## Womanhood as it appears to us

The rights of womanhood or feminism rightly understood and well practised, instead of loosening or mitigating the ties of love, or disputing authority in the home, ought rather to contribute in fact and deed, to pervade or intermix her forces with a view of strengthening the will to outstretch the cords of affection that unite sincerely the man and the woman in the family Circle.

To recognize and strengthen the personality of the woman in the home, is the first authority that the man ought to exercise as a nontransferable right, the rights dictated and ordered by God; there would then be no fear that the discipline which ought to be exercised in the home would be relaxed, if the woman occupies the place which corresponds to her as mother and a Christian wife; a natural weakening would however be sure to ensue if the woman does not value her rights and obligations in the dignity of the Family. These should never be forgotten by the woman, because on this depends the rights of her legitimate and direct influence in the Family Circle and of her indirect influence on the Society in which she moves. It is only by her christianlike and dignified deportment, will she be able to demand from the man the rightful place to which she belongs, because, the moment she descends from such pedestal she ceases to be the companion of her partner but rather converts herself into his slave.

Therefore as soon as womanhood falls away from the idea for which God created her by a depreciation of her dignity, or demoralizes herself by immoral thoughts or actions, as a pretext of what she may deem a betterment in merely material realizations, she invites reproach on herself and ought to be shunned as one would a plague.

There are those narrow minded men who assert that there is no necessity for educating the girl as they would the boy there not being the necessity as a requirement to sustain the many battles of his life; but far should it be from us to oppose the higher culture of the woman, who has been created by God to be the companion, the helpmate not the slave of man; she is endowed with a highly intelligent soul, with a higher instinctive than man for knowing the Truth and for loving it; it is most convenient therefore that the woman should be well educated, for she in turn will have to instruct her children, giving them that first education

which shall serve as the basis of the instructions which they later shall receive from their teachers; and it is this education that creates the sagacity to overcome evil temptations, by means of the ambition inlaid in them through proper education.

It is essential therefore that true womanhood would reject the present day false decorousness, this stupid circumspection, this false affectation, she should look on all these as only a myth; it is necessary that they cultivate their understandings on a parallel with the coeval sciences of the day, in short, it is necessary that the twentieth century woman should know to lift herself from this shameful abjection in which they live until now—and elevate herself into an exalted womanhood, thus creating herself as the megaphone of all that tends to a life of rectitude and honourable mention in the Community in which she wields an influence.

The woman is therefore the all in all, and above all, the companion of the man in the home and when her life does not warrant being respected in this category, arguments and contentions will arise in that home, much to the detriment of the harmony and tranquility of domestic life, and breaks that peace and concord which forms the perfume for the correct and appropriate education of the children, who will most assuredly adopt the examples set them in the parental mode of life. She must by her sympathetic love to the man overlook his foibles, she must console him, try to make him happy when the misfortunes of his business affairs make him resentful, or dismantle his good humour, remembering that it is compassionate to console her neighbour, much more so is it incumbent on her so to do for her helpmate. It is equally the duty of the woman to study closely the wishes, the likes and dislikes of her husband in so far as they do not conflict with the laws of God or exceed the limits, of prudence; and if they transgress these limits, her finer sentiments of compassion will reproach him with affection not with austerity, remembering that the supreme authority of the home has been vested in him by Divine wisdom.

Above all it is acceptable and beneficial to womanhood, when the married woman (and those who propose to adopt themselves to married life) "adorn themselves with all the virtues that the estate of matrimony enjoins; among which, first and foremost is fidelity

to the husband; a good custodian and prudent administrator of the goods entrusted to her care; she must be industrious, diligent, a lover of her own home; but an enemy to idleness, keeping late hours, or being a street walker, she must avoid being a bore to her neighbours by frequent visits, she should abstain from frivolities and illicit diversions; she should be amiable, of a courteous disposition, pious, gentle, charitable and self respecting. She must realize the fact that instead of adorning herself with her best things to make herself presentable and attractive on the streets, she should keep those attractions for meeting her husband

on his way home from his work or business, and contrive to make him forget his worries in the busy world of business affairs by her affectionate and gay attractions, then will she be the idol of that home, and his centre of attraction in this giddy world of ours. Then and only thus will she be living up to the Standard of the helpmate and companion as she was intended by the Creator to be; thus will she be visioned as a highsouled woman, on whose brow will be imprinted Abiding faithfulness and Trust, Truthfulness and Bravery, and above all a generous heart, such an one as Ruskin described as "Love Visible".

it could only mean that he would use every means, by the strength of his votes, to prevent such an occurrence by political strategy, and that really there was nothing to be alarmed over; the public in the gallery however kicked up such a rompus that the chairman had to abruptly bring the session to a close.

