Latest Foreign News.

Sebastapool 7.—The steamer "Pront" arrived here. The crew reported and put the officers at liberty praying to be re-instated in their different posts. Orders have been given to anchor the "Pront" in the Bay of Kamesheval, pending investigation. The Executive Committee of the Social Democrats have issued a proclamation calling upon the workmen and all classes of the society who are interested in the overthrow of the Government to show their sympathy in whatever manner they elect and fight for the liberty of Lodz, Varsovia and Odessa. The marine engineers have issued similar manifestos. The strikers have issued a proclamation calling for a general demonstration on Thursday next. 25,000 men are on strike.

St. Petersburg 7.—The Admiralty is ignorant of the whereabouts of the "Potenki." It is believed she obtained sufficient coal and provisions and returned to Batoun, where the revolutionists will give them great assistance in escaping to the mountains of the Caucasus.

Odessa 7.—During the disturbances of the 27th and 28th, over 7,000 persons were killed, 200 of which were thrown in the harbor. Thousands of bodies were consumed in the fires in different parts of the city. This butchery was organized by the St. Petersburg police.

St. Petersburg 7.—The papers publish lengthy accounts of the disorders in Odessa copied from foreign papers. The press unanimously declare that the rising was caused by the corruption existing in the navy. In the course of an interview a captain said the question of rations was only a pretext and there was no sympathy between officers and crews, the majority of the former being incompetent military men. The disgraceful flight of Kruger through dread of the mutineers, has called forth the most sardonic happiness in the capital. The hospitals of Liban are filled with officers wounded in the streets by the mutineers. The Insurance Companies calculate their losses in Odessa at \$40,000,000. The 67 sailors of the "Pobiedonosets" who headed the mutiny, have been sent to the Kerchu jail, and will probably be shot.

Teaquisen 7.—The "Potenki" arrived here asking for provisions, coal and medical aid. The mutineers demanded a guarantee from the authorities that they would not be molested during their stay here after which they hoisted the flag of rebellion and issued the following proclamation: "The crew of the "Potenki" hereby notifies the Foreign Powers that they have inaugurated a decisive action against the Government of Russia. They guarantee the safety of all foreign ships navigating the Black Sea as well as all foreign ports."

Bercarest 7.—The Captain of a steamer which arrived here to-day reports that the "Potenki" has returned to Batoun.

Sebastapool 7.—To-day Kruger's squadron returned from Odessa on her second voyage conveying the "Pobiedostzi."

Samora 7.—A terrific hurricane passed over the island causing much damage.

London 7.—Princess Arisugama baptized the Japanese battleship "Kaozi" yesterday.

Portland, Oregon 7.—After a sensational trial of two weeks the ancient senator, Mitchell of Oregon, was sentenced to 2 years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000 for accepting recom-

pense for services rendered in the matter of fraudulent land titles in the Federal Department.

Hong Kong 7.—The merchants of Canton have addressed a petition to President Roosevelt relative to the unjust exclusion laws. They have sent circulars to every city exhorting the people to boycott American goods. The Canton policy is intimidating the Christian natives.

Madrid 7.—Typhus fever is on the increase in Salamanca.

Barcelona 7.—A Catholic and a Protestant seaman of the British Navy were buried to-day with great pomp. The Captain and officers assisting at the funerals.

The Mayor entertained Admiral Beresford and 36 officers at a magnificent banquet at Mount Tibidaba. The health of the two Kings and the nations were enthusiastically drunk.

San Sebastian 7.—At the International regattas here, the arrival of 2 British cruisers, 2 Dutch, 2 German and 2 French, in addition to the Spanish squadron is anxiously looked for.

Warsavia 8.—A battalion of reservists refused to obey orders or accept their rations. They will doubtless join the mutineers. There has been no change in the situation in Odessa, Lodz and Varsovia. A general strike among the railway employees is in progress. They have refused to permit the troops to pass to the seat of war. Every day it becomes more evident that the troops of the Czar cannot be depended upon. His Majesty will not receive anyone but his Ministers, every other person is suspected. In Poland the police were attacked in several places with bombs.

