Attention of a Chiropractor must be classed as medical treatment, Judge A. G. Zimmerman, of Dane County Circuit Court, ruled this morning, reversing a decision of the Industrial Commission in

ing, reversing a decision of the Industrial Commission in the case of Henry Corsten, Green Bay fireman.

As a result of the decision, the city of Green Bay will be forced to pay a Chiropractor's bill of \$ 150.00 incurred by Corsten after he had been injured in a collision between a fire truck and a street car.

The question raised by attorneys for the city and by the Industrial Commission was whether or not Chiropractic treatments come within the provisions of the state law providing for medical, surgical and hospital treatment.

Chiropractros are licensed in this state by a board of examiners in Chiropractic. Judge Zimmerman pointed out that "it appears that Chiropractors are as fully authorized to treat the sick as physicians and surgeons.

Alfano's cure was brought about by Dr. P. H. Griggs, a licensed chiropractor, who brought him out of the "attic of has-beens" in which he was stored due to his blindness.

Fight fans and Alfano's trainer had given him up as never being able to fight again. His accident happened after his 149th fight out of which he had lost only 18.

Alfano's injury occurred when he entered the ring agains he

he entered the ring against Sammy Offerman, when he fell and injured his spine at the base of the brain. Alfano has sought every known has sought every known means of restoring his sight but got no relief until Dr. Griggs discovered his trouble. Griggs discovered his trouble. Alfano, in an intervievy today, told a reporter, "Dr. Griggs has performed a miracle—I never expected to be able to fight again. My injury vvas terrible—nothing could be vvorse than to knovy that blindness is creeping slovyly but surely upon oneself." He said that his left eye vvas in such a condition that he vvas affected vvith double vision at times and at others he could not see anything.

Alfano gives Dr. Griggs credit for restoring his sight, for relieving him of severe headaches, and said that Dr. Griggs vvould be requested to be near at hand during his coming training periods and that he vvould never again enter thering unless Dr. Griggs vvas in his corner.

London telling of the or ganization of a widespread league to wage a campaign against the color bar in England. This association composed of liberalminded Englishmen of the older and younger generations, is distinct from the Leaque for the protection of colored people, recently formed also in London, with Dr. Moody of Jamaica as its head.

This movement is not being started too soon, as a matter of fact it is too long delayed. As the news article truly says, Britain has been allowing conditions to develop within the Empire which have been "alienating the minds of her colored sub jects and making them feel strangers in their own land". At the same time it is said that France is "making friends of the natives and teaching them pride in France".

The Colonial Exposition now being held in Paris is a significant gesture on the part of France to hold the affections of her co lored subjects and to stimulate an undying patrio tism in them. From every corner of French Africa, the French West Indies and French Indo - China have been gathered a stupendous assembly which is now bringing to the knowledge of Frenchmen the vast area and diverse races over which France rules. Similarly the appointing of Blaise Diagne, a coal black Negro from Senegal, as under secretary colonies, in Premier Laval's cabinet, proves that France does not re-cognize the color bar and is living up to her ideal of "Liberty, Fraternity and Equality".

On the other hand the situation in the British countries has been grovving more and more distressing for the colored man who has any pride in himself or any self res-pect. The United States can no longer boast pre-eminence as the land in which the poison of race

flourishes. In England colored subjects of the Empire are being humiliated solely because of the co-lor of their skin. In the colonies the door of opportunity is closed to them, and the boasted tradition of British fair play has become in many instances, only a mockery. No Chatham now thunders in Parliament against the nefarious color bar in South Africa, no Wilberforce is willing to give his life for human liberties and the equality of man. The natives of Autralia are ill-treated, Canada closes her doors to colored immigrants. In British East Africa the white planters vow to maintain supremacy over the natives, and to perpetuate the robbery of their lands. All this is leading to a serious unrest. India has already broken the bonds, and Lord Irwin, the late vice roy was for-ced to admit that the prestige of the white man lost forever in India' The tribes in Africa are stirring, and black men in the West Indies no longer bend the knee to the "massa".

Of these 6 were convicted three of vyhom were executed, two given life sentences and one adjudged insane. The mans I a u ghter cases numbered 27. In the previous year (1929) 21 cases were dealt with involving 24 persons; of vyhom 9 vere convicted, 6 being executed, 2 sentenced to penal servitude and one adjudged insane. When compared vvith other countries, the follovving is observed: Murders in Jamaica average about 14 or 15 per million. In England, vwhere the number of murders annually, for the size of the population, is the lovvest in the vvorld, the average is a little over one murder per million of population. America, vwhich easily takes first place among all countries, accounts for some thing like 12.000 murders each year giving an average of nearly 120 per million of population. In Trinidad, the figures are stated to be some vvhat like those in Jamaica. 41 cases of murder and Manslaughter vvere recorded in 1930, as compared vvith 23 in 1929.