## Cuba's Cattle rearing

While Costa Rica has to be importing from Nicaragua fully 50 percent of the cattle slaughtered for our consumption, we find Cuba is seeking outlets for getting rid of her stock for slaughter. The price for cattle in Cuba is 2.75 cents, while in this country it is 4.75 cents. on the hoof.

Cuba had at the end of 1930, 4,336,819 head of cattle on her 45,983 square miles of land, and Costa Rica only 352,636 on our 23,000 sq. miles of territory.

Cuba is a great meat consuming country it is shown by the statistics of the Ministerio de Fomento that for 1930, 77,360,805 kilos of beef besides 9,147,599 kilos of Pork and 376,970 kilos of Mutton were consumed.

This heavy increase in the cattle rearing industry of Cuba is due to the ruinous price of Sugar, on account of which many cane planters had to launch out into some other industry; so it will be here too, for with the slumps of bananas, being dumped in the sea up North as is being done, it is evident that banana planters will have to look to something else and as the banana fields afford good pasture lands, it is evident that Cattle rearing is the most feasible, especially as we must find meat to feed ourselves rather than be importing an article of diet that can easily be produced here.

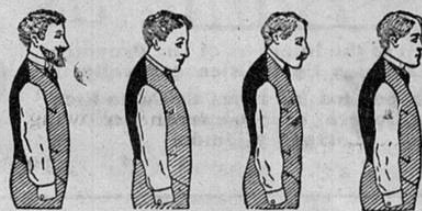
officers and 14,000 men of alien races on the roll of the U. S. Army, Navy and Marine Corps.

### Loss of Over 300,000 Banana Trees

In Saturday's issue of the Gleaner, the rough estimate given of the damage to bananas as a result of the storm that passed us on Thursday, was put down at over 200,000 trees. It can easily be put down at over 300,000 as a result of further enquiries.

The prices in America have so dropped that the loss will not prove very material at present.

### Banana conflict settled

The deadlock which occurred some weeks ago between the banana growers in the districts along the shores of Lake Gatun, Panama, and the buyers who supply the fruit to the United Fruit and Standard Cos. as a result of the latter dropping their prices to \$ 0.40, \$ 0.20 and \$ 0.15 has been settled, after a prolonged conference was held, in the office of the Governor. Under the agreement, which was signed by all the interested groups the buyers are to pay 55 cents per stem of 9 hands, 40 cents, per stem of 8 hands and 20 cents per stem of 7 hands, all payments to be made on a cash basis.

### Yet another Flag

Another flag was on the 8th. inst. added to the already long list of those which have come into existence since the World War. On that day the Indian Nationalists unfurled and saluted their new flag throughout the larger cities of India. ## Gasoline Monopoly

In view of the much discussed monopoly of Gasoline to bring this government a revenue of a million colones per annum by the adoption of a law to be framed for the purpose. The following information on the prices of gasoline for the year 1930 in the principal countries of the world is useful.

In the list it shows that in the United States where there is a Tax of 3.78 cents per gallon it is sold at 19.2 cents per gallon; Puerto Rico comes next and Norway at 22 cents with a tax of 6 cents per gallon; Canada comes next at 23.3 with a tax of 5 cents per gallon In Britain it is 28.6 cents per gallon with a tax of 8 cents; in France it is 32.7 cents; Colombia, Bolivia and Costa Rica are the dearest of all 47.2 57 and 45 cents respectively, what it will be here if the monopoly is adopted, God Knows.

## The International Lottery

A contract was signed with the Minister of Hacienda by a Mr. Minton for the purpose of running a Sweep Stake Lottery on Races to take place in Baltimore the government was to get a million colones per annum for the concession, besides, the Junta Caridad should get twenty per cent of the Tickets Sold in Costa Rica. The prizes amounted to one million two hundred and sixty thousand dollars; there were to be four principal prizes and 2,000 minor prizes of \$400 each. The Tickets were to be two millions at two dollars each.

