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

Although known as irregular soldiers or guerillas, and paid solely by the plunder they are always sure to get, they are the Sultan's chosen instruments when it becomes his imperial pleasure to wreak wholesale vengennee upon any of his Christian subjects. It was the Bashi-Bazouks let loose upon the Greeks at Sclo in 1822 that reduced that fair island of gardens to ashes, while 25,000 people met death in a single day and 30,000 women and children were carried off and sold as slaves, to the scandal of Christen-

In the Turkish war with Russia in 1877 thousands of Bushi-Buzouks were transported from their homes in the highlands of Asla and turned upon the helpless Christian population of southern Bulgarla, massacring over 40,000 of them in the month of June nlone. It was at this time that a whole large school of children were killed at once and the bodies of the victims, together with the school house, burned by the destroyers.

It was the Bashi-Bazouks, armed with Martini rifles by command of the Sultan, though in defiance of the Berlin treaty, who began the awful Armenian massacres at Sassoun in 1894. For twenty-three days the work of carnage was permitted to go on in that single district, village after village being wiped out of existence, while children-were put to death with every the young men were tied hand and foot, laid in a row, covered with brushwood and burned alive. Others were seized and backed to pieces; little chil. Government. dren were cut in two and mutilated, and young girls outraged in the presence of their families. 





A SERMON FOR SUNDAY

A DISCOURSE ON "THE CROUND OF CHRISTIAN CERTAINTY."

The Rev. Reginald John Campbell Tells in Beautiful Language of the Assurances of Divine Mercy Which Buoy the Hearts of Believers.

OCEAN GROVE, N. J .- Nearly 10,000 people filled the Auditorium here Sunday morning to listen to the Rev. Regimald John Campbell, pastor of the City Temple, London. His subject was "The Ground of Christian Certainty." He said:

My text, or rather, my two texts, will be found, one in the third chapter and fourteenth verse and the other in the fourth chapter and nineteenth verse of the First Epistle of St. John: "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth for death." "We love Him because He first loved us."

The thought is not one of simple gratitude. The text teaches us bat the power of loving comes from the fact that God is The writer of the fourth gospel, whether he was or was not the Apostle John, was probably one of the greatest theologians that ever lived, because his spiritual insight is so propund, and the inwardness of his master mind so complete. The writer of the Fourth Gospel is plainly the writer of these epistles. He was undoubtedly John the Divine. He never refers to himself by name, but only as the disciple whom Jesus loved. None of us would be willing to spare out of our Christian experience the fourteenth chapter of St. John. In this the disciple sets forth what we believe to be the profound est and most beautiful truth concerning the relationship of the sanctified soul to the Redeemer. What a beautiful phrase is this: "The disciple whom Jesus loved." This man of wonderf I ability, who remembers all that Jerus said and writes it down for our benefit. By that he did not mean that he was the only usciple whom Jesus loved, but he meant to say that he got his own spiritual experience from the same foundation that we get ours.

There are signs in the New Testament that the disciple whom Jesus loved was at

one time a passionate, ambitious man. Mark that occasion when James and John were called the Sons of Thunder; when they came to Christ and said, "Master. shall we command fire to come down from heaven and consume these adversaries; yours and ours?" And Christ replied, "Ye know not yet what spirit ye are of."

Again, the mother of James and John

comes to the Master and says, "Master, grant that these, my two sons, may sit the one on Thy right hand and the other on Thy left, when Thou comest into Thy kingdom." 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

THE VICE OF INTEMPERANCE, Insanity From Alcohot - Very Valuable Testimony on This Point Found in Re-

of the Retreat for the Insane at Harrford Conn. The Superintendent, Dr. Henry P.

