

That'll keep you awake, Nan- Pyecombe crook, says Jefferies, "has a curve or semicircle, and then opens straight; the straight part starts at a tangent from the semicircle. How difficult it is to describe so simple a matter as a shepherd's crook! In some way or other this Pyecombe form is found more effective for capturing sheep, but it is not so easy to make."

If the shepherd's crook is a simple matter, its ecclesiastical cousin, the crozier, is, on the other hand, a most complicated subject for discussion. Much ink has been used on questions relating to the right use of the term. "crozier," and also as to the correct use of the thing itself. The results can be briefly summarized. The bishop's pastoral staff was of old called simply his crook. In the sixteenth century it was commonly termed a crozier's staff or crozier-staff, the symbol being carried by an official known as the "croclarius," or crozier, and before long the crook staff was called the crozier. But much confusion has arisen through the latter-day application of the term "crozier" to the cross which is borne before an archbishop. 

A ray of light, caused to pass systematically over the surface of a transparent film containing a photograph, falls upon a selenium cell whose electric resistance varies, with the amount of light passing through different parts of the photograph. These variations are transmitted to the electric wire, and at the receiving end they vary the illumination of a small vacuum tube, which passes over a sensitized photographic paper synchronically with the ray of light moving over the Ilm at the sending station. Thus a copy of the original photograph is produced.

> > That a body can acquire during the night a different temperature from that of the surrounding atmosphere has been demonstrated by Mr. Well, au Eaglish physician. If a thermometer is taken from a window, wrapped in cotton and placed on the ground, its mercury will descend seven or eight degrees. Vegetables similarly situated, and being bad conductors, may freeze at a time when the thermometer does not mark the freezing point -proof that the cold experienced by a plant may be entirely different from the temperature of the surrounding nir. This low temperature of plants, however, only occurs when the night is clear, since at this time the plant sheds its heat throughout space and becomes chilled, whereas if the night is cloudy the phenomenon does not occur. This gives rise to the popular superstition that plants and buds are frozen by moonlight.



#### NEW CARTRI GT TO AWE MOBS.

The new cartridge for rlot duty is nearly ready for the National Guard, State of New York. It is of the calibre of the Krag-Jorgensen rifle, which is .30, and will be used by the guardsmen in that rifle. Until a few weeks ago the State soldiers were equipped with the Springfield only, except for fifty Krags, which the expert riflemen in each regiment were permitted to use in Creedmoor practice. Now, however, the Krag is to be issued generally, and by the opening of the drill season in a few weeks the entire militia probably will be using the weapons of the regulars.

The new riot ammunition is called the "multiball" cartridge, because instead of having only one bullet it has two, a triffe larger than buckshot.

When fired they will scatter, and a volley of them will make a mob think it is facing shrapnel.





#### Jamaican in Trouble in Mexico.

PETER A MOODY (JNR.) MELD ON MURDER CHARGE.

From the Jamaica "Daily Telegraph."

Mr. P. A. Moody (junior) of Port Antonio is in serious trouble in Mexico.

Some months ago, the young man, who is well known in the \$30, 522, 524 Common St., northside, left Jamaica to engage in business in the Mexican republic. He became a contractor and a large shed in connection with a railway, or some other public work; and then his troubles commenced.

The story that has reached this island is to the effect that after the roof had been placed on the shed, Mr. Moody ordered some of his assistants to remove two bolts. The result was disastrous, A portion of the roof immediately fell, and 15 or 16 of the work men below were injured -one of them fatally.

ARRESTED FOR MURDER.

As soon as the man died, the Mexican authorities arrested Mr. Feb. 32.-At 9 a.m. s.s. Atrato, Moody, and lodged him in jail on a charge of murder. Bail was refused. This highhanded proceeding was reported to the British Consul at the place, who instantly communicated with Mr. Moody's relatives in this island. Their grief and auxiety can be better imagined than described.