Congress however turned it down on the grounds that there was no guarantee behind it.

The Syndicate occupied 21 Post office Boxes for the distribution of the Tickets there are supposed to have left this Country 300,000 letters with these Tickets; but each apartado was in a separate name, and the Tickets did not bear the name of the Cessionario; hence it was considered by Congress a Fake and declared Cancelled. Congress has asked the Minister of Gobernacion of investigate the affair which is now before the Courts.

# Actions speak louder than words

In all fairness to Don Ricardo Jimenez we have seen an insertion by Don Manuel Isaac Zuniga in La Tribuna that appeals to one very seriously and which ought to be proclaimed as meritorious to his past Administration. It is a reproduction of a paragraph of his Presidential Message of 1928, in which he stated that Revenue had exceeded that year any previous year, having realized \$ 30,500,000 with an expenditure of \$ 23,300,000 leaving a saving of... \$ 7,200,000 to be added to public utilities and reducing National debts. Besides all this he had constructed during his time 30 waterworks in Different Districts 101 Bridges over Roadways and 64 school houses; which gives on an average that during his Administration of 4 years in every 40 working days he had given a watersupply to some parching District, in every 19 days he had given a school to some Community, and in every 12 days he had secured life and property by placing a Bridge over some dangerous waterway.

Costa Rica who are free from personal objections, realize that Don Ricardo Jimenez as the only man who may be able to save the country from the chaotic situation in which we are found today.

## Egyptian Civilization

The Department of Egyptian and Assyrian Antiquities in the British Museum has recently secured, an important example of Sumerian sculpture from the site at Lagash.

The work dates from the reign of Gudea and his successor Ur-Ningirsu, in the 24th. century before Christ, thus making this work of fine art 43 centuries old.

Other lifesized sculptures of this period have also been discovered recently, illegally excavated within the past few years.

This Statue acquired by the Museum at a cost of £ 7,500 is a particularly fine work, imperfect only through the shattering of the body including the feet. The figure which represents one of these rulers is carved out of grey stone, and appears covered in fringed garment, the hands being clasped in the attitude of worship. The right arm and shoulder are bare and finely modelled, the beardless head is marred by a blow on the cheek.

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## GANDHI'S MISSION TO LONDON

### Gandhi Gives No Hope Of Going to London

Gandhi sees in the replies to his complaints "a complete indication that he must not sail to London" Government's attitude in the matter is that it was impossible to agree to an arrangement involving suspension of the ordinary law or the regular machinery of administration.

### Gandhi stands Firm.

ALEMADAHAD, Aug.—Gandhi stated to Reuter Press that the situation is unaffected by the interviews of Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru and Mr. Jayakar with him. Asked if there was any hope of his going to London if no Arbitration Board were appointed, but the Viceroy and the Government assured him that they would examine serious cases of breaches of the Irwin-Gandhi pact, he opined that such hope was unwarranted.

### Hope of Moslem

BOMBAY, Aug.—"God willing, I will bring back peace and freedom", declared the Moslem representative at the Round Table Conference, Shaukat Ali, before leaving the Peninsula for London with twenty-six other members of the Round Table Conference, including Bikanir Sapru.

### Discussion in London

LONDON, Aug.—The decision of Mahatma Gandhi not to attend the Indian Round Table Conference which will shortly be convened in London, has been the subject of serious discussion in the Press.

The Manchester Guardian says: "Something that emerges with complete clearness is that nothing has happened which really ought to prevent the Congress from sending their representatives to the Round Table Conference."

Disappointment at Gandhi's decision was expressed by the Viceroy of India, Lord Willingdon, in his telegram to Gandhi of August 13th. in which he said he "could have hoped that you would not have allowed disputes over the present details to prevent your serving India by participating in the momentous discussion of the future constitution which may determine the destiny of India beyond your time and mine."

It is realised, however, that regrettable as the absence of the Congress representatives would be, the continuation of the Irwin-Gandhi agreement is not involved.

Before leaving Bombay last night, Gandhi wrote a personal letter to the Viceroy explaining the implications of the resolution regarding the withdrawal of the Congress from the conference. He made it clear that the Congress would continue to honour the Delhi pact.

