Anent the sailing of Christ-pher Columbus from Palos, Spain to discover A sia and Japan via the Atlantic, history recalls that other explorers had sailed from explorers had sailed from Europe for the same purpose, but as their discoveries were never given publicity, very little or any thing was known to the world about the existence of the western hemisphere or world. It is said that or world. It is said that amongst the many explorers who came to the Western continent, was, Leif Erickson, who died shortly after his return, thus there was but very little to his acheivement in this direction.

Columbus, history tells us was born of humble parentage in the town of Genoa in the year 1446 or 1451, this date is not correct according to the encyclopedia Britanica and supported by the data on the subject from the publishing huse Las Casas. He was the son of Domenico Colombo and Suzzana Fontanarossa, his father being a wool comber of some small means. He was schooled in the University at Paland devoted himself to astronomy, Geometry and Cosmography, (the latter a science which teaches us of the whole system of the worlds, the figure, disposition, or relation of all it's parts, and the manner of representing them on the planes) Therefore it can be seen from the foregoing that Colombo, was like gethe planes) Therefore it can be seen from the foregoing that Colombo, was like geniuses, set from birty, to have accomplished this singular and notorious achievement which was not duplicated in the world. According the general history & correct authography of the life and activities of this gr at man, it can be realized, that Columbus, suffered errible consequences and set backs in lumbus, suffered errible con-sequences and set backs in the bringing into realization of his ideas, ambitions and greatest aspiration, that of tre discovery of the west-tern world, though as we may further gather, from the said records pertaining to ait, he sufferred intrigue, at-ter he had presented his proposals and plans to the John the Second of Portu-gal, who after considering gal, who after considering the same presented it to a the same presented it to a commission for study, who commission for study, who in a like manner, gave a decision adverse, whilst on the other hand, intrigue was preparing to rob Columbus of his great idea; this intrigue was especially planned and engineered by the Bishop of Cueta, wno proposed that the plan should be executed in secret unknown to Columbus, and as evidence of the fact, that right must have it's way and justice must prevail, inspite of all things, the two caravel whiche were prepared and all things, the two caravel whiche were prepared and dispatched on the adventure, returned to P rtugal after a brief absence of a few days, the sailors having lost heart and refused to verture further, thus the culmination of what would have otherwise been, a cheating of Colum-

bu's original and legitimate

plans

He soon left Portugal se-He soon left Portugal secretly, unknown to the King, so that they should not know his whereabouts or destination, whilst it was said that he left in that manner to evade the persecution of his creditors for the debts which be owed. Hesoon arrived in the south of Spain and immediately began negotiations the debts which be owed. Hesoon arrived in the south of Spain and immediately began negotiations with the King of France to sponsor his adventure in 1491 though the Duke of Medina Celt, who was greatly encouraged about the possibilities and soon arranged to finance the trip, prepared the vessels etc.; but there came the set back and after further consideration of the project it was thought to too vast, and consequently he was not able to go on this support. Columbus there upon turned his attentions the Queen Isabel of Spain. The King & Queen of Spain were very much inclined towards supporting the proposals of the mariner and the matter was submitted to the care of Alfonso of Quintanilla, whom Colombus soon got very enthusiastic over his plans, and caused him to give a very favourable report to their Majesties. However at this time, Spain had her hands filled with the conquets of the Granada Moors and could not in justice to the merits of the gigantic proposal of the Genoese, give the same the proper consideration and study vehich it deserved, thus it veas again postponed for such time until Spain could have vanquished the Moors and have time to adequately conclude the proper negotiations.

Columbus, hovever continued to negotiate his plans

Columbus, however continued to negotiate his plans until he finally left in disgust and despair, for in 1491 the matter being again referred to the throne was submitted to a Junta, who also rejected the offer, and all that Colombus received was a promise that after the war with the Moors was over they would give his plans further eonsideration and help him if it was merited. In dispair, he betook himself for Huelva, a little Spanis town in Andalucía, north-west of Cadiz, with the intention of taking the ship to France.

He is said to have halted at the monastery of La Rabida, near Huelva and still nearer.

Negotia-Columbus, strong in his belief, stuck to his terms and demands, he asked for the rand of Admiral of the Ocean in all those Islands, seas and continents that he might discover, the vice royalty of all he should discover, and a tenth of the precious metals discovered within his admiralty. admiralty.

