GREAT ENOUGH TO OPPOSE ANY THERE NATIONS ON HARTH.

(Special Letter to the "Panama Journal.")

New York. - The cable has brough us some hint of the views recently ex pressed by M. de Lanessan, French ex-minister of marine, concerning the John Fisher.

M. de Lanessan observed that bitherto the British Admiralty has been guided by the principle that the British fleet should be superior to those of the strongest naval powers combined. That end has long since been attained, and in his opinion England now contemplates the possibility of a conflict with three powers -namely, France, the United States and Germany. She can oppose to Germany the Channel fleet and the Atlantic fleet. Even supposing Germany were to be supported by the Italian and Austrian navies, their junction would be rendered impossible by the British Mediterrangan fleet

Against the Un ted States, England could employ her Gibraltar fleet, the western section of her cruisers and two squadrons of armoured cruisers without weakening her forces in home



All complaints are made to the Railway and Canal Commission. Any local or municipal governing or sanitary authority, any chamber of commerce or trade, any trading or freight association, or any other body or association which can get a certificate from the Board of Trade that it is a responsible organization may file complaints, but the Board of Trade may require an organization to give security for costs.

From the decision of the Railway and Canal Commission on any point of law an appeal may be taken to the Court of Appeals and by leave to the House of Lords. Other courts of law or equity are forbidden to restrain the commission by writs of prohibition or certior-

Complaints upon which the commission will pass include allegations of violations of the charter or special acts by a railroad, the legality of rates, complaints of undue preference, unreasonable charges, oppressive treatment or unfair discrimination.





An Overdose of Medicine and its Resuits.

This actually happened in Mindanao. The story was told to me by the army surgeon himself.

He was seated in his tent one morning when a number of the followers of the Sultan of Pantar came hurrying to him, saying the Sultan was dying of cholera. Aided by the zlight knowedge he then had of their language the surgeon diagnosed the case from their reports as a well-nigh hopeials one. Still, anxious to show the skill and friendliness of the American for the Moro brother, he bastily made up six powders, each containing one-sixtieth of a grain of morphine and thirty gains of bismuth. These he mave to the emissaries, telling them to give the Sultan one of them in a glass of boiled water every three hours and to report to him next morning how the patient was getting along.

The next morning the surgeon was more than surprised to see the Sultan himself walk into the tent. Wan and weak as he was, he had come some eight miles to thank the surgeon personally for having saved his life; and had brought with him one of his subjects, who spoke Spanish well enough to serve as an interpreter.

It was through this interpreter that the surgeon learned how his directions had been followed. First they had given the entire six powders to the Sultan at one dose-a full grain of morphine and 180 grains of bismuth-and then had poured a tumberful of boiling water into him every three hours afterward, scalding his Americans a good idea of the extraormouth and throat so that he could dinary craft which has just been built hardly speak.






CIRCULATION OF HOT WATER.