### New proposals

BOMBAY, Aug.—It is thought that a basis for negotiation may be provided by new proposals that have been made, and it is understood that Gandhi has sent a communication to the Viceroy, in which he waives the demand for the appointment of an arbitration board, to enquire into alleged breaches of the agreement between himself and Lord Irwin, if the Government is prepared to institute an enquiry through an impartial judge, such as the Judge of the High Court, in whom the public have confidence, and if a definite assurance is given, no coercive measures will be taken in future and there will be no breach of the Delhi pact committed.

Latest news is that Gandhi has decided to go to London taking his milch and spinning Wheel.

The distance between both places is 14 kilometers. Two kilometers of the roadway is already built and it is now proposed to build six kilometers more to cost \$ 80,000, this sum being at present available for the purpose; the remaining six kilometers will be completed later.

Ithaca, N. Y., May 23—Dr. Henry P. de Forest, of New York City, and Dr. Horace G. Baldwin, of Tannersville, N. Y., have been conducting researches in the medical laboratories at Cornell University here to discover the anatomical basis for what they are confident is a cure for various nervous irritations commonly mistaken for rheumatism. A series of ailments thought to be rheumatic, but really caused by mechanical nerve irritation, can be and have been cured by these physicians, but they have yet to find the anatomic substantiation of their method.

Among the numerous diseases which the researchers feel certain are susceptible of cure by their method are nervous prostration, neuritis, diabetes, Raynaud's disease, sciatica, lumbago, neuralgia, angina pectoris and various forms of painful affections generally classed as rheumatic. Such ailments, they say, are not really rheumatic, but are caused by mechanical nerve irritation.

The two doctors have treated thousands of supposed rheumatic cases with success. "We have done it, but how did we do it?" is the question they are asking themselves in their research work.

Drs. de Forest and Baldwin are working upon the theory that the afflictions named and other allied diseases have their seat in the sacro-iliac joint, at the base of the back, where the two pelvic bones are joined by the small ilium, the dorsal bone of the pelvis. A dislocation of this bone, they have proved to their own satisfaction, exerts pressure on nerves passing through the joint and may cause pain in the foot for one man, or chronic headache for another. By setting this bone in place they have worked "seemingly miraculous cures."

This is the mechanical end of their knowledge. The anatomic substantiation of the method they are at a loss to explain. They have procured the use of the Cornell anatomy laboratory and joined forces to attempt a solution of the question.

With the whole hearted cooperation of the staff of the Cornell Medical College, the physicians have been delving for the connecting link which they are certain exists in relationship between the sympathetic nervous system and the sacro-iliac joint. By dissection, by study of the human skeleton,

Dr. de Forest has observed and treated more than 1,000 cases in the last year, and Dr. Baldwin about 2,000 in the last three years. They relate another instance of a man afflicted with chronic headache who was almost immediately relieved and cured.

They tell of the cure of a man crippled in such a way that he was able to lie in bed only on his side. The patient had been ill for years, and the cure was effected in three hours.

Scientists are greatly interested in their research work. Dr. A. T. Kerr, secretary of the Cornell Medical College, put his private laboratory at the disposal of the physicians, and cooperated with them in every way.

It is hoped that the treatment, once it is analyzed and its anatomical basis discovered, may be applied by small-town physicians in all cases of the sort.

And What is Chiropractic?

The American Illustrated Medical Dictionary, by W.A.

Dorland, M.D., a member of the committee on nomenclature and classification of diseases of the American Medical Association, has the following definition of Chiropractic, i. e.:

**Chiropractic.**—A system of adjustment consisting of palpation of the spinal column to ascertain vertebral subluxations, followed by the adjustment of them by hand, in order to relieve pressure upon nerves at the intervertebral foramina so that nerve force may flow freely from the brain to the rest of the body. — (Palmer.)

## World Commodities

The acreage of cotton cultivation in the United States has been 40,129,000 acres with an average yield of 185.8 pounds per acre, gives a production of 15,584,000 bales of 500 pounds each, exceeding the yield of last year by 1341,000 bales.

The prices of the manufactured cotton goods are: printcloths range from 4 1/4 to 6 cents per yard of 38 1/2 to 37 inches width; sheetings, 36 to 40 inches, from 3 1/2 to 5 1/4 cents per yard.