London 8.—The "Daily Mail's" correspondent in Vienna says: "Archduke Francis Ferdinand has commenced military preparations in view of the eventuality of Hungary retiring from the Monarchy."

Rome 8.—The Pope is suffering very much from the excessive heat in the Vatican. The gardens are unapproachable and if the temperature does not change, His Holiness will be compelled to abandon the Vatican. The Government is on the point of sending a small garrison to Castle Gandolfo to render honor and maintain order during the Pontiff's stay there.

St. Domingo 8.—The Government has suspended all individual guarantees and proclaimed the district of Barcelona in a state of siege. The Minister of War has been placed in command of the forces. The rest of the Republic is quiet.

Kieff 8.—The reservists are in open mutiny, they have sacked the liquor shops and disarmed the police.

Berlin 8.—The correspondent of the "Local Anzeiger" in Odessa says: "The crew of the "Potenki" attacked a German settlement near that port, demanding cattle and other stores. He took on board several heads, besides all the men they encountered."

Bercarest 8.—Before the "Potenki" left Kustenji, a delegation of the crew delivered to the Prefect a proclamation addressed to the representatives of the Powers in Roumania, in which they declared war against all Russian ships which fail to join them. They promise to respect neutral property and foreign shipping. The delegation requested that the proclamation be sent to the Powers.

Odessa 8.—The "Potenki" is being chased by several torpedo boats, their intention being to sink her. As their crews are all volunteers there is no danger of their refusing to attack and sink her.

St. Petersburg 8.—The Minister of the Navy has received the following from Admiral Kruger: "When Boont left the Bay of Budrovo the crew broke out in open mutiny, murdered the Captain and officers and Quartermaster."

Vienna 8.—The Russian Government has sent a note to Turkey and Roumania begging not to supply coal or provisions to the "Potenki," and to arrest the mutineers.

Odessa 8.—A torpedo boat arrived here this morning with orders to sink the "Potenki." The troops are en-

camped on the plazas. The artillery has been withdrawn. All public places are closed. No one is allowed on the streets after 10 p.m. The troops are protecting the city and preventing further fires. The reports that the streets were filled with dead bodies is denied. The central station and Courts of Justice were saved from the flames.

St. Petersburg 8.—The "Official Messenger" publishes an article of three columns over the Odessa occurrences and the mutiny on the "Potenki." It says: "This is the saddest episode of the war and one without precedent in the history of the Russian navy. It attributes the mutiny to the effect of the recent disorders, assassinations and here it gives a new version of the mutiny, and states that when the officer shot Omitchuk the seaman, he was forced to do so as the mutineer advanced with his rifle and the remainder of the crew refused to fire on them. The officers were then charged and killed one by one. Those who threw themselves in the sea were shot at by rifles and rapid fire guns. Thirty sailors who refused to join were also killed."

Paris 8.—Radolin telegraphs that Rouver has accepted the invitation but under certain conditions. The "Petit Parisien" says: The following are the conditions under which France accepts the German invitation to a Conference. That the integrity of Morocco and the sovereignty of the Sultan is guaranteed. Respecting the treaty with Morocco and the Powers especially the Franco-Anglo and Franco-Spanish. Recognition of France's special rights, in virtue of her position on the Moroccan frontier. The arrangement of all questions of an international character to be subject to the approval of the Chancellors of the nations interested. The "Petit" is of opinion that Germany will not adhere to the proposals.

London 8.—Within a few days Mr. Balfour will present to the House of Commons, a projected law authorizing the distribution of the electoral districts according to a uniform system of representation. If the plan goes into effect, Ireland will have 72 departmental members instead of 105 which it actually possesses, while England will have 496 instead of 465. The Irish members are energetically opposing the new project.

London 8.—Within a few days the official announcement of the Franco-German agreement will be published in Paris and Berlin. It has been assured that England and Spain will assist at the Conference.

New York 8.—According to official reports from 150 of the principal cities of the United States, the 4th July celebrations caused the death of 36 and the injury of 1,677 persons, all through the firing of toys, rockets, fireworks, powder and toy pistols.

