especially at this time in the history of the coun try so ull of straitened afflictions, never before encountered by any other ruler; but from his high sense of patriotic duty, he is obliged to cons ider well before giving thought to such a reso lution; first and foremost judging from the actual political circumstances, his retirement would let loose a tempest of disorders that might lead the country into civil disturbances so much to be depreciated, because were he to resign in fa-vour of his nephew the first Vice-President Mr. Fabio Baudrit, his con-duct in political affairs would naturally be the same as outlined by his government, he befing o the sam : idea as his, as evidenced by his man ner of conducting his department of Minister of interior affairs, hence the mere changing of names would not give any satisfaction in the minds of those who may be feeling that a change in Administration might be a means of amelior ating our present ills.

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The Death Of Edison

Thomas Alba Edison known as the Electrical wizard of Menlow N. Park died on Monday last at 3.24 a. m. surrounded by his wife and five children, had been ill from he diabetes for some weeks and been lying in a state of Coma for more than a week.

He was born in the state of Ohio in 1847 from whence he removed with his parents to Mí chigan at the age of seven, he used to sell news' papers as a boy, but was always studious in Mechanical experiments while selling his papers; in 1862 he published a small Weekly paper of his own in an old freight Car which he used as his workshop, later on he got a job as Telegraph Clerk in the Grand Trunk Railway and his first invention was to make a repeater which automatically would transfer a message to another line without the need of an operator; he wastransferred to Boston where he perfected se-veral telefonic apparatuses, by which means he was able to secure a laboratory of his own. He invented the Microphone, and then made the Telephone a commercial convenience. In 1878 he gave the

world the Phonograph, and the following year he perfected the Incan descent electric light. which has so revolutionized the lighting facili ties of the world.

In 1886 he constructed his own laboratory at Orange from whence he emanated but very sel-dom and where he has given to the world so many conveniences of by dedicating all his life. intelligence, genius, and tenacity to a labourious existence up to the time he was taken seriously ill his life a continous and laborious school of industrious application and ingenuity, by whose dedication the world has bencfitted so much and millionaires have sprung up overnight by harnessing his descoveries, of whom President Hoover declared when his death was announced In every Nation at different epochs of the world's history men have arisen whose mission here has been none but as bene factors to humanity, such distinction has been the life of Thomas Alva Edison, whose death, has put an end to an existence truly Marvelle by the great tasks it made possible, and

Marconi exclaimed. Edison lent incald

lable services to humanity, because the influence of his discoveries cannot yet be apprecia. ted, from the fact that they have come to trans' form completely the bases of Science. I feel deeply this loss which up to a certain point, and after a fashion is my personal loss, be cause he inspired me with a great part of my inspiration to work in the investigation of Scientific researches. His funeral is a world wide celebration and he will be finally intered in Ohio at the home where he was born.

State Hospital-School Dilema

Extremists will contend that the right or wrong of the University Hospital and Medical School controversy may be found on one or the other-side. A very unfortunate situation has arisen over the official inarisen over the official in-jection of the feud between the regular school of phy-sicians and the chiropractors. A clear headed observer is bound to see that the matter is one important beyond the immediate clash and even the threatened disruption of the medical-school and demo-ralization of the hospital. on this big controversy had an acute human angle. A patient was in a very serious condition from paralysis; re-gular physicians had said there was no hope for her. T e husband, concerned as any normal man would be under the circumstances, was in a frame of mind to try any expedient or take any mea-sure which offered any hope. In this case a chiropractor was selected and the husband appealed to the governor against exclusion of the prac-titioner. The governor, so far as announcements are av-ailable, issued an order for admission upon the principle that the hospital is a state institution and that the state could not make discrimina-tions between faiths and practices. The report is t at became very much better. When Dr. Leroy Long, dean of the medical school,

when Dr. Leroy Long, dean of the medical school, resigned, the state lost the services of a very valuable man, a citizen and profes-sional leader of high rank. That action seems to put the school and hospital in jeopardy The doctor's action was prompted by a sense of outrage due to an executive order for the admission of a chiropractor upon request of a patient in the state hos-pital. The standing of the state medical school, which uses the hospital as a base, is said to be endangered. It is allied with an association of the regular, ethical sort, and the association objects to practitioners from other to practitioners from other schools to hospitals under its auspices.