And I am hoping that all of us, yes, every negro from foreign parentage residing in these Latin Aamerican states & especially those of us who have been fortunate to be citizens of this country where we have been enjoying so many privileges as though we were sons of the soil, notwithstanding our distant heritage, will never forget that, we owe our gratitude to the great statesmen and soldiers of Costa Rica, just as the Englishmen owe their liberty and freedom to those hardboiled, rough old barons, who away back yonder on the english meadows at Runnymede, at the point of a merciless sword made a contemptible cringing English tyrant sign the Magna Charta, and laid the first stone in the pillar of political freedom. tyrant signt the Magna Charta, and laid the first stone in the pillar of political freedom. And we owe something to those Costarican heroes who shook themselves from the Spanish conquest under the ruling of Fernando VII during the existence of the reign of the province of Guatemala just as the English Guatemala just as the English heroes who shook their fearless fists in the face of Charles First, another English tyrant, made him sign on the dotted line the Petition of Right, and laid the second stone in this pillar; we owe some gratitude to the legislature of Costa Rica for having legislated from time to time in such a form as to guarantee our freedom and to time in such a form as to guarantee our freedom and to remove any or all obstacles that would deprive us of an infinitesimum of our rights as a free people, just as the english people owe something to the British Parliament that would not allow William and Mary to sit on the British throne until they signed the bill of rights and laid the third stone on that documentary pillar of freedom.

So then we should always bear in mind that we are living in an independent democratic country, that we are enjoying the hospitality, benevolence and concord of a nation and people that owe us no reciprocity, and that we owe an abundance of gratitude to the people of Spanish America for their tolerance and generosity and that even after our departure from these shores wherever we may be, we shall never forget the Carrillos, the Moras, the Sotos, the Iglesias, the Esquivels, the Acostas, the Jimenez nor our present chief executive don Cleto González Víquez to whose health and to the prosperity of Costa Rica I invite you to drink. Three cheers to Costa Rica.

Some Questions For The Duchess of Atholl.

«The Forward» of Glasgow published the follow

ing: — Her Grace the Duchess of Atholl is still going strong about the ques-tion of slave-labour in Russia.

But what has she to say about the statement made by the Minister of Justice for South Africa reply given to a question.

According to a cutting ('The Natal Mercury") which a South African correspondent sends us, Minister of Justice

"that the system or hiring out prison labour had worked well tor the past 18 years, and a revenue of ... £ 120,000 a year was brought in. My own idea is that if possible that amout should be doubled. My offer at Bethal was made to every farmer. If we succeed in getting farm' ers to take all the convicts we can supply -some 5,000 - it would be a very fortunate thing indeed for the Treasury. So far, the system has worked system has worked extremely well. There is a lot of money involved in it, and I am not prepared Convention or no Convention, to depart from that system.

After further discussion the vote was agreed to."

So is the Duchess now prepared to demand that we should shut out all imports that come to us from South Africa?

And by the way, it is six months ago since we asked the Duke of Atholl to tell us what wages are paid to the natives that are employed on the sugar estates in Jamaica owned by the company of which he is a director.

And how do the wages and conditions of the natives that load the West Indies ship with Elder's and Fyffe's bananas (the Duke is a director of the Banana Combine) compare with the wages of the work-ers who load the ships with Russian timber?

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on Panama Canal

Since the opening of with a beam of 108 feet on the Panama Canal August 15th. 1914, this waterway has accommo dated no less than 65.000 vessels of all classes through her great gates and locks and carried a volume of this earth's products of about 300 million tons in varied merchandise.

These vessels have paid Tollage to the tune of about 300.000.000 dollars, the majority of its trade is from West to East being principally raw materials and the opposite route being manufactured articles. Chile is the heaviest producer of Canal traffic of the South American Countries, last year sending about . . . 1.750.000 tons of nitrates to Eastern Ports, Europe principally and considerable amount of wines made in Chile and shipped to Italy and Spain.

The commodities of greatest importance pas-sing through the Canal mineral oils, ores, Western Lumber, manufactures of Iron and steel. nitrates and wheat, each one of these exceeded 1.500.000 tons during last year.

Ceylon moving towards self-rule

What is regarded as the biggest experiment in Colonial government with the view of ultimately obtaining self rule has been introduced in the Colony of Ceylon.

The Legislative Council has elected a Speaker and seven Ministers, of whom all but two are Singalese. Each Minister will have charge of a Committee and will together, be responsible for all aspects of administration except and Finance, which are to remain under the control of officers of

Mexico and United States of America

It is calculated that it needs 2½ acres of land to maintain each individual, and it is shown that the total possible population that this area of arable land can be made to feed at the present scale of produc tion and consumption is 5 200.000.000, which figure is given as the «maximum comfortable population» that the earth's cultivable surface can

We are afforded some very interesting information regard-ing the population of Great ing the population of Great Britain as a result of the census taken last April. The total showed an increase of more than two millions when compared with the figures of the 1921 census, the totals being: England and Wales. . . being: England and Wales. . . 39.990,485 and Scotland . . . 4.800,000 with the women in the majority by 1.861,000; and although the birth rate had dropped by a millon and a quarter, the deaths had also fallen by one million. The population per square mile has also now reached the very high number of 685 persons. A remarkable feature of the census is with regard

to the enormous growth of the population of London, which has shewn an increase of 722,000 during the past ten years, an equivalent of ten per cent.

On comparing these figures with those recently given out regarding America, we note regarding America, we note that London is still much ahead of New York by nearly a million and a quarter souls, a fact which would hardly otherwise have been credited by most persons, having regard to the heavy additions made to her normal growth by the large influx of immigrants during the period under review. The respective figures are, London 8.202,818, New York 6.981,917.