Dawson City 8.—The enormous forests of Alaska are on fire. Hundreds of miles of telegraph lines have been burnt. The loss is enormous.

Cleveland 8.—Mr. John Hay was buried yesterday at Lakeview. At the grave was President Roosevelt, the Vice-President, members and ex-members of the Cabinet and many other persons. At the wish of the family the funeral was of a private nature and not as a Secretary of State. The coffin was covered with flowers and wreaths. One of which was from President Roosevelt, the others being from King Edward, Sir Mortimer and Lady Durand, Whitelan Reid, the Japanese Government, Minister Tak-hira, the Diplomatic Corps, Korean Legation, Brazilian Government, and the Republic of Cuba. Elihu Root is the most likely Candidate for the Secretary of State. He is a staunch supporter of the Monroe Doctrine. In spite of the opposition of Japan, Roosevelt insists on an armistice.

St. Petersburg 8.—The Cossacks bred on a gang of strikers in the Putloff Works. The commencement of the trouble was through a young man who was seen to leave the works and who was suspected of having placed pieces of dynamite in the building. On his being arrested he fired at the police killing one, they in

which the strikers rushed to the Petershoff road and fired on the Cossacks. The soldiers discharged their rifles killing several.

Odessa 8.—The "Potenki" appeared off Akkerman and demanded coal and provisions which was refused by the authorities. The torpedo boats then fired two shots and left. The "Potenki" has paralyzed navigation in the Black Sea.

Varma 8.—Two Russian warships anchored here to-day.

St. Petersburg 8.—Chankin has ordered the Sebastapool squadron to embark new crews and officers. The Czar is indignant at the impossibility of moving Kruger's squadron from Sebastapool. Cassaforte says the "Potenki" has 500,000 roubles on board.

Elilock 8.—Disorders increasing Many killed and wounded.

Sofia 8.—The Russian destroyer "Stremilki" arrived and anchored off the Palace demanding provisions. After being supplied she left very quickly.

Batun 8.—The Causian railway officials are on strike.

Teodosia 8.—The "Potenki" and two torpedo boats are bombarding the city.

London 8.—The movements of the "Potenki" is giving serious concern to the Powers, and notes are being exchanged with regard to the necessity of adopting measures for the protection of neutral commerce in the Black Sea. According to a Vienna despatch, however, they have not yet decided to address a collective note to the Russian Government and will not do so until the extreme necessity demands it, in order not to offend Russia.

St. Petersburg 8.—News from the Black Sea and Caucasus is causing considerable alarm. The whole Crimean Peninsula is on the verge of rebellion. Anarchy reigns in the mountains from Batun to Baku. Due to the strict censorship, only short despatches have been received.

Teodosia 8.—The workmen have joined the mutineers of the "Potenki." The people are fleeing from the city in a panic. The cannons of the rebel ship are trained on the city, because the authorities refused to supply the coal demanded. The bombardment may commence at any moment. On the other side of the Peninsula, Chukin's fleet of 6 ships without counting Kruger's squadron, are anchored under the muzzles of the forts guns. Chukin doubts the loyalty of his crew and does not order the capture of the mutineers. News comes from St. Petersburg that 4 torpedo boats manned by volunteer crews have left for Teodosia with orders to sink the rebel ship. Admiral Wieren says the "Potenki" is still in Teodosia and recommends that a torpedo boat be sent to sink her. The situation becomes more grave daily. The ship is not manned by Russian sailors, but by revolutionary committees, who passed on board at Odessa and issued a manifesto to the Powers, in which they say they desire to be considered insurgents and will shortly demand to be considered belligerents by which means they hope to save their heads. They are however outside of the law and only pirates. The inhabitants in obedience to the authorities have abandoned the city. The "Potenki" may bombard this evening. Only the troops and employees remain.

