THE BANANA CONTRACT WC AFFAIRS

Following are the terms of the Banana Contract signed bet-ween the Secretary of State for Commerce & Finance of Costa Rica and Mr. M. M. March as representative of The United Fruit Co.-1st Da Commerce

The Company agrees whe-ther directly or by means of individuals, or affiltated or as-sociated Companies, to plant for exportation at least 3000 hecta-reas of Bananas of which at least one half must be in the Atlantic Zone, 1500 Hectareas must be planted within three years from the signing of the Contract, and the rest within the succeeding two years. The Co. will select the areas most convenient for such culti-vation and will advise the Mi-nister of Public works and agri-culture where such lands are selected for his publication. The Come to plant another 3000 hectareas, making the neces-sary Contract for the purchase to receiving at the fruit, under similar conditions as exists at present; such Contracts being for no less a period than five years duration, renewable when ap plied for.

plied for. 3rd. For the proper manipu-lations of the Areas planted the Co. will have the right to Cons-truct Railroads, Tramways, bran-ches or deviations within such lands under her control or dep-endence; or to remove, extend or charar each contractions as

endence; of to remove, extend or change such constructions as are found necessary. The government will give every facility for the transportation & exportations of such fruit with-out any especial priveleges. The

Company will be exempt from Customs duties for all materials needed for such Construction, Gompany will be exempt from Gustoms duties for all materials, needed for such Construction, repairs or maintenance of traffic of such Roadways. Such prive-leges cease inflhose regions that the lands are exhausted and the Company will have privelege of taking up the materials used in such plantations. For these con-structions, in case the Company has to pass thro government land she can occupy twenty metres in width without any indemnity whatever for such use. 4.0 In case the owners of fruit rejected by the receivers or ar-bitrators apply for the transporta-tion of such fruit to any point along the line, the Company agrees to transport them at ½ the Rate of existing freight tarrif without any unnecessary undue delay to render them unfit for marketable use. 5th. This Contract comes in force as soon as it becomes law by sanction of Congress, from which time the Co. agrees to pay two cent U. S. currency per stem exported as an Exportation Tax; and the government guarantees that the Industry shall not be subjected to any other Taxation or Impuesto, except the territo-rial Tax for twenty years ending on 29th Oct. 1950.
