians are much better fighters than the Nipons. This they are said to have demonstrated at the battle of Malaya, which was, we are told, lost only because the allied troops were pitted against overwhelming forces.

It has also been stated that the Japanese conquests in Malaya and Java resulted, mainly, from the defending forces being composed, largely, of men who, in many instances, only endeavored to defend their ad-

A CHANGE OF CABINET MINISTERS

Don Alfredo Volio Mata is no longer associated with the Republic's Executive Ministry. He retired from the vastly important position of Minister of Public Works and Agriculture during the earlier days of the week in course and is succeeded by don Jorge Zeledón Castro.

Happenings of a political nature associated with the campaign being unfolded in connection with the 1944 Presidential elections are said to have brought about don Alfredo's resignation which is much regretted on all sides.

A fully qualified Civil Engineer, don Alfredo was regarded, throughout the country as one of the outstanding members of the present Administartion and an exceptionally zealous and capable official. His retirement is especially regretted by all associated with this section of the Republic, as it was felt that he took a sincere interest in all which might assist our efforts toward our financial betterment. We hope that his successor will be similarly disposed.

Don Alfredo's retirement has motivated the resignations of other highly positioned members of the department, among them don Luis Cruz, head of the Agricultural division and Engineer Peralta Chief in charge of Roads, and Bridges.

LIKELY RUPTURE BETWEEN ALLIED NATIONS AND VICHY

Certain diplomatic circles believe the United States and England will shortly sever relations with Vichy in view of the recall of Pierre Laval to occupy a prominent position in the German controlled government.

It is the general belief that fearing an early continental invasion by Anglo-American forces, the Nazi authorities obliged Marshal Petain to reorganize his governing Body by the inclusion of ex-Premier Laval and Admiral Darlan, two of the most outstanding collaborators with Germany. It has been stated that Laval will assume the position of "Chief of Government" and be responsible only to Petain, who will retain his title of "Chief of State". It is expected that Darlan will be Minister of Foreign Affairs and Chief of the Armed Forces.

In view of the above, Washington reports that the United States government

have stopped the departure from New York of two ships laden with food stuffs for the French nationals in North Africa as also another vessel which was taking food to the children located in the unoccupied territory of France.

Happenings of a far-reaching character are being anticipated meantime trouble of a rather serious nature has commenced in France in protest of Laval's recall. Acts of sabotaje, public anti-German manifestations, mass arrests and executions are reported.

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