Teodosia 9.—At 9 a.m. the "Potenki" landed some men who were received with a discharge of rifles killing two and compelling the others to throw themselves in the water. The torpedo boat then fired a shot which passed over the city. The "Potenki" and torpedo boat then left, but continued to manoeuvre in sight of the town. Teodosia is declared in a state of siege.

CURRENT ITEMS.

The actual transfer of the Costa Rica Railway to the Northern Railway took place only on Thursday last.

The Marriage of Mr. Harry Jones to Miss Lydia Esquivel is announced to take place at San José this morning at eight o'clock.

MR. L. O. FRASER, who was called to Jamaica by the death of his brother a few weeks ago, returned by the "Altai" yesterday.

THE latest New Orleans papers report that there is a rumor that the United States Government has been officially advised to stop all work on the Panama Canal until the Canal Zone has been put into a thorough sanitary condition.

It is currently reported that Mr. McLaren, the Missionary representing the Jamaica Baptist Missionary Society at Corn Island, was among the passengers drowned in the recent schooner fatality reported in these columns.

A memorial presented to Congress by the Governor of Limón asking for the introduction of free duty of lumber destined for the construction of houses in this port was unanimously rejected at their session on Wednesday last.

THE S.S. "Miami" arrived from Manchester on Tuesday last under the command of Captain Castle. The worthy Captain since his last visit has joined the ranks of the Benedictines, and his young wife accompanied him this trip.

THE Banco Commercial's returns for the past month show that quite a large business was done. The Bank's headquarters are in the building formerly occupied by the United Fruit Company, and their offices have been very handsomely fitted up.

THE S.S. "Altai" will leave here on Monday coming, the 17th inst., taking mails and passengers for Kingston and New York. Cheques on the Colonial Bank for remittance by this steamer can be obtained at this office up to hour of sailing.

MR. F. NUTTER COX, H. M. Consul at San José, left here for England yesterday by the "Miami." Mr. Walter J. Ford will assume charge of the Consulate during Mr. Cox's temporary absence, while Mr. C. N. Pirie will be the Representative of the Costa Rica Railway Company.

MR. F. FARAH, a prominent merchant of Kingston, arrived here by the "Atrato" on Monday last. Mr. Farah, who is accompanied by Mrs. Farah, will spend two or three weeks here in the interest of his firm before returning to Jamaica.

FROM THE London "Daily Mail" of the 23rd June we clip the following:— "Heavy arrivals at Covent Garden of strawberries in quantity from Cornwall, Hampshire and Kent caused a slump in bananas, Costa Ricans being obtainable as low as "4 shillings" per bunch.

THE murderer, James Adams, who shot and killed his wife at Putta, last year, and who was sentenced for a term of 7 years in San Lucas, is lying ill in San José. His sentence has been suspended by the authorities until his recovery.—"El Noticiero."

MR. W. G. CHASE, late Superintendent of the Northern Railroad, was a passenger for Boston by the S.S. Limón on Sunday last. Mr. B. M. Hess, formerly Chief Train Despatcher of the Northern Railroad, was a passenger by same steamer, and both are gone on leave of absence.

MR. D. A. JOHNSTON has been a visitor here from San José during the past week. Mr. Johnston has been appointed Agent in Costa Rica for several well known English houses, including Keen, Robinson & Co., Ltd., Pilcher's Paints, and Lipton, Ltd., the great Tea Man and General Produce Merchant.

OUR publisher, Mr. F. M. H. Wood, will make his usual monthly trip up the old line as far as Guacimo today, returning to Limón tomorrow (Sunday) by the evening train. Cheques on the Colonial Bank for remittance by the Atlas steamer leaving Monday can then be obtained from him.

THE passengers by the "Miami" for Manchester last night included Mr. W. Reid, late Resident Engineer of the Costa Rica Railway; Mr. G. W. Rothery, who has for several years been connected with Mr. Reid in the construction and extension of the iron pier; and Mr. F. W. Bornemann, of Waldeck, who goes on a holiday tour to Europe.

AN apology is due our readers for the absence of the usual stereotype matter in this issue, due to some delay in shipping from the States. Advice of shipment was received all right and also the bill (we always get the bill), but the goods up to yesterday had not materialized. We trust that next issue everything will be all right again.