Stearns, in discussing the question, says: "You will further observe from the tables of statistics appended that in no less than twenty-one of the admission that is, in more than seventeen per cent.
-the insanity was thought to have been aused by the abuse of alcohol. This may be a higher per cent, of such cases than exists in some State institutions, but it

corresponds quite accurately with our own history (seventy-nine years) in this re-"In fact, alcohol plays so important a role in the production of insanity and crime, especially in cities and large towns, that society should use every means to educate the rising generation as to the dan-

ger attending its use as a beverage.
"The effects of alcohol upon the elements of the nervous system are much greater before twenty years of age than afterward. The brain is more sensitive to the effects of all toxic influences during the period of adolescence, and young persons acquire habits of using both alcohol and tobacco much more readily than during later periods of life. When once formed during this period they are much more likely to become incorporated with the development of the system and thus become

"They may eventuate in some cases in a degeneration of the cells of the brain and the vasomotor portion of the nervous system. In other cases, before such a stage is reached, there may result morbid changes in the mental activities of the in-dividual, attended by cravings which become very difficult, and in some cases impossible to resist. The will power becomes much impaired, and the higher deals of the individuals are lost."

In view of these facts we are prepared to find Dr. Stearns emphasizing the importance of temperance teaching to children and youth. He says:

'The importance, therefore, that some effective measures be adopted, if those already in existence are not adequate, to have instruction given to the pupils of the public schools of the State regarding the nature and effects of alcohol when used as a beverage, can hardly be overestimated. Such a course should be continued if at the expense of less important subjects of

This can be done more effectually than elsewhere in the higher grades of schools. and should be done mainly by means of conversations and oral instruction in the form of questions and answers by both teacher and pupils. In this way and by illustrating examples and plates, pupils will more readily become interested than by reading any amount of dry material

Absinthe in France.

As a result of an investigation set on oot by the Prime Minister of France, Dr. Laborde has reported that absinthe is ruining both the souls and bodies of the French race. The Academy of Medicine has made a declaration against its manufacture and sale, and we see the prohibition question which many have thought limited only to puritanical communities in the United States taken up by a European Government. One of the striking, and in many instances inspiring, characteristics of the French Government is that under it prohibition prohibits. It does not mat-ter particularly what the thing prohibited is, whether it is a bad habit, a school system, or the Mounn Rouge, it goes. The French Government, whose mysteries are past finding out, and which seems to be a series of crises, with a knock-down and drag-out riot in the National Assembly at often recurrent intervals, is very effective. We do not always admire its methods, but we perceive that it always strikes twelve. "Yes, always so, more or less," he answered. "Often there is a great deal more food than this to throw away Look at this cart."

As he spoke a cart came along the wharf and tipped into the nearest scow a load composed entirely of vegetables and fruits.

"Is nothing ever done with this food?" the visitor asked.

"Nothing; it is all thrown away." was the answer. "And, as you see, it is not nearly all bad when it comes into our hands. Half of it, if not more, is good to cat. Unless you have actually collected the refuse you have no idea of the wastefulness of the average family in a New York flat.

Cargoes of Fruit Thrown Away.

"The waste of fruit in New York is incredible. Every banana steamer brings hundreds of thousands of bunches of fully ripe bananas, beautiful, yellow fruit, just ready to eat. The trade will not handle fruit in this condition; it wants green fruit. All these ripe bunches are thrown away.

"Only a short time ago over a million bananas brought in by the British steamship Chickahominy were wasted for this reason. Last year I remember an Italian steamer coming in with a cargo of lemons. The market was glutted at the time, and there was no price for them. It was cheaper to buy emons here than to import them. The whole of the cargo was given to our department to throw away.

"This sort of thing seems an awful waste, but I can assure you it is not at all uncommon. On a smaller scale it is always happening at our markets. A fruit dealer has a few boxes of oranges or tomatoes. The market is just closing, he can't get his price, and rather than sell them for five cents less he hands them over to us to throw away. That happens every day. It makes a man's heart bleed to see such immense quantities of good food thrown away, while many people, even in prosperous New York, haven't enough to eat."





On the ther hand, the average price realised abroad was considerably better than in 1901 : but although this has been an encouragement to the planters, there has been no increase in the area planted, and the export of coffee is likely to remain at between 250,000 and 300,000 bags per annum. The export to the United Kingdom has amounted to 73 per cent, of the whole crop, as against 66 per cent, in 1901.