These conditions were rejected and the negociations were again interrupted. Followed by an interview with Mendoza without any results, and before the close of January 1492 he again set out for France. At length however

LIMON A FREE PORT

Many have been the calls we have had as to the intentions of making Limon a «Free Port», there are those who are imma-gining that the intention is to have a suspension of customs duties on goods imported for general consumption, others think that certain lines of goods only will be admitted fre of duty, whilst others will maintain the usual impuestos of Customs duties, while there are still others who miantain that it wil be run on a paralel with the Zone Customs where the merchandise imported for the maintenance of the employees of the Canal Department would be able to buy their goods

being cheaper exemptfrom duties, so would some favoured companies or importers be able to extend preferential treatment to their dependents by way of handing out cheaper goods as a setoff against the reduction of wages so prevalent among us now-o'-days. These are all very erroneous ideas, and can hardly he expect-ed to even be argued among any who have an inkling of intelligence, considering that the Customs Dpt. is the most important Revenue in the country, being estimated this year at an aggregate of twelve million colones

ailed to twenty four millions, how could such an idea be entertained we are at a loss to immagine.

The idea is to make Li-mon a Central Port, a sort of Deposit Port where all goods in Transit for the other Central American Republics, would be left by ships that do not touch on such Ports for which they are consigned, and despatched by some other boat that may arrive with a destination for the Port of destiny of such intran-sit goods; these cargoes would be left free of duties or port-charges to be forwarded by the Agents by the first outgoing boats for the Ports to which



This means would serve admirably the Pacific Coast of these Central American conutries; because say for instance merchandise was destined for Managua Nicaragua, it would be thrown out here, loaded on our Railway, shipped to San Jose, transferred to the Puntarenas by means of the Government's Pacific Railway, put on the first ship calling at Corinto and so be discharged in Managua within five or six days, especially as there is no adequate Port or Railway facilities on the Atlantic Coast of Nicaragua, and so it would be for the conveniences of the other Central Ameri-can Republics, because small Coastal boats would soon be placed on an itinerary from Limon to Belize for instance, by means of which such intransit goods would be rushed to their ports of destination, where direct communication with heavy Ocean Liners are not existent. On the other hand it is

well known that the Fa-nama Canal will soon be enlarged so as to cope with the increasing de-mand of ocean trade, and during the operations for improving her capacity, it must be conjectured that her traffic will be congested, therefore Limon as a Central Port must be resorted to as a means of transporting by her in-teroceanic Railways the

Hostile conduct of Japain

Japan and China have been practically at war with each other now for some time; in spite of the efforts of the Powers to put an end to the warlike preparations of each country and to the many acts country and to the many acts of aggression advanced by Japan. China has appealed to the League of Nations, Japan wants private settlements with China but this is refused by China, and now at a meeting of the Advisory Council of the League of Nations on the 15th the representative for Japan Mr. Yoshizawa says his country refuses to sit in Council so long as the United States sits in the Chamber, even as an observer, this has thrown the Council of the League in a panic. The cable reads.

Geneva 15th a lamentable and truly sensational stage occurred this morning, during occurred this morning, during an exchange of conversations more or less favourable to arrangement of a favourable ending to the Chinese-Japanese dispute, when the Japanese delegate Mr. Yoshizawa received definite orders from his government to reject any participation on the part of The United States on the Council even in the character of an observer. Immediately of an observer. Immediately the Council suspended its de-liberations truly surprised over the attitude adopted by the Japanese government, which is attributed to the declarations made yesterday by the Secretary of State Stimson which are considered very austere. For several hours the greatest consternation reigned but later on the members of the **Big Five** with the ex-ceptisn of those for Japan met at four o'clock in the af ternoon to resume transac-tions, to realize what were the tions, to realize what were me real motives that induced the Mikado to reject the presence of the United States whose personality there, was only personality there, was only recognized as a friendly co-

worker.

Great anxiety exists to know what was the result of the evening Session, with regard to the latest instructions received by delegate Yoshizawa from his government. An understanding has however been given by Japan that she has no intention of going to war with China, her actions are only with the idea of protecting her citizens doof protecting her citizens do-miciled in the Manchurian Territory.

The Northern Railvvay paid a dollar for every tie used formerly on the Roadvvay of good quality and the same can be done here, so as to keep as much as possible of the money to be spent on the Railvvay in the country.