THE General Meeting of Court Galed, 8590, A.G.F.F.S., will be held on Tuesday, 18th inst. The Passing Ceremony of the newly-deceased members will take place, and further instructions given them in the mysteries of the Order. It is also hoped that there will be an initiation of two candidates. Members are requested to turn out in full force, and at an early hour.

ACCOMPANIED by a heavy downpour of rain, which lasted for two hours, a terrific thunderstorm passed over the city at 12:45 p.m. on Wednesday. No damage was caused by either, with the exception of the falling of a large tree at Bariala, which completely blocked the N.R.R. track and resulted in the evening passenger train abandoning that route and coming in over the old line from Zent.

NEWS from Banana River reports that the storm at 12:45 p.m. on Wednesday, destroyed over 1,000 banana trees at West Bearesen, in addition to throwing down several giant trees which probably have been standing for over a hundred years. Residents in the vicinity of Bearesen West, which suffered considerably from its elevated position, describe the storm as the worst experienced for many years.

SIX months ago Genaro Badilla accompanied by his wife and two sons left here for David, Republic of Panama, where the family intended to reside. Shortly after they moved to the capital, Panama, and established a tinmith's shop. Fifteen days after, yellow fever invaded his dwelling, taking off his wife and sons. The unfortunate man in a moment of despair placed his revolver to his head and blew his brains out.—"El Noticiero."

THE annual report of the Banco Anglo for the year ending June 30th, shows a total profit on the year's transactions of \$243,706.10. After payment of the usual dividend of 12 per cent, there remained \$99,706.10, of which \$57,000.00 was Reserve Fund and for providing against future losses, while the sum of \$42,706.10 was carried forward into the current year. The Directors for this year are Messrs. Adrian Collado, Guillermo Steinworth, Justo Quiros, F. Nutter Cox, Jaime G. Bennett.

THE "Sunday Herald" of the 25th June gives the following paragraph relative to a homed rooster sent to the States a short time since by Conductor Klone, of the Costa Rica Railway:—"Herewith is reproduced a photograph of a curiosity in the shape of a homed rooster. The strange fowl was reared in Port Limón, Costa Rica, where it was regarded with awe by the natives, who looked upon it as something supernatural. It was brought to this country by a sea captain. The horns seem to be of the same material as the ordinary rooster's spurs."

THE R. M. S. "Atrato" arrived here on Monday last from Kingston direct, having called here prior to touching at Colon. She had a number of labourers on board, principally from Barbados, in transit for Colon. Much disappointment was expressed at the inability of the Limón postal authorities to distribute her Jamaican mail so that replies could be sent by the Atlas steamer leaving that day. The business at the Limón post office has increased so much of late that some days in each month several more assistants could easily be employed, while the ordinary staff generally speaking is sufficient.

WE are informed on reliable authority that the United Fruit Company will shortly construct a splendid hotel in Limón, provided with all modern improvements. Hitherto Limón has not proven very attractive to visitors from the interior, or from abroad, simply on account of first-class hotel accommodation, especially for ladies, for whom until very recently absolutely no provision was made whatever. The United Fruit Company are practically the pioneers in the construction of up-to-date buildings in this port, and there is every reason to believe that the hotel they have in view will surpass anything yet seen in this country. What and the entire absence of yellow fever for the past year, we shall yet see Limón a health resort for visitors from the States as well as from the interior.

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Latest Foreign News.

Berlin 9.—Professor Reinsder of the University of Berlin, a native of Russia, says: "The mutiny of the seamen in the Black Sea was not due to bad food but the result of the agitation set on foot some years ago by revolutionists in the navy. These men cannot be called rebels and assassins, but only heroes disposed to sacrifice their lives for their country. The great error of the Russian Government is in having converted the army into a practical party to sustain Imperialism against free will."