Pyjama checkings 36 1/2 inches 5 to 6 cents; Drills, 37 ins, 5 1/2 cents; Filling satens, 37 1/2 inches 7 to 7 1/4 cents, Carded Lawns 5 1/4 to 6 cents. The profits to importers in this country can well be realized on such cotton goods.

Raw Sugar can only realize 1 1/2 cents per pound, refined 4 1/2 cents.

The world consumption of Coffee for this year has been 1856,387 bags.

Cacao; warehouse stocks at New York were 227,090 bags with a price of 4 1/8 cents per pound.

Rubber price fetched 5 1/2 cents per pound, there were 43658 Tons shipped from Malay in July.

The New British Cabinet has been formed as follows: Ramsay MacDonald Prime Minister and first Lord of The Treasury; Stanley Baldwin President of the King's Privy Council; Phillip Snowden, Minister of Finance; Sir Herbert Samuels Minister for War and Police; Lord Sankey Lord High Chancellor y Privy Seal; Lord Reading Min. of Foreign Affairs; Sir Samuel Hoare Min. Internal Affairs; J. H. Thomas Min. for the Dominions and Colonies; Neville Chamberlain, Secretary of public health; Sir

Phillip Cunliffe Lister, Secretary of Commerce; Sir John Gilmour, Secty. of Agriculture; Sir Austen Chamberlain, first Lord of the Admiralty; Lord Londonderry, Secty. of Labour; Lord Lothian, high Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster; Lord Amulree, Secty. of Aviation; Mr. Mc. Lean, Secty. of Education; Sir Archibald Sinclair, Secty. for Scotland.

Premier Mc. Donald made an appeal to the nation for support of the Ministry of this coalition government formed of four labourites, four conservative and two liberal members to cope with the present economic difficulties, in consequence of which his government had fallen chiefly in not being able to provide for the unemployed, due to the pressure put by American Bankers in refusing to finance the labour scheme for unemployment. He called attention to the necessity of a general National economy as well as the necessity of increased taxation to remedy the situation. Mr. T. A. Kitchener, L. B. founder of the Boston Chronicle, and a prominent citizen of Boston, also visited his home, after an absence of 31 years.

The progress made by these talented sons of the Isle of Springs, is further evidence of the opportunities to be taken advantage of in the great Cosmopolitan Republic referred to in another article, when the citizen has the qualifications and ambition to bring himself fame.

## Coalition Government

The labour government of Great Britain has fallen and in its place will be a provisional coalition government of all the Parties. At 10.30 a. m. of the 24th. Ramsay Mc. Donald arrived at Buckingham Palace to acquaint the King that his Cabinet had resigned, and advised him to call Stanley Baldwin, head of the Conservative opposition party and Sir Herbert Samuels, head of the Liberal Party, in the absence by illness of Lloyd George, to discuss the feasibility and necessity of forming a coalition government as a means of solving the present most serious economic crisis. Sir Herbert arrived at the Palace at mid-day and consulted with the King for half an hour, Baldwin arriving immediately after and consulted for an hour, and declared to His Majesty that himself and his Party were disposed to assist in the formation of a Coalition Cabinet, under the leadership of Mc. Donald, to tide over the present difficulty, because he said, the formation of a national government made up by members of the three parties will be a guarantee that the gravity of the situation is understood and consequently, the necessary measures will be taken to place the finances of the country on a sound basis; as it does not signify a permanent coalition, but merely a

transitory arrangement which is indispensable to confront the present situation.

In this Cabinet there will be three Conservatives, three Liberals and the balance Labourites: Baldwin, Chamberlain and Hoare will be selected from the Conservatives with Sir Herbert Samuels and two others from the Liberals.

In American financial circles the attitude displayed by the British political groups, for placing aside their party interests, and forming a Cabinet of concentration, to grapple with the serious economic situation has given rise to a most pleasing impression of the patriotism of British politicians, and as a consequence the Federal Reserve Bank is disposed to extend to Britain the credits necessary to solve the situation, and the Governors of the Banks have conferred so as to be ready for whatever calls may be made on them.

## World affairs American workmen for Russia

6000 American workmen and their families have embarked from New York for Moscow, where work has been guaranteed them on similar terms with the natives, these are principally Carpenters, Masons and Railroadmen.