Don Ricardo has identified himself vvith every move that had any relationship tovvard the betterment of Limon, such as Agricultural Societies, Roads building, Canalization, et. etc. And he recognizes the value of the coloured people as Colonizers, therefore he is much beloved and respected by them, and his successes are followed with much interests by all on the Atlantic side. Some time ago we heard of a dispecte between the recently formed District No. 10 of the Samaritans, when this District placed an injunction before the Law Courts here, against the Reorganized Mt. Purity and the St. Stephens Lodges of the Same Order forbidding them to work without being afiliated to them.
These Lodges contend-

ed that according to the Constitution the District could not go to Law with them until they had exhausted every means of arbitration pos sible, and so complained to their High Executive the National Grand Council of the U.S. A. This Council in turn directed the District Grand

Lodge No. 10 to with-draw the lawsuit it had instituted against these Lodges; this has been

have been occasioned for lawyers fees etc., to defend themselves before they will treat with the District Lodge; failing which they have placed a claim for such expens es before the lawcourts to recover the unnecessary amounts spent.

In the meantime the Executive Council has sent down a suspension order against the Mt. Purity Lodge for claimher cost ing against the District with orders to the District to recover the working paraphernalia of such Lodges and prevent them from tunetioning: at the same time the District Charts of Panama, Colon and Limon have been recalled for purposes of reterritorializing them.

This step now taken should have been taken three years ago, then there would have been no dispute, because the Panama District Lodge No. 7 was given in the old days territorial Jurisdiction over Lodges in Panama, Costa Rica and Nicaragua, then the No. 10 District of Costa Ridone, but the Lodges ca was instituted wit now claim that they must out curtailing the Righ be reimbursed the out of the Panama No. ca was instituted without curtailing the Rights

The fight is going to be a stubborn one, because these Lodges claim that they are registered under the laws of Costa Riea and were so, long before the District was incorporated, hence their goods and chattels, bought with their own moneys cannot be taken away from them; to the contrary they are claiming that from the fact that they would not be allowed to enter the U.S. A. to place their grievances be-fore the Council, they will decide to secede from the American Jurisdiction, and revert to the British Independent order; thus it seem as if there is going to be a great split in the Ranks of the National Grand Lodge Jurisdiction again,

on the entreaty of the Queen's confidante, the Marquess of Moya, of Luis de Santangel, receiver of the ecclesiastical revenues of the crown of Aragon, and of ot er countries, Isabel was induced to determine on the expedition, a messenger was sent after Columbus and exertook him at a bridge expedition, a messenger was sent after Columbus and overtook, him at a bridge called «Pinos» 6 miles from Granada. He returned to camp at Santa Fe, and on the 17th of April 1492, the agreement between him and their Catholic Majesties were signed and sealed.

t eir Catholic Majesuctier Cat pangu or Japan, but also the opening of intercourse with the gandkhan of Cathay he received a royal letter. After all arrangements

After all arrangements were concluded and Columbus with great difficulty was furnished men for the equipfurnished men for the equipment of his ships etc., etc., sailed out of the town of Palos with three ships, the Santa Maria, The Niña and the Pinta, with a crew comprising a total of altogether 88 souls on Friday the 3rd. of August 1492 at 8 o'clock in the morning.

He first reached the Canary Islands, were he stopped

nary Islands, were he stopped and from thence he proceed-ed until he reached or sighted the first land of the new world or an island called Guanahani which he afterwards named, San Salvador. This island is now generally identified with the Watling Islands, then he discovered Cuba, Puerto Rico, and San-to Domingo. He settled here from some time and then he returned to Spain taking Indians, animals, peices of gold etc.

In 1493 he discovered Jamaica and other islands of the lesser antilies, and again returned to Spain. In a fourth and last trip he dis-covered Cabo Gracias, Hon-dutas, after he had called up on this trip to Santo Do-mingo, and refused landing, because of trouble waged on him and which caused

on him and which caused the appointment of another Governor. Etc.
On the 18 of September in the year 1502 he anchored of Cariay bay of Limon and dusembarked on the Island quay of La Uvita, he stayed here for 17 days, whilst he repaired his vessels which got out or order, during this repaired his vessels which got out or order, during this time he made exchanges or merchandise with the indians for curios and other goods and novelties. He returned to Spain in 1504 and soon after died with out being

able to get Ferdinand the Second of Spain to carry out the Crowns end of the con-tract, he cied on t e 20th of May of 1506, poor, with out even knowing that he had discovered a new world, as he always beleived that the lands discovered by him were belonging to Oriental India. This ended the life and wonderful career of one of the greatest men that the world has ever known, and who got nothing in return for what he bore and risked his life to unvea to the human race for their benefit and grandeur.

There are those who are thinking that the old Bodegas outside the wharf gates could be used, but these would entail too great an expense for loading in the Railway Cars, and unloading outside with the same process over again when a ship offers; therefore to economize in the costs to the mer-chants who own these goods, Warehouses and facilities must be constructed and provided on the Piers, even if these have got to be extended for the purposes; hence our work men must be benefitted by the transaction.