St. Petersburg 9.—The Black Sea fleet is on its way to Theodosia. Governor Sinforopal says half of the rebel ship's crew is wishful of surrendering but are prevented from doing so by the rebels. Only six companies of troops are in Theodosia. The Governor of Odessa says the reports of the troubles in that city was much exaggerated. The rebels lost 44 killed and 72 wounded, while the troops had 1 killed and 20 wounded.

Copenhagen 10.—Sweden and Norway are under arms. Troops are being mobilized and hurried to the frontier. Christiania 10.—The Secretary of the Norwegian Government offices in Stockholm was preparing to decorate the buildings in order to welcome the arrival of Prince Gustavo and his bride. This action called forth hostile comments from the Swedish press which declared that the flag of the rebels should not be displayed in welcome to the royal pair. In order to avoid any act that would offend the Swedes, the Secretary was called here to-day.

London 10.—The mutiny on the "Potenki," says the "Daily Mail's" correspondent in Constantinople, offers the Porte an opportunity to renew the artillery at the entrance to the Bosphorus and which was so strongly opposed by Russia. Cannons of large calibre have been despatched to these points. Within the last few weeks a notable change has been observed in the Sultan towards Russia.

Constantinople 10.—The Council of Ministers have decided to send to the entrance of the Bosphorus all the warships available. The Chief of the Turkish General staff left yesterday for Haracia, to impede the entry of the "Potenki" to the Bosphorus.

St. Petersburg 10.—The companies working the petroleum deposits have decided to avoid police aid and protect their property with their own men in Baku. They are of opinion that it will be impossible to re-establish the petroleum industry otherwise.

Moscow 10.—General Kizloff has ordered the re-decoration of the grand sultan at the Litvinsky Palace in the Kremlin. It is said that the Czar intends to come to Moscow, from whence he will issue a manifesto convoking a meeting of the people's representatives.

Berlin 10.—The correspondent of the "Local Anzeiger" in Kiel, reports a collision between a battleship and a destroyer No. 124, on the coast, by which the latter was completely cut in two, three firemen were drowned.

New York 10.—The "Potenki" is under the control of a committee of 7, headed by the Quartermaster and an ex-exigun Alexieff. Her crew numbered 750 men. The bombardment of Theodosia continues and the soldiers are sacking the city. It is reported that she sunk two of the torpedo boats which attempted her capture. The most contradictory reports come from St. Petersburg about the ship. Sebastopol advises report that Admiral Chonkin has prohibited the sale of arms.

London 10.—The "Standard's" correspondent in Moscow reports that within a few days an ultimatum will be presented to the Czar, demanding political rights for the army. Over 200,000 reservists, younger and more discontented, after receiving their arms refused to proceed to the war. The garrison of San Sebastian has taken the initiative. The Emperor has received telegrams from the people of Volk, protesting against the act presented by Prince Trutiskoi from the deputations of the Zemtsov Congress. The Russian liberals will not be content with anything less than a Republic, organized after the model of the United States.

Washington 10.—It has been positively announced that President Roosevelt has offered the post of Secretary of State to Mr. Elihu Root who has accepted the vacant post.

Chicago 10.—The corrected official list of accidents during the 4th July celebrations in the United States gives a total of 54 killed and 3,157 injured. From fireworks, 1,258; cannons, 284; firearms, 446; toy pistols, 373; barrels taking flight from explosions, 80. Total value of property destroyed by fire, \$251,317.

Rome 10.—During the past year, the immigration from Italy to the United States was 223,102 and to other places, 59,964 persons.

New York 10.—The newspapers rejoice over Mr. Root's appointment as Secretary of State.

London 10.—Last night a grand ball was given in honor of Prince and Princess Arisugama, at which His Majesty the King, Queen Alexandra and the aristocracy assisted.

Barcelona 10.—The Mayor entertained 150 Englishmen at a banquet last night. The officers and crew of the British fleet were present at the bull fight. The British Consul will offer them a banquet to-morrow. Admiral Lord Charles Beresford has written the Alcalde, expressing his thanks. The officers were entertained at a sumptuous lunch, and the crews by the Pelota clubs. Many young men have solicited permission to join the British Navy as volunteers. The British Consul was obliged to refuse their request.
