Since his graduation, Mr. Cruz has been offered a prominent position by a foreign Corporation of repute operating in the country, but, as he desires to obtain a wider

Our Ministers of Finances and Education, Messrs. Carlos Aragón and Ricardo Fournier have resigned their portfolios.

A foolish attempt at revolution was made in Grecia by Mr. Ernesto Martin, a prominent lawyer of San José and a few followers, but they were arrested and all is quiet. Four guards were wounded in the fracas.

In Panamá there was a Coup d'etat, by which President Arosemena was forced to resign and Mr. Alfaro has been called from Washington to take charge of the Presidency. The Star and Herald has been suspended in consequence.

The new government of Guatemala has been acknowledged by Costa Rica and the United States of America.

President Moncada of Nicaragua is protesting against the withdrawal of the American Marines from his country, but the populace demands it.

THOUGHTS OF PROSPERITY AND HAPPINESS DURING THE NEW YEAR ARE THE OBJECTIVES YOU DESIRE MOST IN LIFE?

Many and varied concepts may be given to this question, and as one contemplates the matter is a serious vein, some surprising facts will disclose themselves and you will be able to gain a rather accurate perspective as to what your future will be. 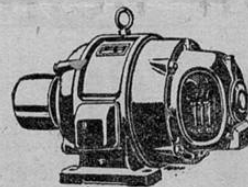

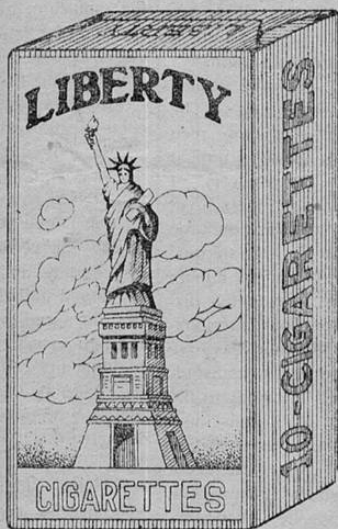

IS TO DOUBLE YOUR BUSINESS

La indiferencia de las Repúblicas Centroamericanas por el Canal de Nicaragua

La inolvidable frase dicha por el gran Jerez, hace más de ochenta años: «Pregunto a Centro América ¿Qué hora es? y ella me responde: Media noche»; es absolutamente de actualidad si tomamos en cuenta el abandono, la criminal indiferencia, con que los gobiernos de las cinco repúblicas del Istmo ven aproximarse el problema más grande que jamás se haya presentado a la consideración de ningún pueblo, el debate más importante que decidirá del porvenir de sus respectivas naciones: la construcción del Canal de Nicaragua. Preocupados estos gobiernos en arreglar cuestiones relativamente pequeñas, aun no han tenido tiempo para pensar que derrotero deben tomar ante la enormidad de este asunto, cuyas múltiples consecuencias es imposible medir en todos sus aspectos.

Que Nicaragua permanezca casi inactiva en este momen-

to histórico, es explicable, pues colocada como está en una situación especial de resultados del tratado Chamorro - Bryan, que aunque sea producto de la ignorancia y la maldad en contubernio, como dijo un célebre escritor, es un hecho consumado, no quedándole mas que esperar el desarrollo de los acontecimientos. Pero que Costa Rica, con sus derechos indiscutibles en la margen derecha del Río San Juan, sobre los cuales no sabemos que exista compromiso alguno. Y que Honduras y el Salvador, con los suyos no menos legítimos en el Golfo de Fonseca, tampoco enagenados, ni con promesa de cesión, permanezcan a estas horas cruzados de brazos, sin prestarle la debida atención, es algo inaudito, de difícil explicación.

Con la apertura del Canal de Nicaragua, es innegable que vendrá para Centro América

una era de progreso general y el comercio tomará grande auge.

De permanecer como hasta la fecha y de realizarse esta magna obra, la soberanía de estos pueblos quedará hondamente lesionada; y es en este punto donde todos sus buenos hijos están obligados a cooperar en el sentido de salir de la manera más airosa y menos perjudicial.

La situación está creada, diremos difícil, mas no inevitable, por los innumerables recursos de toda especie, condición y lugar, con que cuentan los Estados Unidos, presuntos constructores; pero el instinto de conservación, los intereses de la raza, la moral internacional y nuestros deberes para con la posteridad, nos están dictando las que deberán ser nuestras obligaciones en estos momentos.

Según se ha anunciado, como ya los estudios sobre la ruta están terminados, el desideratum para la construcción del canal está muy próximo. El Senado Americano tratará de ello en el mes de marzo

de este año y es casi seguro que sea aprobada; porque además del gran aumento que el tráfico de barcos ha tenido durante los últimos años, para el cual el Canal de Panamá ya no será suficiente, las necesidades de defensa militar que los Estados Unidos deben tener como potencia mundial de primer orden, exigen la pronta apertura de ese camino. Por consiguiente, estando ello tan cerca, es de urgente necesidad que los gobiernos de la América Central, partes grandemente interesadas, traten de ponerse de acuerdo, a fin de que cuando el caso llegue, tener un criterio ya formado sobre el asunto y saberlo resolver en la forma más ventajosa para los intereses de las diferentes colectividades. Mejor dicho: así como se han formado conferencias industriales, médicas, jurídicas, etc., es lógico y necesario que se forme una «Conferencia Centroamericana del Canal», con delegaciones de los cinco países, e integradas por hombres de capacidad y patriotismo bien comprobados.

dad de esta clase, sin o con pocos deseos de estudiar. Lo que posiblemente sucederá es fácil deducirlo.

Estas causas son las que movieron y mueven a diferentes padres de familia a pedir a la Junta de Educación del Colegio, que la Profesora, de que muy a pesar nuestro nos ocupamos, sea trasladada de su puesto de este Colegio.

Sentimos verdaderamente lo ocurrido y no deseamos sino que esta ambigua situación se defina bien pronto y en forma que todos queden satisfechos.
